

Talco-Bogata Board Adopts Policies

The Talco-Bogata School Board held its regular meeting March 18 at Rivercrest. The board approved the minutes of the last meeting.

The following actions were taken by the board:

A school use policy was accepted as recommended with the exception of

political use. Political use would have to be in the form of a forum with other candidates present to discuss the issues.

They adopted the textbooks for the coming year.

They accepted the media contract with Region VIII Educational Service Center. They supply the school with

the film material used in the classroom.

The purchase of a school bus was approved.

The board announced the East Texas State University School Board Workshop April 22 in Commerce.

The board accepted the resignations of Nadine Caldwell and Danny

Buchanan to be effective at the end of the current school year. Mrs. Harold Cowley was employed as the new librarian for next year.

They adopted the 1986-87 school calendar.

Personnel contracts were renewed with the exception of three due to a reduction in force.

State funding to the school system dropped and will directly affect our school system.

The board paid the bills, approved budget changes, discussed the Chapter I program, requested more information on the roof problems on the Talco campus, approved the cafeteria bills and report and tax of-

fice report and adjustments and cast their ballots for the Region VIII Board of Directors.

Transfer students into the school district will be discussed more at the next meeting.

The board didn't have enough information to grant the request of an ex-student for a diploma.

Talco Feeling Oil "Crunch"

Troubles have hit the "oil patch" and Talco, like other oil towns, is beginning to suffer from the oil slump. With oil prices going down past \$15.00 a barrel, most companies are tightening their proverbial belts and everyone in this small northeast Texas community will be affected one way or the other.

Things started on a downhill slide when Dorchester Refinery in Mt. Pleasant shut down, leaving several Talco men jobless. Lone Star Steel lay-offs affected some and now it seems as if times will get worse before they get better.

Elmer Patton, Field Superintendent for Mobil Oil said no lay-offs are planned for the immediate future. There will be cut backs on some activities such as the drilling program and capital work contracts curtailed. A few marginal wells will also be shut down.

A spokesman for Exxon from the Houston office said that Exxon had not cut the work force in Talco but declined to speculate about future

plans. He did say that the company had re-examined their spending plans and are considering shutting down one to two percent of their wells not economical to produce.

Tennico Company spokesman, Pete Brown, said his company had shut down 16 wells and in the future a well having to have a major work over will be shut down. No new wells will be drilled in 1986 and no contract work will be done that they can do without.

Ted Ewing, Field Superintendent for J-O-B Operating Company said the company had 70 wells in the Trix-Liz north field and they had shut down 50 wells that were below lift cost. They plan to keep enough wells pumping to hold each lease until the price of oil comes back up. Ewing said they had to let two contract pumpers go.

American Petrofina spokesman said there had been no lay-offs and non expected at the present time. They are to curb their contract work when possible.

The independent oil companies are mostly playing the waiting game and

trying to cut expenses.

One thing all companies have in common is cutting expenses by shutting down marginal wells and curbing contract work.

Oilfield contractors provide services anywhere from building roads to well servicing. Many of these contractors have equipment and men idle. In order to cut expenses they have to make cuts. Some no longer guarantee 40 hour work weeks. In other words, no work, no pay. A Talco well service spokesman said they didn't know what their companies plans were, that they were just waiting.

Via Well Service who has just purchased the Talco assets of CRC (Crutcher Resources Corporation and Vick Well Service) are on hold for the present. It is a wait and see situation and right now that's what the well services and most other oil field contractors are doing. Right now the oil patch needs to find a cabbage patch for they are indeed in trouble.

Among the 25 species in the menagerie are a giraffe, hippopotamus and rhinoceros. History books come to life as Carson & Barnes uses some of its huge elephant herd for the morning chore of erecting the shining new polyvinyl tent, which stretches more than a city block long. Area residents are invited to come to the showgrounds on circus morning to witness this age old spectacle and to see unloading, feeding and watering of the many animals. THIS is a show in itself, free

to everyone, and it may soon disappear from the American scene. Carson & Barnes is the only big tented circus still making traditional one day stands. Tickets will be on sale at the circus grounds on Showday.



Insects Should Be Bad This Year

By Herb Brevard
Regardless of whether the winter weather is extremely cold or warm, insects will be present in the spring, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist. Generally, everything is occurring about two weeks early this year.

Robinson says the infestation of the Eastern tent caterpillar is the heaviest he has seen in the last six years. With one generation per year, the Eastern tent caterpillar will soon pupate and be gone. The infestation will mostly be a nuisance. The caterpillars are stripping some trees, but the leaves will grow back when the infestation ends. In orchards, spot treatment with sevin or diazinon may be useful to help avoid some loss of yields. It is best to delay the spraying until blooming is completed.

The spring canker worm is appearing in large numbers on fruit trees and berries. Normally, the canker worm affects primarily ornamentals, but during heavy infestations, feeds on blueberry clusters and peach blooms. The canker worm is brown and fat and looks like an inch worm. When disturbed on the tree or bush, the worm drops down on a silk thread.

To protect honey bees from insecticides, spray late in the afternoon or on cloudy, cool days when there is less bee activity. Select insecticides that have low toxicity to bees.

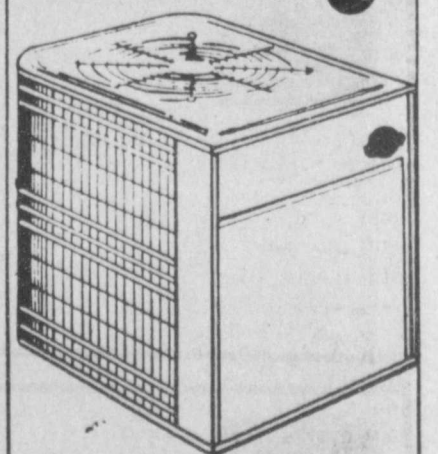
