PJC Schedules Nursing Test

pre-test for Paris Junior College's vocational nursing program in Paris is scheduled for Tuesday, March 5 at 1 p.m. in the counseling department of the Rheudasil Learning Center. Those interested in enrolling for PJC's next vocational nursing class in August must take the test, said Sandra Chadwick, director of the program.

To register for the test, students must pay a \$6 testing fee by noon that Tuesday in the PJC Buisiness Office. Students must be at least 17 years of age and have a high school diploma or G.E.D. by the enrollment

date in August.

Those taking the test will be notified of results in about three weeks and will be given an appointment for an interview with nursing instructors. The test will last about four hours and will cover reading, spelling, mathematics, communication skills, natural sciences, judgement and personal adjustment.

PJC's vocational nursing program includes 12 months of theory and practice after which graduates take the state board examination to become licensed vocational nurses. Tests also will be given on the Paris campus on April 2, May 7 and June 4. The testing is scheduled at the Hunt County Cneter in Greenville on March 7, April 4, May 9 and June 6.

Clay Guest and I couldnt' resist attempting a salvage operation. The water in the well was about six or seven feet deep, so we decided we needed some diving equipment. We made a diving helmet out of a two gallon bucket by placing a glass window in the side. Then we made a short cape out of an old raincoat and fastened it around the rim of the bucket, the cape being long enough' to fit down over our shoulders. The helmet and cape was made water and air tight with asphalt tar. We rigged a garden hose to carry air from the surface to the inside of the diving helmet while under water. We also made a flashlight water tight with asphalt

The equipment was assembled and we were ready to try it out one Sunday morning. There was a loose piece of sheet metal on one side of the building that gave easy entrance. We went in and started work.

I went down first and immediately discovered that the diving equipment wouldn't work. With no air pump on the hose to equalize pressure, the pressure of the water forced the air from my lungs and I was unable to inhale, so we discarded the diving gear and went to work bare handed. We brought up about a bushel basket full of broken and empty bottles, but nary a bottle contained the treasure.

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

Weed Control Affects Hay

By Lynn Golden spring usually produces the highest has been stored through the winter. uality hay we can produce. The digestibility of warm season grasses is higher in the spring than any other time of the year. However, weeds are also germinating and taking their place in the pasture or

meadow. Weeds in the early spring cause the hay quality to be lower and they use valuable nutrients. One rule of thumb is every pound of weeds produced is a pound of valuable forage lost.

Preemergence weed control has become more popular and has been economical in hay production in the past. As you know, many weeds emerge in the spring before the

bermuda grass begins growth, The first cutting of hay in the removing nutrients and water that Preemerge herbicides need to be

applied to the soil before March 15. Examples of this type of herbicide are Princep, Karmex and Simazine. These herbicides control plants that germinate from seeds. There is little control of plants that are already growing. These herbicides will also control clovers and ryegrass. Do not apply to any area that you want clover or ryegrass production.

Be sure to read the label on the chemical package. The label will give the rate of herbicide to apply and mixing instructions. The label will also explain any precautions you need to be aware of before using each herbicide.

Lice Bad On Area Cattle

seems advisable to control these external parasites before more loss .

Last week I, like many of you, visited one of our local cattle sale barns to see what the market was for the beef and dairy producer, it doing. I did determine that the market was up, but the alarming thing was the high percentage of cattle going through the sales rings that were infested with lice. My estimate would be 95 percent.

There is really no excuse for any of us to have a lice problem today, as there are so many products on the market that will do a good job of controlling lice. Chemicals come in sprays, dusts, pour-ons and spot-ons. They will all do the job if properly

Dust bags will also do an effective job if the animals go under the bags frequently. Strategically placing the bags where the animals get the insecticide on their body is a must

There are several brand names of the pour-on chemicals. They cannot be used on dairy cattle in milk, but may be used on dry cows within a certain time period of calving. This is usually two to three weeks. The label should be studied for all of these particular limitations.

A six volt hot shot dry cell battery was used to energize the rig. A long wire was strung up between the house and barn to radiate the radio impulses.

The receiving part of the radio was just as crude as the transmitter. It was similar in that it had a coil and condenser to tune to the same frequency as the transmitter. It used a piece of galena crystal, (borrowed from the high school physics laboratory), with a brass wire cat whisker for the detector. An ordinary telephone receiver served as ear phones. No batteries were required for the radio receiver.

All this scrap junk properly wired together would transmit and receive radio signals. However a problem developed. Radio broadcasting stations began to come into operation, and many people around Deport acquired radio receivers.

Our transmitters, being as crude as they were, radiated on a very wide band. It was so wide that it almost blanketed the entire broadcast frequencies. When we fired up our transmitters, every radio in town that was turned on, sounded like a chain saw at full throttle. It didn't take long for our neighbors to locate their trouble, and request a halt in our transmissions. That ended our two-way radio effort.
