

# Meeting Opposes Pirtle's Removal

The Bogata Gym bleachers were full Tuesday night as Precinct 1 citizens met to elect a committee to see Red River County Judge W.S. "Scotty" Whiteman this Thursday about the conditions Precinct 1 Commissioner H. Drue Pirtle was ousted from the Commissioner's Court, and to see if the judge would consider re-appointing Pirtle.

Pirtle was fired by the County Judge on a technicality last Friday. Judge Whiteman was not present at the gathering, but sent his secretary.

Travis Hale, moderator, said that no one wanted to criticize or embarrass the judge, but that the position

of the constituents needed to be made known in the circumstances.

Hale introduced Pirtle to the crowd, who wryly thanked everyone for "coming out to my birthday party". He was 51 that day.

Peopel were invited to make two minute statements on the issue, and a number of people praised Pirtle's work, and expressed their desire to see him kept on as County Commissioner.

The County Judge's secretary took the floor and said that Drue Pirtle didn't represent the entire county, and had spent three times more money than the past commissioners.

More people expressed their support of Pirtle, and the committee to visit with Judge Whiteman was selected.

Travis Hale, W.C. Barnard, M.J. Dodd, Ennis Moore and Rev. Billy Daniels will form the committee.

The meeting was the result of last Friday's confrontation at Commissioner's Court. County Judge Whiteman said to Pirtle, "I don't think you're good for the county", and informed him that Pirtle's office was vacated because he sits on the Talco-Bogata CISD school board.

Pirtle said that it's the "first time in my life I was ever fired from a job!" He also says that he has tried

to be fair and honest, and tried to vote on every issue with the benefit of the people of Precinct 1 in mind.

Pirtle and Whiteman have been at odds on a number of issues, primarily on the budget.

Pirtle and other commissioners wanted to use a \$128,000 surplus of funds in needed repairs on county roads, while Whiteman wanted to return the excess to the taxpayers and avoid a tax increase.

Members of the Red River County Historical Society began the issue about the two elected offices because of Pirtle's stand in favor of a new courthouse as opposed to renovating the old one. Pirtle wanted the old

courthouse turned over to the Historical Society.

Pirtle says he wasn't notified that he had vacated the office. Whiteman responded by saying that he had left word for Pirtle to contact him. Pirtle had been out of town for several days.

Pirtle offered to resign from the school board position and let the county re-appoint him.

Whiteman refused.

Pirtle is currently consulting with legal counsel on the matter. He says he has procured more than \$20,000 donations to build roads, and has built more roads than any other commissioner.

Whiteman contends that Pirtle

wasn't willing to live within his budget and just wasn't good for the county.

According to the law that was used to oust Pirtle, an automatic resignation takes place when an individual files for another elected position.

Pirtle was appointed by Judge White to fill an unexpired term two years ago, and was fifteen days away from serving two full years on the Commissioner's Court.

Pirtle said at Tuesday's meeting that Precinct 1 was in good shape, and would be debt free at the end of the month.

The outcome of the controversy may not be settled for some time.

It's cotton stripping time. How it got here so fast remains one of those obscure mysteries.

But, the first trailers are trundling down the roads, and the gins have begun their throaty roar. For some, cotton time doesn't mean much, but it always creates a lot of nostalgia for me.

When I was a youngster (yes, I know I'm showing my age) cotton harvest was a major marker in the year. School would turn out for two or three weeks for youngsters to help pull bolls with their parents.

There were four gins running in Deport alone at that time. Rugby had one, Fulbright had one, Bogata had two, there were gins at Cunningham, and scattered just about everywhere else. Now Deport and Cunningham are the only two, each with a gin apiece.

The fields would open slowly, cotton wasn't killed and stripped mechanically.

From early in the morning until dark, those white fields were spotted with countless backs, clad in bright colored shirts and jeans or overalls, pulling the long white sacks that slowly swelled with the harvest, pulled by hand.

Scales and trailers waited at the end of the rows to weigh and haul the cotton.

In 1957 there was what may have been the biggest cotton crop this neck of the woods ever saw.

Seven hundred Mexican Nationals were brought in from down South. They were housed in the old cotton warehouse, and for the first time ever, we youngsters heard the plaintive sounds of Mexican guitar floating over town at night.

A few of the younger children came to school, objects of much curiosity to the rest of us.

Then, when the fields were bare, the Mexican Nationals disappeared as swiftly as they came, and interlude that brought a change to all our lives. Within two years mechanical strippers were taking over the hand harvesting.

Now, there is no such thing as "pulling bolls". It's a lost occupation in this part of the world. Those that did it remember aching backs and don't mourn it's demise.

But for me, fall and childhood will always be filled with slow rides through the countryside with my grandfather to see the harvest. It's filled with the gentle rumble of cotton gins, going on day and night, and the whine as a gin gears up.

The importance of cotton was ingrained...and it's a hard feeling to lose.

The gin cranked up to action...and it brought back once again those visions from a bygone day.

## Talco-Bogata CISD Proposes Tax Increase

Area residents expressed their concern, and in some cases, anger, at the public hearing on a proposal to increase their Talco-Bogata CISD taxes by 17.8807 last Tuesday night.

The public hearing was held at the Rivercrest High School and about fifty people showed up for it.

The hearing, which many people thought was to be a public vote, was a mandated hearing on a decision which had already been made by the school board.

Two public meetings had already been held, and those meetings had been advertised in a number of newspapers. There was almost no turnout for those meetings.

Harold Cowley, the school superintendent, told the Bogata News that much of the hike was due to the decreasing tax base. The Talco-Bogata tax base has declined due to decreasing values on farm land and oil, both of which are major sources of taxable resources in the school district.

People at the meeting were inform-

ed of the option of a tax rollback under provisions of House Bill 72 for tax increases of more than eight percent.

Voters can referendum to limit property tax increases under this provision, and if a "rollback" election occurs it limits the following, not the current year.

The board said that they had tried to keep the insurance low by adopting a step tax to reach compliance in property tax equalization required by the state by gradually lowering the amount of allowable deduction for homestead exemptions.

This, they said, was partially responsible for the large property tax increase by using up the financial surplus for the district.

The budget for the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. is 2.6 million, and increases from last year's 2.4 million.

Superintendent Cowley stated that teacher raises, which are required, new rules on the size of classes, addition of a teacher, and two new classrooms which were needed at Bogata had accounted for the budget increase.

## Not Guilty Verdict Instructed In Borders Trial

Judge Leon Pesek instructed a verdict of not guilty in the murder trial of Minnie Belle Borders, a Cuthand woman accused of the December, 12, 1984 murder of Ernest Borders, her husband.

The judge instructed the verdict during the presentation of the State's evidence, saying that a scientific laboratory employee failed to remember which other laboratory employee she transferred two items of evidence to for storage or examination and thus broke the chain of custody of the items, which were among 25 items of evidence presented by the State in court.

The verdict came during the trial, in which the prosecution, Red River County Attorney Thomas Fowler, claimed that the killing was prompted by Border's illness and heavy drinking. Experts from the Southwestern Forensic Science Center in Dallas testified that the blood stains on Mrs. Border's nightgown were spattered from the impact of the bullets fired at close range. Borders was shot in the forehead and temple with a .32 pistol which the prosecution claimed belonged to Mrs. Borders.

Defense attorney Jim Dick Lovett claimed that Mrs. Borders was the victim of poor investigation by Red

River County Sheriff's deputies.

He raised questions about Border's coin collection, and produced witnesses which said they saw Borders with a man who looked like a flier from the Pantego Police Department of a man wanted for the serial murders of two Tarrant County coin dealer murders.

Volumes of other evidence both for the prosecution and for the defense were presented, but the question became academic when Judge Pesek ruled on the break in the custody chain, ending the trial with the not guilty verdict.

## Talco-Bogata Enrollment Released

Enrollment figures for the Bogata and Talco schools was recently announced. The first day of school was September 3 and total enrollment was as follows:

Talco: Kindergarten, 20; first grade, 25; second grade, 17; third grade, 23; fourth grade, 23; fifth grade, 12; sixth grade, 22; seventh grade, 21; and eighth grade, 24. A total of 186 youngsters enrolled in the Talco school system.

In Bogata: Kindergarten, 43; first

grade, 30; second grade, 39; third grade, 37; fourth grade, 37; fifth grade, 43; sixth grade, 40; seventh grade, 33; and eighth grade, 30. Total enrollment in the Bogata school system is 332.

At Rivercrest High School: Ninth grade, 72; tenth grade, 63; eleventh grade, 40; and twelfth grade, 49. Total enrollment at Rivercrest is 224.

Total enrollment for the Bogata, Talco and Rivercrest systems is 742 students for the fall term.

## Red River Fifth In State Hay Production

Producers in Red River County placed fifth in Texas all hay production during 1984, harvesting 91,600 tons or 2 percent of the state's total crop.

According to figures released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, yield for the county averaged 2.5 tons from 36,500 acres. Nationally, Texas ranked ninth in

all hay production during 1984 with a total of 5.42 million tons.

### Clovers Cut Fertilization Costs

The question may be asked, why use clovers in pastures? Well, one reason is to improve the water holding capacity. Another, clovers can be used to aid in good weed control. Also, the grazing period will be extended, cutting down on the amount of hay needed.

Clovers will also cut the cost of your fertilization program if properly managed. Over 7,000,000 pounds of nitrogen is above every acre of land, but cannot be used. But, nitrogen-fixing bacteria that are on clover roots can take the nitrogen from the air and convert it into useable form.

By growing both clovers and grasses in combination, the quality of forage will greatly improve, and the protein content will be increased. Much more management is involved when growing both clovers and grasses together, rather than one or the other.

All clovers have the ability to fix a certain amount of nitrogen in the soil. The red clovers can produce approximately 114 pounds of nitrogen in the soil per acre. Arrowleaf, white, and crimson clovers will produce approximately 90 pounds of nitrogen in the soil per acre.

A rancher must consider two major items when managing clovers and grasses in combination. One is the management of grasses going into the cool season. If there is an excessive amount of grass during September, it should be removed. This can be accomplished by grazing mowing or shredding. The removal of this grass will allow the clover to receive more sunlight, and begin to grow. Another is the management of clovers going into growing or warm season. This can be made possible by not overgrazing, deferring pastures and allowing the seed approximately 30 days to mature. Arrowleaf, red and white clovers will mature and go to seed from about June 1 through July 15. Crimson clover will mature and go to seed from April 15 to May 15. Clovers should be given a chance to get a good start by excluding grazing. After the clover have reached four to six inches in height, they will furnish some grazing during both winter and spring.

Alice Ann White, neighborhood chairman for the Girl Scouts in Bogata and Linda Eilers, publicity representative, attended the training.

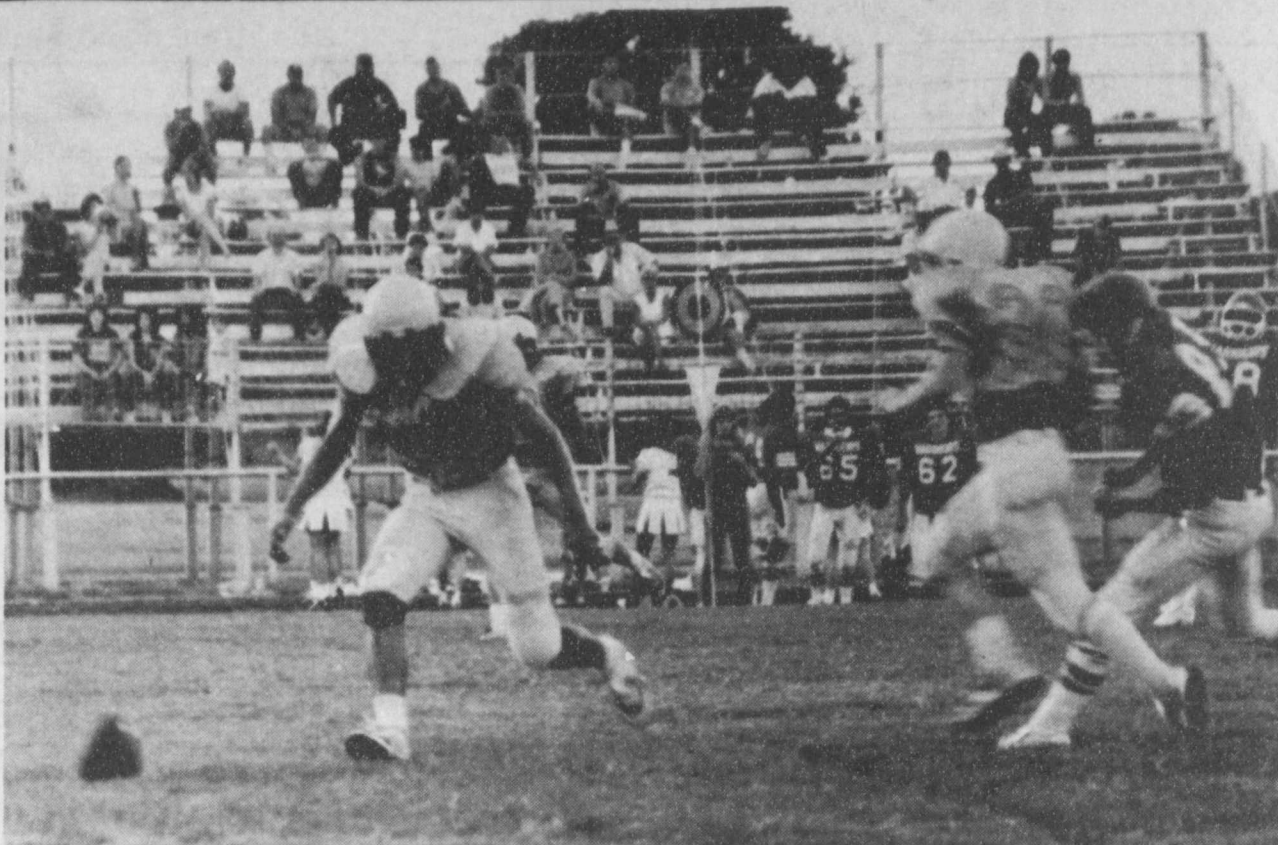
The service team members are responsible for organization of troops and recruitment of girls and adults in their own local communities. These adults are also responsible for pro-

### Weekly Ag Update

By Herb Brevard

Many producers are getting ready to plant winter pastures and the question has been asked about the feasibility of mixing the seed and fertilizer so that both could be applied at the same time.

According to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr. agronomist, small grains and ryegrass can generally be broadcast with the fertilizer without any adverse effect on the germination of the seed. Problems can arise if the seed are planted in direct contact with the fertilizer. However, when small grain is put out with a fertilizer truck, the seed and fertilizer are disked in and scattered so that not much direct contact is made.

As a precaution, Reeves suggests not mixing the seed and fertilizer until ready to plant. Generally, high concentrations of fertilizer are more harmful after the seed germinates. The young root system is very sensitive to fertilizer concentrations.

The weight difference between the seed and fertilizer can cause some problems in distribution. To overcome this difference, use narrower swaths and criss-cross the field for more even distribution.

Do not mix fertilizer and inoculated clover seed. The fertilizer will kill the inoculant. The longer the fertilizer is in contact with the inoculant, the more it kills.
