

# Talco-Bogata Trustees Study Budget

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools meeting in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, August 14 at 7:30 p.m. gave tentative approval to the 1984-85 school budget. Official adoption of the budget will

be made after the Public Hearing which is scheduled for Tuesday, August 28 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest.

If approved, the 1984-85 budget would call for total expenditures estimated to be \$2,221,530 as compared to \$1,920,434 for the previous school year, an increase of \$301,096. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan stated that this is not a true increase in expenditures since approximately \$150,000 of this amount is flow-

through money that must be budgeted as an expenditure in keeping with changes in the State finance system. He said, that in his opinion, the 1984-85 school budget has only about a \$150,000 increase over that of the previous year. Most expenditures in the various budget items are about the same as the previous year with the exception of increases in teacher salaries as mandated by the Special Session of


the 68th Legislature and approximately \$40,000 that is budgeted for improvement to facilities.

Taxable values for the school district are estimated to be \$141,800,000 as compared to \$150,265,000 for the previous year, a loss of about \$9,000,000 with the most of this being attributed to a decrease in oil values.

It is estimated that the school district will receive \$1,205,800 in

State Aid with the remainder needed to finance the budget coming from local revenue and balances in various funds. It is estimated that it will take a \$7.70 tax rate to finance the budget which is a \$0.05 increase in rate over the previous year. However, the exact tax rate cannot be set until the school district receives a certified tax roll from the Red River County Appraisal Board.

Superintendent Morgan said that the Special Session of the 68th Legislature has made many changes in the operation of schools in Texas and that the full impact of these changes are not realized at this time.

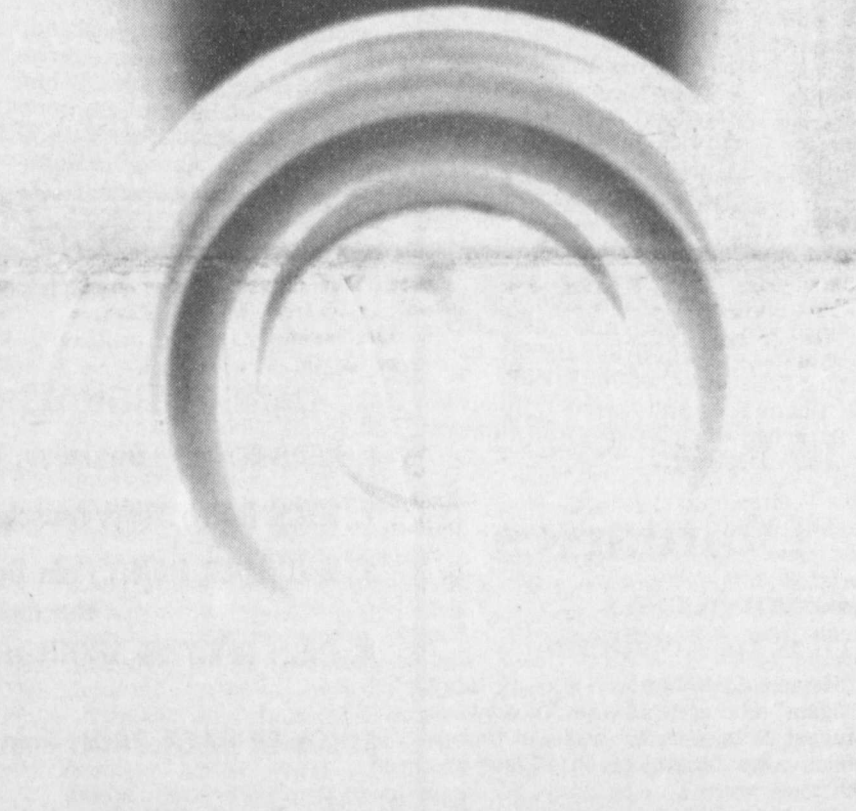
## Guess What Contest Draws Big Response

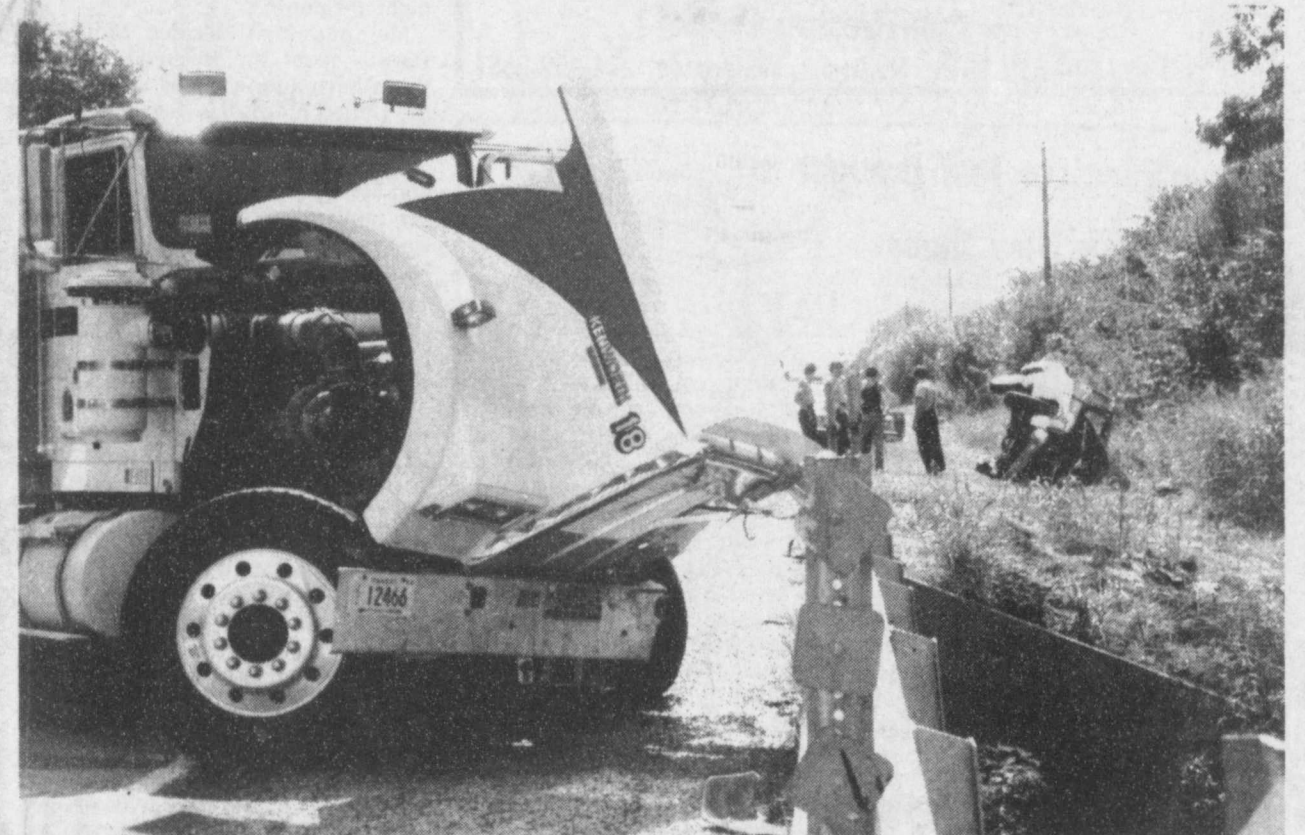

## School Lunch Prices Announced

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55 cents and high school students may buy breakfast for 65 cents. Extra milk may be purchased for 25 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free or reduced price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, you must fill out an application, which is available at the school office, as soon as possible, sign it and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by

each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time. If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for

these benefit. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Talmadge Morgan at Box 125, Bogata, Texas or call 632-5205.

The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact us. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.
