

Rebs Take Ore City Head For Bi-District

The Rivercrest Rebels captured second place in District 19-AA football by defeating the Ore City REBELS 34-6. Rivercrest will meet Quitman Friday night in Mt. Vernon at 7:30 p.m. in the bi-district clash.

The Rebels made it look easy as they racked up points against Ore City. Bradley Woods returned the first Ore City punt for a touchdown giving Rivercrest its first points of the night. The point after failed for a 6-0 score with 9:57 remaining in the first period.

The two teams punted the ball back and forth for the rest of the first quarter with neither team getting an edge on the other.

Early in the second stanza, the running of Bradley Woods and Jerry Belcher advanced the ball to the Rebel 4. Belcher carried the ball in for the score and was called again to carry in for the two point conversion. Rivercrest was on top 14-0 with 10:53 left in the half.

The Rebels from Rivercrest were not ready to quit, however, as they added six more with 3:23 remaining in the half. Clint Stephenson dashed 51 yards for the score. Charley Martin's extra point kick was good for a Rivercrest halftime lead of 21-0.

The Rebel Band entertained the fans during the halftime break. The band presented their sweetheart and beau for the year. Barbie Cox and Jerry House were honored by the band. Both are seniors. The band also recognized their senior members.

Rivercrest came out of the locker room smoking as Clint Stephenson marched the opening kickoff all the way for a touchdown. A clipping penalty against the Rivercrest boys nullified the points and brought the ball back.

The Rebels fumbled the ball away to Ore City but the visiting Rebel team couldn't advance the ball against the tough Rivercrest defense.

Rivercrest took over on their own 33 and proceeded to march over the goal line yet again. Jerry Belcher ran the first three plays gaining twenty yards on his last carry. A face mask penalty against Ore City moved the ball even closer to score territory. Clint Stephenson carried for the other three plays necessary for the score. He took the handoff from the three yardline and plowed over with 5:09 remaining in the third period. The extra point kick was blocked for a Rivercrest lead of 27-0.

Rivercrest controlled the ball for most of the final quarter. Sammy Sparger, sophomore guard, intercepted an Ore City pass to give the Rebs their final opportunity to score. Sparger took the ball at the 26 and ran it down to the four yardline. Charley Martin gained two more and then Bubba Simpson took the handoff on

the right side and crossed the goal line for the six points. Charley Martin's kick was good for a Rivercrest lead 34-0 with 4:20 remaining in the game.

Ore City put their only points on the board with 2:46 left, as junior Frank Jones dashed 72 yards for the touchdown. Their try for two points failed.

Rivercrest held possession for the football for the rest of the contest following an interception by Geary Savage.

Rivercrest Head Coach Terry Giddens commented, "Overall, I think we did pretty well. Our best accomplishment is just being in the playoffs. Everyone did a pretty good job—they did what they were supposed to do. No one individual stood out. The whole team did their job."

Giddens continued, "Quitman has an impressive record. They are ranked sixth in the state and are undefeated in district play. They are

not any bigger than we are but are awfully quick. They are a well disciplined team, they do what they are supposed to. We were ranked low in the district and look where we are, so ratings don't make a lot of difference. We won't be a pushover Friday night."

Individual statistics for Friday's game were as follows: Jerry Belcher rushed for 70 yards and Clint Stephenson for 97. Bradley Woods ran for 24, Bubba Simpson for 12, Charley Mar-

tin for 15, and Geary Savage for four. The Rivercrest team rushed for 216 total yards.

Bradley Woods completed one pass to Tony Jasso for five yards. Woods also returned two punts for a total of 75 yards and Clint Stephenson returned one for 38 yards.

Rivercrest will travel to Mt. Vernon Friday to meet Quitman. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. Rebel fans will sit on the west side of the stadium as we will

be the visiting team. Advance tickets are currently on sale in the office at Rivercrest High School only. All tickets at the gate will be \$4.00. Advance tickets are \$2.00 for students and \$3.00 for adults.

The game will be broadcast on the radio on KDXE in Sulphur Springs. This will be a live broadcast on 96 FM. KMOA in Mineola will carry a taped delayed broadcast.

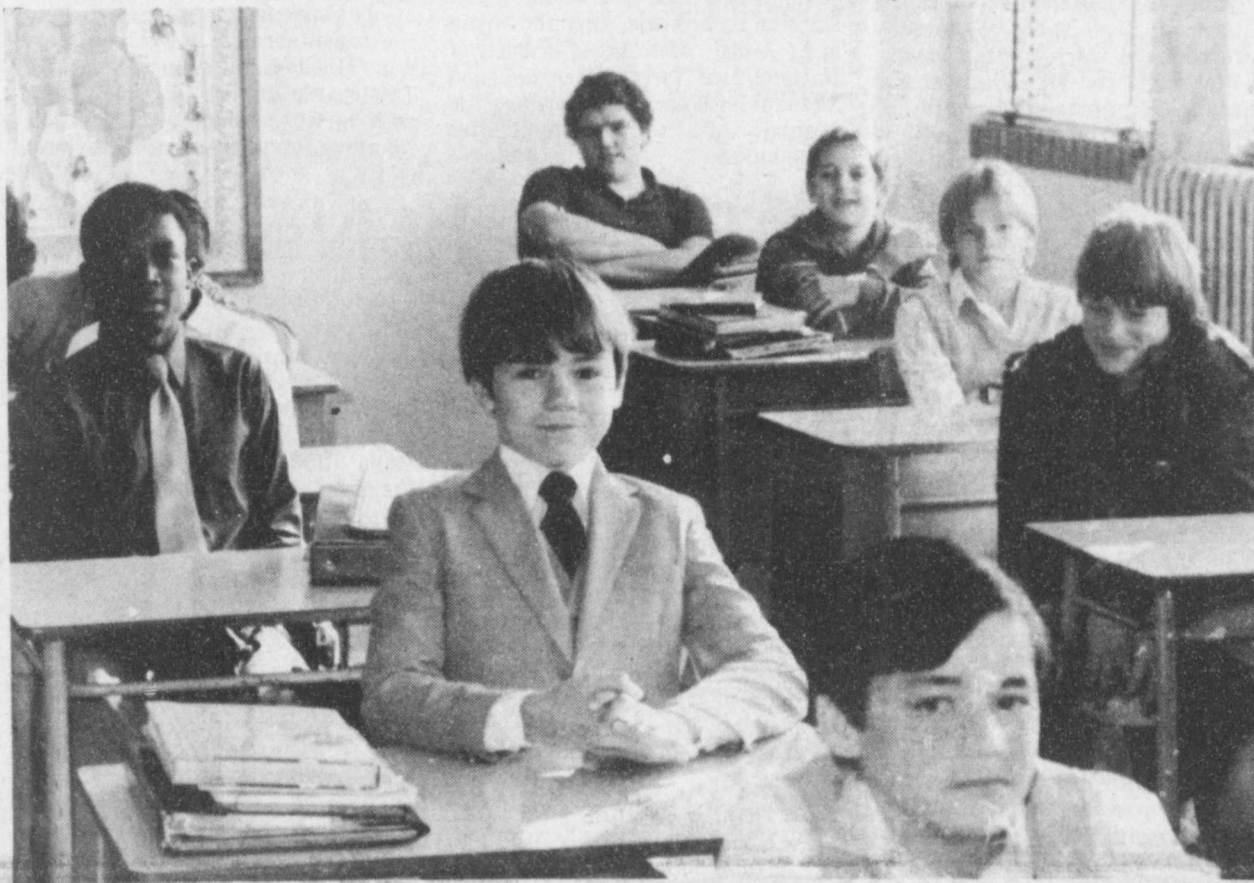

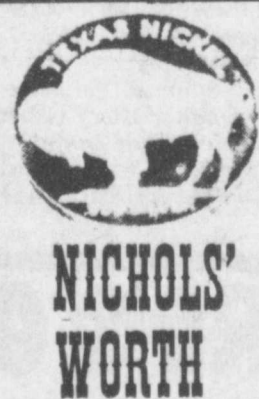
ALL DRESSED UP! Friday was dress up day at Talco School. Students enjoyed seeing who was most dressed up. (Staff Photo)

As birds, they cannot be sleeping in the mud like the turtles and frogs. Therefore, since they were fishing the last of summer's minnows out of the pool only a week ago, and now are gone, they must be migrating.

But they don't migrate in huge flocks. Their harsh, croaking cries don't fill the night as do the sad sounds of wandering geese or ducks.

They, like the incredible hummingbird which migrates over thousands of miles, and much open water, must go alone.

It's strange to think of them, and the other summer birds, which we take for granted, going to live in some warmer, kinder place for the winter.

The field larks, hawks and scissor-tails, thrashers and blackbirds all move along some mystic, marvelous path to and from places most of us have never seen.

Even the beautiful butterflies which grace our lands for a few weeks, are going to Mexico!

For many birds, this is the south. They winter here, away from the harsher, bitter winters of the north. Geese feed on wheat and water weeds, ducks too, enjoy the sanctuary of our winters.

And of course, there are so many birds that will flock to feeders during winter. The brilliant cardinal, goldfinches and the list is long.

Through it all, the lowly sparrow is to be seen, scrambling for food on frozen ground or in the mud, indomitable and persistent.

But sometimes now, sitting on the porch in the dark, I hear a flock of geese going over, secure in their V-shaped numbers, and wonder...where are those herons, cranes and coots? What lonely, unnoticed trek do they make, somewhere out there, in the dark? Like humans, birds are different in their souls...and the variety is endless.

Smoke Out A Great Day For Quitters

Smokers who want to give up the cigarette habit may find the task easier on Thursday, November 21. That's the date of the American Cancer Society's ninth annual Great American Smokeout--A day when the nation's 54 million smokers are encouraged to kick the habit for at least 24 hours, just to prove to themselves that quitting is possible.

Smokeout Day is celebrated throughout the country. The aim: to offer support and assistance to smokers trying to quit for the day. Although the Great American Smokeout may seem all festivities and celebration, it has a very serious purpose, since more than 340,000 Americans die each year of diseases linked to smoking, representing one out of every seven deaths in the United States.

Cigarette smoking is responsible for 83 percent of all the lung cancer deaths in the nation, and, in 1985, lung cancer will surpass breast cancer as the leading cancer killer of women. Cigarette smoking is a significant factor in other cancers as well.

Last year, a record number of smokers--an estimated 20.4 million, according to a Gallup survey--participated in the Great American Smokeout. Of the participants, 5.4 million smokers--about 10 percent--succeeded in quitting for the day. Approximately 3.1 million still were not smoking one to five days later.

So, you think that because you don't

smoke tobacco that the Smokeout isn't for you? Well, according to the American Cancer Society, it is for all tobacco users, and that includes you "smokeless" users who dip or chew. Like other tobacco products, smokeless tobacco is habit-forming and hazardous to your health.

Rivercrest Future Homemakers of America in sixth period Homemaking I are sponsoring the Great American Smokeout in Talco-Bogata Schools. The class will be putting up posters, handing out leaflets and badges, and securing pledges who will refrain from using tobacco for 24 hours. Non-smokers are urged to "Adopt-a-Smoker" or tobacco user whom they'd like to have quit for the day. Adopters can offer "survival kits", snacks and encouragement throughout the day.

Peering Into the Cell

A sophisticated, computer-assisted electron microscope is being used by Texas A&M medical researchers to study the behavior of calcium in living cells--an investigation which may shed light on the cause of cystic fibrosis. One theory suggests that the hereditary disease is related to the inability of certain glands to handle calcium. The researchers are using the electron microscope to plot the calcium behavior in normal test animals.
