



He is a director of the First National Bank of Deport.

In making his announcement as candidate for commissioner, Pirtle stated that he thinks he is the best qualified candidate to serve the people of Precinct 1. "I will use my educational background, business experience and experience as commissioner to continue the program I initiated of improving the roads and bridges. At the same time, I will represent the people of our precinct in county government.

"When I was appointed commissioner in September 1983, the road,s bridges and workign equipment were in extremely poor condition. There was approximately \$60,000 in precinct 1 funds, and a debt of over \$50,000 that had to be paid. After making the above improvements, I still had a balance of \$42,000 in the Road and Bridge No. 1 Fund and \$32,000 in the Main Road and Bridge Fund when I was fired on August 30, 1985.


