

# Multiple Fires And Break-Ins Pague Area

Four fires, a break-in and an attempted break-in have had the Deport, Blossom and Bogata Volunteer Fire Departments, plus Lamar and Red River County law officers busy since Thursday of last week.

A house on Front Street in Blossom was totally destroyed by fire Thursday night. Blossom Volunteer Firemen worked hard to control the blaze and keep it from spreading. The house has been vacant for around a year, and there was no

electric or gas service in use. The origin of the blaze has as yet not been determined.

A late model John Deere combine, belonging to Kenneth Thomas of Deport was heavily damaged, it not totally destroyed, by fire Sunday afternoon.

Thomas was driving the combine down Highway 271 near Rugby and Dale Gray of Deport was following, with the intention of getting some tools from Thomas. Gray noticed the combine blazing at the back, stopped

Thomas, and a fire call was turned in to both Bogata and Deport Volunteer Fire Departments, who extinguished the blazing machine.

Shortly after midnight on Monday morning, a passing truck driver traveling Highway 271 near Rugby reported a house fire. Volunteer fire units responded to it, and saved outbuildings and a tractor from going up along with the house. The house was also vacant, with the power shut off at the light meter, and no gas going to it, and the origin of the blaze is undetermined.

The house is on property belonging to Estelle Montjoy, and the tractor that was saved belongs to Octavius Westbrook of Deport.

Monday night, a break-in and an attempt to break-in occupied Constable Al Parks, City Marshal C.G. Nobles and the Lamar County Sheriff's office.

Burglars attempted to force their way through the bathrooms of Francis Food Store, Highway 271 Deport, but were unable to gain entry into the building.

On the same night, burglars tried

to force the lock on the Shamrock Station located on Highway 271, about two miles west of Deport and when unable to force the lock, broke the glass out. The burglar apparently sustained a cut during the entry operation, as there were blood stains on the window and floor. Some cigarettes and candy appear to be all that was taken from the station. Law officers feel that the two incidents are the work of the same person or persons.

Tuesday morning, the Deport Volunteer Fire Department went

about two miles east of Deport to a round bale fire, but left the bales to finish burning up.

Maize stalks, on the property farmed by Rodger Allen of Deport, had been baled the same morning. When the baler ran out of twine, it set up enough friction to ignite three of the round bales.

Volunteer fire departments are fearful that the extreme dryness caused by the lack of rain in the area will result in even more fires if the hot weather continues unabated.

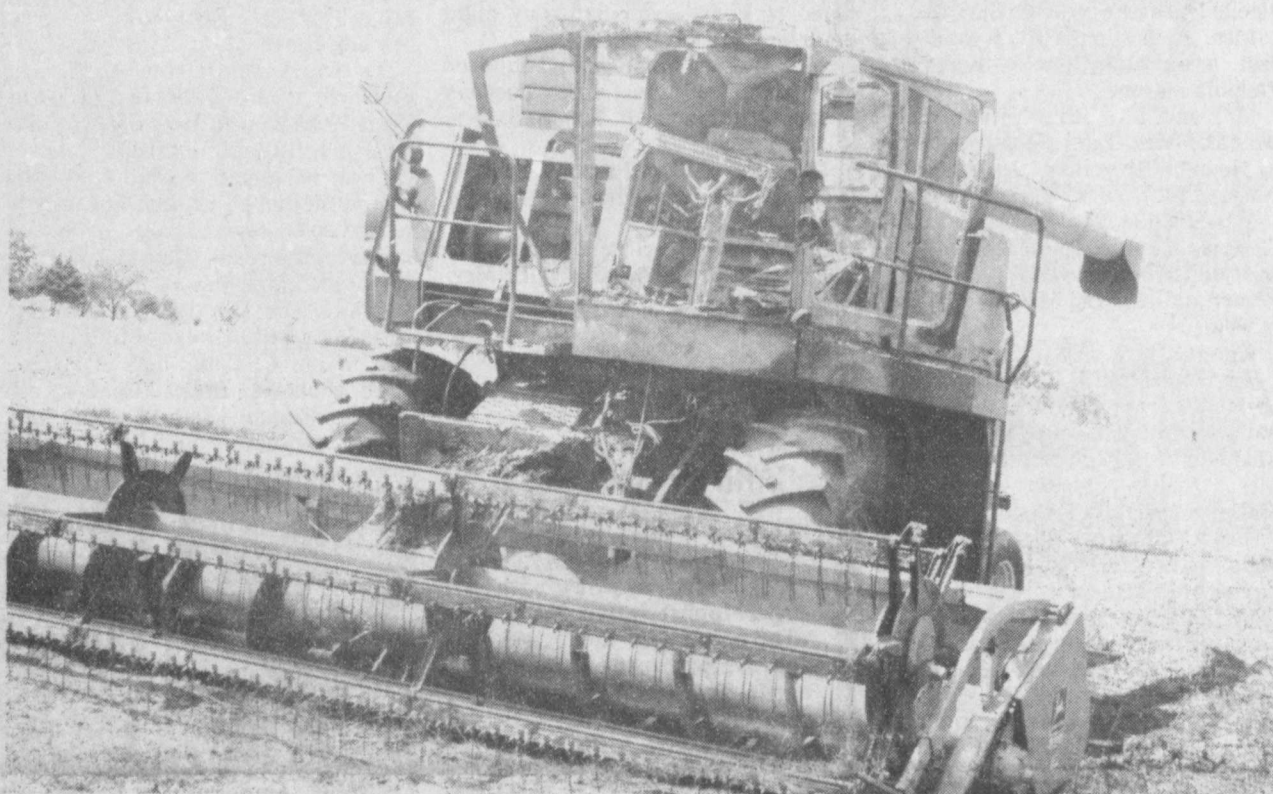

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

DPS Urges Caution

"Schools are opening throughout the state which means motorists will have to be more careful," Atlanta District Engineer L.L. Jester, Jr. warns. State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload school children to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen: 1) the bus driver signals you go on by, 2) they turn off the flashing red lights, or 3) the bus itself goes into motion. The law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limit as well as outside. The only exception to the law is when driving on the other side of a divided highway. Motorists who fail to stop for a school bus could be fined up to \$200.00.

When you see the amber lights flashing atop a school bus, prepare immediately to come to a complete stop. When the red warning lights atop a bus are flashing, you must come to a complete stop a safe distance from the bus and remain stopped until the red lights are turned off. Always give special observance to the proper courtesies and rules of the road when driving near a school bus.

Many people in Bogata are confused and perplexed as to whether they should renew their ambulance subscription to Red River Ambulance Service or subscribe with another company.

Perhaps this letter could be used as an explanation of why there is no ambulance, at this present time, in Bogata itself.

Red River Ambulance service is owned by you, the subscriber. It exists today to provide ambulance service for you and your friends and neighbors. It is supervised by dedicated citizens, after many of us lost our subscription monies to the now defunct Loyd Ambulance Service. It, the Red River Ambulance Service, is operated on subscription monies collected twice a year. It's not Bogata Ambulance Service any more than it is Clarksville, Annona, Avery or Detroit Ambulance service. It's for Red River County and adjoining communities' citizens.

The only reason an ambulance in Bogata is because we had two people who were dedicated and at that time qualified and certified, who devoted twenty-four hours a day seven days a week to its operation. New certification requirements and a desire to have some time off caused this couple to resign (they resigned and were not fired). The Board had no option but to station the ambulance in a central location (Clarksville). This has since proved economical and feasible as great efforts are being taken to provide an ambulance at the scene of an accident or illness in 15 minutes or less from the time the car is dispatched. This is a quicker response time than the citizens of Dallas or Houston receive from an ambulance.

Red River Ambulance Service now has a complete staff of Emergency Medical Technicians or Paramedics. Within 15 minutes of your emergency call, you will have the finest in medical care at your side.

We feel Red River Ambulance Service has come a long way in providing you, the citizens of Bogata, the best service possible. We can continue to improve if you will support an established ambulance service like you now have available to you.

Please, before you change to some other ambulance service, consider what you had before Red River Ambulance Service and remind yourself that the \$55 family membership per year and the \$33.00 individual membership per year is solid and protected because it's YOUR ambulance service.
