The time has arrived for getting seed in the ground for winter pastures, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist. Small grain pastures should be planted immediately and clover-ryegrass pastures should be planted in the next two to three weeks. If sod-seeding is planned, Reeves grasses down to less than three inches before planting. When sowing clover the area lightly or drag the field so that the seed will get in contact with seed to be planted with the proper inoculent.
