

Four In Talco-Bogata School Board Race

Four candidates will be on the ballot of the Talco-Bogata School District trustee election April 6. Filing are H. Drue Pirtle and Eddy Denny for the Bogata area, Jerry Russell and Eddie Brown for the Talco area.

One three-year term is to be filled from Bogata area, one three-year term from Talco and a one-year term at large will be filled from either the Bogata or the Talco area.

Eddy Denny was born and raised in Bogata. He attended Bogata schools and graduated from Rivercrest High School in 1966.

Denny began employment with Texas Power and Light in 1969 and transferred from the Rivercrest power plant in 1976 to the Monticello power plant where he is now chemical supervisor.

He married Nancy Bell in 1969 and they have two sons now attending Bogata and Rivercrest schools. Todd is a freshman student at Rivercrest and Scott is a seventh grader at Bogata Junior High.

The Dennys reside in Rosalie. They attend church at the First Baptist Church where Eddy serves as a deacon. He is also a member of

the Bogata Lions Club.

H. Drue Pirtle is a candidate for re-election to the Talco-Bogata School board.

He has served on the school board for the past three years and is interested in seeing further progress made in the operations of the school district.

Drue and wife Tommie and two children, Lana and Clay live in Jolntown. They are active members of the Jolntown Missionary Baptist Church where he serves as music director, adult Sunday School teacher, treasurer and deacon. He is

also on the board of directors of the First National Bank of Deport and serves on the board of the Red River Valley Girl Scouts of America.

Pirtle states that he has enjoyed serving on the board for the past three years and would appreciate the opportunity to serve for another three-year term.

Jerry Russell is a life-long resident of Talco and is married to the former Barbara Mankins who is an English teacher at Rivercrest High School. They have two children, Greg, a senior at Rivercrest and Jerilyn, a

sixth grader at Talco Junior High.

Jerry is employed by Exxon Oil Company. They are members of the Calvary Baptist Church where he is a deacon and the choir director. He has served as trustee for the past four years and as president of the school board for the past two years.

He is also the coach of the Oilers team on the United Girls Softball Association.

Eddie Brown is also a life-long resident of Talco. His wife is the former Nancy Graff and their two children, Kim, a sixth grader and Jack, a second grader at Talco

school, reside in the Maple Springs community where they are members of the Maple Springs Missionary Baptist Church.

Eddie is employed by TUMCO and Nancy is employed by Winn-Dixie in Mt. Pleasant. Eddie has served on the school board for the past three years.

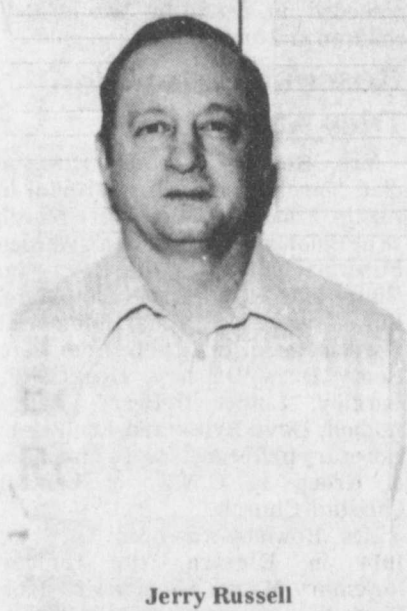

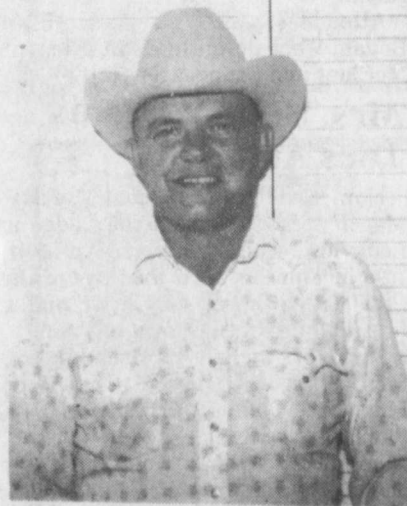

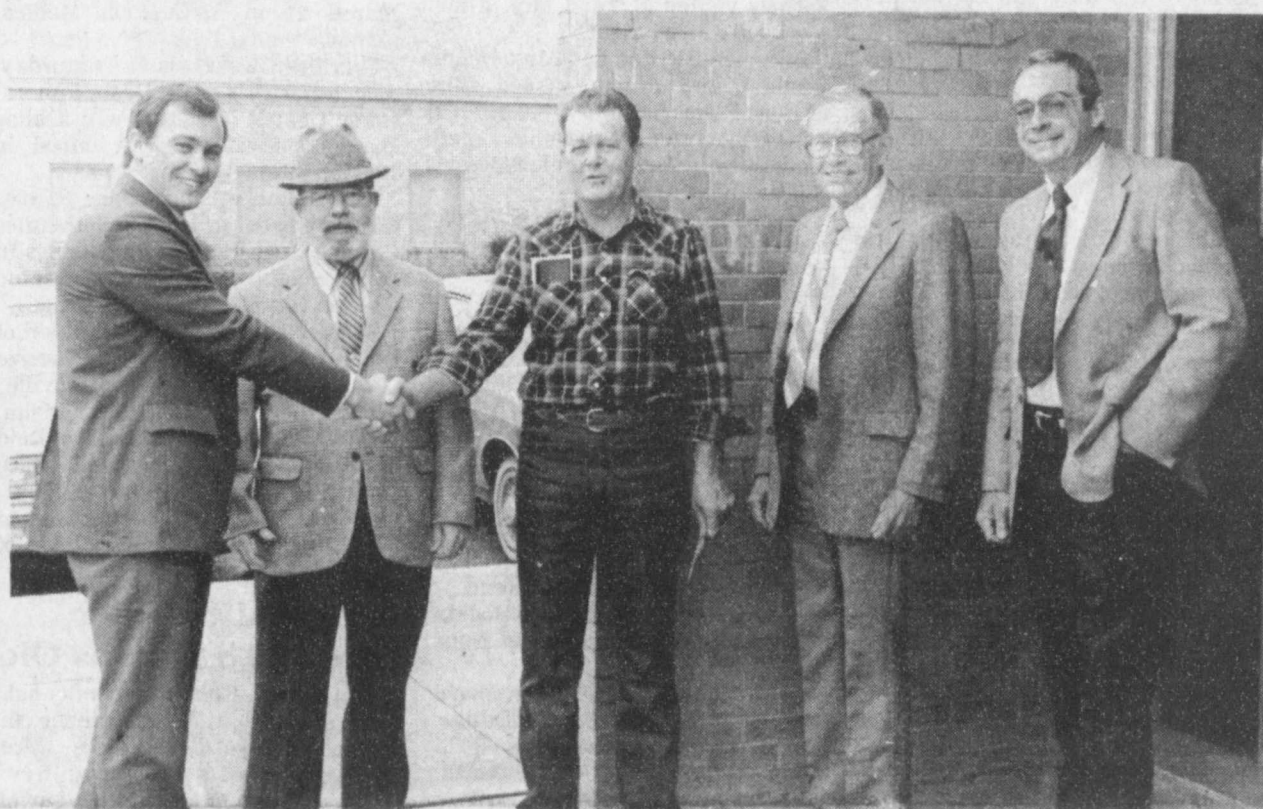
Boy Scout Roundup Set

Once There Was A Hydrogen Explosion

W.J. Holloway and his wife Syble, taught in the Deport High School in 1924 and 1925. Mr. Holloway was the superintendent and taught mathematics and science. Mrs. Holloway taught English. They were two of the best teachers that I ever had. There were no professional counselors in high school in those days, but Mr. Holloway was a counselor and a good one. We had some options as to subjects that we could take. He would discuss with us these various subjects, and give us an opportunity to make the right choices. He would discuss with us individually our goal in life and what we should do to reach that goal. I probably never would have gone to college except for his encouragement. If anyone was having difficulty with some of his school work, he was invited and welcomed to go to their home in the evening for some special tutoring.

Mr. Holloway taught Physics, and sometimes he would have me to set up the laboratory apparatus for the

demonstration. Once while we were studying electric currents and electrolysis, he asked me to set up the apparatus for, and demonstrate the electrolysis of water. The apparatus consisted of a couple of interconnected glass tubes shaped like the letter H, and set in a vertical position. There was an electrode, or electrical connection at the bottom of each leg of the H and a stop cock at the top of each leg. The glass tubing was then completely filled with water. When an electric voltage was applied at the two connections at the bottom of the tubes, gas bubbles would form and rise to the top. The demonstration was to show that the electric current passing through the water would break it down into its two components of hydrogen and oxygen. The oxygen would rise above the positive electrode and the hydrogen above the negative electrode. After sufficient gas was accumulated, a test would be made by applying a lighted match to each of the opened stop cocks at the top of the tubes. The oxygen should cause the match to flare up and burn brighter. The hydrogen gas should catch fire and burn like ordinary natural gas.

In setting up the demonstration, it was discovered that the dry cell batteries that were to be used were dead, and there was no direct current to energize the experiment.

It was almost class time and rather than postpone the demonstration, I rigged up the electrical connections to the alternating current of the house lighting system. By then it was class time.

Everyone gathered around the table to view the demonstration. After the necessary remarks about the decomposition of water and the phenomenon of electrolysis, the electricity was turned on. Immediately bubbles began to form at the electrodes and rise to the top of the tubes. The volume of hydrogen was supposed to be double that of the oxygen, but in our experiment the volume in the two tubes was the same. That was strange, because that was not what the book said. We continued with the experiment

and after three or four cubic centimeters of gas had formed, I applied a lighted match to one of the gas openings, and BOOM!!!!!! with the sound of a pistol shot, water and shattered glass went all over the table. Fortunately no one was injured by the flying glass.

I was embarrassed. I knew instantly the cause of the blast, but it was too late to call it back. I expected Mr. Holloway to give me a good dressing down, and discharge me from my job as laboratory assistant.

Instead he calmly said to me, "You will now tell the class what caused the explosion and how the apparatus will be set up next time."

I think the experiment was performed, made more of a lasting impression on all of us than it would have if it had been carried out in an uneventful manner.

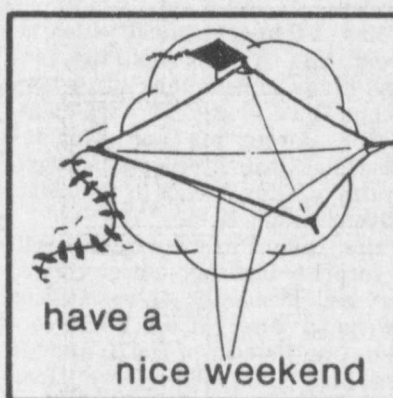

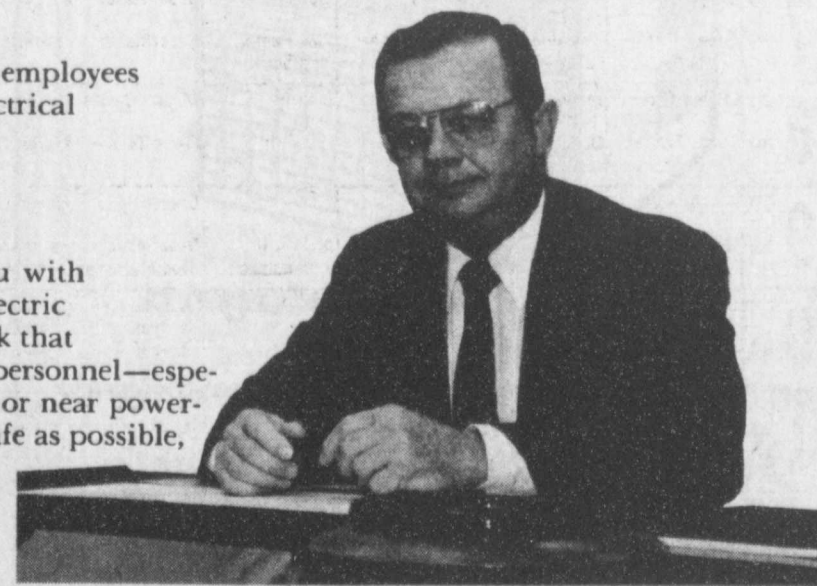

A: Supplying you with dependable electric service is a task that requires a lot of trained personnel—especially when working on or near powerlines. In order to be as safe as possible, our linemen and construction crews are thoroughly trained to work with electricity safely.

Even though you and your family do not work with powerlines, you should make it a practice to use electricity safely every day. Here are a few guidelines: Always use tools and appliances which are properly grounded; never allow electrical appliances, such as hair dryers and radios, near the bathtub; replace worn or damaged electric cords.

When working outdoors, be aware of overhead powerlines and avoid contact with these lines. TV antennas, masts, tree pruners, ladders and other metal objects are extremely dangerous when used near powerlines. If you see a downed powerline, do not touch it.

With electricity, you cannot be too careful, so always handle electricity with care and respect.

WHAT IS A TAX RENDITION?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains the process.

A rendition is a report a taxpayer makes which lists the taxable property he owned or managed and controlled on January 1, 1985. A rendition also gives a taxpayer the opportunity to record his own opinion of what the value of his property should be.

Not every taxpayer has to file a rendition, but there are important reasons why a taxpayer may wish to do so.

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used to produce income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser.

Renditions may be filed by any taxpayer who wishes to preserve certain valuable rights.

Even if you aren't required to prepare and file a rendition on your property, there are several good reasons why you should do so:

- By filing a rendition, you have placed on record your own opinion of your property's value.

- You create a responsibility on the part of the chief appraiser and the appraisal review board to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property by any amount over the value you rendered. Further, you have the right to protest to the appraisal review board either the increase in value or any other decision affecting the taxability of your property.

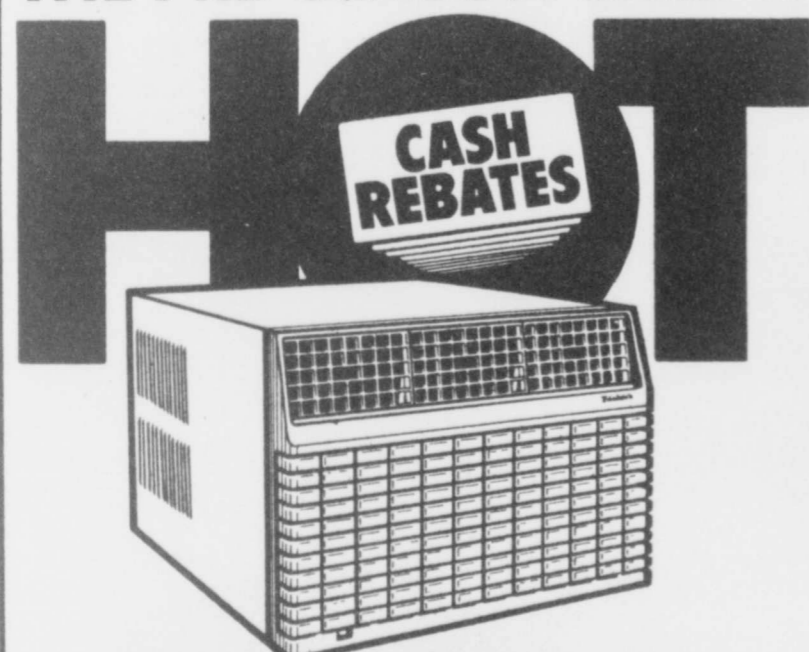
- You place your correct mailing address on record, thus ensuring receipt of tax bills. If your tax bill goes to an old or wrong address, you may be liable for penalty and interest if your taxes are paid late.

Besides a rendition, you may also file a special form called a "report of decreased value," if the value of your property decreased during the preceding tax year for any reason other than normal depreciation. The appraisal office will inspect the property to verify any reported change in appraised value and its cause.

You should file renditions and other property reports with the county appraisal district office any time from January 1 through April 30. The appraisal district has rendition forms available for various types of property, as well as other property report forms.

Your appraisal district can also give you a free copy of the Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities pamphlet which explains exemptions, appeal rights, and other details of the local property tax system in Texas. Or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.
