It brings to mind some of the other things that have happened here on main street.

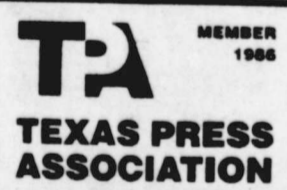
There was the afternoon in the middle of summer several years ago when a small black goat trotted through main street.

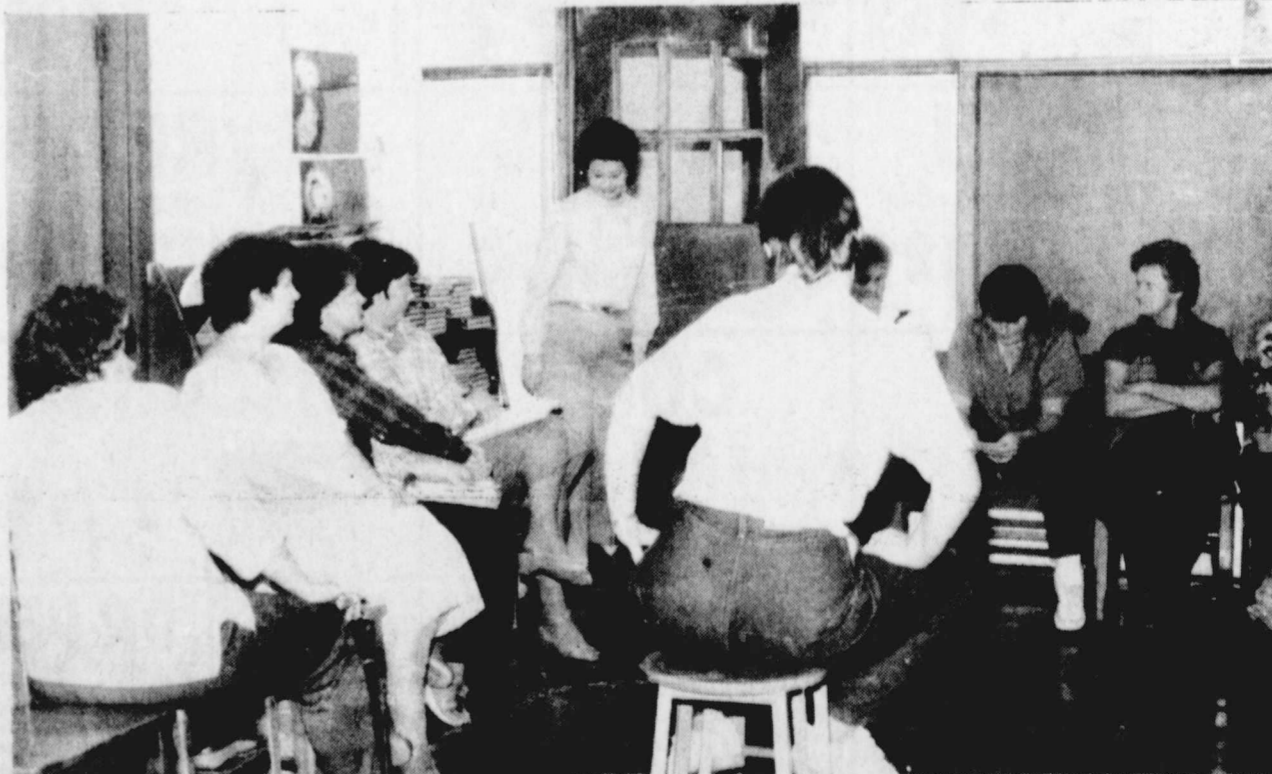
Talco PTO Meets

Rebels Drop District Opener

The Rivercrest Rebels opened district play last Friday night in Honey Grove, but fell short of a victory by the narrow margin of 6-0. From the opening kick-off both teams appeared evenly matched as the Honey Grove Warriors took over on their 20 yard line. The Warriors moved the ball 25 yards in eight plays before the Rebel defense forced them to punt. On the Rebel's first possession, they ran at the Warrior defense six times for 22 yards. On consecutive possessions, both teams managed about 18 yards before punting in a seesaw contest.

neither team able to score, leaving the game tied 0-0.

Rivercrest opened the second half with the ball, but was forced to punt. Honey Grove took possession at their own 5 yard line. Running back, Jewel Shaw shouldered most of the attack, gaining about 6 yards per carry. Then on a second down play, he found an opening on the left side of the Rebel defense and streaked 64 yards for the game's only touchdown. The point after attempt was no good, leaving the Warriors with a 6-0 lead in the third quarter.

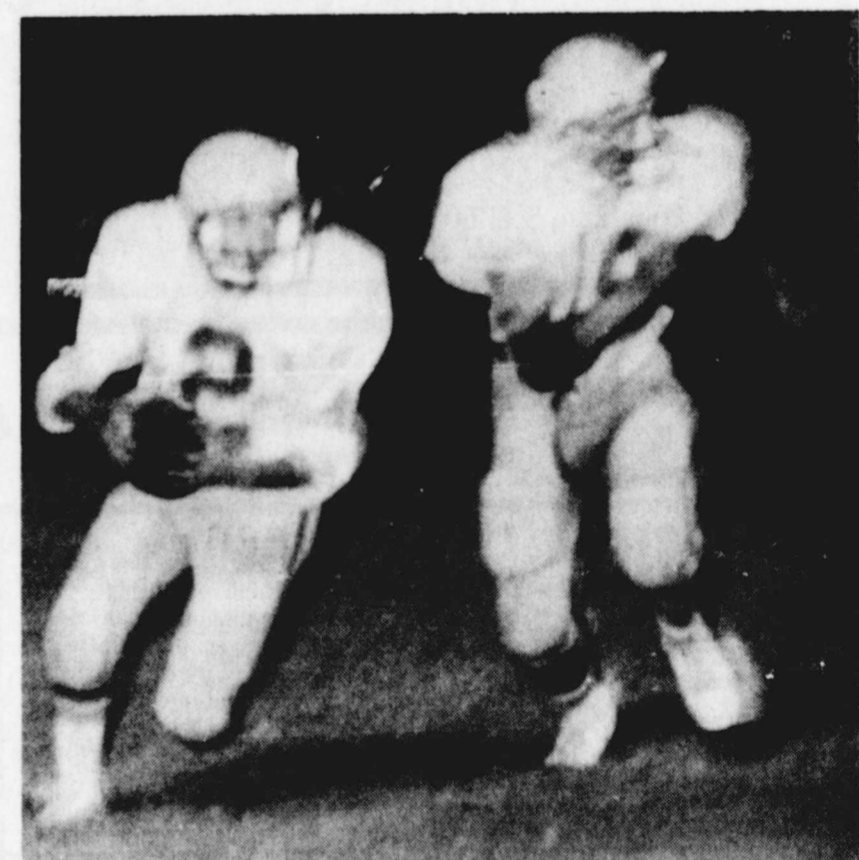
During the fourth quarter, neither team was able to generate much offense and the warriors won 6-0.

The Rebels turned in a good team effort against the Honey Grove Warriors, allowing 278 yards total offense with Jewel Shaw accounting for 115 yards. Rebel Fullback Bradley Wood led the Rebel effort with 73 yards and Tailback Amos Brown had 50 yards.

This week the Rebels host Leonard at Rivercrest with kick-off slated for 7:30 and homecoming activities before the game at 7:00.

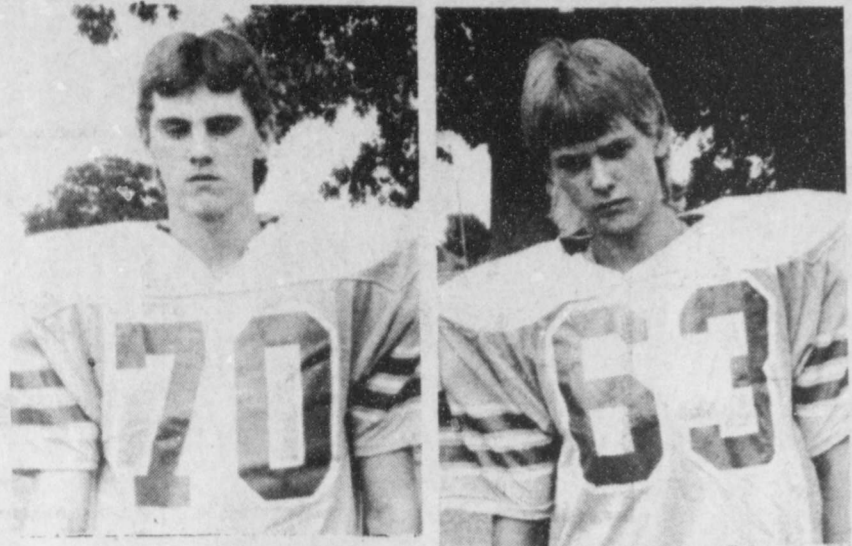

Locals At Finals Rodeo

October 16-18 in Ft. Smith, AR marks the culmination of a full year of rodeos across a seven state area, sanctioned and approved by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, headquartered in Shawnee, OK.

The CRRA, which originated in 1977, marks its tenth annual Finals Rodeo, affords the top 15 cowboys and cowgirls who qualify in their respective events, the opportunity of gathering additional prize money to their season totals.

In addition to the top 15 contestants in the seven championship events, the rookie leader in each event is allowed to compete at the Finals.

Red River County has several contestants who will be vying for average championships at the Finals, along with two rodeo companies who will be furnishing livestock for the rodeo, in addition to being nominated for Producer of the Year honors. Livestock from these rodeo companies has also been nominated for Bareback Horse of the Year, Saddle Bronc Horse of the Year and Bucking Bull of the Year.

The Wing Rodeo Company of Bogata has bareback horse Tracy Snort, in nomination for Bareback Horse of the Year; Strawberry Hill as

Saddle Bronc Horse of the Year and Outlaw, as Bucking Bull of the Year. The Wing Rodeo Company has previously been awarded titles in all three categories for their outstanding horses and bulls, along with being the three-time Producer of the Year in the CRRA.

The Andrews-Wing Rodeo Company of Adielou, managed by Sammy Andrews, has Bandito Gold in nomination for Bareback Horse of the Year; Smitty in the Saddle Bronc Horse of the Year category and Texas Twister in the Bucking Bull of the Year category.

Casey Jeffrey of Bogata has qualified for his second consecutive finals rodeo in the Saddle Bronc riding, ranked in eighth position for the year, and Kenny Dearman of Bagwell finished the regular rodeo season in ninth position in that event.

In the bull riding event, Damon Holmes of Bogata is in the runner-up position for the yearly title, winning \$5,391.91 during the year. Holmes led for the bull riding championship earlier in the year. Jeffrey Bivins of Bogata will enter the finals in seventh position in the bull riding, accumulating \$3,151.67 in regular competition. Wade Cline of Mt. Pleasant,

the 1985 CRRA Rookie of the Year, will compete in tenth position in the bull riding and Rusty Bradberry of Bogata will compete in the eighth position. Guy Franks of Mt. Pleasant finished the year in 19th position.

The bareback riding competition will see Rickey Rhoades of Talco in fourth place, followed by Mike Needham of Clarksville in eighth position.

Doug Williams of Idabel, OK, rodeo announcer for the Wing Rodeo Company, was elected Announcer of the Year for the fourth consecutive year. Donny Sparks of Texarkana, bullfighter for the Wing Rodeo Company was elected Bullfighter of the Year and Scotty Waller of Cooper, TX was elected to work the 1986 Finals Rodeo. Waller works as bullfighter for the Andrews-Wing Rodeo Company.

The Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association sanctioned more than 130 rodeos during the 1986 rodeo season. Rodeos approved by the CRRA in the immediate area are Bogata, TX; Mt. Pleasant, TX; Cooper, TX; Pittsburg, TX; Wright City, OK; Idabel, OK; DeQueen, AR; and Bonham, TX. All rodeos are produced by either the Wing Rodeo Company or the Andrews-Wing Rodeo Company.

Leading for the All Around Championship for 1986 is David Wesson of Delaware, OK with a total of \$10,943.22.

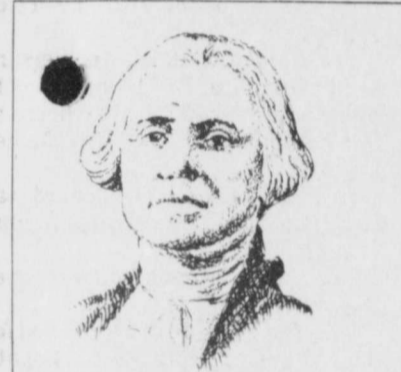

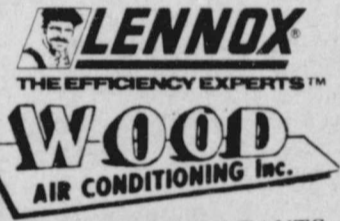

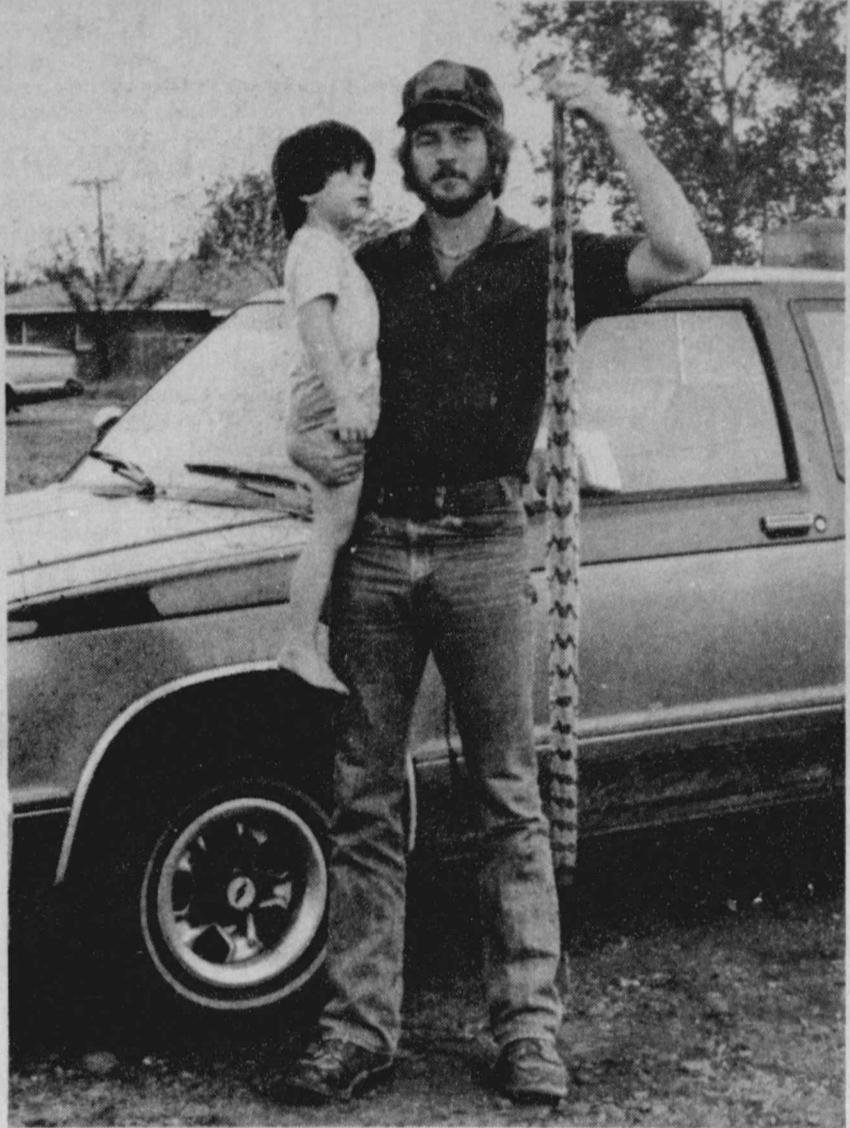

Talco Spinal Screening Set

The Texas State Legislature has passed a new law that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can

be eliminated by early detection. Spinal screening for Talco school children has been scheduled to begin on Tuesday, October 21, 1986.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. This condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early.

Joe Choate's Service Station, One Of Bogata's Oldest

The Shamrock Service Station located on U.S. Highway 271 in Bogata is one of the oldest businesses in the area. Joe Choate, owner and operator of the station, opened for his first day of business in March of 1938.

The oil and gas supplier for the station then was Southport. The suppliers have changed several times through the years, from Southport to Barnsdall, then to Skelly, and at present, Shamrock.

Joe's smiling service hasn't changed at all.

He laughingly recalls a visitor he had at the station right after it opened for business. The fellow looked the place over and then offered to bet Joe that he'd have to close in 30 days.

"Well," Joe laughs, "he'd a lost. I've been here 48 years."

Joe says there is a lot of difference in the way the town looked back then on Saturday nights after closing time compared to today.

"I'd start to my house on North

Main, and I'd have trouble getting down the streets for the crowd in town," he recalls. "Now days, there's hardly anybody at all in town."

Leaded gas sold for 13 cents a gallon and Ethyl sold for 16 cents a gallon.

"There were a lot of Model T's and Model A's in those days," Joe recalls, "and the total sale of gas to them was usually about 25 cents. On rare occa-

sions, I'd sell someone a dollar's worth."

In 1942, Joe was called to serve in the armed services during World War II. He closed the station for a while, but later allowed J.W. Corbell to operate the business in his absence.

Joe returned home on Christmas eve in 1945. Shortly after, he again took over operation of the station. He

and his wife, the former Ida Becton, had a daughter, Dereca Jo, in 1948.

Joe still has a supply of calling cards which he used back in the days when people gathered in Bogata on Saturday nights. He would employ a couple of young boys to go downtown and place one of the cards on every

automobile there. Written on the card is the following poem: "If I knew you and you knew me, And both of us could clearly see, I'm sure that we would differ less, and clasp our hands in friendliness."

Mrs. Choate died in 1954. Three years later, Joe married Gertie,

Allums.

Joe's philosophy for success is to work hard, to do good work and to treat people right. After forty-eight years in business, many area residents can attest to the fact that he definitely possesses the credentials to do those things.

Fall Insects Present Problems

Armyworms are devastating some permanent and winter pastures in Red River County says Donnie Glover, County Extension Agent. They will probably continue to be a problem until frost, primarily because ideal conditions exist for continuous infestation. One spraying will not do a permanent job of control if current conditions continue. Sevin and Dylox are approved for armyworm control.

Leaves are falling off pecan trees

due to a heavy infestation of aphids. Glover says retention of leaves on the pecan trees is very important for storing food for next year's crop. Leaves shed due to aphids usually have a black sooty mold on the. Producers who have followed an aphid control program through the summer probably have trees which are retaining their leaves. Aphid infestation can occur any time between late spring and early fall. Treat with malithion or Zolone to keep the population under control.
