Local Sales Tax Down Slightly

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$131.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Houston's check for \$21.3 million was the largest, up 12 percent from

last year's payment of \$19 million. Dallas received \$14.7 million, up eight percent from the \$13.5 million sent last year.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,647.25, an 18.59% increase from the payment in 1985.

Deport received a check for \$1,096.08 for a 7.56% decrease from last year's payment of \$1,434.78.

Paris received \$277,480.65 for a 4.20% increase over last year's payment.

Bogata received \$3,806.45 for a

12.51% increase over the \$3,493.59 payment of last year.

Clarksville received \$27,978.02 for a 3.86% decrease over 1985.

Detroit received \$1,234.85 for this period, marking a 21.04% increase over last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$151,808.99 for a 19.00% increase over the previous year.

Talco received \$2,711.33 for a 5.97% increase over the 1985 payment of \$2,848.97.

Family Night Set For Schools

Talco and Bogata eighth graders are scheduled to start pre-registering for their high school subjects beginning Friday, February 28 at 2:30 p.m., when both eighth grade groups and their sponsors will meet with Mrs. Huddleston, counselor, and Mr. Herve, high school principal, at Rivercrest auditorium to discuss their high school careers. An information package will be given to each student to take home for parent discussion and advice.

A Family Night for parents of all prospective high school students is set for Monday, March 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the Rivercrest Cafeteria. All eighth graders and their parents, as well as ninth and tenth graders and their parents, are urged to attend. Because of the extreme importance of high school subject choices, these are the grade levels that are most affected at

this time. Recent legislation has changed many of the previous methods of pre-registering, in that what is chosen at the beginning of a student's high school career, or ninth grade level, will affect the type of academic seal that will be placed on his or her transcript at high school graduation. Two types of seals will be available. One is a regular Academic Seal showing the completion of required subjects; the other seal will be an Advanced Academic Seal showing the more advanced subjects being completed. A student, with parent approval, must choose either the general academic or advanced academic route at the freshman level in order to get in all the required subjects. These requirements and other matters will be discussed at the Family Night meeting March 3 in the Rivercrest Cafeteria.

Talco Warning System Developed

The Talco Volunteer Fire Department would like to announce the storm and disaster warning systems which have been set up. The system will serve Talco and the surrounding area. For Talco, the system will include signals for both tornadoes, tornado warnings and disasters. Disasters include both natural and man-made.

The man-made disasters are things such as gas trucks and other things spilling or blowing out in town. The signal for a tornado which is sighted or on the ground, or for a disaster in which notice should be taken will be ten blows on the siren at 30-second intervals. The siren is located at City Hall downtown.

For a tornado warning, not a tor-

nado watch, the signal will be three long blows on the siren. A tornado watch means that conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A warning means that a tornado has been sighted in the surrounding areas.

For the community, the fire department will be watching the storm from various places around Talco. In the event that a tornado is sighted, the fire trucks will follow the clouds. If a tornado is sighted, the fire truck will set the sirens on the trucks off and will announce over a loud speaker if you need to take shelter.

If you notice that the clouds are bad and the area is under a tornado warning, listen for sirens and any announcements, take heed of them, for your own personal safety.

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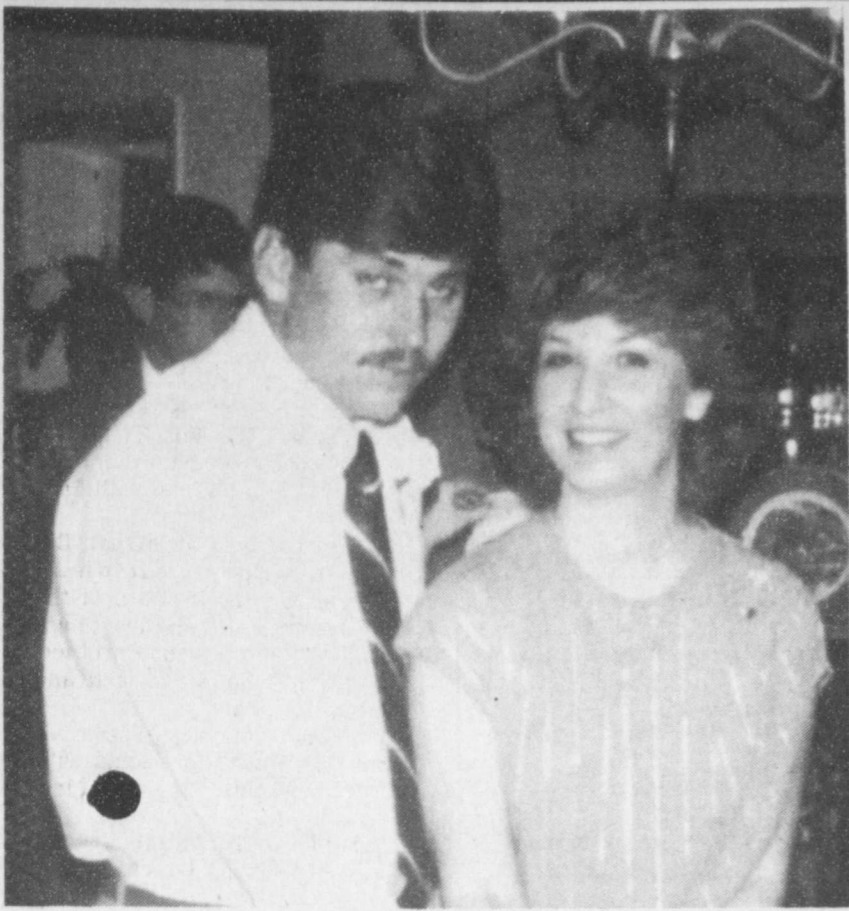

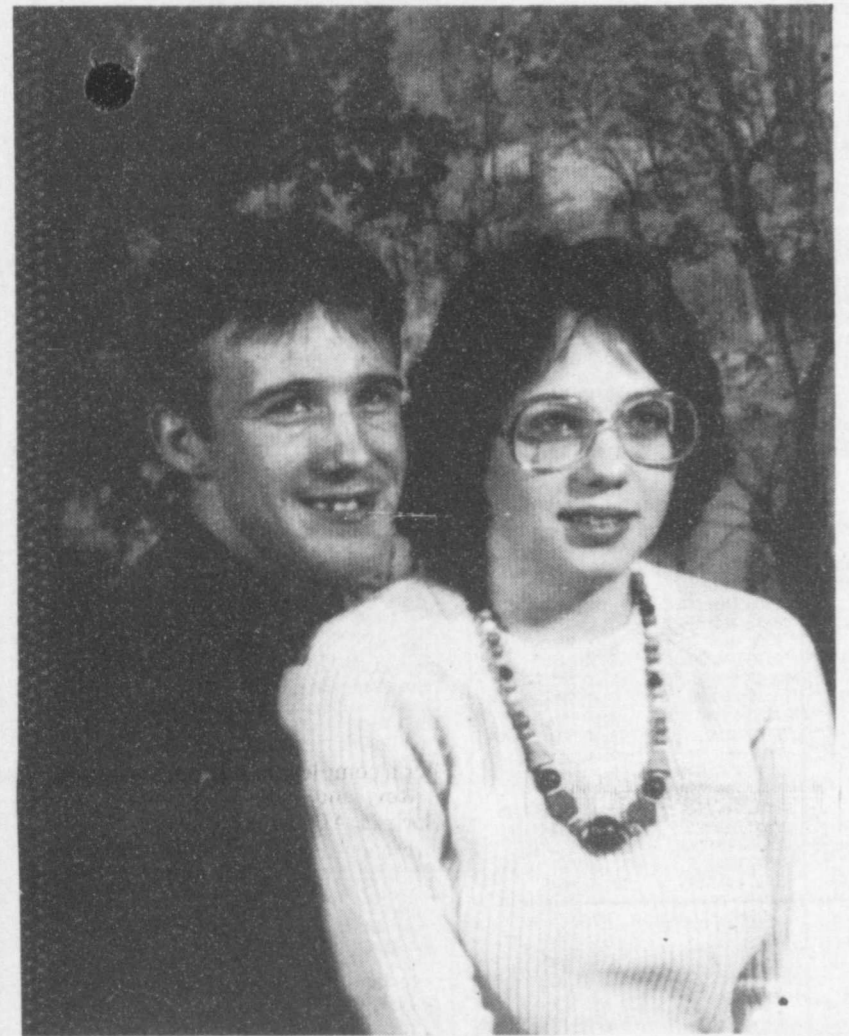

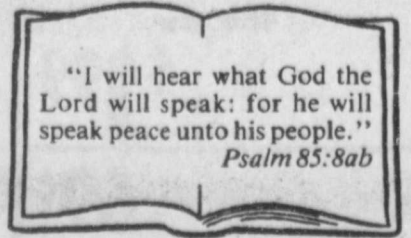

Time To Order Fish

It's that time of year again. Local landowners can stock their ponds with hatchery produced fish. The delivery will be arranged by the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. The next delivery is planned for the middle of April.

The fishpond stocking program is sponsored by the Red River County C&WCD as a service to local landowners. The federal and state agencies no longer stock private waters, therefore, the small fish must be purchased from private hatcheries.

Orders may be placed with the Soil Conservation Service office in Clarksville. Prices of the fish are: Channel Catfish, 4-6 inches, 30 cents each; Channel Catfish, 6-8 inches, 60 cents each; bass 1-1 1/2 inches, 40 cents each; Hybrid Bream, 2-3 inches, 30 cents each and Fathead Minnows are \$6.00 per pound.

All of the fish are hatchery produced and purchased from a licensed operator.

Orders must be prepaid to the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District.

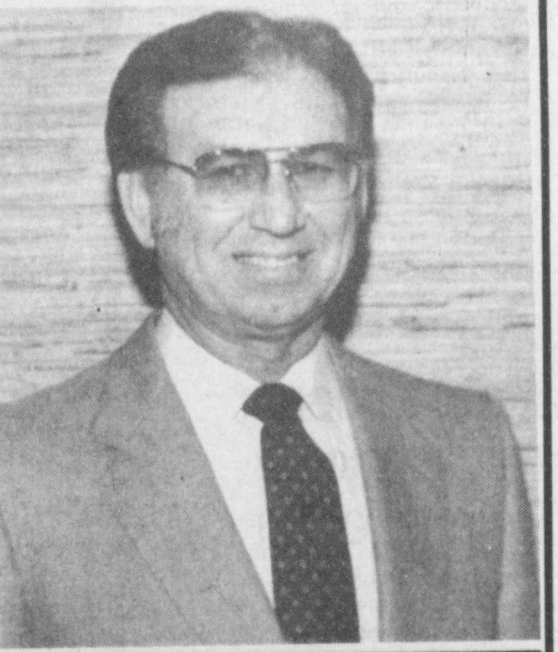

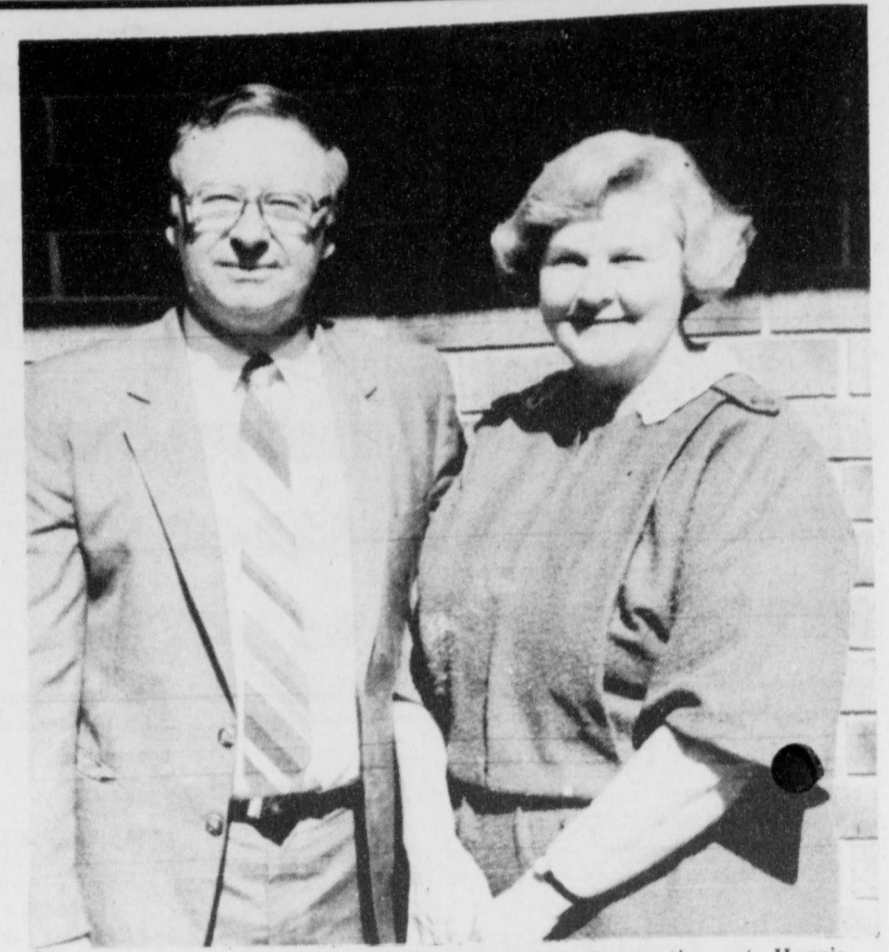

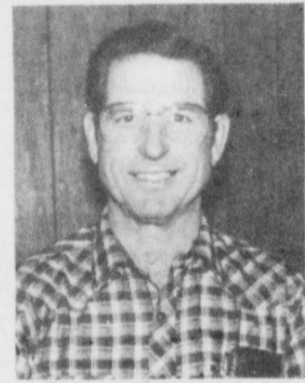
