

Sales Taxes Vary From Town To Town

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$56.6 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,015 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston received the largest check, \$8.8 million, bringing Houston's total 1986 payments to \$82.2 million, down four percent over last year.

Blossom received \$671.79 for this period, compared to \$788.34 for the same period last year for a 0.51 percent increase in total payments to date.

Deport received no payment this period, as compared to \$677.22 for the same period in 1985, marking a 12.48 percent decrease in payments to date for 1986.

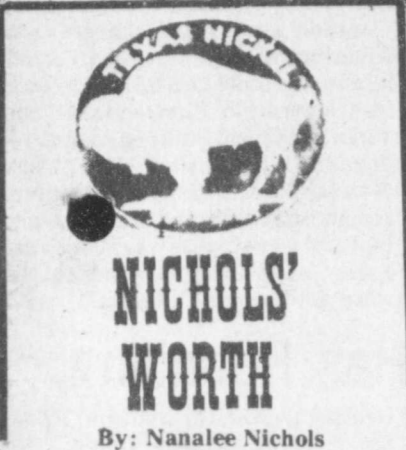
Paris received \$132,553.76, for a 1.85 percent increase over the 1985 payment.

Bogata received \$1,592.65 for its payment this period for a 35.15 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,103.22, bringing the 1986 total to \$17,866.80 to date.

Clarksville received \$11,183.30 for a 7.88 percent increase. Detroit received \$701.66 for this period for a 20.41 percent increase over 1985.

Mt. Pleasant received \$65,806.52 for a 5.28 percent increase over the 1985 payment for the same period while Talco received \$934.71 for this period payment, compared to \$1,430.29 for the 1985 payment for the same period, marking an 8.66 percent decrease.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.

If you enjoy gospel singing, come and sing someone with you. All special and group singers come and let's have a good time.

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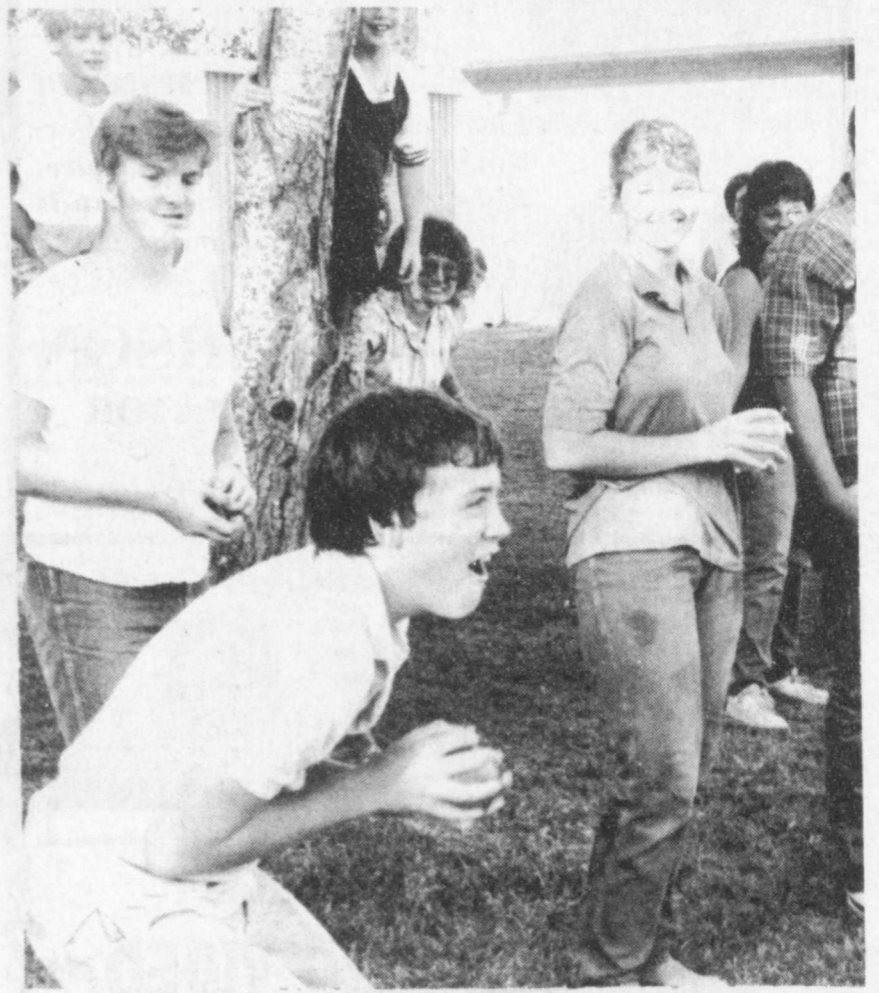

Buckman Discovers Fire

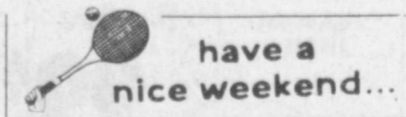
Thanks to Bill Buckman, several buildings on North Main Street were spared extensive fire damage late Sunday evening.

Buckman had gone to the drug store to fill a prescription and upon entering his store, smelled the faint odor of smoke. Buckman said the smell was so faint at first that he decided he had just imagined it, however, as time passed he became more definite that there was a fire nearby.

After a thorough search through his store, he called Morris Foster and Charlie Lewis. Donnie Strain arrived later and together the men tracked

the smoke to the back of Bob Smiley's barber shop. Upon further investigation, they found that the fire had begun in a mattress which had been stored in the back of the barber shop. The mattress was pulled outside and the fire snuffed out.

"My timing was just right," said Buckman. "If I had been any earlier, I would not have noticed the smoke, and if I'd been any later, it would have done a lot of damage."



Losses From Round Hay Bales Calculated

A fellow County Extension Agent down in South Texas conducted a demonstration last year aimed at studying weathering losses. They studied sorghum sudangrass that was baled in July and stored until the following January. Approximately 20 inches of rain was received during that time which is comparable to our area.

Weathered parts were removed and weighed to determine loss. Bales averaged 1575 pounds at harvest and 1400 pounds at feeding.

Smallest losses were in bales stored on top of the ground because the hay acted as a wick and soaked up moisture from the ground. Uncovered bales on the ground lost 220 pounds on the average while covered bales on the ground lost half that amount.

However, those that were uncovered but stored on pallets off the ground lost 80 pounds while the covered bales on pallets lost only 35 pounds.

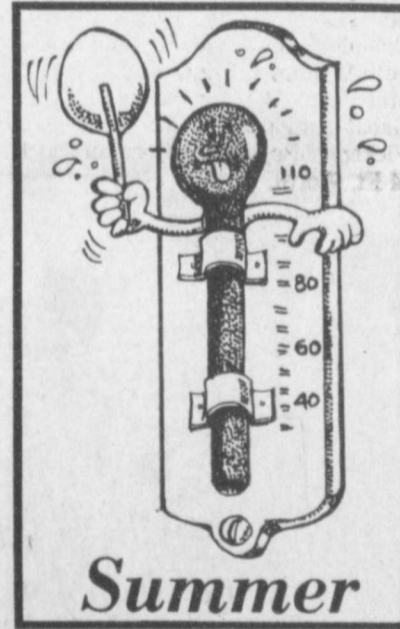

Red River Haven Honors Birthdays

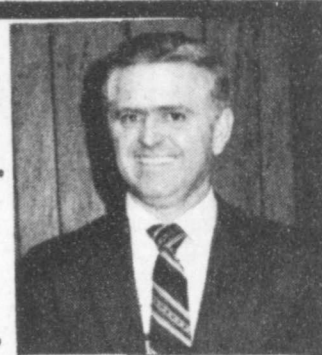

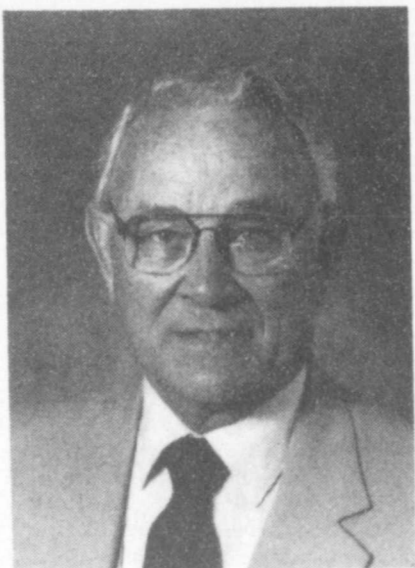

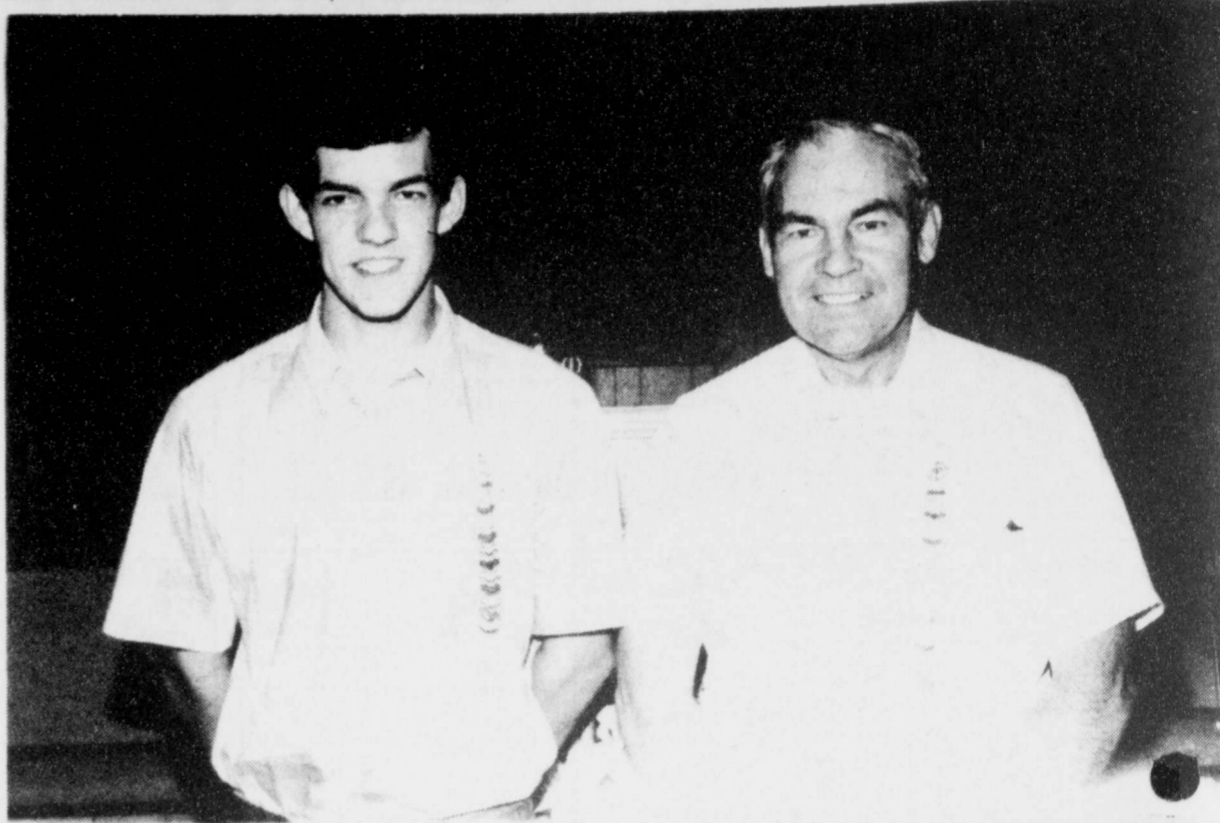

Hay Quality Variable This Summer

By Herb Brevard

Due to wet weather, hay has been cut at odd times this spring. The 28 day schedule, normally used as a guide for determining the cutting time, has not held due to the unpredictable weather. Therefore, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist, it is difficult to determine the quality of the hay without testing.

Reeves says that each cutting of hay should be tested and properly identified. Hay quality is important whether selling or buying hay. The quality will determine the best use for the hay, since different classes of livestock require different nutrition levels. Higher quality hay should be fed to lactating cows and developing heifers. The lower quality hay is generally sufficient for dry cows if the protein content is near seven percent.

Some hay has gotten wet after cutting and before baling. This can be a very discouraging situation, particularly if the hay supply is limited. The longer the hay stays wet, the more quality is lost. Reeves says that if the hay can be fluffed so that it will dry quicker, less quality will be lost.

The production of hay is a very expensive practice on most farms and ranches. Therefore, it is a definite economic advantage to study the cost of production, cost of harvesting, investment and labor requirements, and the best use of the land available before going into the hay baling business. Many smaller producers find it advantageous to purchase all their hay and use their land and capital for other purposes. The situation will vary drastically from farm to farm.

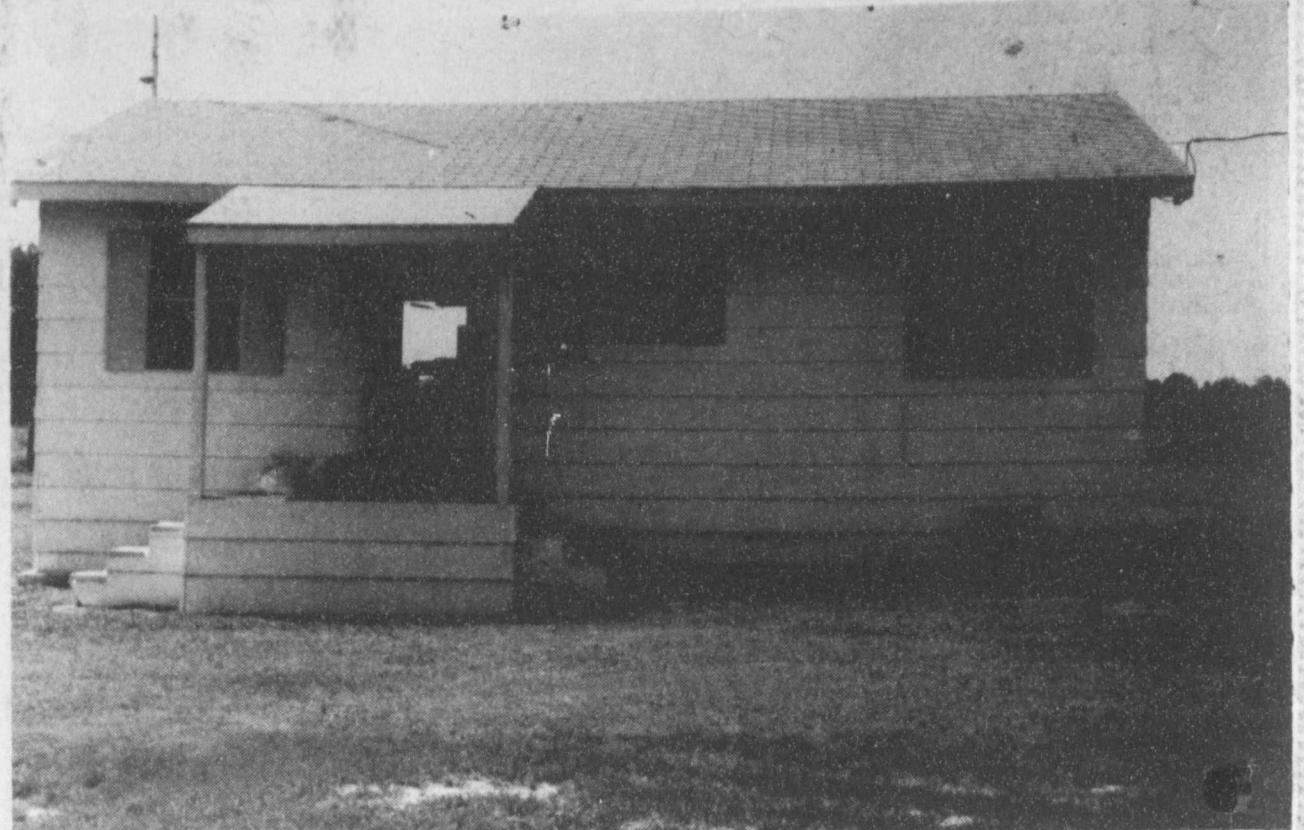

Buckman Sets State Record

July 6 at the East Texas Rifle and Pistol Club monthly IHMSA bigbore handgun silhouette match, Bill Buckman set a new state 4-gun aggregate record of 148 targets of 160. The previous record of 145 had been set in 1985 by Buddy Bailey of Houston. This record was then shared in early 1986 with Dr. Tom Clinkscales, also of Houston. In May at the state finals in Sweetwater, a new record was established at 146 by Jim Bodkin of Hereford. Buckman helped Bodkin in shooting this record by serving as his spotter.

Shooting a 140/160 or 100/120 is considered an honor in IHMSA and qualifies for a special president's 140 (or 100) Club award from the president of IHMSA, Elgin Gates of Idaho Falls, Idaho. Buckman had made the 100 Club for the past five years, but it was 1986 before placing in the 140 Club with its small yearly number of usually less than 100 shooters. However, this 148 score was his fourth 140 Club in a row this year.

IHMSA (International Handgun Metallic Silhouette Association, Inc.) is an organization of some 38,000 shooters world wide. A match normal course of fire is 40 rounds as 10 chickens at 50 meters, 10 pigs at 100 meters, 10 turkeys at 150 meters and 10 rams at 200 meters (219 yards). Life size targets cut from steel plates, must be knocked off the stand to score a hit. Rams weigh approximately 55 pounds. Targets are shot in banks of five, left to right, in two minute intervals. There are four categories, Production Revolver (freestyle); Production Single-shot (freestyle); Production Standing (revolver or single-shot); and Unlimited (freestyle). Freestyle is a position that allows the shooter to shoot in a comfortable, but unaided position with certain safety and gun placement regulations. Aggregate totals must always include the standing category. Handguns fired must meet certain qualifications according to category such as weight, sight radius, amount of custom work, etc., but all share the same requirement of having only "open sights", no scopes or magnifying devices allowed. Individuals are ranked in classes according to their shooting ability, International Class being the highest class in each category.

Buckman's score was made by firing a standing score of 29/40, Production Revolver 39/40, Production single-shot 40/40, and unlimited for 148/160 with 39/40 rams (missing one ram in the revolver category).
