

Talco-Bogata Trustee Election Scheduled

A trustee election will be held in the Talco-Bogata Schools on Saturday, April 5, 1986, for the purpose of electing four school trustees. The terms of John Ward, H. Drue Pirtle, Eddy

Brown and Gene Smith are expiring. One trustee is to be elected from the Bogata area for a three-year term; one trustee is to be elected from the Bogata area for a two year term; one

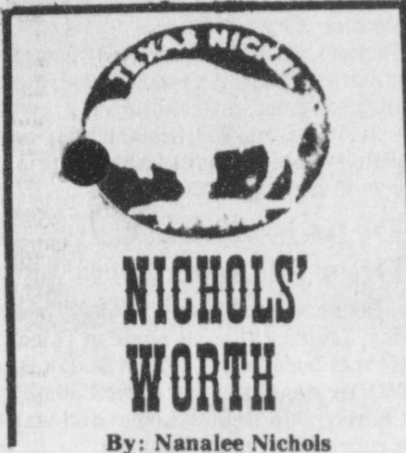
trustee is to be elected from the Talco area for a three-year term; and one trustee is to be elected for a one-year term and may be from the Bogata or Talco area according to the number

of votes received. All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election shall be in writing, signed by the candidate and filed at the

Superintendent's office at Rivercrest by March 5, 1986.

Election dates are: March 5, 1986, Deadline by which candidate must file application for a place on the

ballot. March 17, 1986, Absentee voting by personal appearance begins. April 1, 1986, Last day to vote absentee by personal appearance. April 5, 1986, School Board Election.



Challenger is gone. Exploded high above earth, in an environment most of us will never know.

The words slip from the tongue easily...tragic, heartbreaking, awful, horrible.

But as a veteran space program watcher, growing up with the advent of satellites, space shots, moon walks and the tension that goes with it, there are other words I feel compelled to use...worthy, honorable, in pursuit of a purpose. Those words, while a cold comfort to the family and friends of the dead, still make their loss notable.

As usual, tragedy takes its toll when we least suspect it. After years of sitting with clenched fists while huge rockets hurled space bound people aloft in their fragile craft, it was a greater shock to hear of the astronauts who burned in their capsule during training.

And today, when the space shuttle launches had become almost routine, when "ordinary" people such as the teacher, aboard Challenger, were part of the space program, it was an even greater shock for a nation to sit before their televisions in horrified silence and look at the graceful, swift shuttle explode into debris and death.

To die, as so many have before them, in the pursuit of knowledge, of a better world, is perhaps the most honorable of deaths.

They are a symbol to this nation...or should be. For although the reason for the accident may be revealed to be pathetically trivial, or may remain unknown forever, the loss of life through exploring the unknown is a reason honorable enough for anyone.

There will be people who say such loss is unnecessary. Indeed, there are those who see no reason for a space program at all. But, aside from the wonders of modern technology which have found their way into our daily lives as a result of the program, there is another reason for it.

The spirit of quest, that driving desire to see and know more of lands, of worlds, of galaxies, that spirit is one of the reasons man is more than beast. The spirit of discovery, the pursuit of knowledge...to die for that is not to die at all...

Stolen Goods Recovered After Talco Burglaries

Nearly back to back raids of the same residence in a remote area of northern Franklin County Tuesday, Jan. 21, and again Saturday, Jan. 25, yielded a majority of merchandise and tools taken in three burglaries, according to John Moss Titus County Sheriff. Titus County deputies, accompanied by Franklin County Deputy Ron Hardman, acted on information gathered by the Titus County Sheriff's office in their continuing investigation of several burglaries in the Talco area when they went to the rural home Tuesday.

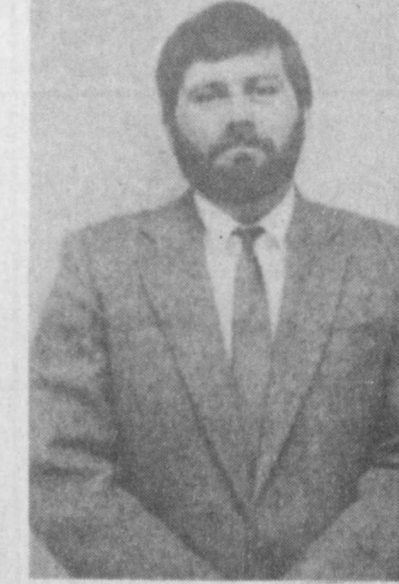
Deputies recovered a variety of items identified as being taken from the Via Well Service office and Wards' Cash and Carry Grocery in Talco on the evening of December 21, 1985. Items recovered included watches, over the counter drugs, sun shades, 21 one-pound cans of coffee, and 78 cartons of cigarettes. Only two bulk rolls of bologna were recovered amid the long list of perishable items stolen, according to Moss.

Further investigation, following the concerted search of the residence, brought officers back to the home Saturday, Jan. 25. At that time a large number of tools were recovered. The recovered tools are believed to be part of an estimated \$1,733.95 in tools taken from LTV Energy / Hardware also located in Talco in a burglary on June 15, 1985.

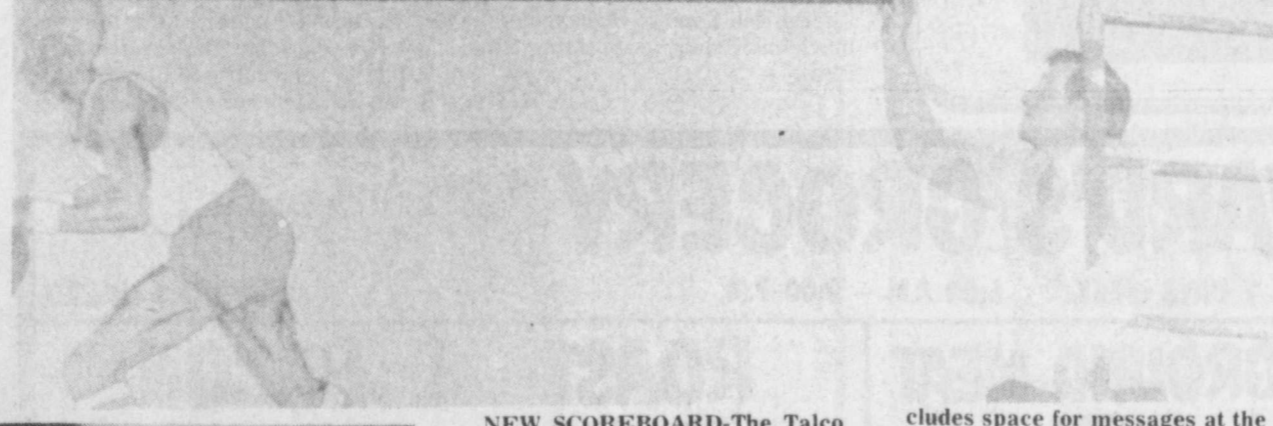
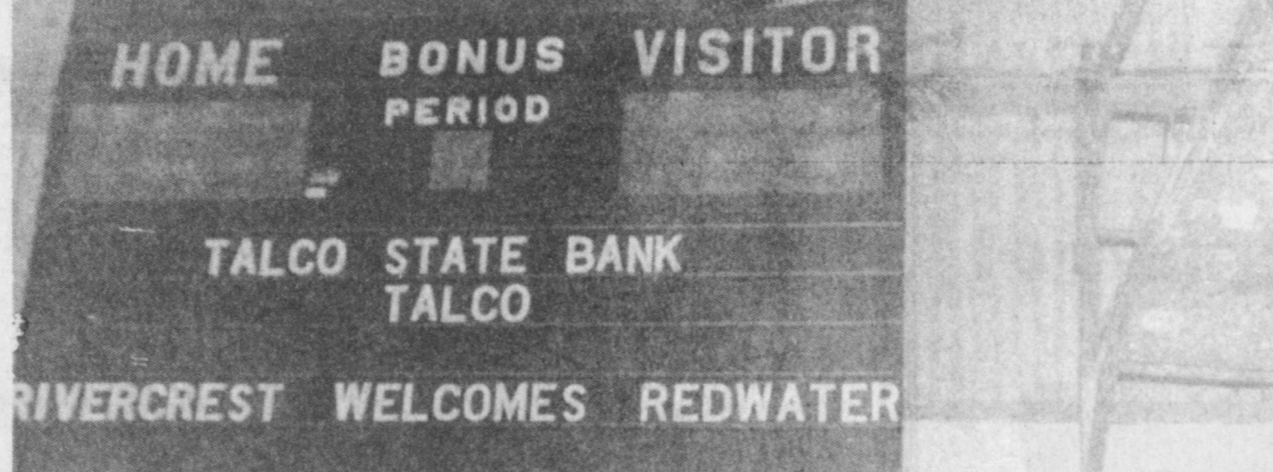
Rusty Jones Promoted To Executive VP

Sam G. Whitten Dies At Age 62

Flags were flown at half-mast at the University of Texas in Austin in observance of the death of Sam G. Whitten, Associate Professor in the Graduate School of Library and Information Science, who died Monday, January 20.

Born in Bogata in 1924, he had a many-faceted career as librarian, educator, leader in professional library associations, bibliophile and advocate of civil rights and intellectual freedom.

After receiving the master of Library Science degree in 1962, at the University of Texas, he was librarian at the San Antonio Public Library, University of Texas, Dallas Public Library and Southern Methodist University. In 1967 he joined the University faculty. He served the Texas Library Association in many capacities, notably as its president in 1968-69, as a member of its Legislative and Planning Committee, and as a member of the Political Action Committee Executive Board. In 1973, the association named him Texas Librarian of the Year.

He also held numerous offices in the American Library Association, including Councilor at Large and member of the Intellectual Freedom Round Table Executive Board. He was one of the chief authors of the Texas Library Systems Act of 1969, and served on the State Advisory Board to the Texas State Library in its administration of the Federal Library Services and Construction Act. He was a former member of the Board of Trustees of the Austin Public Library and the Advisory Board of the Central Texas Library System.

He was a noted collector of Texas books and speaker on book collecting and Texas history and literature.

The esteem in which his students held him as sponsor of their student association since the time of its inception. He was a wise counselor and had strong personal interest in their welfare, both as students and as practitioners.

He is survived by his wife, Virginia; his children, Lynn, Jeff, Jill and Holly; a sister, Cleone Sullivan of Port Arthur; and brothers, William R. Whitten of Port Aransas and Clovis Whitten of Conway, AR; nieces, Glenda Corbell and Carol Ward, both of Bogata.

Memorial services were held Friday, January 24 at 3 p.m. at the University Methodist Church.

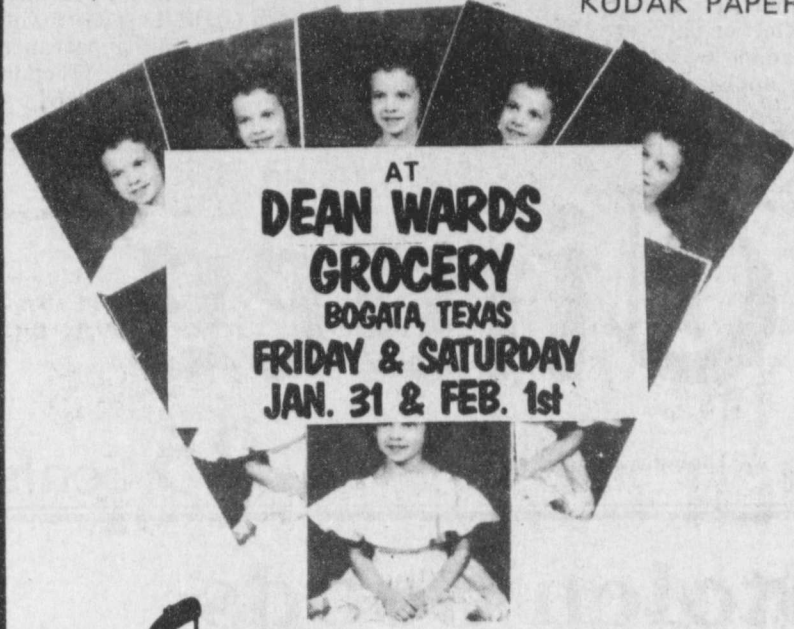

Bogata Baptist Women Meet

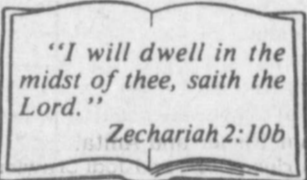

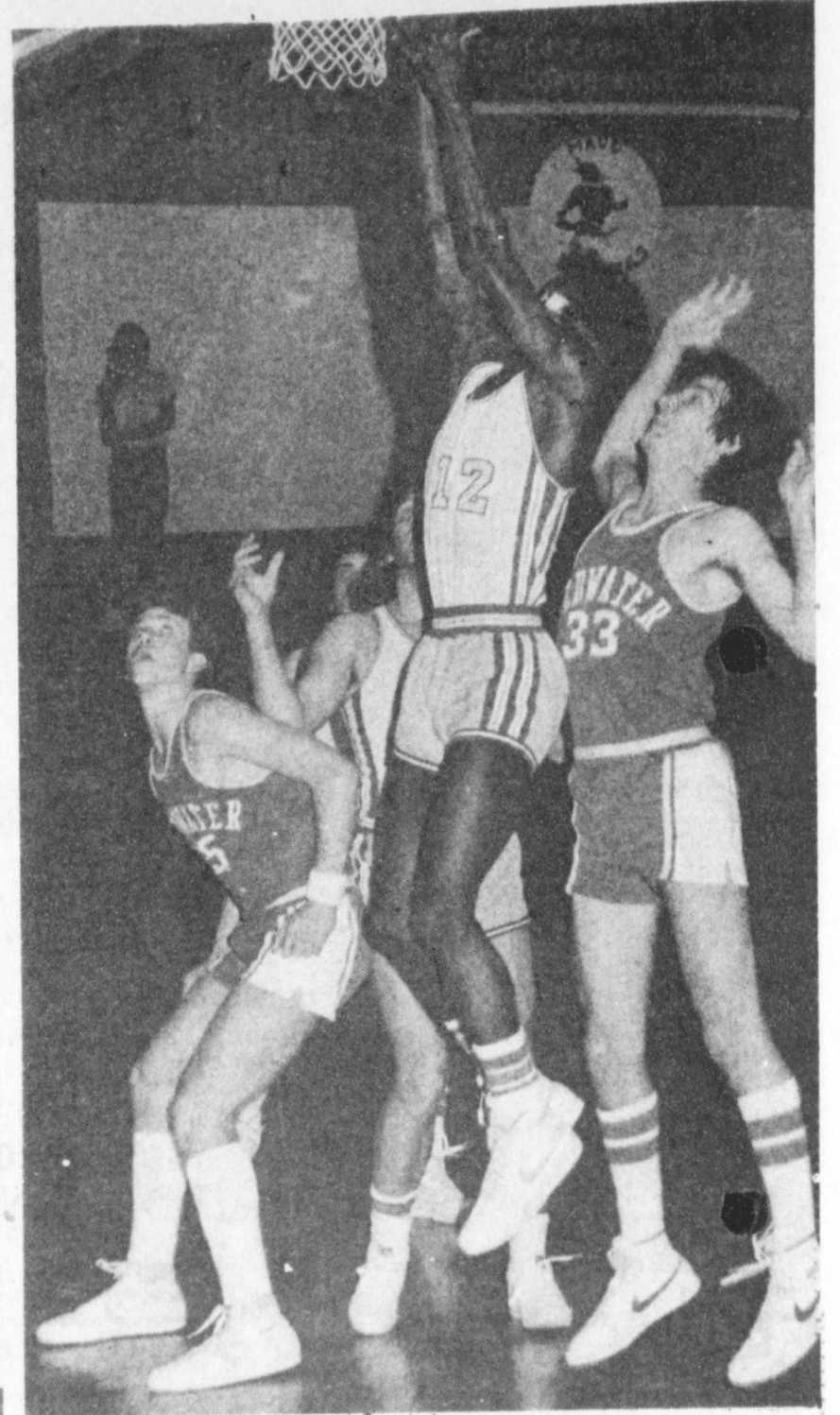

Harvest Bounty Casserole

- 3 cups cut-up fresh green beans, cooked and drained
- 2 medium green peppers, chopped
- 6 medium tomatoes, chopped
- 3 cups shredded Cheddar cheese (about 12 oz.)
- 1 cup Bisquick baking mix
- 1 cup milk
- 6 eggs
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 to 1 tsp. cayenne pepper

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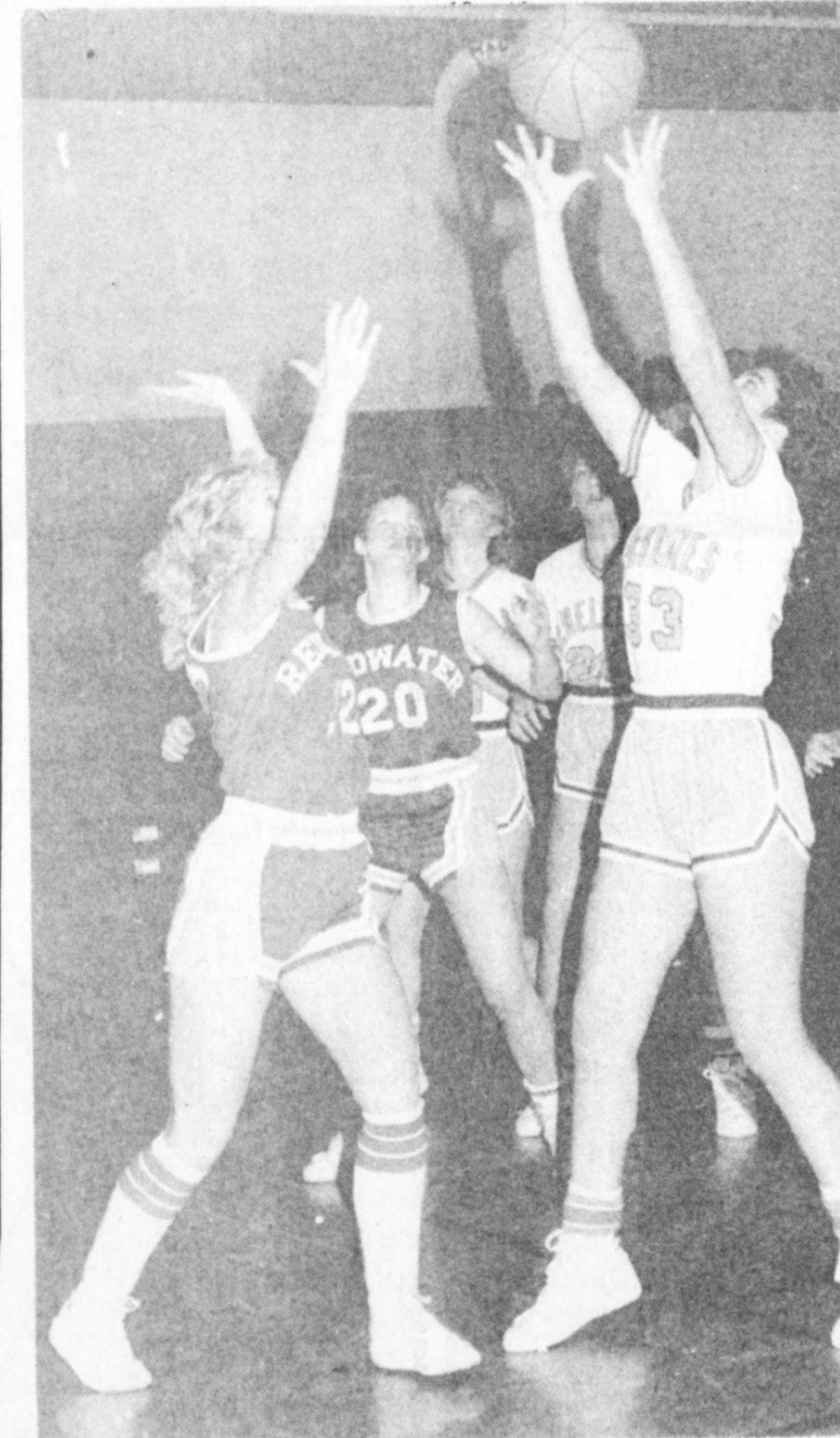

EMT Program Scheduled

A basic emergency medical technical program will begin at Paris Junior College on Monday, February 24, according to Chris Tobin, coordinator for PJC's Emergency Medical Services Program.

Classes will be taught from 6 to 9 p.m. Mondays and Thursdays through June 14 in the Applied Sciences Annex III on the PJC campus.

The course will include basic-level training in emergency medical services. Successful completion will make the student eligible for Texas Department of Health certification as EMT-Basic.

Course coordinators will be Gene Gandy, paramedic in Honey Grove, and C.J. McMellon, paramedic with the City of Paris EMS. All three coordinators are certified as advanced EMS training coordinators by the Texas Department of Health. Assisting instructional staff will be members of the City of Paris EMS-Paramedic Service.

The course is designed for anyone pursuing a career in emergency care or ambulance work and for allied health professionals, day care workers, nursing home personnel, firemen, policemen, and industrial safety team members.

Tuition for the course will be \$175 plus textbook and lab fees. Registration will begin January 20 in the Alford Center at PJC. More information may be obtained by calling 784-9447.

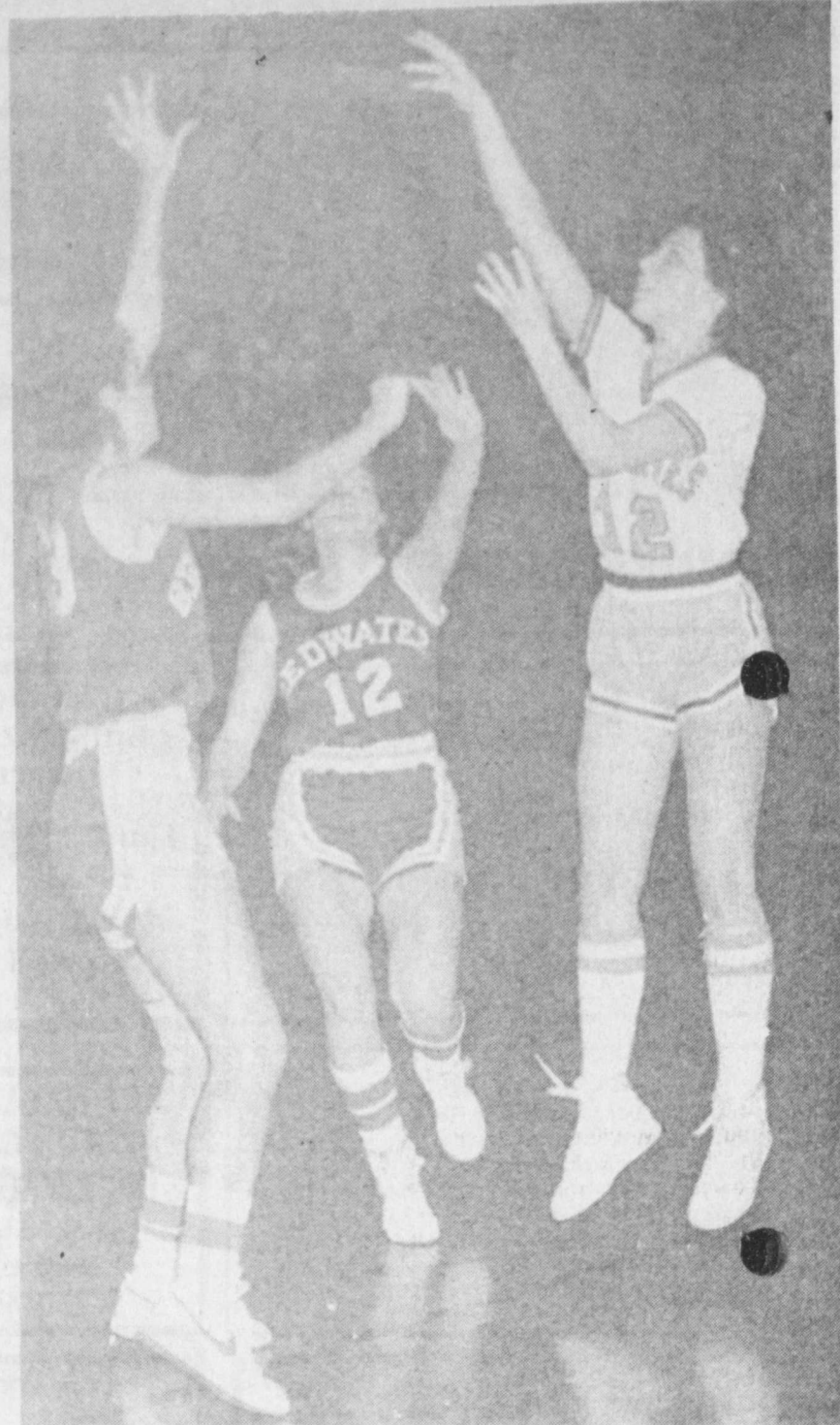

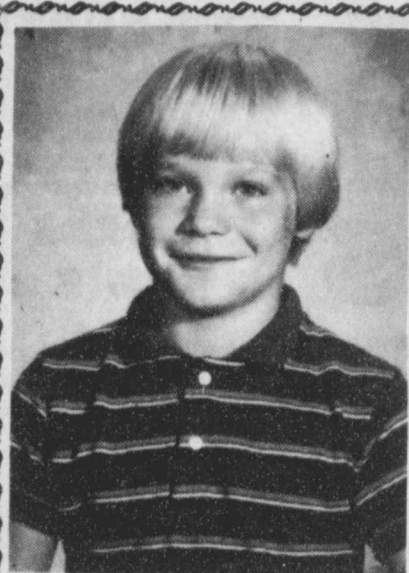

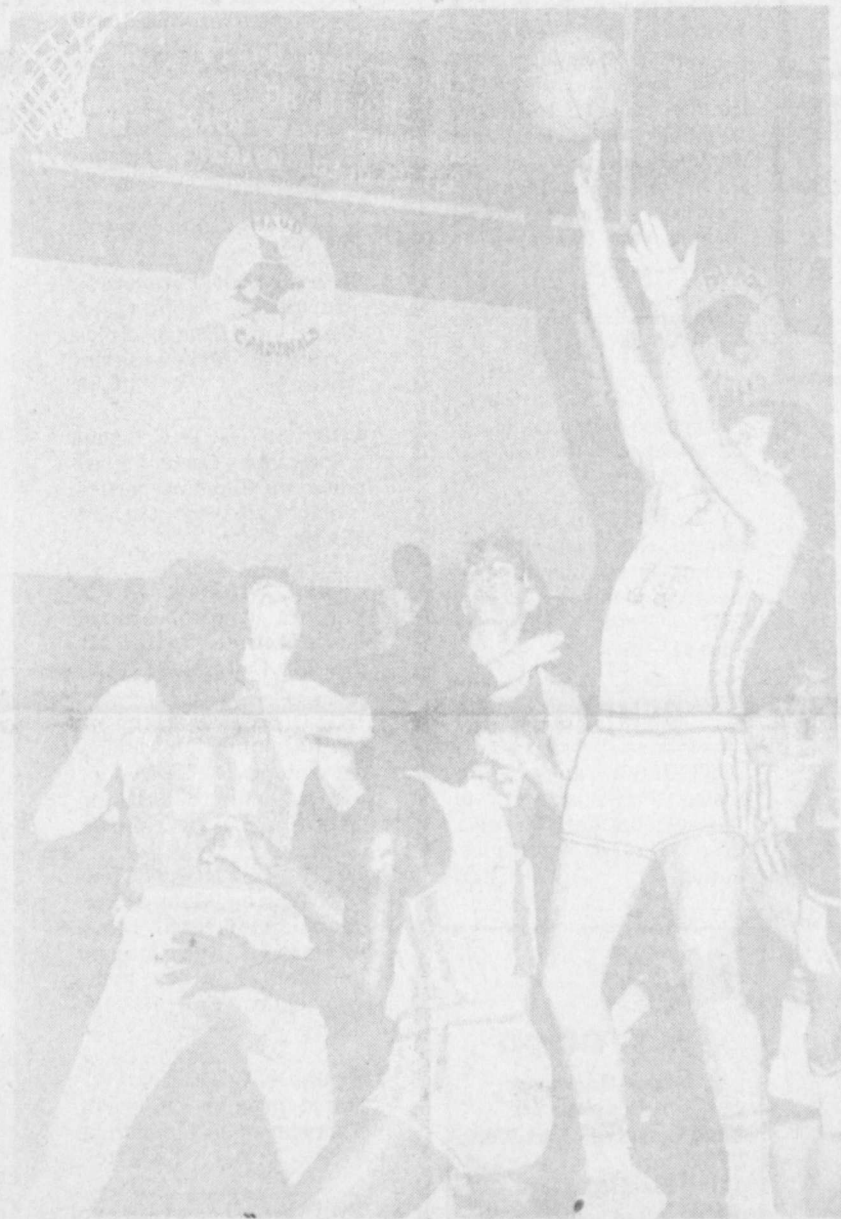
