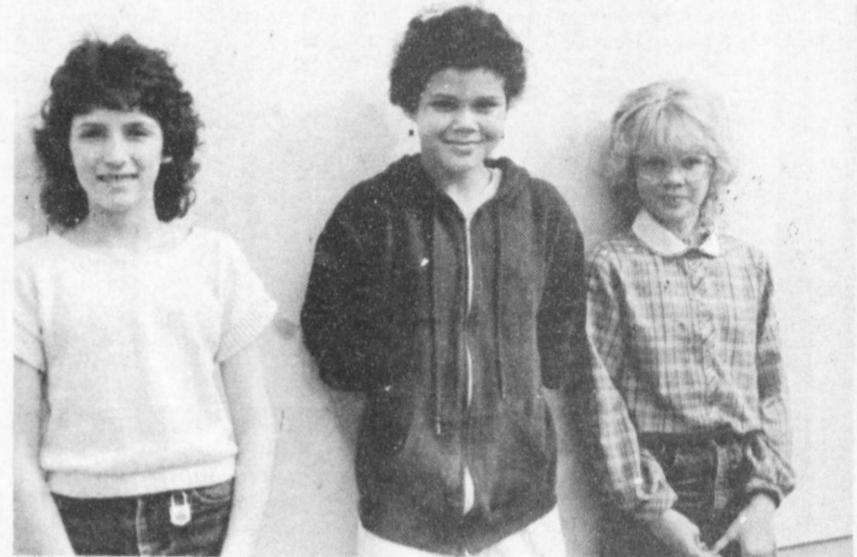

TYPES OF EXERCISE

Exercising gives you more energy, helps you cope with stress and tension, aids in relaxation, tones muscles and improves your self-image. Some exercises can be done standing or sitting, depending on your comfort and ability.

STRETCHING AND STRENGTHENING

EXERCISES are designed to increase flexibility and strength of muscles, joints and bones. Head and neck rolls, arm circles, trunk twists, leg lifts and other stretching routines will keep your bones and joints limber.

AEROBIC

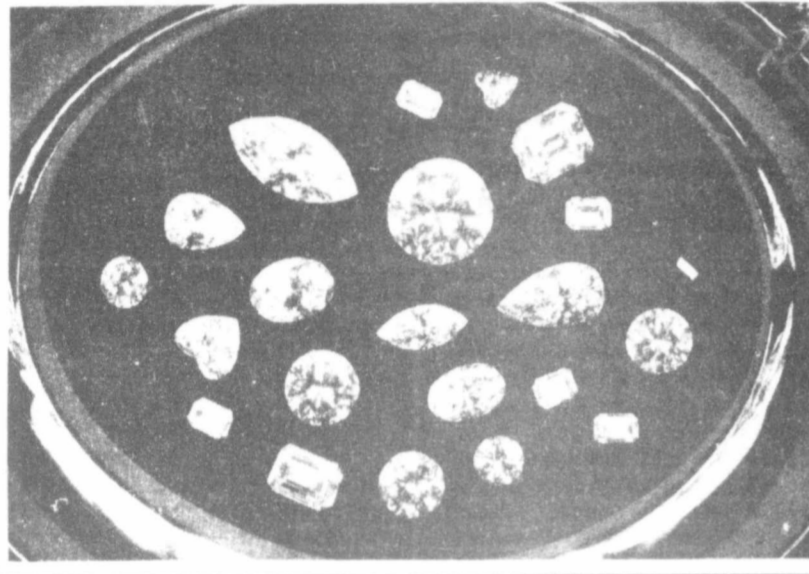
