Local Sales Tax Reported

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$111.8 million in local payments to the 991 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"Disappointing Christmas retail sales during the 1984 Christmas season held February payments to a puny 6 percent increase over last February," Bullock said. "And even this little increase is due as much to new items being taxed for the first time as it is to any real sales growth."

City payments compared to last February's checks and total 1985 to date payments compared with 1984 to date totals include Houston, \$19 million, down one percent from last February, up less than a percent from 1984 totals.

Locally Blossom received \$1,434.78, for a 21.51 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$1,744.48.

Deport received \$1,283.28, compared to last year's payment of \$1,455.70, for an 18.42 percent decrease. 1985 payments to date for

Deport total \$1,795.52, compared to \$2,200.84 for last year.

Bogata received \$3,493.59, compared to last year's \$3,345.14, marking a 3.83 percent increase over 1984. Payment to date for Bogata are \$4,415.55, compared to \$4,252.59 for 1984.

Talco received a check for \$2,848.97, compared to \$3,061.40 for the same period in 1984, making the 1985 to date payments total \$3,595.73, as in comparison to 1984 payments to date of \$5,507.03, for a 35.71 percent decrease.

Take A Look At FFA's Real Values!

Vocational Agriculture Program Provides Wide Learning

All across the nation, Future Farmers of America Chapters are celebrating their week, National FFA WEEK from February 19 through the 22.

Rivercrest FFA Chapter, with 109 members and three advisors has as much or more reason to celebrate as any chapter in the nation.

Perhaps most people think of FFA as simply an organization with animal projects and a few skills taught. That is a complete misconception.

Just think about this for a moment: Mathematics are taught in shop and vocational ag by figuring board feet, bill of material, cost of shop projects, rate of gain on project programs, pound of gain per 100 pounds of feed fed, etc.

The record books required on

projects teach bookkeeping, and English skills are sharpened by written reports required. An astonishing amount of history can be learned through the study of the background and origin of animals.

Physical education takes place in the physical work done and the exercise expended as part of their projects.

Speech is developed through public speaking, and biology, both botany and zoology are taught in the forms of plant and animal science. Animal diseases are studied extensively in Vo Ag.

Chemistry is learned in the testing of soil, testing of milk, figuring of amounts and types of fertilizers.

Free enterprise is encouraged, economics of agriculture is taught, and marketing and economics enable

Vo Ag students to understand and use their knowledge in all phases of life.

At Rivercrest there is Production Agriculture Ag I, II and III. Agribusiness Training is given. Pre-employment laboratory training is designed for high school students preparing to enter employment in an agricultural occupation. General Ag Mechanics provides training in classroom and shop in the areas of farm mower and machinery, small gas engines, electric wiring, motors, surveying and measuring land, plumbing, welding and hand and power tools. Obviously all of these skills can be of use, no matter what career an individual might choose.

The meat processing training program at Rivercrest provides training in the classroom and

laboratory in making wholesale and retail cuts of beef, swine and sheep.

All students in production ag must complete a six month successful supervised Occupational Experience Program to receive credit in the course.

This is the backbone of the FFA program. It makes things very relevant to the student, and is often their first experience in owning some productive animal which is totally dependent on their care. It is probably the first time that a crop becomes a concern. The weather, prices, harvest costs, markets become very real. Free enterprise, in other words, becomes a fact.

Also, a good SOEP in the community provides an opportunity for community involvement. People from all walks of life become in-

terested in the young people. Many successes can be attributed to the fact that many in the community care for the welfare of a young student.

Members learn through active participation how to conduct and take part in public meetings; to speak in public; to buy and sell cooperatively; to solve their own problems; to finance themselves; and to assume civic responsibility.

Judging teams, FFA leadership teams; talent teams, all are a vital part of the learning and competitive process.

It would take a whole page to list the many benefits of vocational ag programs in the school system, a community, a state, a nation!

But suffice it to say simply that Rivercrest FFA deserves a big salute from everyone...keep up the good work!

Shower To Aid House Fire Victims

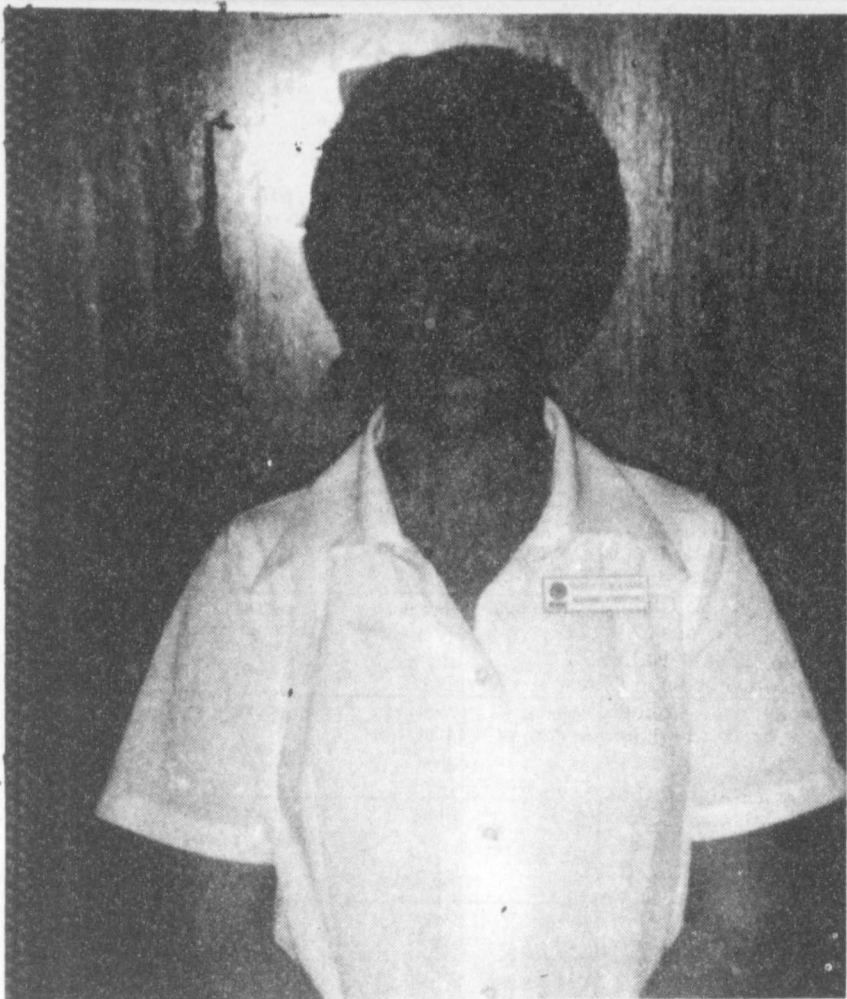
A shower benefiting Luke and Dee Crayton is set for Thursday, February 14 at the First Baptist Church of Bogata.

The Craytons had lived in their new home only 10 days at the time of the fire.

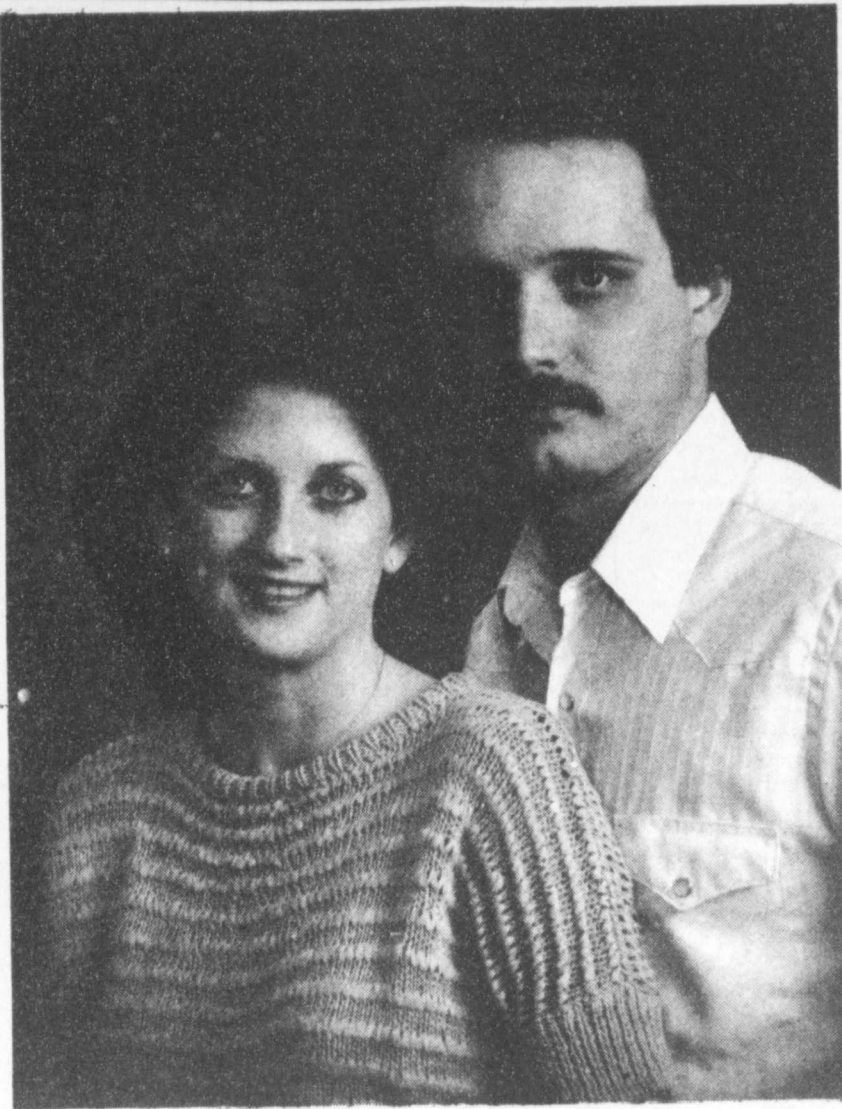
The shower will be in the church's Fellowship Hall and will begin at 6 p.m. and conclude at 8 p.m.

Pirtle-Miller Announce Engagement

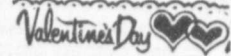

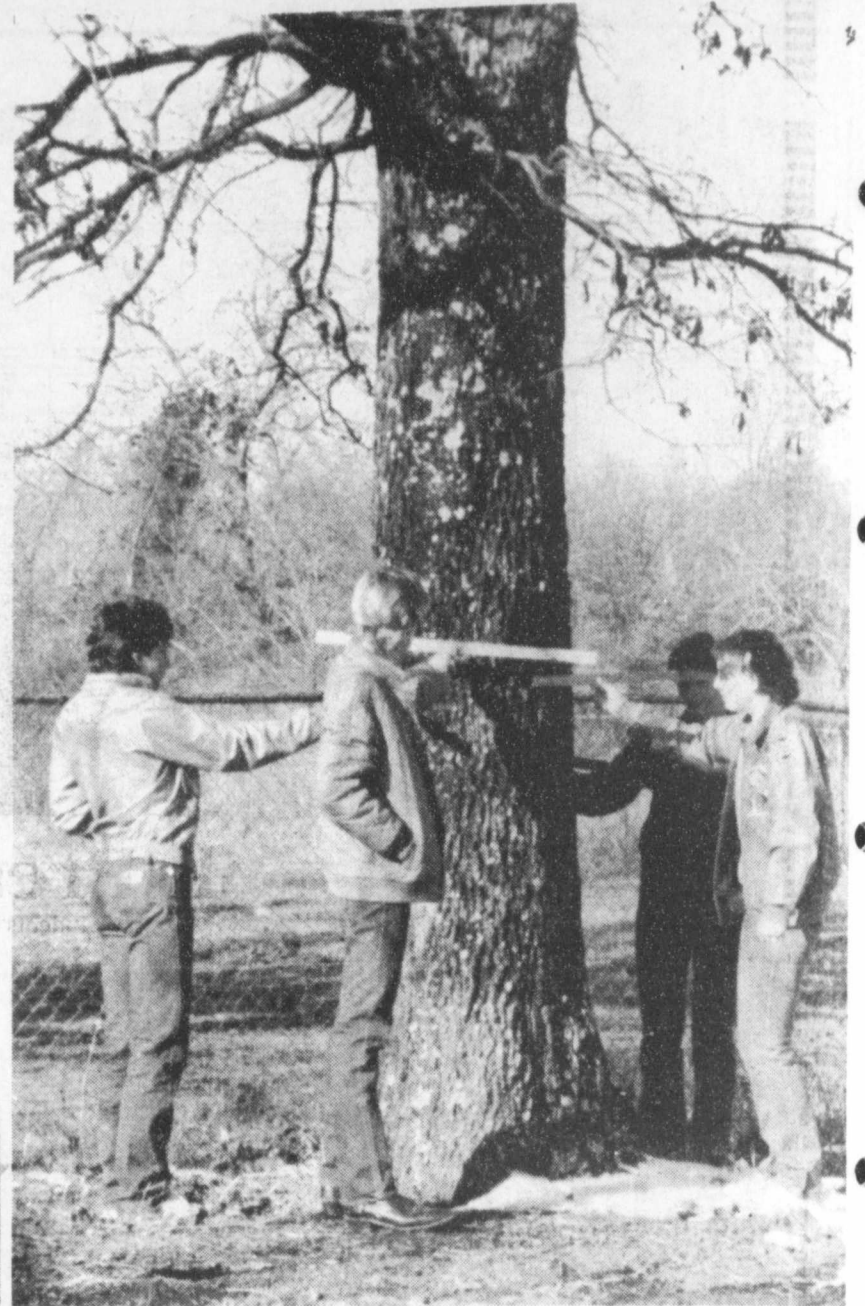

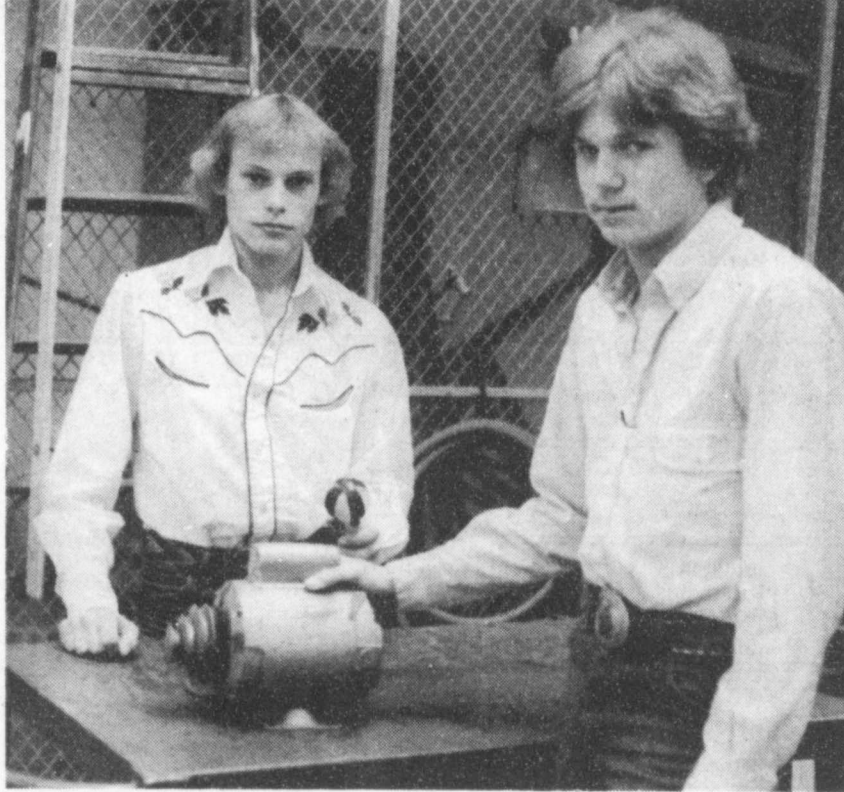

Talco State Bank Presenting Banking Film

Typically, people have had to go to banks to learn about banking. The transition is being made however, the banking representative assisting the teacher with the technical aspects of banking. This is evidenced in a new filmstrip program "Banking Is..." which the Talco State Bank presented as a

public service to the students at Rivercrest High School. Rusty Jones, vice-president, made the presentation on February 12. Receiving the multi-media filmstrip unit at a presentation meeting at Rivercrest High School were W.B. Hervey, principal, and Billie Pirtle, instructor.

In making the presentation Rusty Jones said, "The Program "Banking Is..." gives the students firsthand experience with basic banking activities they will use throughout their lives."

"Writing a check, applying for a loan, computing interest and using a bank's services are things most adults take for granted; we have done them all our lives. But these activities must be learned, and for many of today's students they can be foreign as any new endeavor," Jones said.

"Many adults learned banking by trial and error; but, in today's world of advancing technology, this is no longer a satisfactory solution. Ninety percent of all financial transactions are made by check and the American public will write more than 37 billion checks this year. Yet,

in spite of this, statistics show that less than 85 percent of the graduating seniors know how to write a check properly. So, it is easy to see that check writing is an activity that students should understand if they are to take their places in the financial community.

"We strongly believe that the more financially secure students become through knowledge and practice of good banking, the better citizens they become; and the better our young citizens, the better our tomorrow."

In addition, Rusty Jones, pointed out that as part of the program an officer of the bank is available for a follow up classroom question and answer session and the students may be given a tour of the bank to see numerous financial operations at work.

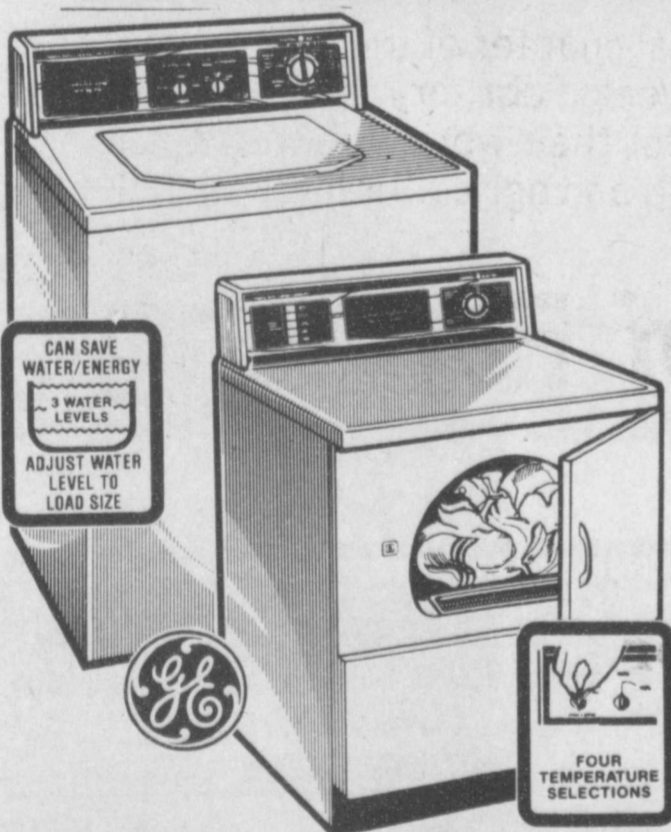

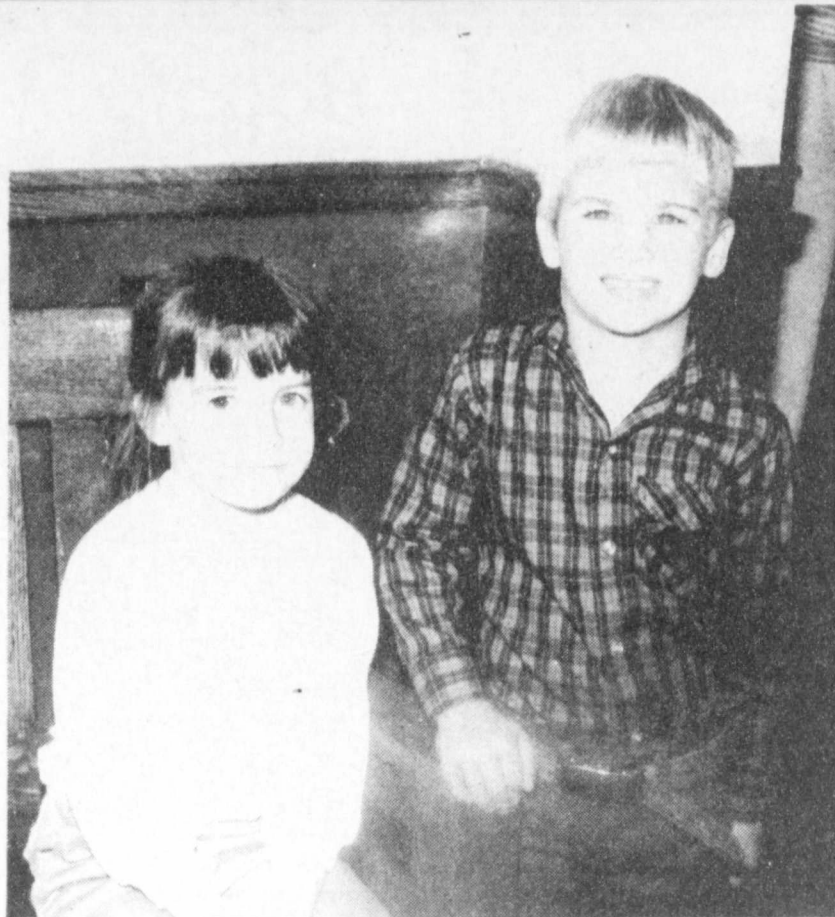

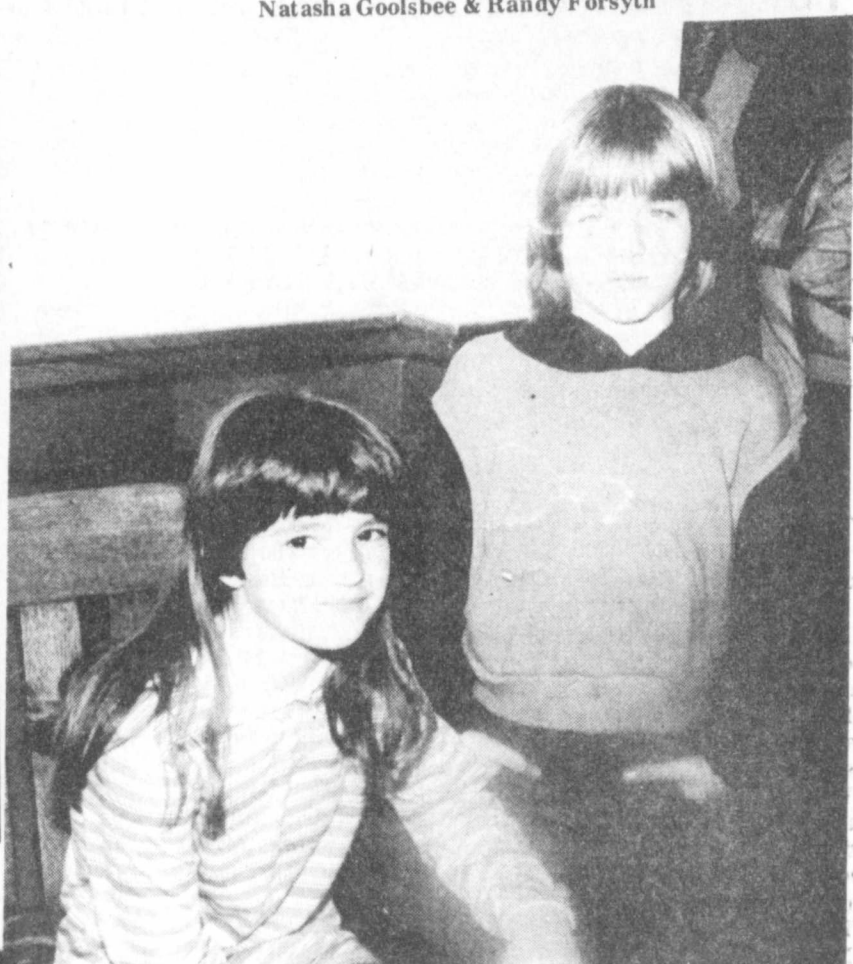

Winter Pastures Need Fertilizer

By Herb Brevard

As soon as it is dry enough to get equipment in the fields, fertilizer should be applied to winter pastures, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With adequate moisture available in most areas, the plants will be able to immediately utilize the fertilizer.

Reeves says apply about 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. However, this depends on when the last application was made. Nitrogen is generally used within a 45 day period. If nitrogen was applied less than 45 days ago, the next application could be delayed.

When the weather warms and the winter pasture begins growing, dark green color of the plants indicates that they are not suffering from lack of nitrogen. Dark green color around manure piles and a yellow color on the other plants indicates a need for

nitrogen.

Since the price of winter pasture is so high, this additional nitrogen application should be very economical and will more than pay for itself in additional forage.

Reeves says it is also time to think about premerger herbicides for controlling weeds in hay meadows. The highest quality hay is produced in the spring. An acre of land will produce just so much forage under a given set of conditions. If left uncontrolled, weeds will make up a large percentage of the total forage produced and will reduce the quality of the hay tremendously.

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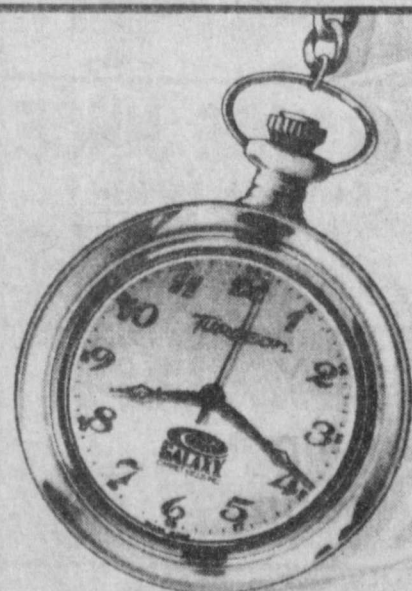

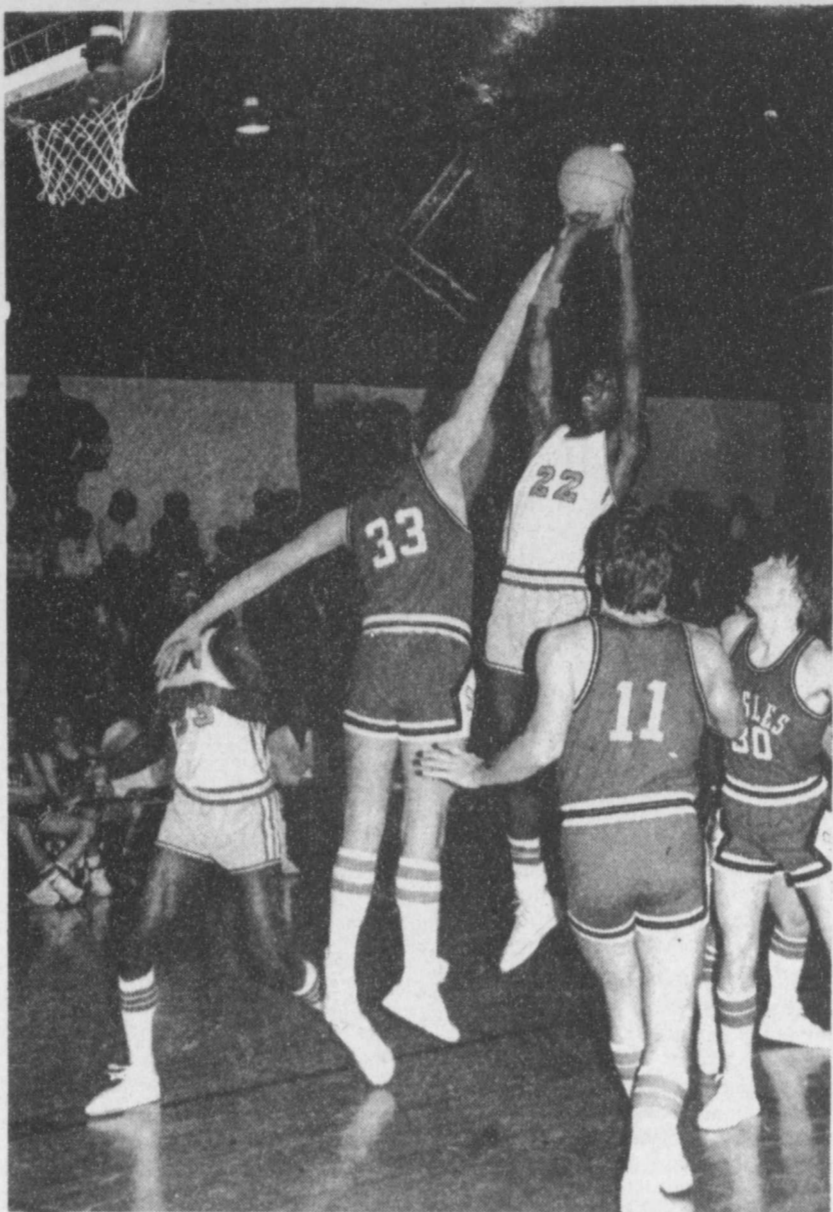

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Texas To Celebrate Sesquicentennial

AUSTIN—With two years remaining in the countdown to 1986, the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission has already organized more than a dozen statewide special events to celebrate 150 years of Texas' independence. Texas won its release from Mexico in the spring of 1836, but remained an independent Republic for nine years before joining the United States in 1845.

To coincide with this special "freedom" anniversary, nearly 200 community and county planning committees are sponsoring hundreds of local celebrations and projects for 1986. Wagon trains, trail rides, a commemorative stamp and special cultural and sporting events are only a few of the statewide festivities planned for two years from now by the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission.

The Texas Wagon Train will leave Sulphur Springs on January 2, 1986, and travel a 2,800-mile circuit, ending in Fort Worth on July 4 after stops in 130 Texas communities. Texans can travel the eastern and western halves of their state in one of two 2,200-mile Texas trail rides starting July 4, 1986, and concluding the following November.

Five major Texas museums will develop a traveling Texas history exhibit as part of Project 150. In preparation for an ambitious collection of oral histories from older Texans living in different corners of the state, the Sesquicentennial Commission will hold 14 free "how-to" workshops across Texas before late 1985.

The Texas Highway Department will issue special license plates, featuring the words

"Sesquicentennial/1836-1986" in red and blue lettering. The new license plates should be available to Texas motorists by December 1984.

The South Texas Public Broadcasting System, based in Corpus Christi, is planning an eight-hour mini-series, "Lone Star," adapted from the book by Texas historian T.R. Fehrenbach. The series will be available to public television stations nationwide.

A series of 52 one-minute television spots, sponsored by the Texas Committee for the Humanities, will highlight significant events in Texas history during broadcasts throughout 1986.

In honor of the Sesquicentennial, many national sports events have been scheduled for Texas in 1986 including the LPGA Golf Tournament in Sugar Land, the Baseball Allstar Game in Houston, and both the NBA Allstar Game and the NCAA College Basketball Championship in Dallas. Austin is a finalist to host the National Sports Festival, a preliminary competition for the 1988 U.S. Olympic team.

The State Fair of Texas is planning an expanded 60-day exposition in 1986, and the city of Dallas is making much-needed improvements to the 50-year-old fair grounds and buildings.

A record number of out-of-state and foreign visitors are expected during the year-long Sesquicentennial celebration in 1986. Through grassroots planning and coordination at the state level, Texas can host events that both capture the state's independent spirit and pay tribute to the different cultures and nations that helped shape Texas history.

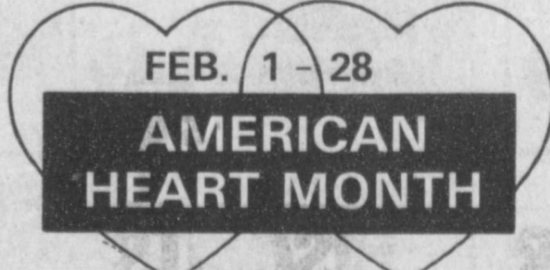

Good Bulls Crucial To Cattle Operation

By Herb Brevard
Most East Texas cattlemen are either ready to put out bulls or will be in the near future. Serious time, thought and consideration should be given prior to the breeding season, says Dr. Randall Grooms.

If the cattlemen uses the right bull, he will maintain daughters and granddaughters in the herd for the next 20 years. If he picks the wrong bull, without genetic merit, it can be very costly and expensive in sacrificed production.

Eighty-five percent or more of all genetic improvement is made through the herd sire, Grooms says. If cattlemen select bulls of known superior genetic merit, genetic progress can be made very rapidly.

Many breeds are now publishing sire summaries that give accurate breeding values of birth weights, weaning weights, yearling weights and maternal value.

Commercial cattlemen may be able to use the truly superior bulls if their management program allows for artificial insemination. If they are not geared for AI, many top sons of these bulls are available after completion of their yearling performance tests.

Commercial cattlemen seeking genetic improvement should select sons of trait leaders that excel in their weaning weight and yearling weight ratios. Ratio expresses the relative standing of an individual in his contemporary group, with 100 equaling the average. Ratios above 100 are the superior individuals.

Grooms says that care should be given to select bulls without extremely heavy birth weights and from cows that excel in milking ability. The idea commercial bull would have 100 plus ratios for weaning and yearling weights and a small birth weight.

The Rebelettes will meet Hawkins in Mt. Vernon Friday night at 7:30 for bi-district.

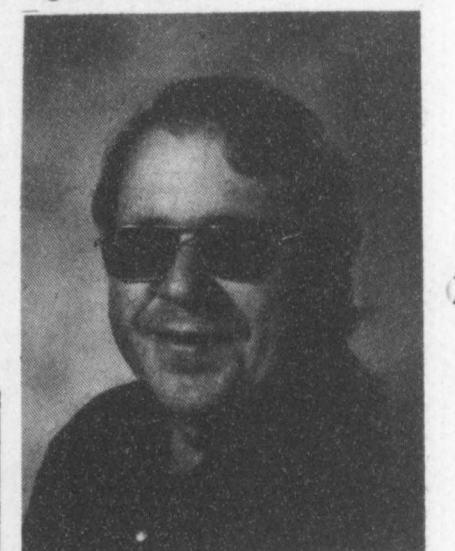
Rivercrest Ag Teacher To Be Honored
