

# Mixups Change Court House Outlook

A misunderstanding in an amount of approximately \$300,000 has thrown the Commissioners Court into confusion and may have put a screeching halt to any plans to renovate or rebuild the Red River County Courthouse.

All those involved admit that there is no shortage of public funds and that the error, or whatever, came about when County Auditor Maurice (Goobar) Isbell's budget for 1985, as approved by the Court, divided far less income into the Road and Bridge Funds than the four Commissioners had anticipated.

Instead, the monies were allocated to the General Fund, precipitating extended discussions and public meetings on whether to spend the surplus reserve fund on a renovation of the Courthouse or build a new one and abandon the present structure.

As a matter of fact, in one meeting, the Court Judge felt compelled to de-

fend himself against "hoarding" money in a hidden account which could be used for the Courthouse work.

As a matter of fact, the funds available will probably be only some \$160,000, not nearly enough for serious discussions on the Courthouse future on a cash-as-you-go basis.

In a special emergency meeting Friday afternoon, all Commissioners promptly voted to take the additional funds back to their operating account with County Judge Wm. S. (Scotty) Whiteman voting to leave the money in the General Fund.

This would give the four Commissioners a total of \$1,316,000 for the precinct operations, in contrast to the \$1,024,000 originally budgeted.

The entire misunderstanding was not an amicable one, with the Judge insisting that the funds should remain allocated in the budget, originally app-

proved by the entire Court on a motion of Commissioner H.D. Pirtle and seconded by Jackie Barton.

However, the Commissioners insisted they had been misinformed and that they had expected to receive some \$330,000 in funding each rather than the \$256,000 which they had approved in the budget.

Isbell emphasized that there is no shortage of money but simply a misunderstanding as to how the funds were to be divided among the General and Road and Bridge Accounts.

The auditor said he had apparently made the division in a manner not understood nor anticipated by the Road Commissioners but that since there was no actual loss of income he was not overly concerned.

However, most of those involved agree that such a misunderstanding came at a most inopportune time,

perhaps the worst in several years.

The Judge was especially incensed at what he said was a delay in advising him of the discrepancy.

County Treasurer Donna Townes Griffin said she had discovered the problem on March 6 and properly reported it to Isbell, who mentioned it to Pirtle on March 8.

The County Judge said he was not informed until March 26 and added that he had received no satisfactory explanation as to the delay yet.

"My personal opinion is that the money should be left in the General Fund where it was placed in the budget unanimously passed by the Court," Judge Whiteman said. "The Commissioners were allocated exactly what they requested, about \$180,000 each plus an additional \$76,000 each for motorgraders and I feel this was sufficient."

Nonetheless, the miscalculation was certainly, as Judge Whiteman said, "opened a can of worms, because the public has been advised of an excess of funds and the Commissioners Court has gone so far in planning for the Courthouse."

Actually, the misunderstanding led directly to involving the Court in a massive brouha, dividing the county into two camps: those who favored renovating the present Courthouse for limited use and building an annex, and those who wanted to build a new Courthouse and close and abandon the present historic structure.

Rightly or wrongly, a large segment of the citizens who favored preservation received the idea that at least some members of Court favored abandonment, bringing down a storm of protests, petitions, surveys and such.

Intensifying the division was the fact

that those on the Court favoring a complete new Courthouse, backed by knowledge of the nearly half million surplus, were operating from a position of strength.

Supporters of preservation feared, with or without probable cause, that the Court might use such funds and contract the new building without recourse to a vote of the people, inasmuch as a tax increase might not have been needed.

Indeed, members of the Court did contact builders who have visited the site, made cost estimates, and a plan for a proposed new structure has been posted in the Courthouse for a couple of weeks or so.

However, this controversy is apparently over for at least the time being, since there is considerable difference in a \$167,000 in hand and a \$457,000 bird somewhere out there in the bush of misunderstanding.

## Local Sales Tax Figures Show

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$48.9 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

Bullock cautioned against attempts to draw conclusions about the Texas economy based on one month's rebate figure but added the April payments "are in line with our projections for the state."

Locally, Blossom received a check in the amount of \$900.44, for a 5.84 percent increase over last year's total to date of \$4,089.09.

Deport received no payment this period, bringing the 1985 payments to date of \$2,759.33, marking a 6.43 percent decrease.

Bogata received payment of \$1,025.88, bringing 1985 payments to total \$7,273.97, for a 13.81 percent increase over 1984.

Talco received a payment of \$2,226.20, compared to a payment of \$2,097.60 this time last year, bringing the 1985 payments to total \$7,563.41 for an 11.91 percent decrease.

### Sam And The \$100 Bill

By Wm. C. Barnard Back in the 1920's the Town Mothers of Deport didn't allow dancing in their homes. The young people of the community had many parties, but no dances. Occasionally a school party with dancing would be held in the Coliseum in Paris, but never in Deport. Sometimes two or three couples could dance in a home if the curtains were drawn and the volume on the record player was turned down real low, but there was no good time, hand clapping, loud fiddling and guitar playing. Out on the prairie the Mothers were more tolerant. Almost every forty acres was occupied by a farm family, and many of these people enjoyed dancing, both square and round.

The next weekend at another party the boy was back with his big bill, and again danced free. In a few weeks there was another party and both Sam and the big money man were there. This time when the \$100 was presented in payment, Sam made change in nickles and dimes. That ended the difficulty with big money.

Sam Bryson was a fiddler and played for many of these parties. Usually he would sit in a doorway between two rooms from which some of the furniture had been removed or rearranged to make two dancing areas. The male dancers would pay Sam a dime for each set that they danced.

One Saturday night everyone was having a good time to Sam's music and when it came time to pay, one of the boys offered to pay with a one hundred dollar bill. There wasn't a hundred dollars in change in the whole party. Sam couldn't break the bill, so the boy danced all evening free.

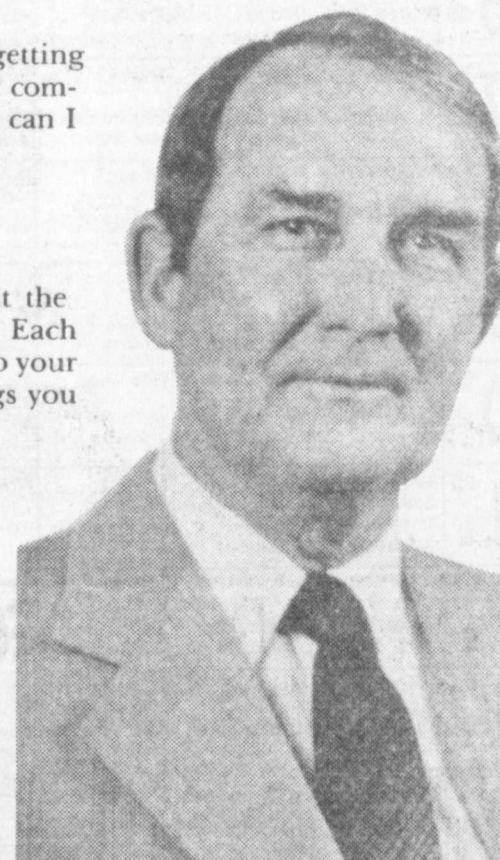

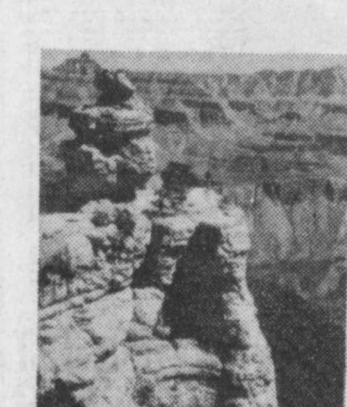

**Hornflies Showing Resistance To Insecticide**

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble."  
Psalm 46:1

Recent research and demonstrations conducted by personnel of the USDA Livestock Insects Lab at Kerrville and entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service indicates that horn flies in East and Central Texas are becoming resistant to the pyrethroid insecticides used in ear tags. Generally, horn fly resistance has not been a problem in western and southern areas of the state. According to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist, the situation is causing many cattlemen to return to more traditional methods of controlling horn flies.

In a recent meeting of county Extension agents and entomologists in East Texas, most agents reported that where the insecticide impregnated ear tags had been used on herds for several years, control of horn flies was no longer being obtained. However, in herds where the tags had not been previously used, good results were reported last year. The insecticide impregnated ear tags continue to give good control of ear ticks, both the spinose ear tick and the Gulf Coast tick. Extension agents and specialists agree that each herd is probably a different situation and that the producer must look at the past history of horn fly control before making a firm decision on the 1985 control program.

Last summer and fall, Dr. John A. Miller, agricultural engineer, and Charley Schmidt, entomologist with the USDA Livestock Insects Lab, worked with Extension entomologists and county agents in several areas of Texas to learn just how resistant horn flies were becoming to the insecticide impregnated ear tags. Herds were identified where insecticide impregnated ear tags had been used for several years and resistance was apparently taking place. After varying lengths of time, flies were collected from the herds and laboratory tested for resistance to different levels of insecticides. As suspected, the flies in certain herds were showing resistance to the insecticide.

Chemical companies are working on the development of ear tags which disperse phosphate type insecticides to combat the pyrethroid resistance problem. Some of these tags are currently on the market. However, their effectiveness is not known at this time. Therefore, alternate control programs must be followed for adequate control, Robinson concludes, especially in herds where the insecticide impregnated ear tags have been used for several years.

- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded Swiss cheese
- 2 tbsps. flour
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen chopped broccoli, thawed and drained
- 2 cups (10 oz.) diced ham
- 3 tbsps. chopped onion
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Preheat oven to 375°F. Combine cheese and flour. Layer half of broccoli, ham and cheese in pie shell. Repeat layers. Top with onion. Combine milk, eggs and seasonings; pour over filling. Bake 40 to 50 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean.

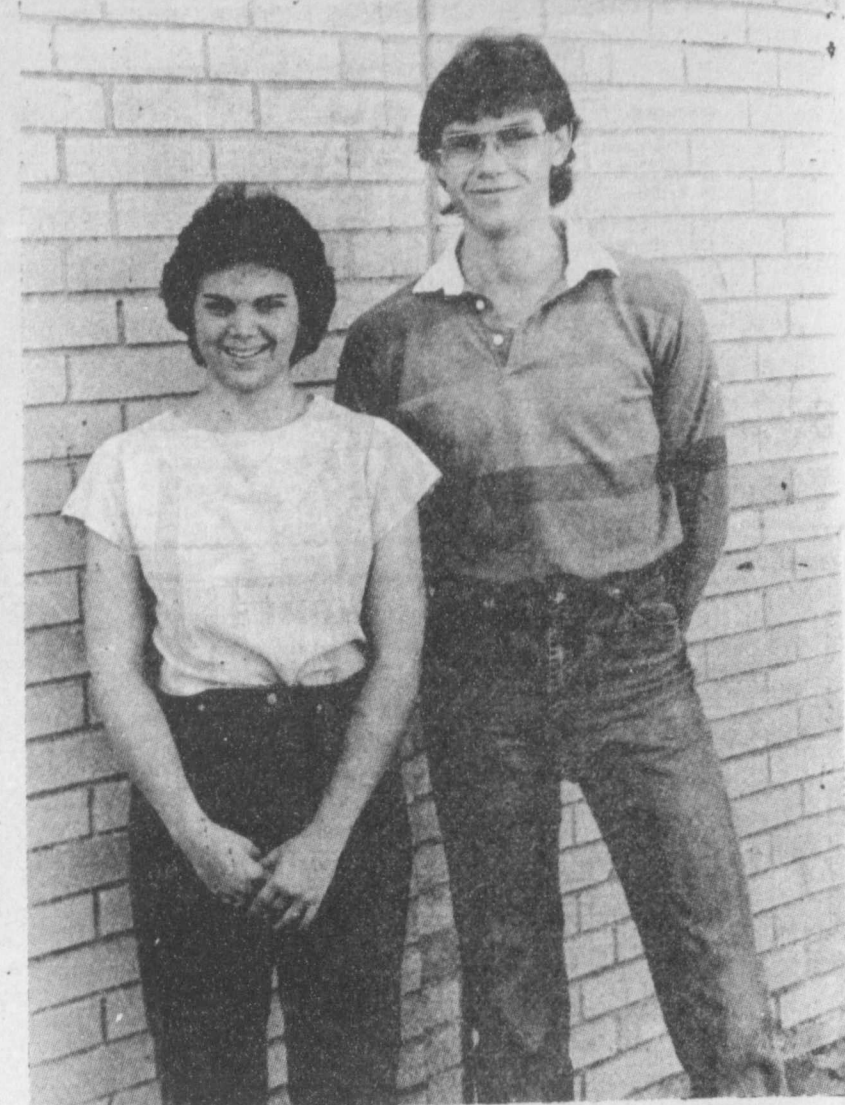

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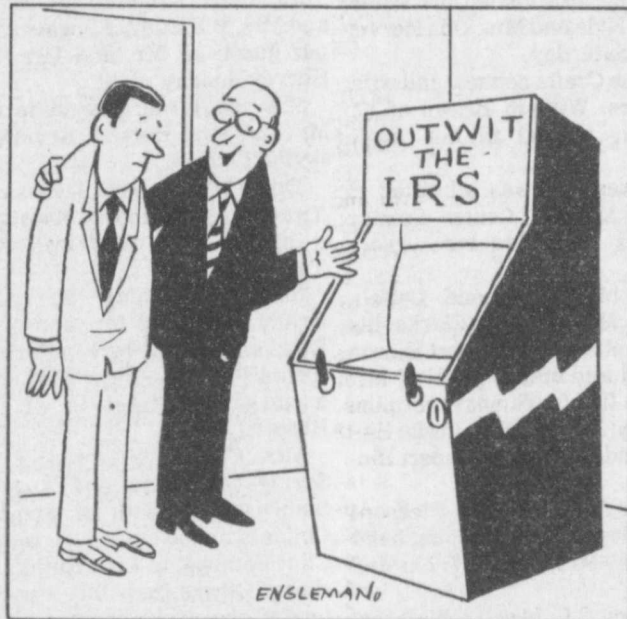
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### Family Council To Be Held At Red River Haven

### Brucellosis Laws Require Vaccination Of Heifers

Heifers born in 1984 in the Class C Area of Texas need to be vaccinated before they are a year old in order to comply with a Texas brucellosis vaccination regulation.

The regulation state that heifers born after Jan. 1 1984 between 4 and 12 months of age which are acquired and used for breeding, grazing, dairying or confinement in a nonquarantined feedlot must be vaccinated or be subject to these restrictions:

Heifers born after Jan. 1, 1984 which are over 12 months of age and are unvaccinated can only legally change ownership after being spayed; or moved to a livestock market and S branded prior to sale; or consigned direct to slaughter, quarantined feedlot or quarantined pasture.

State funds are available for vaccinations. Contact your area TEXAS Animal Health Commission office or your own veterinarian for details.

## Spring have a nice weekend Time

### Wheat Disease Situation Stable

The leaf rust situation in Lamar  
County wheat was stable on Monday  
afternoon when several fields were  
checked. The rust spore count  
remains low at the spore trap located  
at Petty. However, the situation  
remains explosive and farmers are  
encouraged to check their fields  
every two days for signs of rust.

The spore count in Hunt County  
reached 130 spores per day on March  
24 and 110 at Ellis County on the  
23rd. At Uvalde the count reached  
140 on March 31.

The rain helped matters by  
washing off the spores from the plant  
leaves. Cooler temperatures and  
lower humidity are also conditions  
that discourage rust development.

Farmers are encouraged to con-  
tinue their check of fields. Dr.  
George Philley, Extension Plant  
Pathologist, suggested a couple of  
"Thumb Rules" to help one deter-  
mine when to and not to apply  
chemical. One should consider ap-  
plying chemical if rust is found on 10  
to 20 percent of the two leaves just  
below the flag leaf. This is of course  
if the yield potential is there. Also it  
is doubtful that a chemical ap-  
plication would be effective once the  
grain reaches the flowering stage.  
These are general rules only.

Should we have a rust problem,  
obtaining a timely chemical ap-  
plication could be a tricky situation.  
We are speaking mainly of the  
weather. Very few days of late hav  
been satisfactory because of the

high wind. Waiting ones turn is also a  
factor as everyone will want their  
field sprayed first and on and on.

Just as sure as warmer  
temperatures appear in spring,  
algae appears on farm ponds. If  
control measures are to be used,  
they should be used as soon as  
possible before temperatures rise  
and the amount of algae in the pond  
increases.

There are two chemicals that are  
labeled for use on farm ponds,  
Aqualize and Hydrothol 191. Follow  
the recommended rate on the label.  
The rate will be based on so much  
per acre foot of water to treat.  
Remember that one acre foot is one  
surface acre, one foot deep. One will  
need to determine the surface acres  
and the average depth of water.

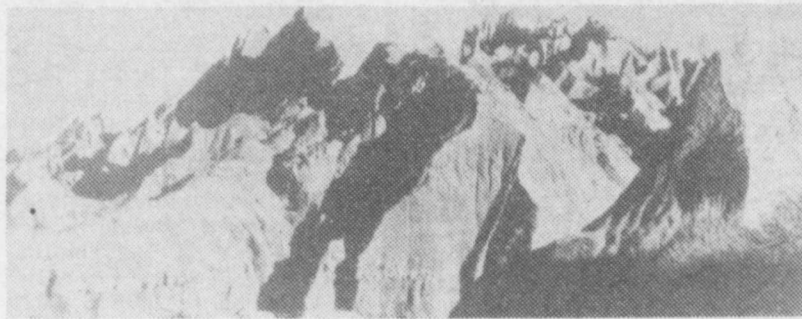
