

Area Harvest Prospects Looking Good

Abundant rainfall for much of the area is resulting in some excellent harvest prospects this year for farmers.

Dropping prices, as usual, mar that picture, as does midge infestation in late milo.

Milo harvesting is just getting started, but early yields indicate as high as 5,000 lb. yields.

Hay producers report better production than in the last few years but damage from drought and bitter cold has still shorted some coastal production.

Cotton and soybeans look excellent, but whether crucial rains during August come or not may well determine the actual production size of those.

Rains, mostly from thunderstorms, have swept the area regularly this year, with more cloudy days and even some very uncharacteristic drizzle during July.

Gardeners, plagued from the beginning this year with a cool, wet spring, have had some difficulty. Peas, however, have done extremely well,

okra and tomatoes following close behind. It was the spring garden truck that seemed to fall below par.

Insects have been prevalent, perhaps more so than usual. Midge, the tiny insect that eats tender milo grains, and can almost destroy a crop, are becoming evident.

Cotton insects are said to be no

worse than usual. Some army worms have been reported, but not in epidemic force so far.

Grasshoppers, a very serious problem in West Texas, have stayed in usual numbers in this part of the state.

Some areas have not received the benefits of the July thunderstorms,

having to watch as the big clouds swept past and dumped their moisture elsewhere. Crops and pastures in those areas are not doing well.

Overall, however, the picture for harvest looks good. If August brings some more of the same, hopes for a bumper crop will be high.

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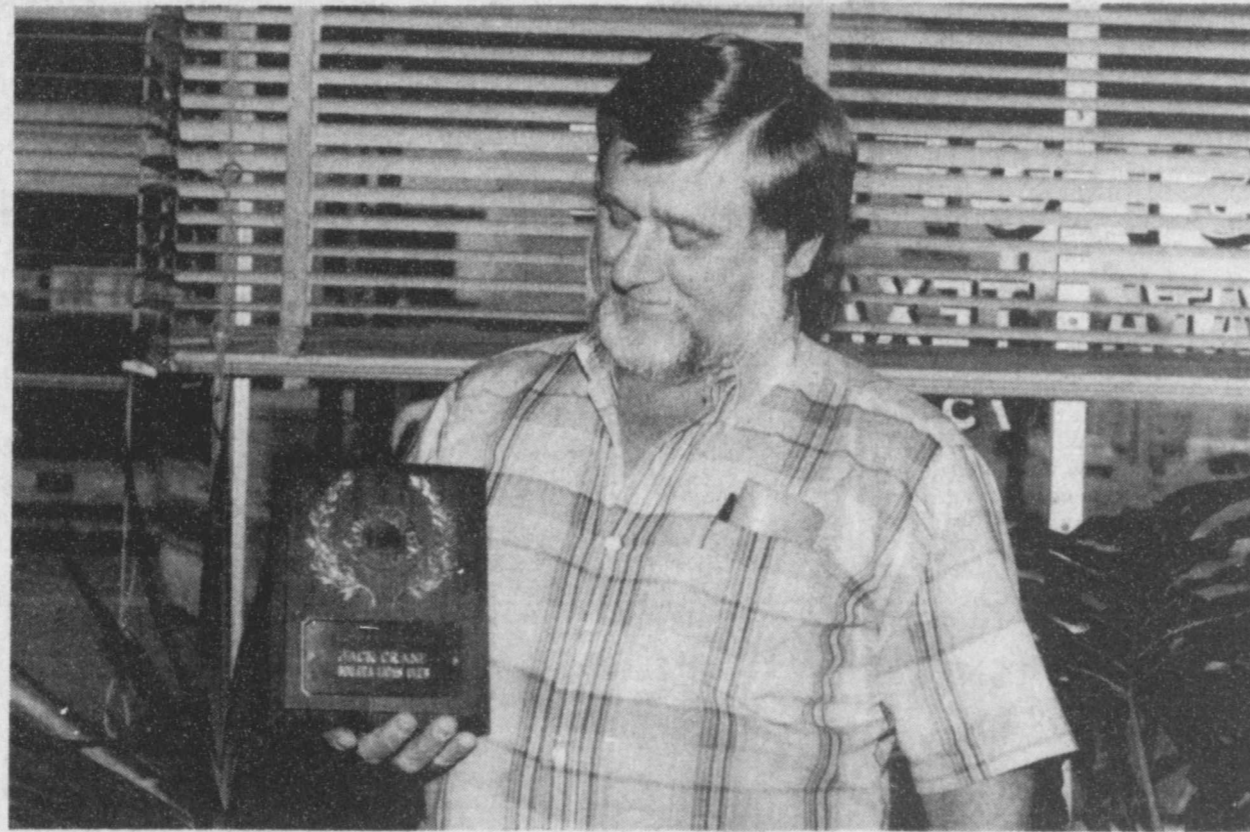

Chapman Keeps Democrats In Congressional Seat

In an election win that kept both candidates on the edges of their respective seats until the very last, Democrat Jim Chapman captured the Congressional seat that has been the coveted prize since Sam B. Hall's resignation to assume a Federal Judge's position.

Chapman received 52,670 votes, amounting to 50.9 percent, while Republican Edd Hargett polled 50,737 votes, or 49.1 percent.

Chapman expressed his delight, and expressed his thanks, and faith in the people of East Texas. He claims that his opponent used \$1.5 million in the campaign, a record.

Chapman will meet with House Majority Leader Jim Wright and House leadership to discuss committee assignments soon. His duties will

begin after the Congress ends its current recess on September 3.

A thirty-percent turnout was labeled as more than either candidate truly expected.

Chapman carried Lamar County with 56.21 percent of the vote. He also carried Red River County, which had gone Republican by eight votes in the June primary, having 1,887 votes to Hargett's 1,227.

Chapman also carried Titus County with 2,459 votes to Hargett's 2,408. The Democratic votes came from the rural boxes, for the most part, and the larger boxes produced Hargett's votes.

The Democrats have held this seat for 114 years. But the Republicans note the narrow margin as gains in rural East Texas for their party.

Two Talco Boys Die In Accident

Two seventeen year old Talco boys were killed Monday night, August 5 in a tragic accident 2 1/2 miles east of Talco.

The pair, Kenneth Chane Whitney and Adam Matthew Tucker, were members of the Talco Volunteer Fire Department, and were riding on a motorcycle to what turned out to be a call for medical assistance. Apparently, there were no lights on the motorcycle. The accident occurred around 10:00 p.m.

According to witnesses, Shane Wright, also 17, and driving a pickup, attempted to pass another vehicle. Wright was headed west and the motorcycle with Tucker and Whitney was headed east.

Apparently the lack of lights on the motorcycle kept Wright from seeing the vehicle approaching, and it was struck head on. Both youths were killed instantly.

Other members of the Talco Volunteer Fire Department had already responded to the call for help from an elderly lady.

Wright was not injured in the accident.

Services for Adam Matthew Tucker were held Wednesday, August 7 at the First Baptist Church of Talco at 11 a.m. with the Rev. Terry Barnett officiating and burial following in Talco Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bowser of Talco and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Matthews and two brothers.

Cheese And Motion Pictures

In 1911, Dad, Mother and family left Washington to move back to Texas. We traveled by train and occupied berths in a pullman, or sleeping car, because it was a three day trip. We didn't always eat in the dining car because meals were rather expensive.

The train usually stopped at noon to change crews or engines, and Dad would leave the train, find a restaurant and purchase sack lunches. In passing through Utah, we stopped at a place and a cafe wasn't handy, but a delicatessen was.

Dad bought a chunk of Limburger cheese and a loaf of rye bread. Mother wasn't impressed, but she opened the package and started making sandwiches. When the aroma of the cheese began to drift through the coach, people began to look around, wrinkle their noses, clear their throats, and finally leave and go to one of the other coaches. Mother was embarrassed. Dad didn't buy any more Limburger.

Uncle Jim Williams and Aunt Sue, Dad's sister, lived in Shawnee, Oklahoma. We traveled through Oklahoma on our way back to Texas, so we stopped to visit with them a while before coming on to Deport. While there, Uncle Jim wanted to

show us some of the sites. There was a new thing in town called a Motion Picture Theater. We had never been to one. There were Opra Houses back in Washington, which we sometimes attended, but no Motion Picture Houses. Dad went with Uncle Jim and took me along. The show was about K.C. Jones, the great locomotive engineer. We had seats up close. There was no dialogue, just lifelike motion pictures flickering on the screen, and a player piano going full blast.

When the lights went out and the picture came on, it showed K.C. Jones as he mounted to the cabin. It showed the engine racing down the track with drive wheels rolling, the piston rods and connecting rods churning, and the black smoke pouring from the stack. It was impressive and exciting, everyone was sitting on the edge of his seat.

The next scene showed the engine in the distance coming toward us at breakneck speed. Steam was blowing from the cylinders at each stroke of the pistons, K.C. with his hand on the throttle, and leaning out the window and looking straight ahead.

Just as the front of the engine and

cowcatcher filled the entire screen and it seemed as if we all were going to get killed, someone yelled "Look out!" That's when I ran over Dad and Uncle Jim trying to dodge the engine.

A Look At The 1932 Bogata

In 1932, Bogata put out a neat little booklet about itself. Entitled "The City of Bogata, The Biggest Little Town in Northeast Texas", it proclaimed "Watch Us Grow" proudly. Malbe Trout has shared it and some other artifacts, with us.

It listed in it's businesses: one bank, financially sound; one furniture and undertaking establishment, with a complete stock of drapes in line with cotton prices.

Three blacksmith shops, three cotton gins, one dry cleaning plant, one shoe repair shop, one beauty parlor, one telephone exchange, one weekly newspaper, four doctors, one dentist, one post office.

One gulf distributing agency, furnishing the area with gasoline. One railroad and one busline. Passenger service on the two had service six times daily.

Highway 37 and 271 were noted as excellent graveled highways, with asphalt topping being put on 271 for five miles in the Bogata vicinity.

A full complement of churches and schools were listed. The authors of the book proudly proclaimed that Bogata was the best place in Texas to raise

chickens, turkeys, ducks, geese, hogs, cattle, truck crops or cotton and feed. These things, it continued, would "Keep money in your pocket every day in the year."

Among the ads in the booklet were those for Hancock Confenctionary, Theford's Fine Tailoring and Dry Cleaning, Bogata Lumber Company, Texas Louisiana Power Company and Tom Underwod's Beauty Parlor and Thomas Barber Shop.

The rest of the book, along with more ads, contained recipes and a variety of helpful hints on how to care for silver, cleaning wicker furniture and hints for women while touring.

Another book was the Bogata telephone book, extolling people to please use the phone numbers when calling.

The Bogata numbers were not always consistent, ranging from two digit numbers such as 17 to 127F3.

Instructions as to rules and regulations mentioned to pick up the receiver and tell the operator the number. To always ring off when through talking. To answer your calls promptly. Never to answer a ring on the line that isn't yours.

Mrs. Dorothy Jones To Chair Arthritis March

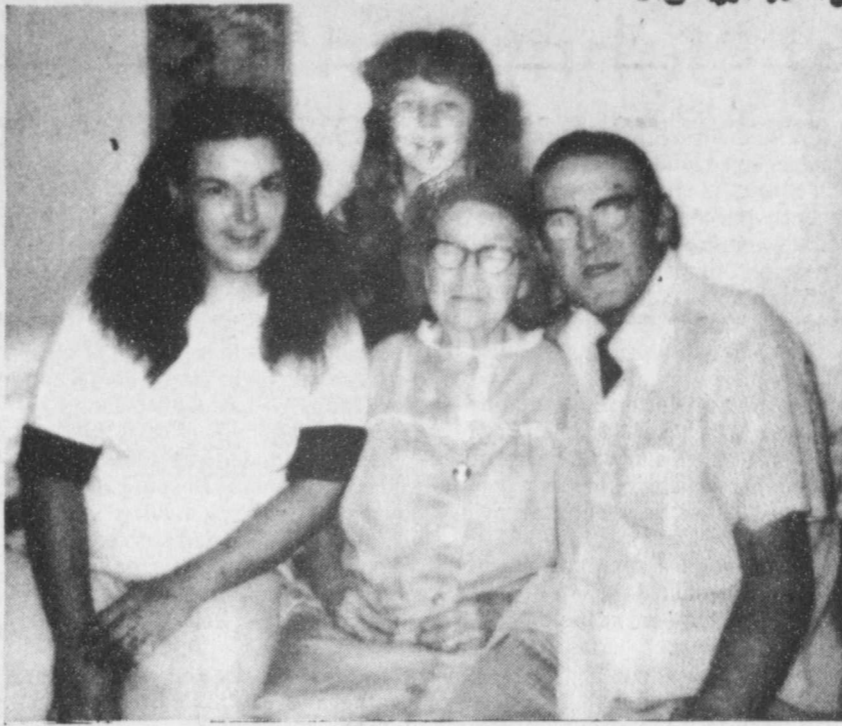
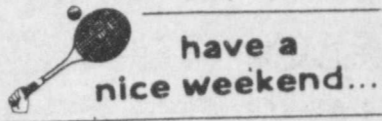

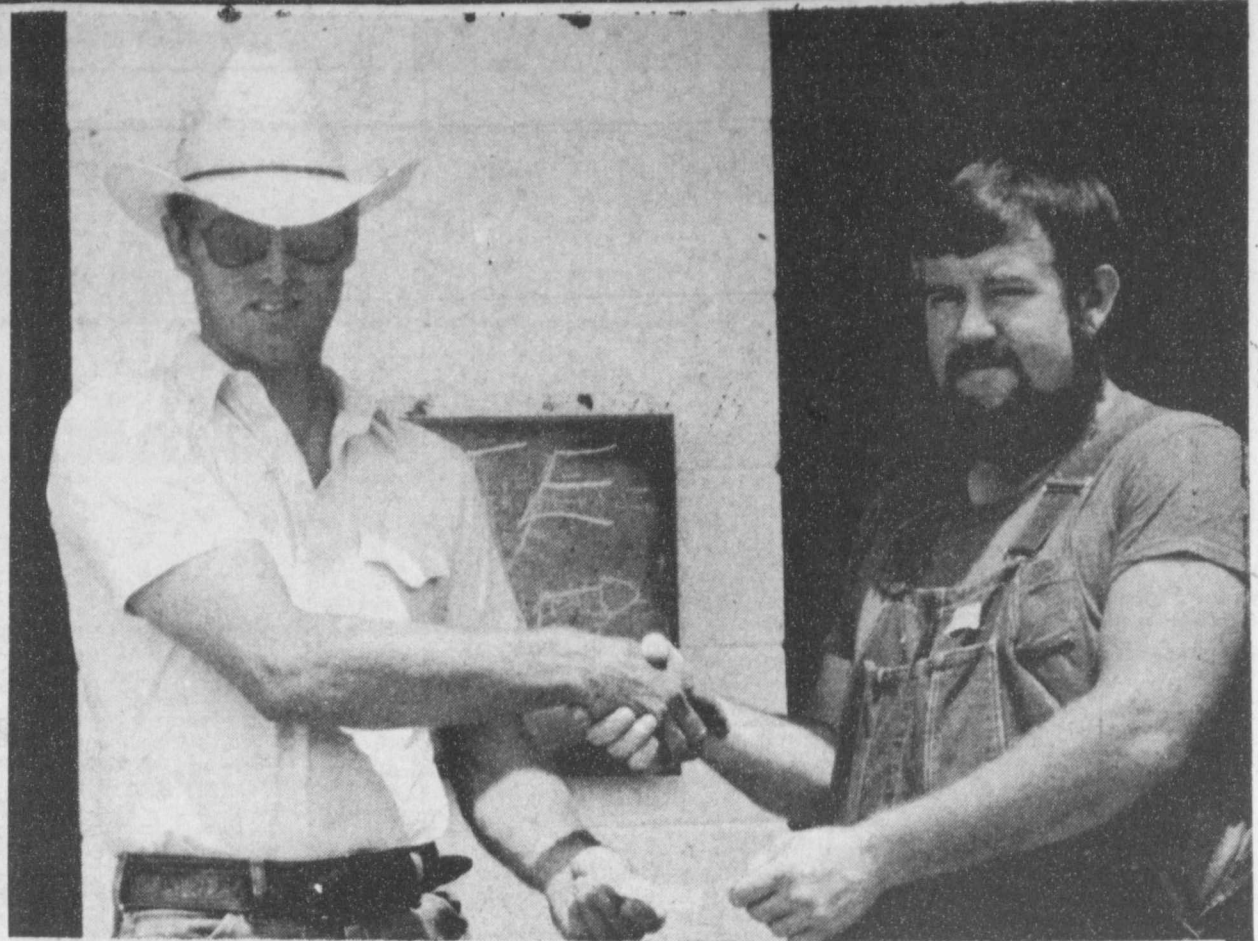

THOUGHT FOR FOOD

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
2/3 cup milk
2 tablespoons light corn syrup
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup creamy peanut butter
2 tablespoons Butter Flavor Crisco
1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

1. Very lightly grease 8x8x2-inch pan. Set aside.
2. Combine brown sugar, granulated sugar, milk, corn syrup and salt in heavy 2-quart saucepan. Heat to boiling over moderate heat, stirring constantly. Cover and boil 1 minute. Uncover. Insert candy thermometer. Cook over moderate heat, without stirring, to 236°F (soft ball stage). Remove from heat.

3. Add peanut butter and Butter Flavor Crisco and do not stir. Cool undisturbed to 120°F. (Bottom of pan is barely warm.) Stir to blend all ingredients. Then beat vigorously with wooden spoon until mixture starts to thicken and lose its sheen (about 2 minutes). Quickly stir in nuts, if used. Spread in prepared pan. Cool until firm. Cut into 1-inch squares. About 1 pound candy or 64 pieces

NOTE: For a stiffer candy, replace milk with 1 can (6 ounces) evaporated milk. Beating time after cooling will be about 1 minute.

In step 3, cooling the candy to 120° may be accomplished more quickly by placing the hot pan in a larger pan of cold water. Water may be changed, if necessary, during this process.
