

Talco-Bogata Schools To Open August 20th

The Talco-Bogata Schools will hold the first day of classes for the 1984-85 school year on Monday, August 20. Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeterias.

Buses will make their regular runs on Monday morning with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual. It will probably take one or two days to establish regular times for each bus route. Should the bus fail to pick up a student for any reason, please

contact the appropriate building principal.

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are new to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School, 632-5204 for information regarding bus routes during the week of August 13-17.

All students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or

before September 1 of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled as well as first grade students who did not attend kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling for the first time in the district.

Parents are also reminded that all children entering Elementary Schools in Texas must have met the required State immunizations of diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella. All students in high school must have diphtheria, measles,

tetanus and polio immunizations up to date.

Pre-registration for new students moving in to the Talco-Bogata School district over the summer who will be attending Rivercrest High School for the 1984-85 school term should report to the Rivercrest High School office Thursday, August 9 or Friday, August 10 between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Registration for K-8 in the Talco and Bogata schools will be held on the first day of school, Monday, August 20, 1984.

Homemaking Teachers At Conference

Mrs. Anita Stubblefield, home economics teacher at Rivercrest High School is attending the Texas Education Agency's 1984 State Inservice Education Conference for Vocational Home Economics Teachers. The conference, in session at the Amfac Hotel, Dallas Ft. Worth Airport, began on Monday afternoon with exhibits of teaching aids and equipment.

The first general session featured Dr. Peter Bishop, University of Houston, whose presentation on the topic "Living in a State of Change" focused on the areas of natural resources, demographics, energy, economics and social structure.

On Tuesday, participants received intensive training for effective implementation of the mandates of House Bill 246. On Wednesday, teachers selected four workshops from a field of twenty topics representing current trends and issues in home economics education.

The meeting closes with area meetings on Thursday. The theme of the conference is "Change: Education's Challenge."

Red River Ambulance In Fifth Year

The Board of Directors and staff of Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. are concerned that the residents of the Bogata area feel that the ambulance service has forgotten them by no longer having an ambulance in Bogata. Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. began its fifth year of operation on December 1, 1983 as the ambulance service in Red River County, and we cannot emphasize enough that we are providing service to all the residents of Red River County, and the Bogata area is certainly as much a part of this county as any other area.

One very important factor to remember is that Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. was established as a non-profit corporation and is governed by a 15 member Board of Directors which includes representatives from all over the county. The directors are Perry O'Brien, president, Clarksville; Travis Hale, vice-president, Bogata; Bill Bryson, secretary, Clarksville; Morris Foster, Bogata; J.C. Watson, Bogata; Roy Lee Castleberry, Deport; Bobby Brem, Annona; Sybil Coffman, Bagwell; Ed Dickson, Clarksville; Jonathan Godfrey, Clarksville; Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Latimer, Detroit; Robert Moreland, Avery; Lucille Samuels, Clarksville; and L.D. Williamson, Clarksville. Charles Young is the accountant for the organization. The directors do not receive compensation for serving on the board, and we hope this makes the county residents feel comfortable and confident that their money which is paid for membership is handled wisely and always in their best interest.

The day to day operations are directed by Manager Allan Helberg who has been charged by the Board of Directors to see that the ambulances are equipped and staffed 24 hours per day, seven days a week, so that if any county resident is in need of an ambulance, one will respond to their aid. In the last few months the most modern equipment has been placed on all three ambulances so that better patient care can be provided.

The staff of Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. is continually upgrading their training and certification. The Texas Department of Health certifies all ambulances and recognizes four certification levels of training and skills, the Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) and three levels of Emergency Medical Technician (EMT): EMT-Basic, EMT-SS (Specially Skilled) and EMT-P (Paramedic). ECA means an individual who has completed a minimum of 40 hours of classroom training approved by the Texas Department of Health and who is

certified by the department to provide emergency pre-hospital care by providing initial aid that promotes comfort and avoids aggravation of an injury or illness. EMT-Basic means an individual who has received a minimum of 100 classroom hours, 20 hours of observation and on the job training in hospitals, three emergency ambulance runs and who is certified by the department as minimally proficient to perform emergency pre-hospital care that is necessary for basic life support and that includes the control of hemorrhaging and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). EMT-SS means an individual who has successfully completed the EMT-Basic requirements and an additional minimum of 60 classroom hours, 50 hours of observation and on the job training in hospitals, 50 hours of advanced life support ambulances and who is certified by the department as minimally proficient in performing skills required to provide emergency pre-hospital care by initiating, under medical supervision or standing orders, intravenous therapy and endotracheal or esophageal intubation or both. EMT-P means an individual who has successfully completed the EMT-Basic requirements and an additional minimum of 160 classroom hours, 140 hours of observation and on the job training in hospitals, 100 hours on a mobile intensive care ambulance and who is certified by the department as minimally proficient to provide emergency pre-hospital care by providing advanced life support that includes initiation, under medical supervision or standing orders, of intravenous therapy, endotracheal or esophageal intubation or both, electrical cardiac defibrillation or cardioversion and drug therapy.

All attendants that respond on the Red River Ambulance Service units are at the EMT level. Currently the full time staff includes four certified as EMT's at Basic Level and one certified as EMT Specially Skilled. Within two months as a result of additional training and certification, the full time staff will consist of two EMT Paramedics, one EMT Paramedic, LVN, one EMT Specially Skilled and one EMT-Basic. In addition to the full time staff, Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. maintains an excellent reserve staff to respond when needed and relieve the full time staff periodically. The reserve staff includes one EMT-Paramedic, RN, one EMT-Specially Skilled, and three EMT, RN's, one EMT, LVN and four EMT's at the Basic level.

An amendment to the Emergency Medical Services Act relating to hospital and emergency medical

services was passed by the 63rd legislature in 1983 and amends the Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes to affect certification requirements as follows:

1) from January 1, 1984 through December 31, 1984, every basic life support ambulance must be staffed with at least two attendants, one of whom shall be trained at the ECA level and

2) on or after January 1, 1985, with at least two ECA attendants.

Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. already far exceeds the minimum requirements for January 1, 1985 and will continue to increase the levels of training and certification of all personnel associated with the service.

Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. is dispatched by the Clarksville Police Department. The dispatchers are trained to receive the calls and have an ambulance responding to the aid of county residents within minutes. The number to call in an emergency is 1-214-427-2911. For those residents on the Clarksville 427 exchange, the number is 911. We continue to maintain an emergency number in the Bogata area. That number is 632-5115. Mary Lassiter receives the call and then requests the ambulance by calling the Clarksville Police Department at 1-214-427-2911.

All of the ambulances of Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. are located in Clarksville with the office in the City Hall at 800 West Main. It is a fact that our response time will not be within five minutes to all areas of the county. However, we will respond in the quickest time possible, and when we arrive the patient will be cared for by the most well trained staff available, in our county, in emergency patient care. We want all the residents of Red River County to know that Red River Ambulance Service, Inc. cares about you and when you need us, please call. We are here to serve you.

A chicken snake in a re-closer at the Rivercrest Power Station was the culprit blamed for a two and one-half hour black-out in Talco on Sunday night according to Thomas Jackson, serviceman for Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

Most residents had retired for the night or were watching the 10 o'clock news when lights, TV, air conditioners and other electrical appliances went off and darkness settled over the town. Now, for a

world run by electricity, that can be a catastrophe especially in a little oil field town.

Creaks and groans of the pumping units and the hum of the electrical equipment cease, all is quiet except for the occasional barking of a dog and a truck or so passing on the highway.

The Talco Station was flooded with light from pickup trucks as service men looked for the trouble there, found none, and moved on to the Rivercrest Station.

The flicker of flash lights danced here and there as pumpers checked their leases, shutting down their pumping units, salt water pumps and lack units. About the time this was finished, the power was back on and they rode the lease roads, turning the power back on to each unit, salt water pump and etc.

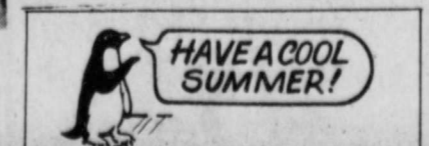
