

# Sales Taxes Reflect Economic Slow Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$54.5 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Houston received the largest check \$8.5 million, bringing 1986 payments

to 73.4 million, down four percent from last year. Dallas' payment of \$6.8 million, down five percent from 1985, brought the yearly total for the city to \$53 million.

Locally, Blossom received \$620.71 for a 1986 total of \$7,160.42 for a 2.23

percent increase over the 1985 payments to date.

Deport did not receive a payment this period and marked an 0.52 percent decrease over the 1985 payments to date of \$4,956.41.

Paris received \$121,196.69 for a 1.17


percent increase over the payment for the same period last year.

Bogata received \$3,885.66 for this period as compared to \$1,237.09 last year for a 36.56 percent increase over 1985 while Clarksville received \$11,988.50 for this period for a 9.36 percent increase over last year.

Detroit did not receive a payment for this period, as compared to no payment for the same period last year.

a 7.41 percent increase over the 1985 payments while Talco received

\$617.83 as compared to \$1,773.39 for the 1985 payment, marking a 5.36 percent decrease over payments to date of \$10,648.03, comparing to \$11,250.63 for 1985.

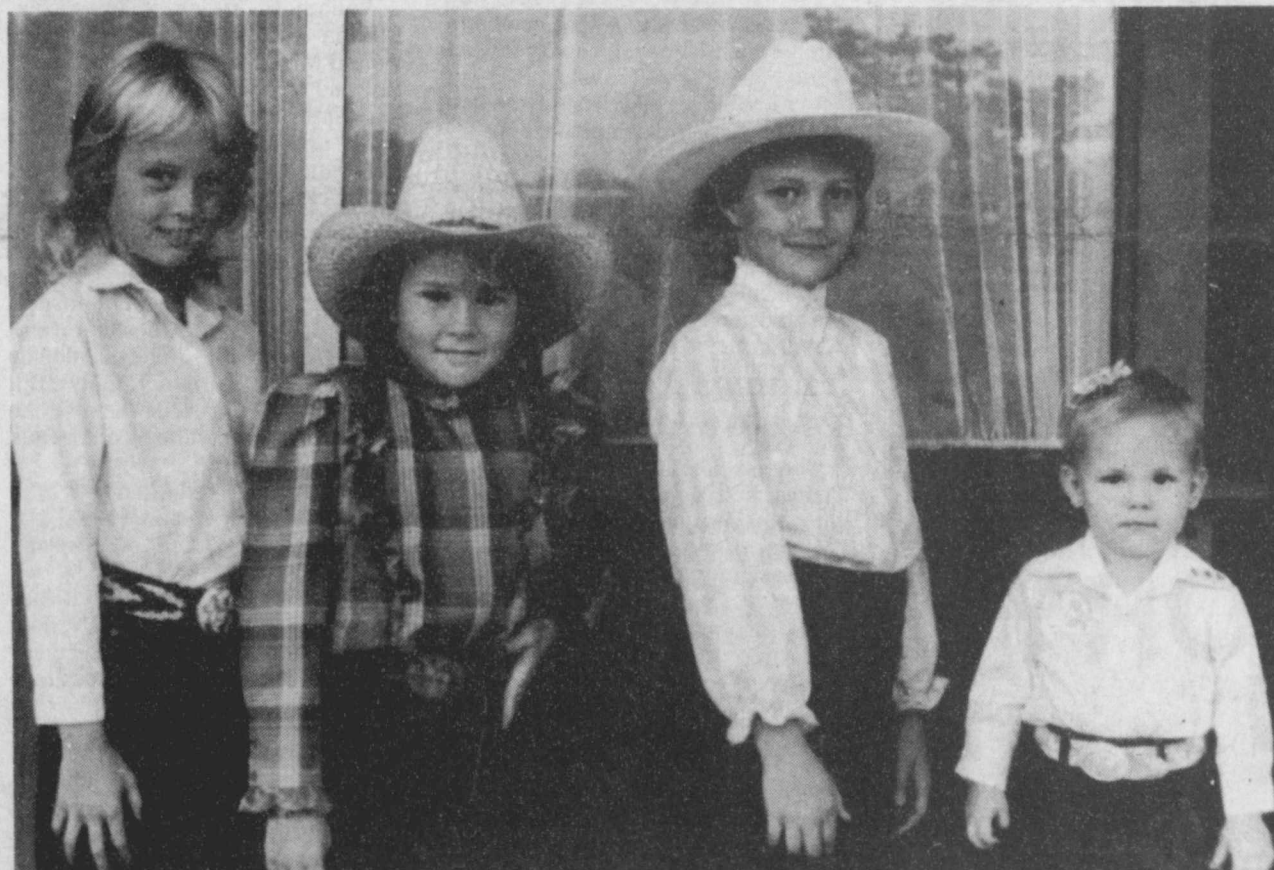

## Talco VFD Takes Over Medic 2

The Titus County Memorial Hospital Board of Managers approved Monday night to transfer ownership of the hospital's Ambulance Medic 2 to the Talco Volunteer Fire Department First Responders. The hospital has been planning to remount the Medic 2 ambulance as a part of the routine replacement procedure. The cost of the remounting would be approximately \$7500 less than the purchasing of a new ambulance. In a presentation to the Board, Jim Carroll, EMT/SS, Talco First Responders, requested an appropriation of \$8000 from TCMH to use in purchasing a replacement vehicle for the Talco First Responders. The Board chose to purchase TCMH a new am-

bulance and transfer ownership of Medic 2 as soon as the new ambulance is operable. This would make all four of the hospital's ambulances comparable in size and capacity.

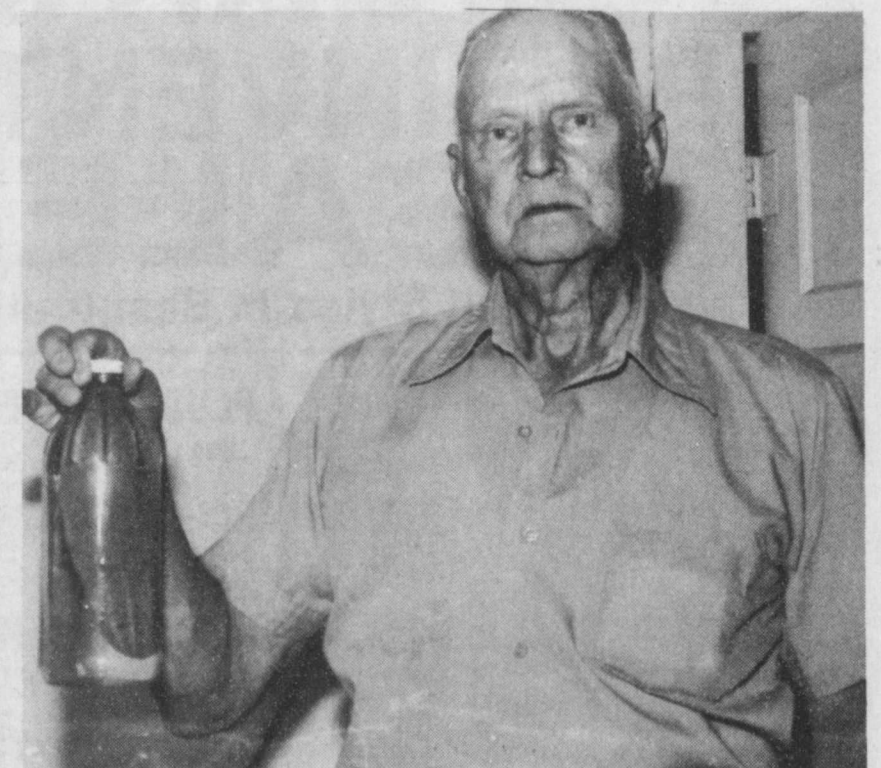
The Talco Volunteer Fire Department First Responders now primarily service any area in North Titus County north of the Ripley Creek. As a matter of procedure, the Talco First Responders do not transport patients, but it is their primary function to stabilize and sustain life until an EMS ambulance arrives. In the last 12 months, the Talco First Responders provided assistance to 83 patients. In the last 30 days, they responded to 26 calls for assistance. The average response time was 2.5 minutes.



RODEO PRINCESS Contestants for 1986 are Kenda Guess, Dee

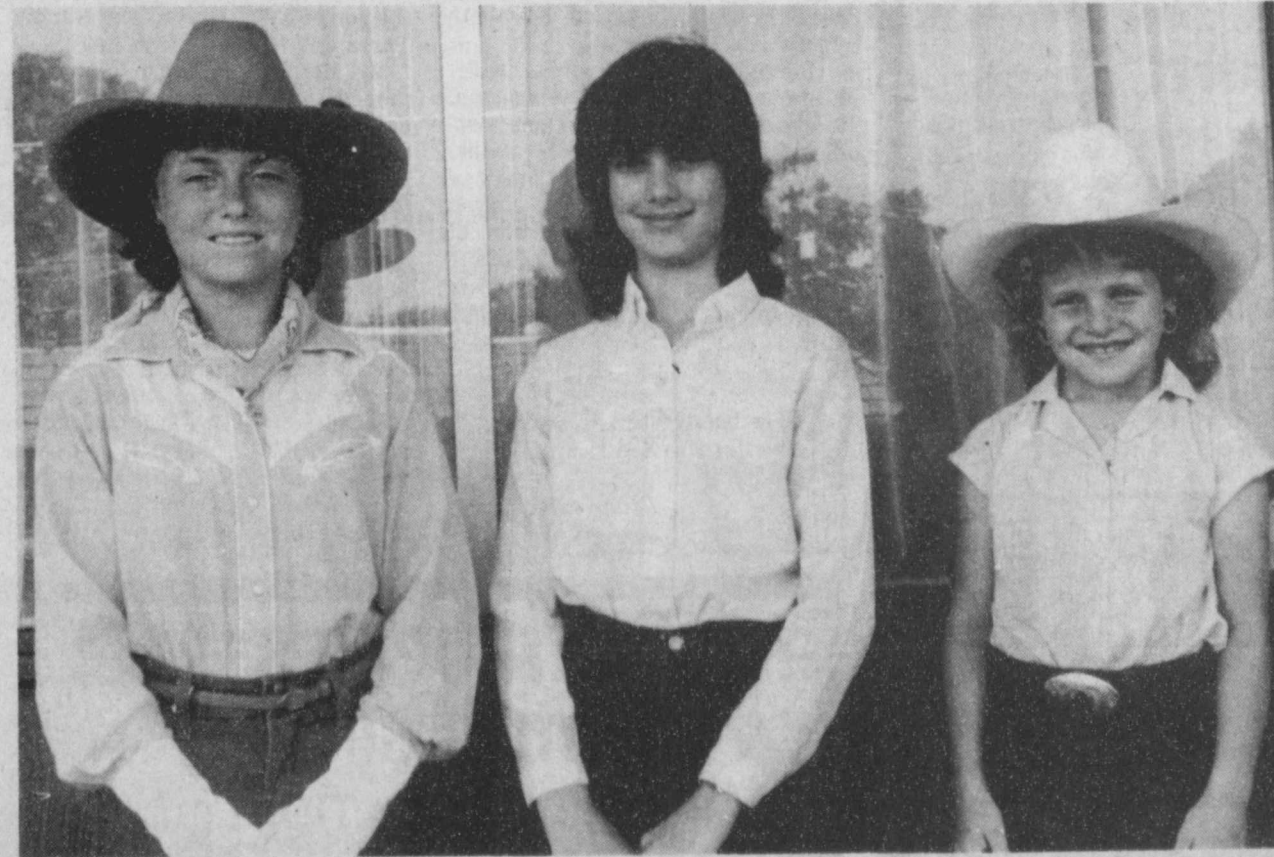

## Talco-Bogata School Board Meets

In a regular meeting Tuesday, June 10, the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. school board approved the minutes of the last meeting, the paying of bills and budget changes, the cafeteria bills and reports and the tax reports and adjustments.

Mr. Cowley gave a report on T.E.A.M., comparing the school average with the state average.

The public hearing for Chapter I and Chapter II was held. Mr. Cowley gave a report on the

Maintenance program. The board voted not to pay for the cafeteria employees and bus drivers physicals.

Billy Daniels was asked to gather information concerning the purchasing of the old Johntown school property by the Johntown community in order to build a Community center there.

The board approved the junior high and senior high handbooks. Mr. Cowley is to work up guidelines for

award jackets. The board employed Kenny Lawson for the Talco Junior High Coach and Leslie Martin.

The board accepted the resignation of Buford Hervey, Deidra Bull and Leanda Seykora.

The board voted to move Mr. Copeland from the Bogata Junior High to Rivercrest where he will be coach for the girls basketball team.

## Talco-Bogata Students Test Above Average

Talco-Bogata students scored above the state average in general on this year's Texas Assessment of Basic Skills testing, school trustees were told Tuesday night, June 10 by Superintendent Harold Cowley.

However, a nagging problem still exists in the grading of one area which Superintendent Cowley says has local as well as many area school

people concerned. The area is entitled "writing" but includes reading as well as writing, and Talco-Bogata students have scored lower in this area of the test for several years.

Cowley explained the major problems basically is the grading of a portion of the test called "Classificatory Written Composition".

Comparison of local scores to state scores indicated that in third grade math local 81%, state 80%; reading

local 74%, state 74%; multiple choice writing local 75%, state 73%; written composition local 54%, state 72%. Fifth grade math local 80%, state 89%; reading local 78%, state 84%; multiple choice writing local 61%, state 78%; written composition local 64%, state 77%. Seventh grade math local 87%, state 81%; reading local 83%, state 78%; multiple choice writing local 83%, state 79%; written composition local 85%, state 77%. Ninth grade math local 97%, state 81%; reading local 86%, state 80%; multiple choice writing local 85%, state 76%; written composition local 75%, state 74%. Eleventh grade students scored 97% mastery in the basic skills area of mathematics and 95% mastery in the area of English language arts.

Teams scores will be used by the administration and staff as an aid to determine possible changes in curriculum requirements.

### Former Bogata Resident Recalls Theater History

I received an interesting letter this week from Mildred (Stephenson) (Hill) Whitt, former Bogata resident, concerning the history of the old Bogata theater. Mildred was married to Henry Hill, a one time Bogata J.P., in 1931. He died in 1968. She married Jack Whitt in 1971. He died in 1985. Mildred now resides at 132 E. Oak Ave., Paris.  
According to Mrs. Whitt's letter, the theater dates back to 1929 when Red Peyton owned the theater as well as the drug store. Paul Hamilton worked at the drug store during the day and sold show tickets at night. Weldon Horten ran the projector. The movies were silent and there was an electric player piano. "We made as much noise as we were allowed to, held hands with our dates, and stole kisses in the darkness of the theater," writes Mildred. There was no popcorn, then, it came later. Some of the names Mildred mentioned as movie goers at that time were Travis Hale, Dude Summers Lassiter, Ruth Craddock Woods, Jimmy Underwood, Carl and

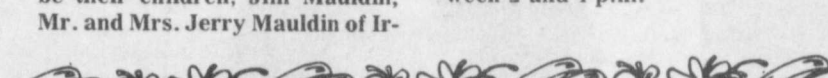
Zelma Woods, Francis Woods Franklin, Frances Franklin Summers, Nora Parks Glover and Francis Parks Shoffner.  
In the late 40's and early 50's, Johnny Gill bought the show and for several years Lela Buffo Ford was a silent partner. Mildred's son Billy Gene Hill, took a job at the theater running the projector and being janitor. He decided he didn't want to be the janitor, so Mildred took that job. Dot Simpson sold the tickets during this time.  
Sometime later, Lela and her brother-in-law, Luther Phelps bought out Johnny Gill's part. Lela's sister, Leona Phelps, took over the ticket sales. By this time Billy Gene had quit his job of running the projector, but Mildred continued the janitorial work. Some who ran the projector were Don Porterfield, James Cody, Truman Stephenson and Luke Phelps.  
Lela's sister and her family moved to Mt. Pleasant, so in addition to the janitorial work Mildred also began selling the tickets and popping the popcorn. Mildred recalls, "Some of the kids I remember selling tickets to at this time were Neil and Francis Mayes Rozell, the Mankins twins, Jimmie and Nelda Huddleston Williams, Jerry Chandler, Bill Buckman, Paula Wilson, Donna and Mary Rozell, the George Marshall children, Ruth Vaughan and her children, Madge Francis, James Francis, Martha and Nina Vaughan, Jim Ed Lee, Lonnie and Dorothy McBride, Dereca Jo Choate Buffo, the children of Muri Roach, M.E. Roach, Horace Adams, Thad Screws, Raymond Screws, Hollis Mathena, George Allums and the grandchildren of Roy Gibson."

Mrs. Ford closed the theater in the early 60's. The building has recently been torn down due to the construction of the new post office.

The council voted to not allow any exemptions to the trash pick-up regulations.

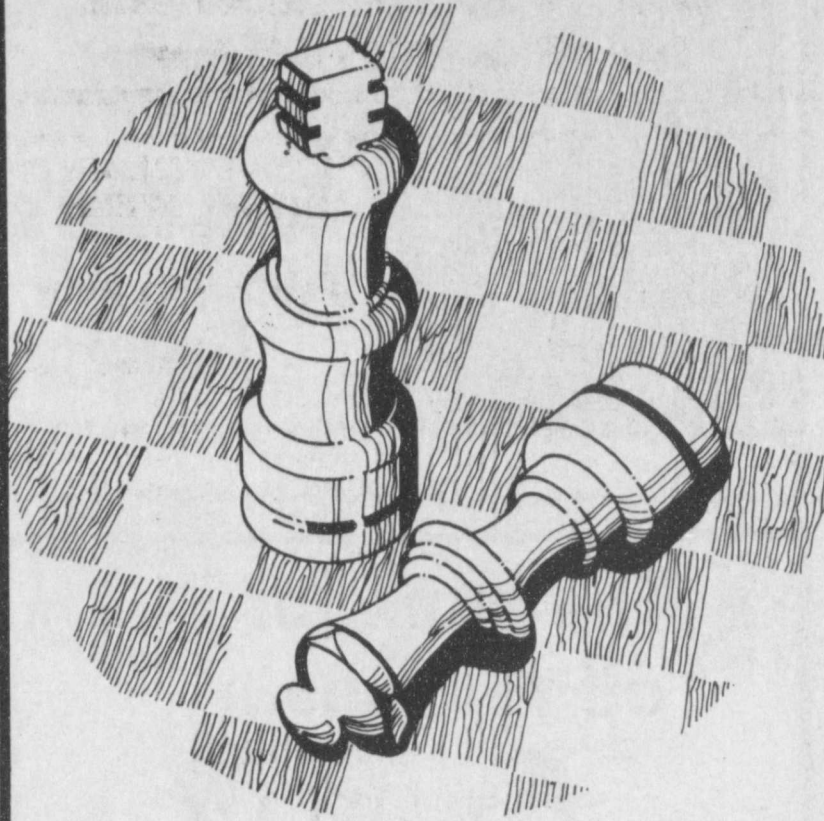

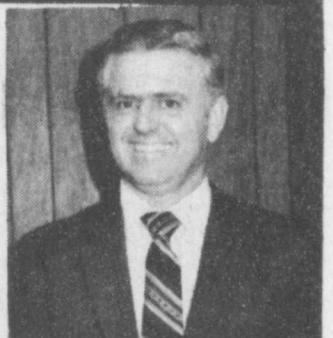

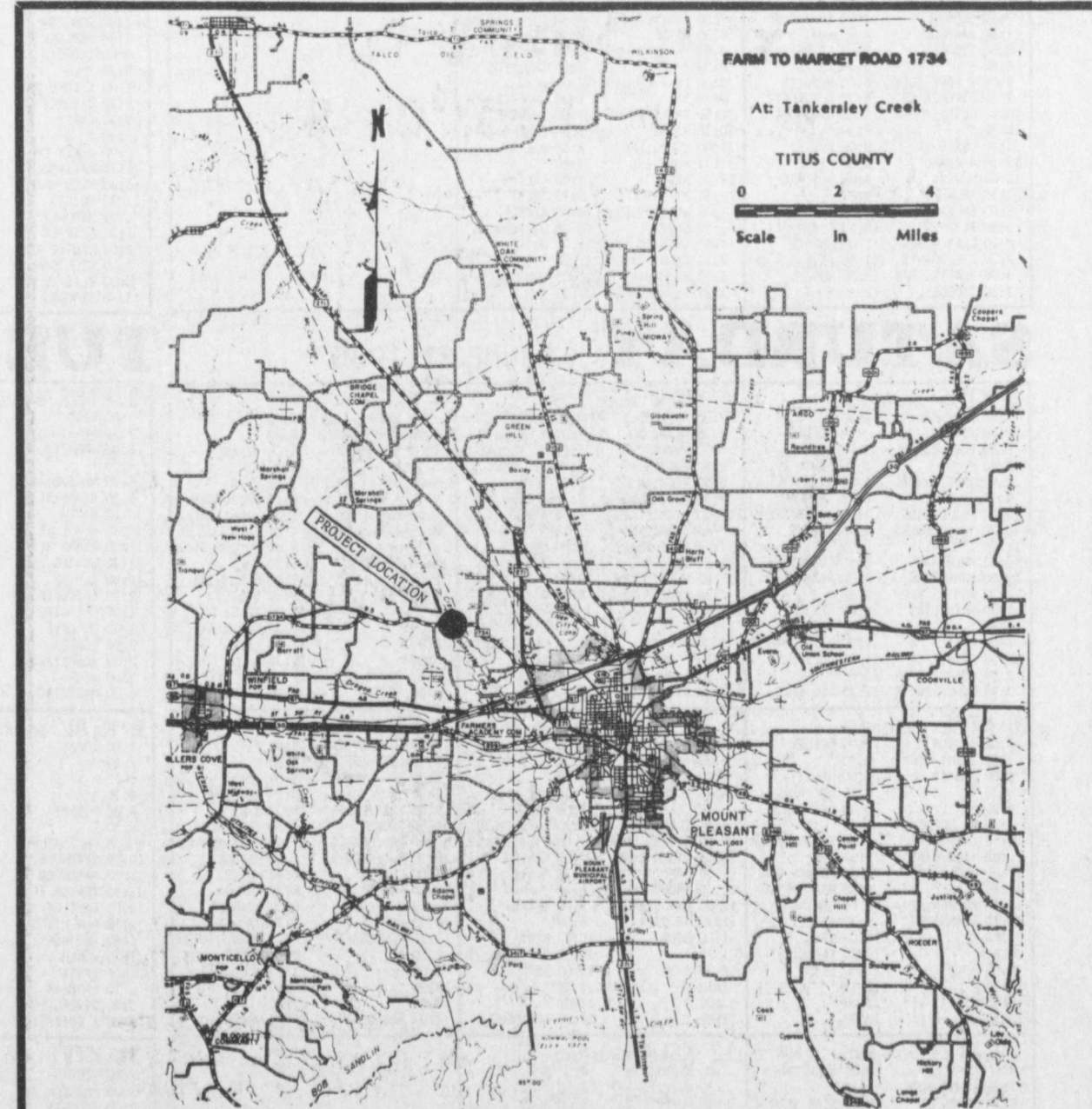

**Notice Affording Opportunity For Public Hearing**

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and an adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

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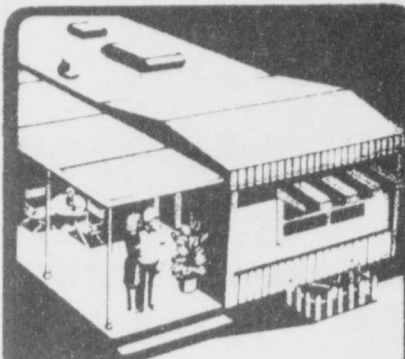
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## Girl Scout Day Camp Successful

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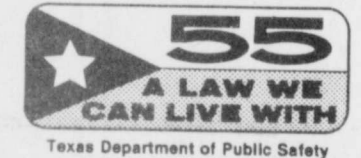
