

Voter Registration Deadline Drawing Near

As the presidential campaign warms up and as the Texas Senatorial race goes into its last acrimonious days, those who plan to vote on Tuesday, Nov. 6, would be well advised to be certain they can exercise that right.

Especially should those who have become 18 years of age before

election day check on their eligibility.

Those who wish to register may do so in the County Clerk's office in their county of residence up until 5 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 5.

Those who wish to register by mail may do so if the application is received in the Clerk's office no later

than 5 p.m. Monday, Oct. 8. Applications are available from that office or from several Deputy Registrars around the county.

Those with incorrect information on their voter registration card should go to the Clerk's office for corrections.

A spokesman said the most common changes are a voter moving

from one voting precinct to another and women who change their names for marital reasons.

In the case of those moving to this county, a person must be a resident for 30 days prior to the election to vote here; otherwise, they must vote in the previous county of their residence.

The spokesman emphasized that the valid one, with emphasis on blue, not salmon, or yellow, or green.

Absentee voting will begin on Wednesday, Oct. 10 and extends through Friday, Nov. 2.

Such voting is restricted to those who will be out of the county on

election day or those unable to visit the polls because of physical reasons.

Absentee voting will be in the Clerk's office during regular business hours in the designated period.

Rivercrest Rebels Shut Out Karnack

The Rivercrest Rebels played host to the Karnack Indians last Friday night in Jolntown. The Rebel team had no difficulty in taking a 34-0 victory. The field was slightly muddy but no rain marred the evening. The temperature did drop, however, and left fans huddles beneath coats and blankets in the stands.

The Karnack team may be something to be reckoned with in future years as they get their team built up, but not now. The Rebel defense was in very good form as they stopped every effort by the Indians.

The first quarter was a mixture of punting back and forth as neither team managed to get close enough to score.

The scene changed early in the second quarter as Rebel quarterback, Bobby Thomas, connected with senior halfback Kyle Roland on a 40-yard pass play. Roland, with 11:51 remaining in the second quarter, made it look easy as he slipped into the endzone for the six points. John Easley added the PAT and the score stood at 7-0, Rebels.

The Indians tried to come back but an errant pass found the waiting arms of Rivercrest's James Anderson. This interception set up the beginning of the second Rebel score. With 1:11 remaining in the half, sophomore Chris Anderson pulled in a 25-yard throw by Bobby Thomas and zipped into the score zone. Easley's extra point kick was good, bringing the tally to 14-zip in favor of Rivercrest.

Early in the third period, the Rebs were forced to punt the ball away. But a bobble by a Karnack Indian promptly gave the ball back to the Rebels as defender, Paul Yeatman, recovered the fumble. Six plays later senior Greg Russell carried in from the two yard line for yet another Reb score. With 6:53 left in the third quarter, the score was 20-0 in favor of Rivercrest. The extra point was blocked by the Indians.

Karnack wasn't even safe in their own territory as penalty after

penalty backed them up to their own 13. The Rebe defense decided it was their turn as linebacker Paul Yeatman and guard Chris Alford took down the Indian quarterback in the endzone for a two-point safety. The score ran up to 22-0.

The Indians thought they were playing it safe early in the final period when they chose to punt. But they weren't counting on the running ability of Rebel Kyle Roland who fielded the ball on his own 30 and dodged every attempt to stop him. He raced for 70 yards to claim the well deserved touchdown. The extra point failed bringing the score to 28-0.

The Rebels still refused to quit as the Indians handed the ball over on a fumble. Charlie Roberts carried into the endzone from the one for the final Rebel score. The extra point was no good for a final score of 34-0.

Rebel Head Coach Terry Giddens said, "Our defense looked better this week but our offense is still not clicking. Our timing was messed up in the backfield and people got through blockers. Overall, Bobby Thomas threw the ball like he was capable. We still need a lot of improvement before next Friday night. Harmony is a quick team and they have a new quarterback this week."

Rivercrest made 24 first downs, rushed for 210 yards and completed five of fourteen passes for 136 yards. The Rebels total yardage was 346. They fumbled four times and recovered four and punted four times for 125 yards with a 31 yard average. The Rebs were penalized for 110 yards.

Karnack made 14 first downs, rushed for 85 yards and completed one of four passes for 14 yards. The Indians' total yardage was 99. They fumbled twice and recovered two and punted six times for 164 yards with a 27 yard average. Karnack was penalized for 95 yards.

The Rebels travel to Harmony Next Friday night with game time at 7:30 p.m.

Costs Increase, Tax, Force Subscriptions Up

Due to sales tax on newspaper subscriptions, increases in production costs, and a proposed hefty postage increase in January, the Deport Times, Blossom Times, Bogata News and Talco Times has been forced to go up on its subscription rates.

A sales tax on newspapers, for both newsstands and subscriptions, went into effect on October 1, which

raises the cost of a subscription \$50 for that alone.

It has been almost three years since there was an increase in subscription rates, and the total amount of the increase will amount to \$2.50 more per YEAR...a very small amount compared to the subscription increases going on in many larger newspapers.

The cost of a subscription in

Lamar, Red River or Titus County will now be \$10.00, in the state of Texas, but out of the above-mentioned counties, \$12.50, and out of the state entirely will be \$15.00.

For the amount of local news, children's photos, area coverage and excellent advertising, the cost for an entire year really isn't much!
