The North Lamar Pantherettes will battle Saltillo in the first game, followed by two strong girls' teams in Cooper

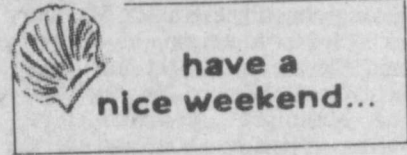

strong! Rivercrest girls received a bye in the opening round due to Detroit girls dropping out. Friday, only two games will be played at Talco, a girl's consolation game at 4:45 and a boy's consolation game at 6:15. All Saturday games will be at Rivercrest. the Rivercrest tourney. North Lamar and Detroit start at 3:45 with both of these teams considered dark horses. But the end is in sight now...and for the first time in my life, I feel very sure that I will appreciate a kitchen...oh, how much that kitchen's gonna be appreciated!

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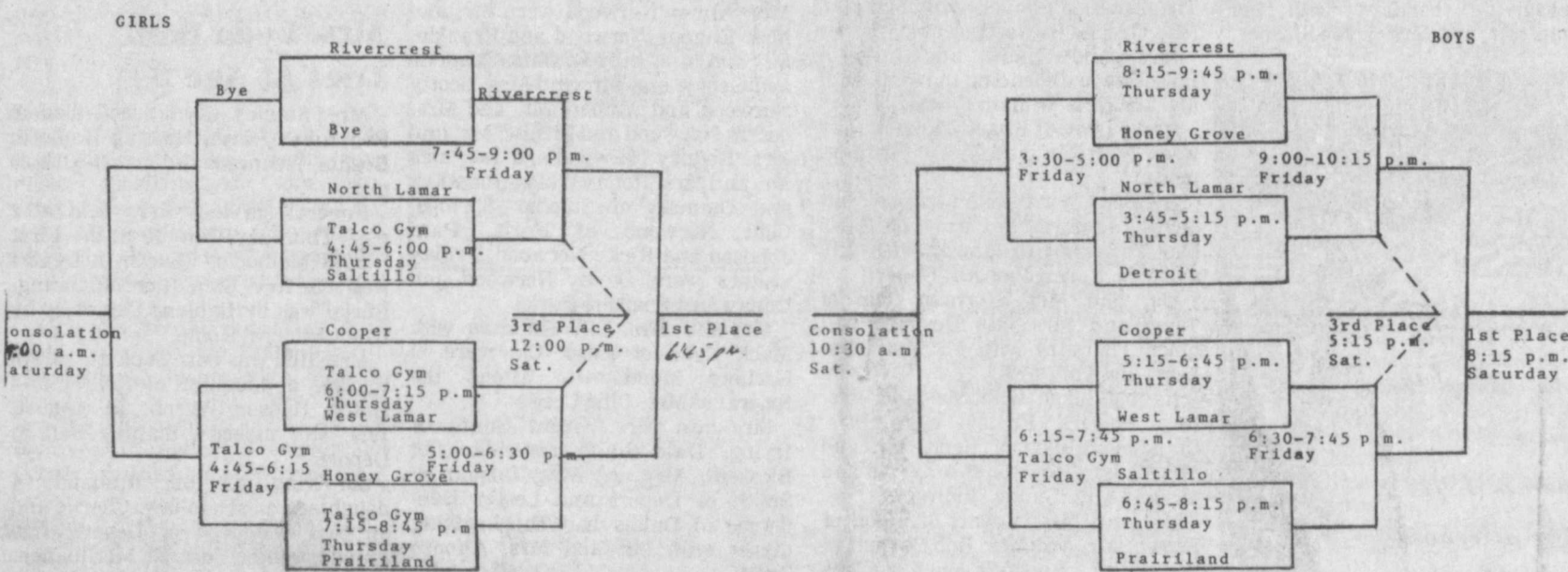

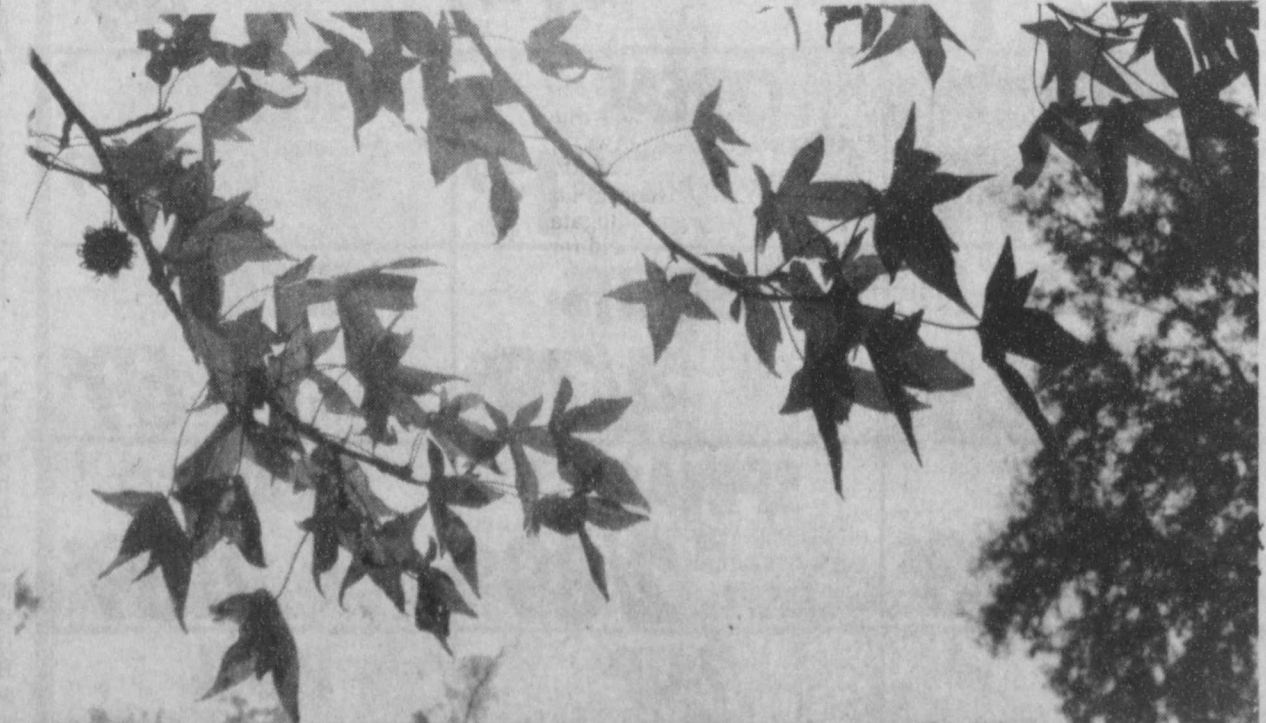
Like a lightning flash, the road runner grasped him by the nose with his strong lizard-killing beak. In the process of getting free from the vicious attack, the roadrunner got away.

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
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1984 CUSTOMER SATISFACTION INDEX

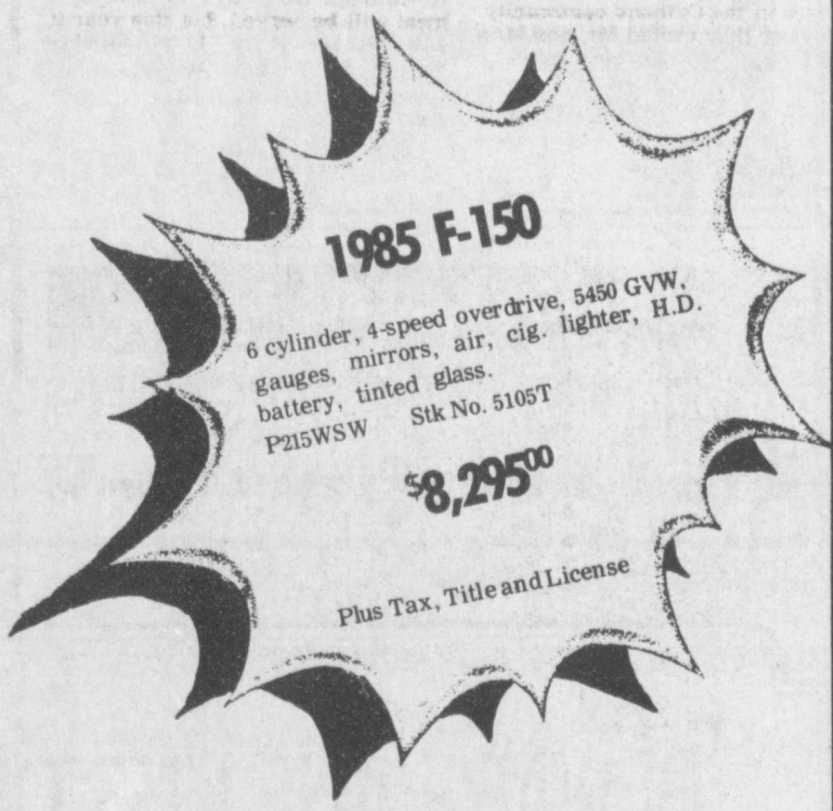

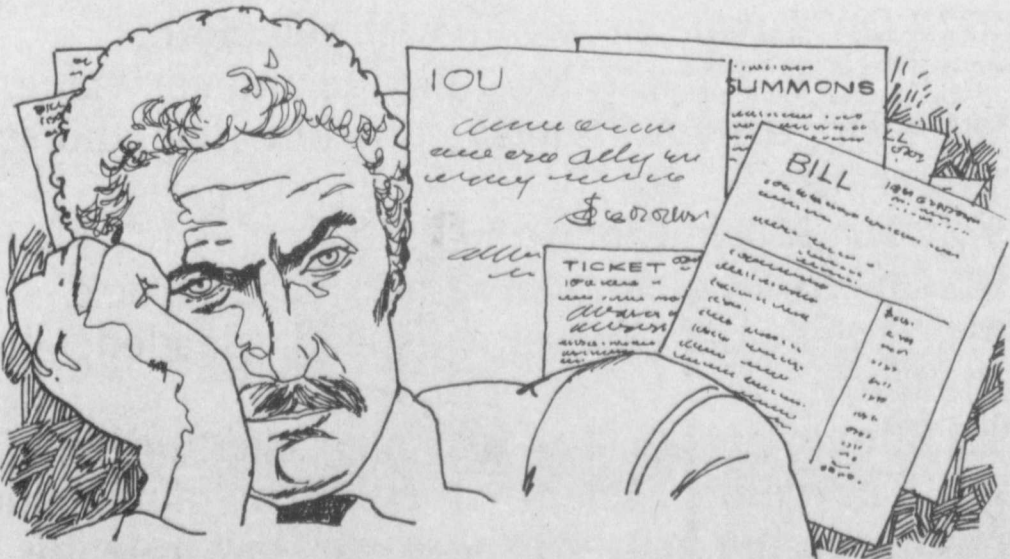

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Old Clippings Reflect Talco Past

While Mrs. Tommie Lou Austin of Bonham was here a couple of weeks ago to put Mrs. Ivy Smith's property on the market, she came across some clippings and booklets on the history of Talco. Mrs. Austin graciously left the materials in my care for a few weeks. I am hoping that The Times subscribers will enjoy reading some of Talco's past as remembered by Mrs. Smith.

One booklet that was of great interest to me was about the Talco Community Fair of Sept. 8-9-10, 1927. The fair started in 1925. How long it lasted I don't know. My mother, Mrs. Gladys Garretson attended some of the fairs when I was one or two years old. Also at the death of my grandmother Keener, I found a red ribbon among her things that

was from the Talco Community Fair. The booklet contained rules governing the Talco Fair, premiums, duties of the judges, entries and the committees.

The permanent Fair Committee was Felix Jones, president; E.W. Smith, vice-president; Joe B. White, secretary; Marvin Hazlewood, in charge of farm crop exhibits; E.A. Brown in charge of hog exhibits; W.D. Cato in charge of cattle exhibits; Mrs. P.B. Harris in charge of poultry exhibits; Miss Beulah Smith in charge of home demonstration and Girls Club exhibits; Mrs. R.R. Kelley in charge of ladies

culinary; Mrs. B.L. Gieger in charge of canned foods, Mrs. J.B. Antone in charge of fancy work.

Committees to solicit exhibits for the fair in their respective communities were: Maple Springs School precinct, Mrs. G.A. McPeters and Mrs. J.A. Blalock; Wilkinson School precinct, W.W. Blalock and P.B. Harris; Lavada School precinct, J.A. Stockton and R.J. Miller; Kinney Point School precinct, E.W. Burks and W.R. Singleton; Panther's Chapel School precinct, R.L. McCullers and C.E. Henry; Midway, W.B. Harris and W.B. (Buck) Alexander; Talco School precinct Mrs. J. Schultze and Mrs. J.B. Antone. All these schools were in the ten mile radius of Talco and are all gone except the Talco Elementary School.

Best all around farm exhibits consisted of products from one farm with first, second and third prizes of \$25.00, \$15.00 and \$10.00 going to the winners. Others received red, white or blue ribbons. These exhibits included cotton, corn, small grains, grain sorghums, hay, potatoes, separate exhibits were open to the boys with ribbons awarded. Livestock exhibits included hogs, cattle and poultry.

Ladies exhibits included canning, preserves, fruit, jellies, marmalades, pickles and vegetables. Ladies culinary included bread, cakes and pies. Girls exhibits were canning, sewing, patching, home improvement and culinary.

The Women's Home Demonstration Club exhibits included canned products, home-made braided rugs, made-over garments for child, lunch cloth and napkin, house dress, bedspread, scarf, dresser set, table runner and other fancy work.

They also sponsored a baby show for the most perfect baby under one year of age. Duane Welch, son of Mr. and Mrs. E.W. Welch was the winner of the baby contest in 1929. He was presented a gold ring.

Tasty casseroles can be prepared by combining cubed turkey with vegetables, sauce, seasonings, cooked spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or converted rice. Regular rice and potatoes become mushy after freezing.

Prepare the turkey casserole, cool it quickly and place in a meal-sized freezing container. Cover tightly with moisture-vapor resistant wrap and freeze immediately.

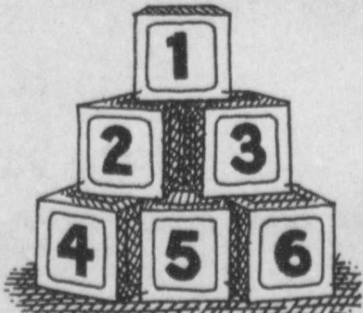

BUYING APPLES

There is no such thing as a typical apple flavor, as each variety has its own distinctive taste. It may be sweet, mellow, or tart. There are 7,000 varieties of apples produced in the United States and listed by the Department of Agriculture. Of these, 9 provide about 85 percent of the total production. Red Delicious is the leader, with 30 percent of the production, followed by Golden Delicious, McIntosh, Rome, Jonathan, York, Stayman, Winesap and Newton Pippin. Many people still do not recognize that the Newton Pippin is really an all-purpose apple. Although it is green, it is not just a cooking apple. Another fine green-skinned apple is the Granny Smith. Similar in size, shape and uses to the Pippin, it could become one of our major varieties.

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Prussic Acid Poisoning Could Occur

Frost will be hitting Red River County before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forage, points out Bob Moody, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, emphasizes Moody. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor, difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, Moody outlines these steps:

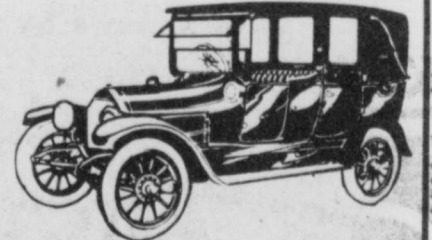
1. Allow plant material to dry thoroughly before grazing.
2. Feed animals a hay or a supplemental before turning in on plants that may contain prussic acid.
3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.
4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early.
5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab at College Station of Amarillo.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed, points out Moody.

Soybean Demonstration Harvested

The results are in on the late maturing soybean demonstration which was planted on the Joe Sanders farm near Direct and some outstanding yields were obtained.

Could you live with 45 to 60 bushel soybean yields on your farm? Well, of course, the answer would be a resounding yes, but then, we realize that not all soils in the county are capable of producing like the soils in the Red River bottom and not all areas received a rain this summer at the right time.

Shiloh was the top variety with 62.1 bushels. Shiloh is a relatively new variety for our area. It matures earlier than the Lee 74 variety, so it would be a late Group V or early Group VI maturing variety. This is the second year for Joe to grow the variety.

The next highest yielding variety was Lee 74 with 59.9 bushels. Other results were as follows: Hartz - 5171 - 50.5, Hartz 5370 - 48.7, Hartz 5252 - 48.4, and Hartz 6383 - 45.5. The first three Hartz varieties are Group V

and the last one is a Group VI. Over an acre of each of the varieties was harvested with a field combine and weighed in a weigh wagon. So, we feel the yields are significant.

To give you an idea of the plant size and fruiting habits, the following measurements were taken. The first figure is plant height in inches and the second figure is distance from ground to first beans. Shiloh - 35.9; Lee 74 - 39.3; Hartz 6383 - 46.5; Hartz 5252 - 42.7; Hartz 5171 - 46.7; and Hartz 5370 - 36.8.

The moisture level ranged from 13 to 14 percent and grade was excellent.

Many producers are experiencing grade problems with their soybeans. In fact, many beans will not grade and producers who have such beans should check with their insurance adjuster before harvesting if they have insurance on the crop.

The three weeks of rain about ruined some of the acreage in the area. It appears to be worse on beans that were ready for harvest before the rain began. The degree of damage also seems to vary with the varieties. Producers are encouraged to be observant of the present condition and learn. If a variety is affected more severely than others, then perhaps we should forget about it in future years.
