

# Rebels, And Rebelettes Sweep New Diana

The Rivercrest Rebels swept to victory last Friday night in New Diana. Free throws were a major factor in the 58-51 Rebel win.

Coach Wake Wood said, "Anytime we can beat New Diana at New Diana, it is really a big win for us! We need the win to stay in a tie for second place in district. We had the most balanced scoring attack we have had this year, but we still are capable of playing better than we are playing."

The Rebels jumped out to a 13-8 first quarter lead and continued to hold the edge throughout the game. Rivercrest held off several runs by

the New Diana squad during the contest.

The Eagles started fouling frantically during the final minutes, trying to play catch up ball. The Rebels dropped important free shots through the hoop to seal the fate of the Eagles.

Rivercrest featured four players in double figures. Leading the way was James Anderson with 15 points. Anthony Brown and Tony Jasso each hit for 12, followed by Bobby Thomas with 10.

Russell Rozell, Charlie Martin and Brad Anderson also contributed greatly to the victory. Rozell, with good blocking out, kept Eagle Greg Peoples off the offensive boards all

during the game. Charlie Martin saw his first varsity action against the Eagles. Martin came off the bench to spark the Rebel team during the second quarter.

The Rebels will travel to Harleton Friday night for another district clash.

## The Cannon Boom!

During World War I, kids were very aware of the fighting in Europe, and the ships sinking in the ocean. There were news accounts and pictures in the papers, and war was a daily subject of conversation among the grownups, therefore it was natural for the kids to play at war games. We would dig trenches, build dugouts, and bunkers, and man them with soldiers made out of clay mud. After the miniature battlefield was laid out and all the military installations in place, there would be a bombardment with mud balls and clods of dirt,—there were plenty of clods on the black land—.

One of the weapons that the Germans brought into use, was a long range cannon that the allies nicknamed Big Bertha. It bombarded Paris with a two-hundred sixty-four pound shell from a distance of seventy-six miles. The news stories of this weapon made quite an impression on us. There happened to be an old muzzle loading gun barrel laying around in the scrap iron pile at Grand Dad's place. It had been a heavy rifle of about fifty caliber, and the lock and stock were long gone. We salvaged the old gun, cleaned it up and mounted it on a pair of wheels. We managed for some gun powder, but we didn't have any caps. Since necessity is the mother of invention, we came up with the idea of removing the bullets from twenty-two caliber rifle cartridges and using them for caps or primers. We loaded Little Bertha with a good charge of powder, rammed in some paper wadding and a hand full of rocks. We placed a live twenty-two cartridge case over the priming nipple and we were ready for a trial shot.

The testing range was down at the cow lot because, for obvious reasons, we didn't want to disturb people at the house with the bombardment. Arthur (Punk) Barnard appointed himself gunner. He struck the cap a few times, but it failed to go off. Some of the rest of us tried it, but couldn't get it to fire. We gave up and were sitting around discussing what to do next, when Ralph Williams casually tapped the primer with a stick and Little Bertha came alive. Ossie was sitting on the cow lot gate, watching the proceedings, when the gun went off. The full charge of pebbles shattered a plank in the gate just below Ossie's feet.

The cannon kicked backward, turned a couple of end-overs and came to rest on its side, with a little wisp of smoke rising from the end of the barrel. When Uncle Charley came in that evening he soon learned of the shot. Little Bertha was confiscated before it got to participate in the war games.

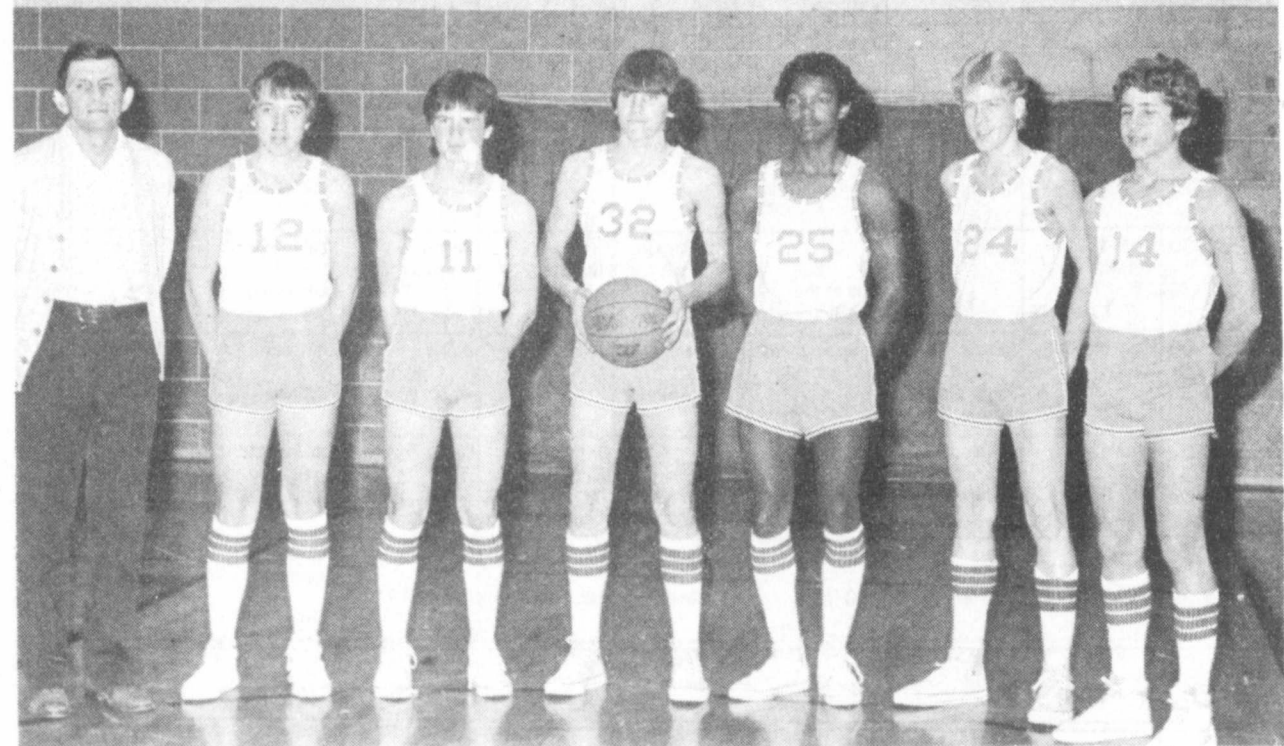

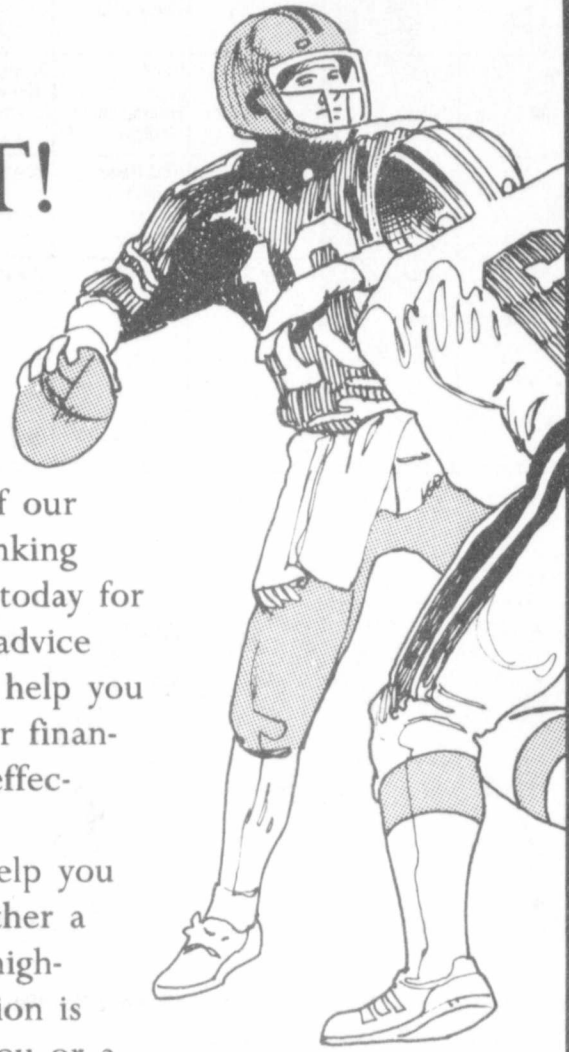

## Texas Completes Training

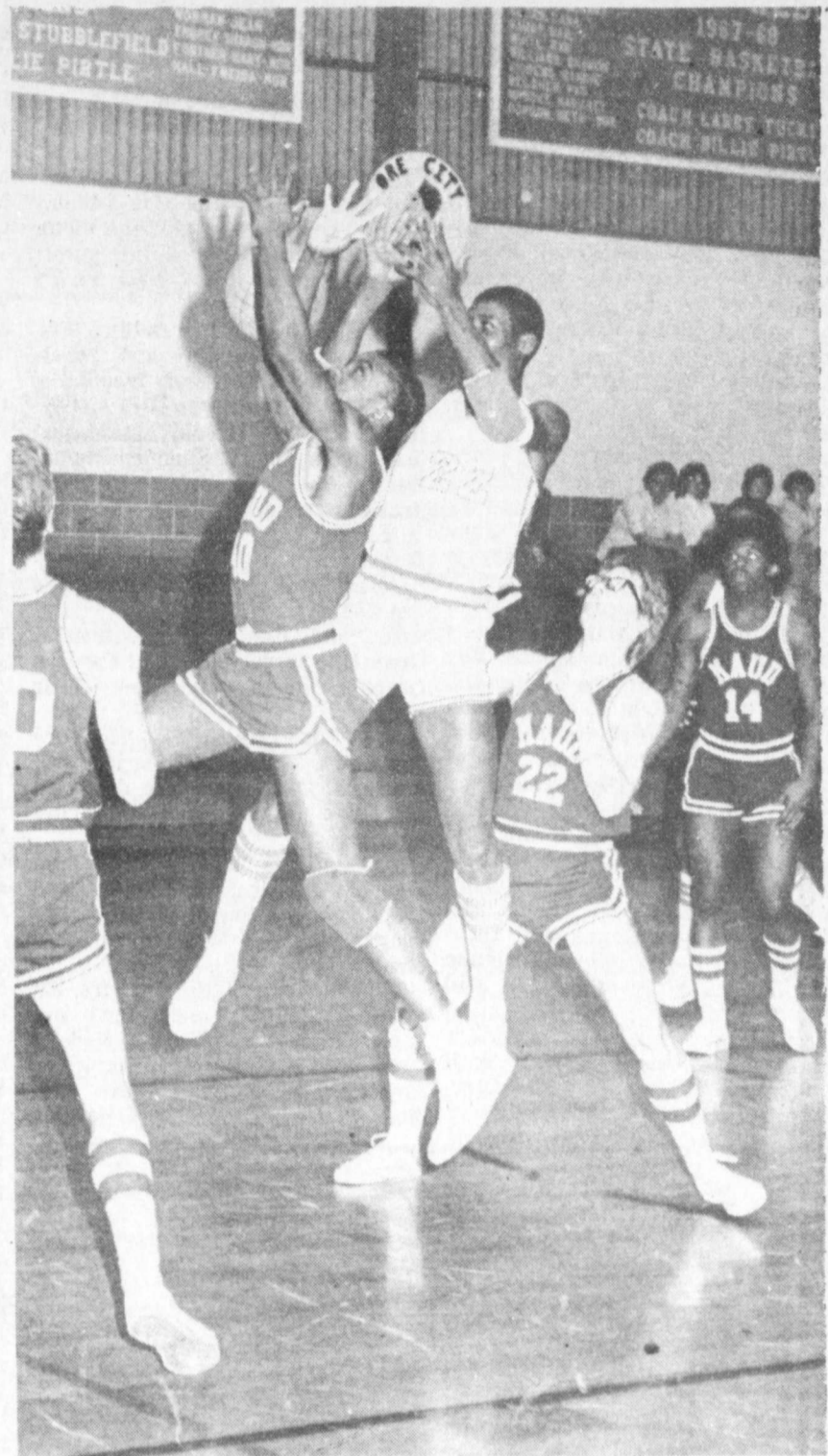
Texas employees of the Farmers Home Administration have completed an intensive training session and are ready to implement the new farm credit initiatives announced recently by President Reagan.

FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said members of the state farmer programs staff and employees from district and county offices participated in the training.

"The final regulations have now been issued in Washington," Futch said, "and Texas is now ready to work with farmers on the initiatives."

Under the new plan, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent, to a maximum of \$200,000 of a farmer's FmHA debt for five years without interest. For non-FmHA borrowers, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a loan if the lender is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the debt.

In both cases, Futch said, the actions must improve the borrower's cash flow position so he or she can make payments on the remaining debt.

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GARDEN Colorful Plants From Brazil

A natural assumption would be that the zebra plant came from Africa. Not true. The zebra plant is native to Brazil. The plant has large, shiny green leaves and the main veins, which are ivory colored, stand out like the markings on a zebra. This small evergreen likes soil that is rich and porous, good light but away from direct sunlight, and regular watering. The plant is sensitive to sudden changes in temperature and should be located in a draft-free room. The zebra plant is at its best in autumn when it produces colorful yellow flowers. After flowering, the plant should be pruned back to two good leaves. In a short time, side shoots will appear. When they are firmly established, the plant should be repotted in fresh soil. The plant does best when the temperature is kept constant at 58°F. Another import from Brazil that is popular as an indoor or greenhouse plant is the gloxinia. This perennial has large, simple leaves and tubular-shaped flowers. There are many varieties, all summer bloomers, in red, pink, purple and bicolors. The gloxinia may be propagated from seed or from stem cuttings. Tubers may be saved for early starting in spring.

By Herb Brevard Many producers were forced to sell livestock during the drought of the past summer and fall. If the livestock were used for breeding or dairy purposes, the sales are considered an involuntary exchange for tax purposes, says Wayne Taylor, economist manager for the TAES. The gain and resulting tax from involuntary exchanges, such as the sale of beef or dairy cows due to drought last summer, can be postponed if replacement property, cows in this example, is purchased within a specific replacement period. Only the gain from the number sold in excess of the normal sales can be postponed, Taylor points out. The replacement period begins on the date cows were sold and ends two years after the close of the tax year in which the first sale was made. None of the gain will be recognized or considered taxable gain if the replacement property costs are equal to or greater than the amount received due to the drought sale. Producers who were forced to sell cows due to drought should attach a statement to the 1984 tax return with the following information: 1) evidence of drought conditions that forced the sale; 2) the gain realized on the sale; 3) number and kind of livestock sold; and 4) the number that would have been sold as a usual practice in absence of a drought. This provision is available to livestock producers even though the county was not designated as eligible for drought relief assistance by the federal government. If a producer believes he is eligible for postponement of gain, he may obtain a copy of the farmers tax guide from the local county Extension agent or check with his accountant.

Wheat Running Out Of Nitrogen

By Paul D. Payne Field after field of wheat in Lamar County and entire area is showing yellowing and generally unthrifty growth characteristics. Yellowing in wheat and other small grains can be caused by a number of factors, but a lack of nitrogen is a good possibility this year. Even though some fields have received adequate nitrogen applications, deficiency symptoms are apparent due to weather conditions. Prolonged wet conditions has caused leaching of available nitrogen such that the majority of available nitrogen is below the effective root zone of the plant. This is particularly true in corase soils which have received the high rainfall. In the case of low saturated areas in fields, nitrogen losses occur through a gaseous volatilization called denitrification. Yellow coloration in these areas is caused not only by nitrogen deficiency, but also by a loss of air in the soil. This occurs when the water replaces the air in the root area and prevents the plant from respiring normally. According to Dr. Travis Miller, agronomist at Texas A&M, all nutrient uptake is halted until water levels recede. This is why some of the yellow wheat has greened up during the last week or so. We have seen the above condition in some wheat fields in the county where the limestone rock was pretty close to the top of the ground. The soil was completely saturated and roots were not able to breath. Nitrogen deficiency is typified by a uniform pale green or yellow color of the leaves of the affected plants. Older leaves show the most pronounced symptoms, with new leaves often showing less yellowing. A topdress application of 30 to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen could cause a good response and prevent further loss of forage. There are other causes of yellowing, greenbugs, winter grain mite and mildew. However, these are easily differentiated from that of nitrogen deficiency. The feeding pattern of greenbugs are normally in an irregular circular pattern. In most instances, greenbugs start at the edge of the field and feed to the center.

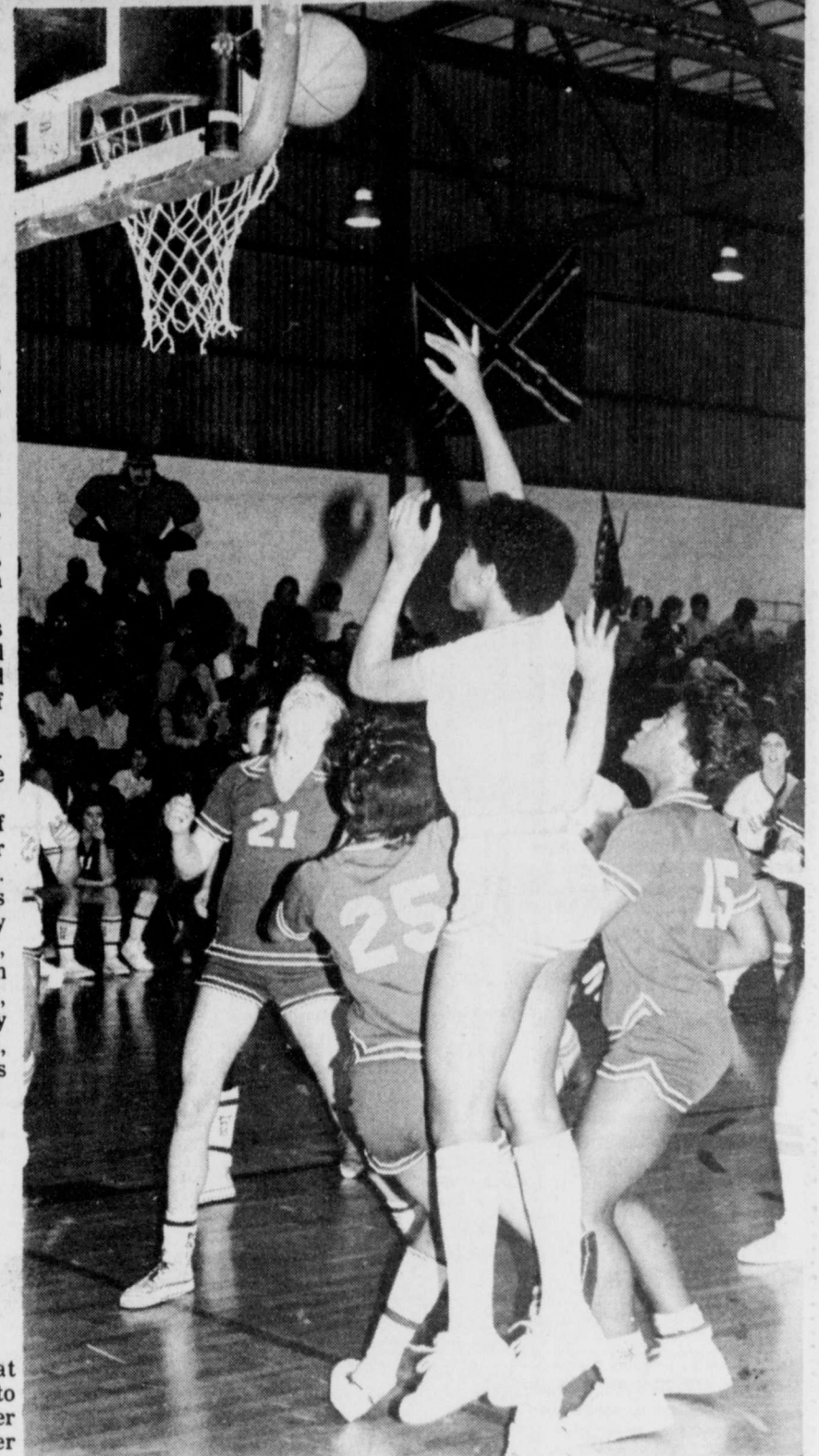

## Looking Back At Talco

This Talco history was written by the late Ivy Smith in July, 1961. More than 50 years ago, last July 4, the town of Talco celebrated its first Independence Day at its present location with a free barbeque and balloon ascension, in order to draw a crowd to open the sale of city lots for the new townsite.

To start the sale, the promoters, the late Eugene Lillienstern, Henry Wilson, Charles O. Lide and J.V. Moore offered choice of a free city lot to the first person purchasing a Liberty Bond which they were also selling, as this was during World War I. Jim Dyer of Hagansport got the free lot, located across the street from where the Frutia Washateria stands.

Mr. Moore, who was the spokesman, also offered a free lot to the first baby born in the new town and this went to the late C.T. Pittman, father of Mrs. Zela Neugent here. Land was also given for the Talco Cemetery, which by now is just about filled up, but thanks to the late Mrs. Leora Stevenson, a couple of her adjoining acres were willed to be added to the cemetery.

The now discontinued Paris and Mt. Pleasant Railroad was completed a little before this time and was responsible for the idea of a town. Then there was a good many years, besides the shipping of cotton and other farm products. My late husband, Ernest W. Smith was the Paris and Mt. Pleasant Railroad Station agent here at one time.

The promoters debated as to what to name the new town and agreed to call it "Frances" after the daughter of Tom McLean, a wealthy farmer and stockman living here and very much interested in the progress of the place. But later it was decided to move the bank and post office from its former location, about 2 1/2 miles east, to the new location and the men thought it best to retain the name. So the name, Frances was used for a street name and McLean for another street.

Other streets were named Lillienstern, Lide and Wilson, after the founders. One was named after the late Dr. Albert A. Smith. Dr. Smith started his career here as a horse and buggy country doctor several years before Talco was established and practiced medicine in this community for 50 years, working right up till his death.

Crawford Street was named for the late W.H. Crawford, who was considered quite a wealthy farmer and stockman, and was the first man to own an automobile in Titus County. His widow still lives at their same old home on Crawford Street.

The late Arthur O. Brown, native of this community between the creeks, as it was called at that time, and a longtime rural mail carrier on Route 2, inspired the name for Brown Street.

These are all the original streets running east and west, the ones running north and south being numbered, and there are 12 of them.

Lawrence Street was named by the late J.R. White when he surveyed off his wife's part of the Gieger estate.

In a later survey, Frances Street turned out to be run only a short distance and is not considered a street anymore, therefore it is not in the city directory.

Marvin Hazelwood, then school trustee and City Commissioner, purchased the first lot in Gieger Heights in 1938. He leased it to the late J.T. Casrter, whose daughter Christine was a teacher in the new school.

On this fourth of July, of 1970, there were still a few old timers attending picnics and barbeques which marked the beginning of the history of Talco.

Of course, oil is the main industry now and ever since its discovery in 1939, Talco has been known as The Asphalt Capital of the World.
