being about average this year. The results of the 1980 drought and the last two winters' extreme cold are slowly disappearing on the meadows.

Summer's stifling heat always seems as if it is generated right on the

premises...and at the time seems to promise to never leave.

As usual, and with more abruptness than usual, summer has been defeated once more, and leaves are beginning to tumble down prior to the first frost.

In all probability, there will be some more warm weather, but thermometers will probably not see the

higher nineties any more this year. Another cold front is predicted for this weekend, so dusty stoves and empty wood heaters can look forward to

some more usage to take the "edge off the chill" against Saturday and Sunday!

Rebels Take Big Win Over Karnack

It was a long ride to Karnack last Friday night for the Rivercrest Rebels, but it was well worth the trip! The Rebels bounded to victory 21-6 to claim their first win of the season. The game with Karnack opened the district play for this year. Jerry Belcher rushed for 110 total yards with Bubba Simpson not far behind with 103.

Coach Terry Giddens said, "I thought we executed our offense well. They are coming along. Our defense held strong, like they have the rest of the year. The boys all worked pretty well as a team."

He continued, "We play Harmony Friday night. They are a pretty big team and a good aggressive ball club. Harmony has a good veteran coach that coached against me when I played in high school."

The Rivercrest defense held the Indians to only six points in the contest. Karnack's Alan Webb carried the ball into the endzone for the Indians.

Clint Stephenson, 167 pound sophomore fullback, bulldozed into score territory for the Rebels with 1:36 remaining in the first half. Stephenson carried nine times for 66 yards for the night. He also played well on defense.

Rivercrest didn't waste any time

starting off the second half with another touchdown. The Rebels marched into the endzone in seven plays with senior tailback, Jerry Belcher, doing the honors. The extra point was good for a 14-6 lead over the Indians. The points were scored with 8:06 remaining in the third period of play.

The Rebels weren't ready to quit yet, however, and racked up another score in the fourth quarter. Shane Wright went in from the two yard line for the touchdown. The extra point was good for a score of 21-6, Rivercrest.

The Rebels marked up an offensive total of 297 yards for the evening. They made 19 first downs to Karnack's four and totally dominated the game.

Rivercrest will hold their Homecoming October 4 as they host Harmony. The Homecoming Queen and her court will be presented during pre-game ceremonies beginning at 7:15 p.m. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

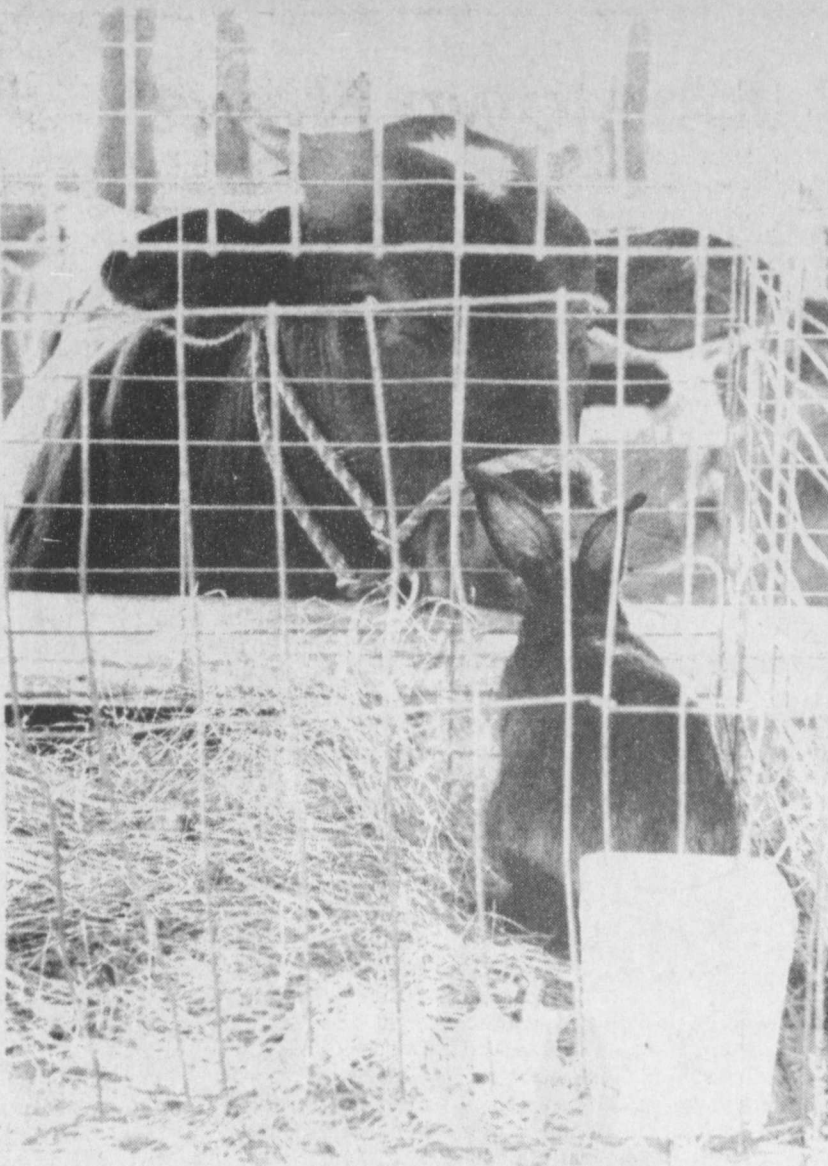

Time To Plant Winter Pastures

By Herb Brevard
The time has arrived for getting seed in the ground for winter pastures, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist. Small grain pastures should be planted immediately and clover-ryegrass pastures should be planted in the next two to three weeks.

If sod-seeding is planned, Reeves says to graze the warm season grasses down to less than three inches before planting. When sowing clover and ryegrass seed in a sod, either disk the area lightly or drag the field so that the seed will get in contact with the soil. Be sure to inoculate all clover seed to be planted with the proper inoculant.

If small grain is sowed on a

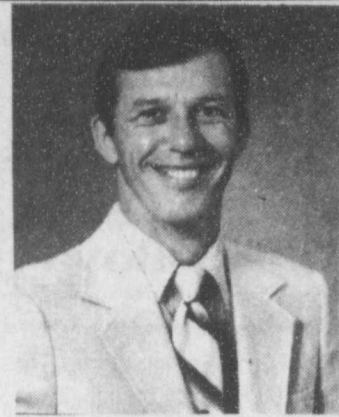
prepared seedbed and disked in, a packer should be used to firm the soil. If the seed are planted with a drill that has a packer wheel, the use of an additional packer is not necessary.

Reeves advises using plenty of seed, regardless of the type winter pasture being planted.

Clover-ryegrass pastures should be fertilized with phosphorus and potassium at the time of planting. Delay any application of nitrogen until after a killing frost to prevent the warm season grasses smothering out the new plants.

Small grain pastures on a prepared seedbed need nitrogen in addition to phosphorus and potassium at the time of planting.

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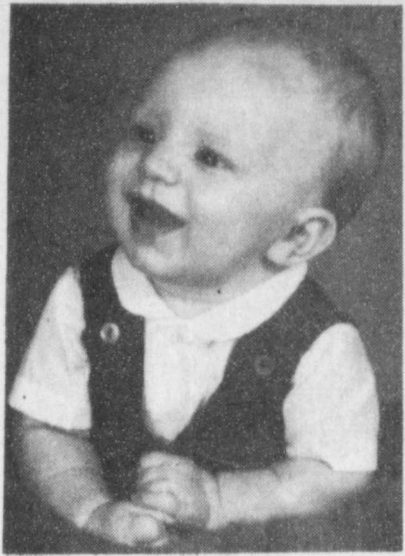

Armyworms Can Threaten Pastures, Lawns

As pastures, meadows and lawns green up farmers and homeowners should be on the lookout for the fall armyworm. Although we have not received any report of the worms in Lamar County, they have been found in many counties south of us and as close as Titus County. The coolest weather will lessen the likelihood of an armyworm outbreak. We would not expect a widespread outbreak, but rather spotty occurrences along fence lines, trees or around buildings. Adults of the worm are ash gray moths with mottled forewings. They lay batches of eggs on foliage which hatch in about five days. Individuals with newly planted wheat or winter pasture should inspect their fields often as an entire field can be wiped out over night. Insecticides should not be applied until worms are seen in the area. Effective insecticides include Dylox, Sevin and various products containing Bacillus Thuringiensis. Managing risk is one of the keys to farm financial survival, and Lamar County producers are invited to a short course on that topic October 1-3 at the Stiel's Farm Comoputer Training Center at Thrall. The farm is located on U.S. 79, about a mile east of Thrall or six miles east of Taylor. Purpose of the short course is to acquaint crop producers with numerous yield and price strategies. The price being paid cotton farmers for cottonseed at area gins is about half that paid a year ago. This is not good news for cotton producers, but it is music to the ears of area dairy and beef producers. Cottonseed at the prices being quoted currently are a good buy. Many livestock producers have called seeking nutrition level of the seed compared with cake and cubes. Cottonseed supplies about half as much digestible protein per pound as does 41 percent protein cottonseed meal, but has one-fourth more total digestible nutrients, because it is so rich in fat. For fattening cattle, cottonseed is an economical substitute for part or all of the cottonseed meal in a ration. Whole cottonseed have a crude protein value of 23 percent and a total digestible nutrient value of 90 percent. This compares to a 72 percent TDN value of cottonseed meal and cake. So, if you have a place to store the seed and a way to feed them, feeding cottonseed could be the way to go this winter.

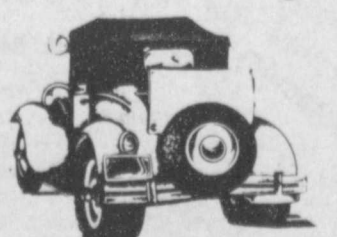

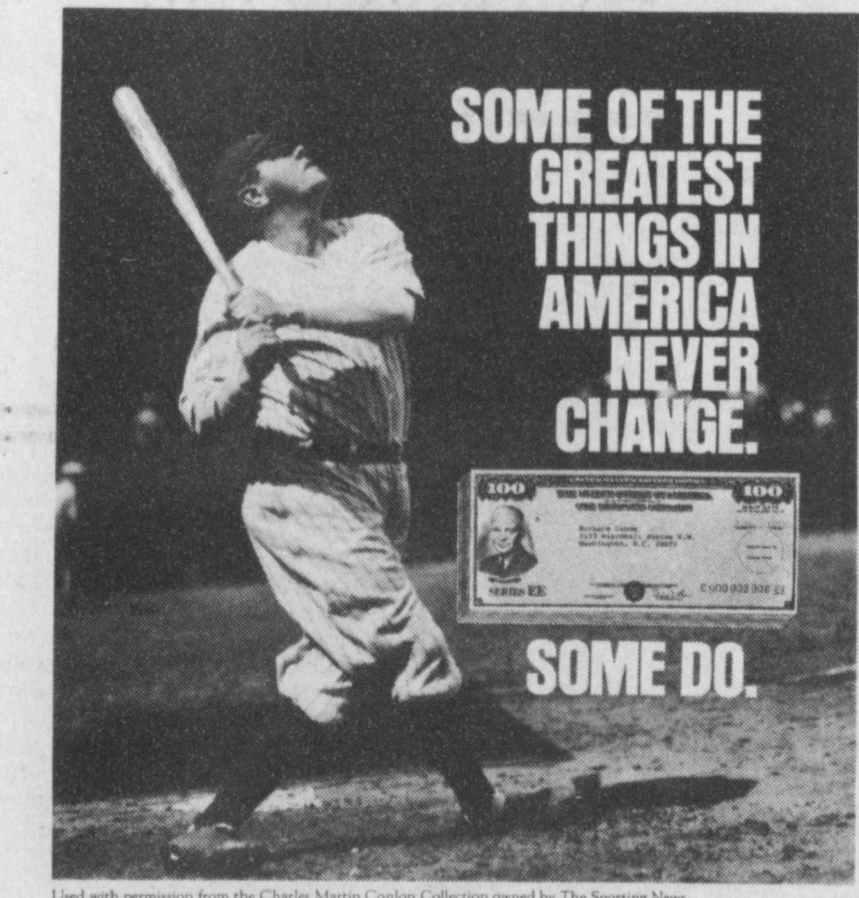
