



They went to Nashville the next morning and a good part of the day at Opryland and saw some good shows there. They traveled on to Jackson, Tenn. for the night.


As is the custom fo the Trans-America Tours, they had their farewell party in the South Room at the Old Country Store and Restaurant in Casey Jones Village.
