Seat Belt Law Effective September 1

Seat Belt Law will go into effect. Whether one likes it, or whether one doesn't, will no longer be a matter of concern, for the fact is, seat belts will be required on the following:

Passenger cars include light trucks with manufacturer's rated carrying pounds.

Persons commit an offense if the person: is at least 15 years old; is riding in front seat of passenger car while it is operated on a road, street or highway of this state; or occupying a seat that is equipped with a seat

Effective September 1, 1985 the capacity of no more than 1,500 belt; is not secured by a seat belt. A person commits an offense if the

A passenger car is deemed to be equipped with seat belts. If vehicle came from factory with seat belt anchors or belt holds it must have safe-

Penalty: Punishment by fine of

The law does not apply to U.S. postal workers while performing duties requiring the operator to service postal boxes from their vehicle, which requires frequent entry into or exit from their vehicle.

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55 cents an dhigh school students may buy breakfast for 65 cents. Extra milk may be purchased for 25 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food

stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security number so all household members 21 years of age or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member. Verification: The information on

the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year. Reporting changes: If your child is

approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. Reapplication: You may apply for

benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have toster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Non discrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal Income Eligibility Guidelines



Keeping Healthy

Hot Weather Hard on the Elderly

Older people have an increased risk of heat-related illness and the National Institute of Aging of the National Institutes of Health warns against heat exhaustion, heat cramps and heat stroke.

The Institute suggests several ways to cool off during a hot spell: taking lukewarm or cool baths or showers, allowing the body to air dry; placing an ice bag or wet towels on the body; staying out of direct sunlight and avoiding strenuous activity; wearing lightweight, lightcolored, loose-fitting clothing; wearing a hat outdoors. Whenever possible, remaining indoors in a cool place is advisable.

Another suggestion from the Institute is to drink plenty of water or fruit juices to replace fluids lost through perspiration but to avoid alcoholic beverages.

Elderly relatives or neighbors should be checked on routinely, and especially those who live alone. Danger signs such as nausea, dizziness, fatigue or fever require prompt medical attention.

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School Clothes Give Children Confidence

By Mary Lou Williamson Most adults know that looking good is an important part of feeling good. But parents sometimes overlook how important feeling well dressed is to children, states Dr. Ann Beard, Extension Clothing Specialist from Texas A&M University.

Children who have confidence in how they look tend to be more positive in their schoolwork and their relations with classmates. Research studies also show that teachers believe school school year to avoid outgrowing age children with an attractive appearance are more intelligent and do better in school.

Parents can help children have that extra bit of confidence by planning clothes carefully. The basic element in selecting school clothes is that they should be attractive, comfortable and safe. But beyond that is an enormous range for choice - a choice to be made with the child's input.

Here are some suggestions on how to make shopping trips for clothes a success. First make a money plan. Know how much you have to spend on clothes for everyone before you begin

buying. The greatest amount of money spent on childrens' clothing usually goes for a back to school

Have a closet check at the beginning of each season. Decide what is usable, stylish, still fits and in good repair. Agree on what to buy and when, since you do not need to have everything at once. School age children grow fast, so purchase only a few things at the beginning of the

Buy clothes that fit according to your child's size, not by age. Most manufacturers base sizes on weight and height so if you cannot shop with the child, take actual measurements along. Since sizes may vary by manufacturer, it is best to have the child try on the clothes.

Dr. Beard recommends when buying children's clothing check for quality and safety. Look for straight seams, check buttons, zippers, belts, ties and pockets, for strength, finishing and ease of handling. Select fabrics that are sturdy but comfortable, colorfast and have easy care requiprements.

Always read labels before you by. Permanent labels give you details for laundering. Hanging tags often carry additional information on fabric properties.

Children's clothing has many purposes in addition to providing something to wear. Clothes give children the means to: be like other children; develop a sense of ownership and responsibility; gain selfconfidence and independence, learn about decision -making; acquire freedom of activity in relation to growth stages; use their imaginations.

Tax **Publications** Available For Small **Businesses**
