





Following a wedding trip to Virginia, the couple will reside in Longview, Texas.



Hagansport-Eureka Springs Holds Reunion







Due to defensive efforts on the part of both Rebels and Dragons, the last


half was defensive battle, with only one touchdown being scored, on the Dragon side.

Great Pumpkin Cookies

2 cups flour cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked

teaspoon baking soda 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup butter or margarine, softened 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 cup granulated sugar

egg, slightly beaten l teaspoon vanilla extract 1 can (16 oz.) LIBBYS Solid

Pack Pumpkin 1 cup semi-sweet real chocolate morsels Assorted icing or peanut butter Assorted candies raisins or nuts

Combine flour, oats, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; set aside. Cream butter; gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla: mix well. Alternate additions of dry ingredients and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Stir in morsels. For each cookie, drop 1/4 cup dough onto lightly greased cookie sheet; spread into pumpkin shape using a thin

metal spatula. Add a bit more dough to form stem. Bake 20-25 minutes, until cookies are firm and lightly browned. Remove from cookie sheets; cool on racks. Decorate, using icing or peanut butter to affix assorted candies, raisins or nuts. Yields 19 to 20 cookies.

Variation: Substitute 1 cup raisins for morsels.


