neither team able to score, leaving 8/0-0/1 the game tied 0-0.



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

weekend. Talco Spinal Screening Set

The Texas State Legislature has passed a new law that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can

be eliminated by early detection. Spinal screening for Talco school children has been scheduled to begin

on Tuesday, October 21, 1986. Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities .: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalighnment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs, Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. This condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early.







#### Joe Choate's Service Station, One Of Bogata's Oldest

The Shamrock Service Station located on U.S. Highway 271 in Bogata is one of the oldest businesses in the area. Joe Choate, owner and operator of the station, opened for his first day of business in March of 1938.
