

Monday Rains Were Needed By Most

Between two and three inches of rain, borne on heavy storm clouds, deluged the area Monday morning, and lasted most of the day.

In a classic illustration of just how fast weather can change, the area in just two short weeks had gone from too wet for area farmers and gardeners to plant to too dry for crops to sprout!

Mondays rainfall was welcome,

therefore, to most people in the area.

During the past two weeks thousands of acres were planted for farmers. Most was planted in milo and cotton, and the rains, while to heavy for perfection, should provide much needed moisture to nourish sprouting seedlings.

With farm prices severely depressed,

hopes for a bumper crop year are high with most agriculturists, and the rainfall gets them off to a good start.

Accompanying the storms that provided spectacular lightning displays and a loud volume of thunder were some high winds.

Tender young leaves and some limbs were torn from trees, sheet iron on

some barns was ripped loose, and Monday was generally a day to stay indoors if at all possible as driving was hazardous.

Tuesday dawned gray but cleared off to a sunny, perfect spring day, and at press time it was hoped that things would stay that way for a couple of more weeks.

Gardeners, generally depressed because of a very cold, wet spring that has kept the early crops such as potatoes, english peas and beans from even being planted, are busy taking advantage of the weather, and most gardens are sprouting lines of green as

the remainder of garden crops are established.

Forecasts for more thunderstorms cloud that hope though.

Papers Receive Award

North and East Texas Press Association held it's annual convention on April 13, handing out awards for the 1984 year.

The Bogata News captured a third place award for Feature Writing. The field was somewhat larger in Division A, weeklies with circulation under 2,500, and a little tougher, too.

Of the third place award, given to Nanalee Nichols for the feature "Wayne Huffman, Pursuing A Goal For The Gospel", the judges said, "The piece is thorough, balanced, made lively by direct quotations, and nicely written."

Of the Homecoming submission, contributed by Francis Rozell, and featuring the two pictures of Iva Hooker's graduation dress, they commented, "a nice sense of enthusiasm and fun, and the dress pictures are wonderful."

About Diana Eudy's ultra-lite feature they said that there was a good balance of facts and personal stuff about Mr. Gayler.

The judges also commented on various other categories, such as the Bogata News Sports Entry... "Rodeo spread fine, but other sports coverage doesn't measure up to some of the high standards set by several other publications in Division A. Still Eudy and Allen demonstrate effectively that sports is more than a man's game!"

Of the Deport Times sports coverage, they wrote that it was "solid reporting but spark missing. Space limitations are a problem."

Entries in photography for the Deport Times were well rated. Chair at phone booth was interesting...wreck pictures had good composition, kids and dog was interesting, but dog should have been in foreground.

Bogata News pictures "liked kid in bucket, cute idea, should have watched background...cat picture use yellow filter to leave contrast."

In News, Joyce Alexander's article on the stray dog problem in Talco was well commended, and judges commented that it should have helped. Nanalee Nichols writing was described as showing feeling and skill, very good.

Nichols Worth was noted for having good, light humour...but the judge said that a "syndicated column at this level nearly threw me." He apparently didn't quite understand the situation.

Your presence is needed as well as your input.

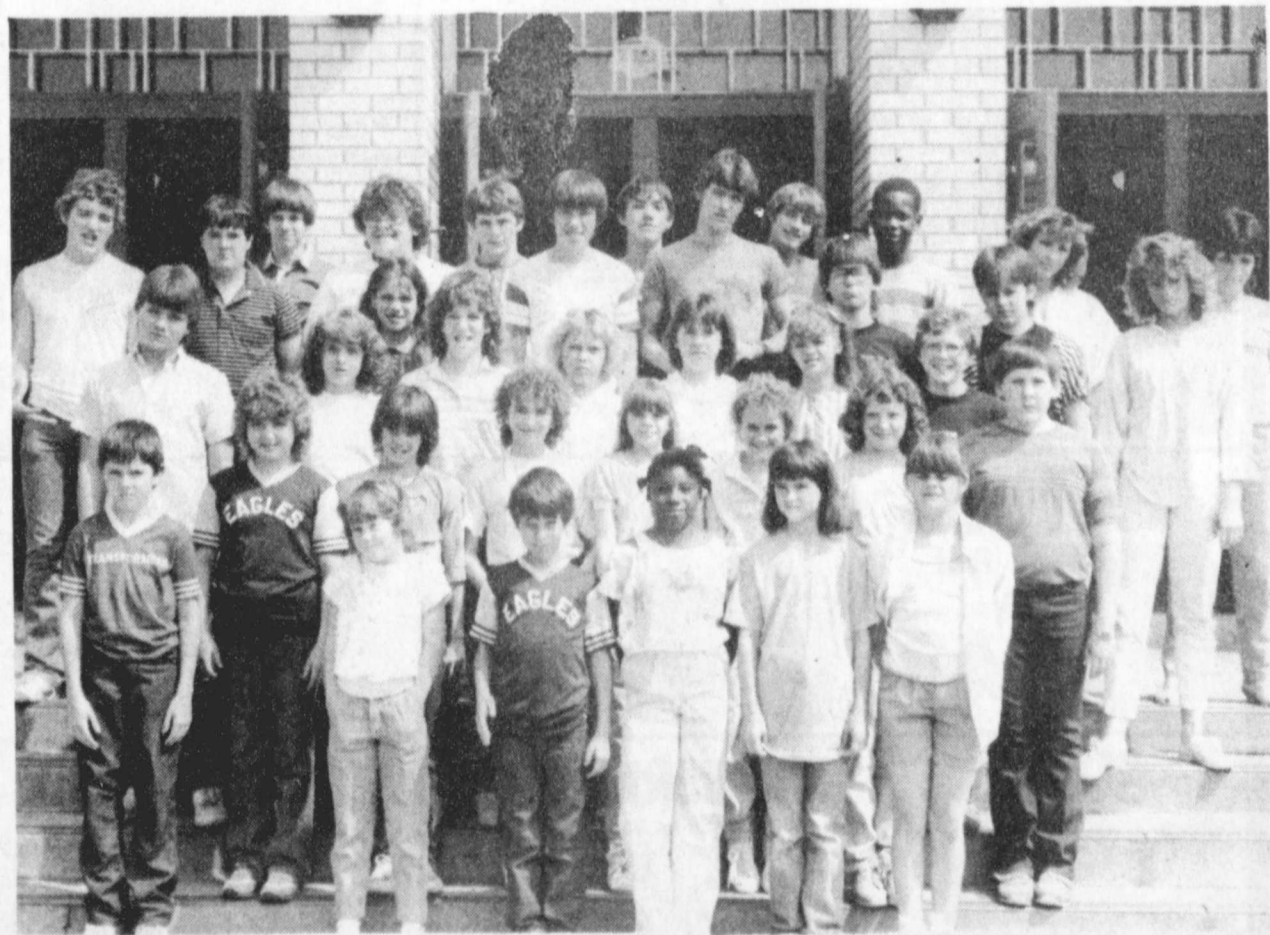

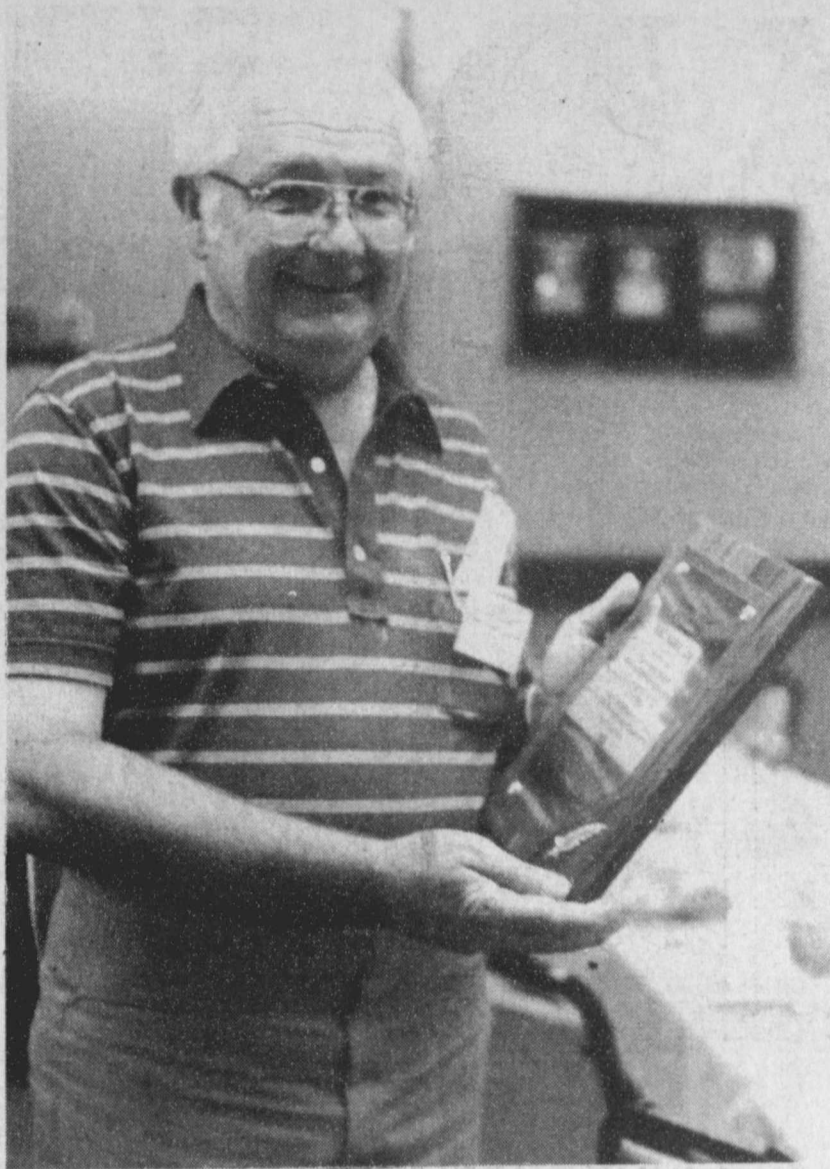

Dwight L. Parks Dies At Age 64

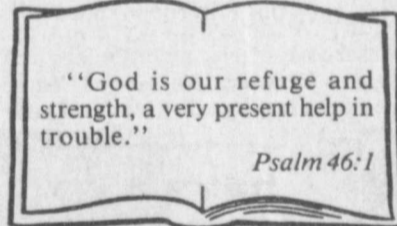
Dwight L. Parks of Ft. Worth died there Monday, April 15.

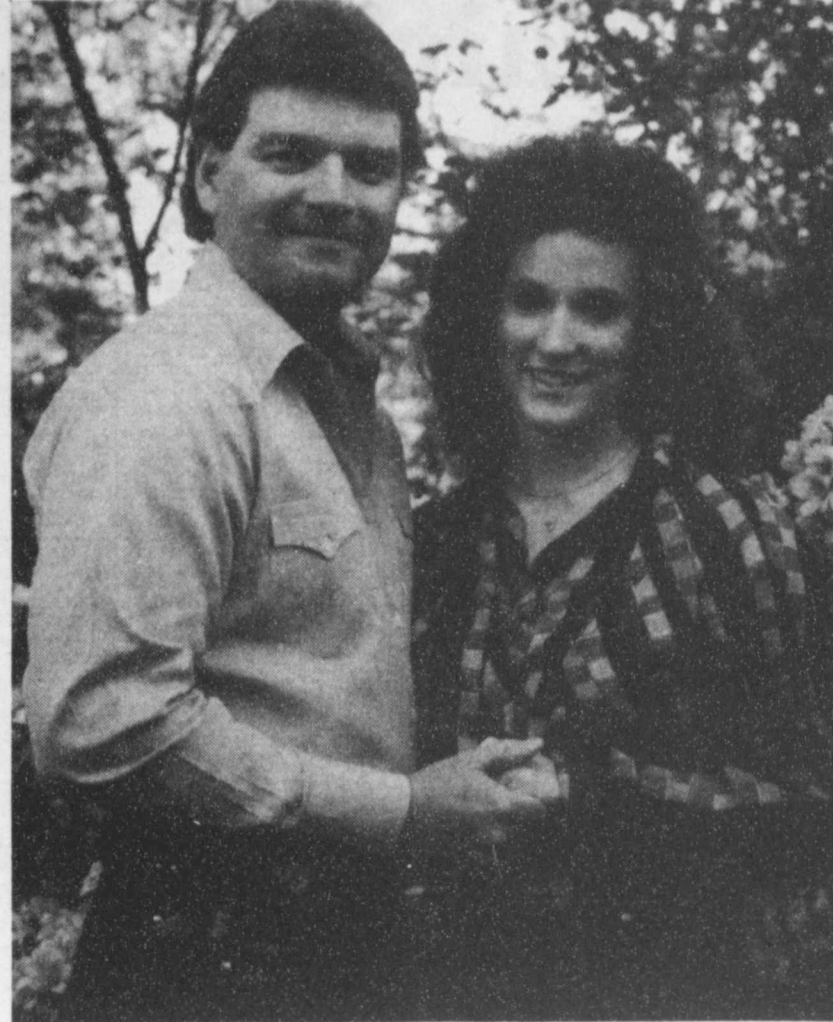

Migraine

According to various estimates, from five to ten percent of the population may have migraine headaches.

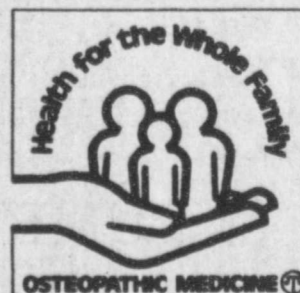
According to Dennis Graham, D.O., Chairman of Neurology, Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, a migraine headache usually starts on one side of the head, and, as a rule, remains one-sided. It may, however, change sides from one attack to another. The pain of a migraine can debilitate the sufferer to the point at which he or she can no longer function. There are two major types of migraine headache.

According to Dr. Graham, an osteopathic physician, "common" and "classic" migraine are differentiated by the presence or absence of symptoms prior to the onset of the headache. The most prevalent type of migraine is a common migraine. Common migraine does not have an obvious dramatic period before the headache starts. However, many people do have a vague, uneasy or irritable feeling.

Classic migraine is characterized by a ten to thirty minute warning period, which signals the oncoming headache. The victim may see flashing lights, zig zagging lines, or areas of total darkness. There may be tingling of the lips, face or hands; weakness of an arm or leg; loss of appetite, slight speech abnormality, confusion, restless-

Keep a detailed record of your attacks; note times, diet, odors, emotions, onset, duration, prevalence. Some headache remedies are prophylactic, and are used to prevent migraine headaches.

Other medication is used to abort the attack once it has begun. Always follow your physician's instructions and take your medication as directed.
