

Taxpayers Object To Tax Hike

The Red River Commissioner's Court held a public meeting on Thursday, August 28, to hear comments on the proposed county tax increase rate by 17.91 percent. Approximately 30 taxpayers appeared and expressed objections when informed that 11.2 percent of the increase would have to be set aside for paying the health care costs of the poor.

Commissioners explained to the group that the proposal increase takes into account a loss of revenue sharing funds which it has heretofore received from the federal government. It will also help offset a substantial increase in the cost of the county's liability insurance premiums.

The majority of those addressing the council said they did not favor a five percent increase in salaries for county employees, which would account for most of the remaining increase.

Commissioners are scheduled to meet again at 10 a.m. Tuesday, September 2, to approve a tax hike.

The Commissioner's Court has also scheduled a special meeting for 1 p.m. Wednesday, September 3, to discuss the proposed building of a privately owned minimum security prison in Red River County with the Bedford based firm of Corrections Concepts.

Judge L.D. Williamson said that he expects the Legislature to saddle counties with additional problems in the future, as a result of the state government's current financial crisis.

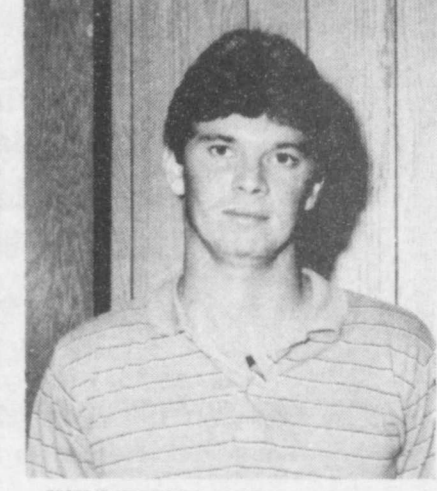

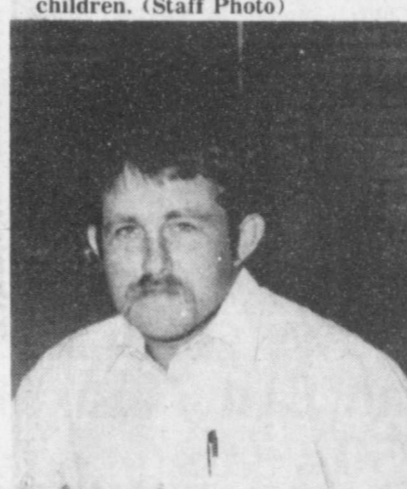

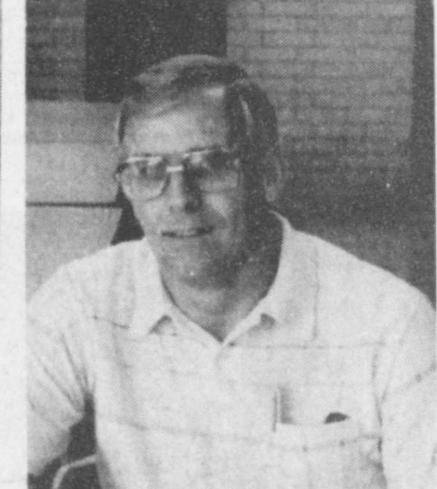

(editorial from Marshall News Messenger, August 20, 1986) Candidate Hargett chooses the low road

Squeaky-clean Edd Hargett is squeaky-clean no longer. Hargett in a "news release," has elected to put legitimate issues in the background in his senatorial campaign against Harrison County Judge Richard Anderson and put the campaign on a bar ditch level.

Last year, when congressional candidate Jim Chapman used a "scare tactic" involving a Social Security issue (an official-looking direct mail piece aimed at elderly voters), Hargett screamed like a wounded bear and rightly so. He said then that his opponent was throwing up smoke screens and not talking about the issues. Now Hargett is guilty of the same tactics.

Hargett's misguided release deals with a non-issue in this campaign: Anderson's support, or non-support, of his daughter Ashley, following Anderson's divorce. Anderson appeared in court in Belton, Texas on charges of non-support, received a civil - not criminal - contempt of court citation from the judge, was held in custody for less than four hours and was ordered to pay child support.

What does this have to do with the current race?

"I believe East Texas needs a State Senator who will work to uphold the laws of our state, not violate them," Hargett said, piously. That claim is, at best, muddled. Only in the most indirect sense did Anderson break a law - the matter was civil, not criminal. Anderson was "convicted" of nothing; Hargett's use of the word has inflammatory appeal, but it's just plain-wrong. And, Edd, if you only want opponents who have never, ever broken any state law, or, by inference, you want only people who have never broken a state law to vote, it would be a mighty lonely election.

Hargett used selected quotes from Belton Judge J. F. Clawson from 6-year-old accounts of Anderson's contempt of court citation and tried to relate those to Anderson's attitude and ability to serve the 1st Senatorial District.

So, what does this 6-year-old issue have to do with this election? Hargett would have us believe that it will be the determining factor in the race. "The fact is Richard Anderson considers himself to be above the law," Hargett says in the release. Quite an assumption for Hargett to make six years after the events in question, and without knowing Anderson's reasons for his actions.

That won't wash, Edd. Taking one incident six years ago that has nothing to do with the issues of today or a candidate's ability to serve the voters of East Texas is outrageous.

The bottom line is this: Richard Anderson made a mistake six years ago, and whether it was a matter of principle, ignorance or stupidity is not the issue. Anderson made the mistake and paid for it. It was a civil matter that had (and has) nothing to do with his ability to serve constructively in the Texas Senate.

Hargett, who thinks he owns the rights to "committed to traditional family values" - a phrase he uses instead of "experienced" and "I run on my record" - should take another look at his campaign and decide to be committed to traditional political values.

And then he should debate the issues with Anderson instead of grasping at gutter politics and billowing cheap smoke screens to capture headline and, maybe, votes.

Hargett until this point has run a good campaign. Tactics like this latest non-issue-issue mean he doesn't like the outcome of the primary election. He is afraid of the momentum that Anderson has, and he's running scared.

There is no other excuse for his behavior.

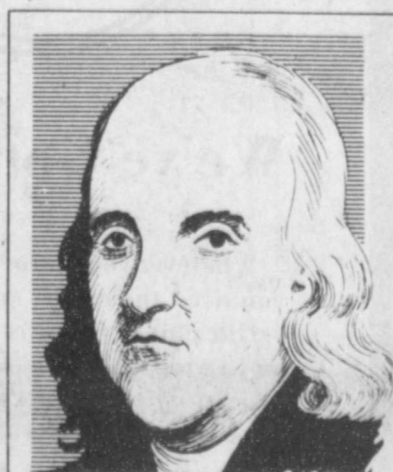

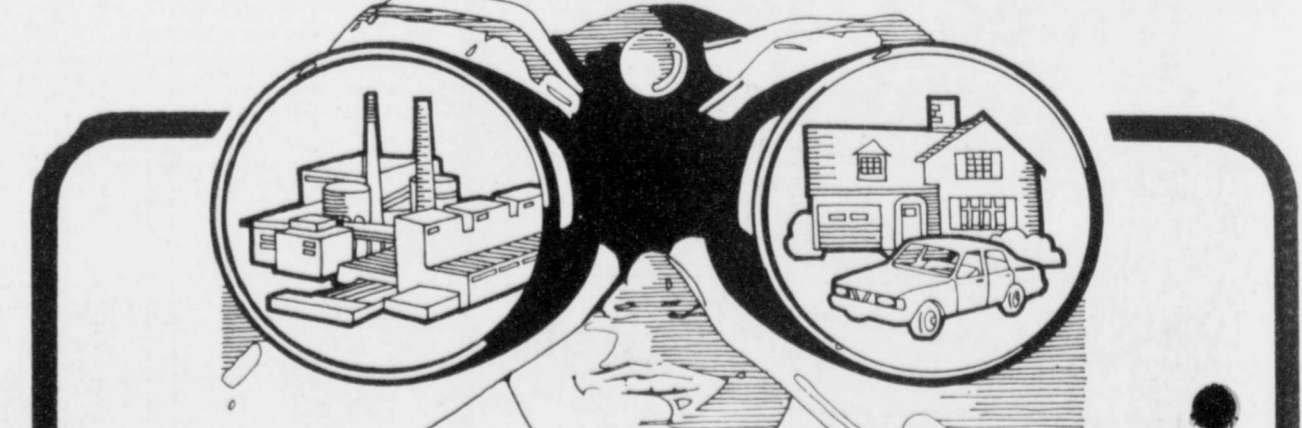
James Cowley Is Leader At ETSU

Old Underwood House in Bogata

Underwood Home Depicts 1900 Era

An estate sale was held at the old Underwood place on Hudson Street in Bogata, Saturday, August 29, due to the deaths of Tom and Jimmie Underwood Jr., who had lived in the house for the most part of their lives.

The house was built around 1902 by a builder who built two other houses in Bogata around the same time. Jim Underwood bought the house in 1911, and the ouse and 29 acres of farmland became home to Mr. Underwood, his wife and their eight children. A ninth child died at birth.

The large, spacious house with hand etched glass doors also boasted a parlor, side porches on either side of the front and gingerbread trim decorating the upper edges of the porches which were held up by sculptured column posts. The house was built with a cistern in the hallway, which has long been covered up. A hot water heater was also installed in the house, something unusual for the 1900's.

An outside staircase leads to three bedrooms to the top story of the house. Those who remember say that these bedrooms and the remaining ones downstairs not only provided quarters for the eight children and Mr. and Mrs. Underwood, but also for cousins, aunts, and friends, who from time to time for some reason or other needed a place to live.

Nanny Underwood died while the children were quite young. Mr. Underwood then married her sister and "Aunt Fannie", as the children

called her, became the only mother some of them would ever remember.

Gladys Underwood, the second Underwood child, was stricken with tuberculosis. A room was added at the back of the hall with windows completely across one side so she might be able to get plenty of sun.

The family moved to El Paso hoping the change of climate would help Gladys, however she died one year later and the family returned to Bogata.

Jimmie Underwood, Jr. often told this story of their return to Bogata. It happened that the house and farm land had been sold upon their moving, but the man who bought the place was unable to make it pay, so when the Underwoods returned, he gave them a cokstove to take the place back.

Mr. Underwood operated a cotton gin on North Main around 1915, and he ran electricity lines and water lines from the gin to the house. This was the only house in Bogata with running water and electricity at this time.

Jimmie Underwood, Sr. died in 1932. Jimmie Jr. was attending Texas University at the time. The house and farmland was in debt and the uncles and business men advised Jimmie Jr. to sell, advice which he shunned. He returned home to take control fo the Underwood farm and was able to pay the place out of debt about fifteen years after taking control.

One of the daughters, Sybil, died at an early age of four or five years. Another daughter, Mary Ann Under-

wood Hudson, died in 1947 of cancer. A son, Mack, died in 1935 with pneumonia.

Zelma Tom and Jimmie Jr. were the only two of the Underwood children who never married. They lived together in the Underwood home until their death. Tom, as everyone called her, was a beautician and operated a beauty salon, a log building which Jimmie Jr. built for her on Main Street in Bogata. Jimmie Jr. continued farming through the years and family members say he seemed to enjoy his reputation as an eccentric. He considered himself a philosopher and gentleman farmer.

They both passed away in 1985. Tom in May and Jimmie in September. The oldest child, a daughter, Gertrude, is still living and is 90 years old. She lives in El Paso. Ed Underwood, the only living son, is 84 years old and lives in Puerto Rico where he started a business in 1947, a business which became very successful.

Mrs. Gayle Hudson Haynes, a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Underwood, Sr., and husband, Frank, who is executor of the wills of the late Tom and Jimmie Underwood, said the house and farm land would be sold.

If houses could speak, this house could probably tell a lot of interesting stories, but it only sets in its place, back from the road, surrounded by tall crepe myrtle trees and looks on at a different world in a different time and reminds us all of a time in history when things were slower and life was simpler.
