

Local Sales Tax Shows Little Change

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$104.6 million in local sales tax to 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1986 payments to date were down 1.7 percent as compared to the payments to date in November of last year.

Houston's check was the largest

\$16.1 million, bringing total payments in 1986 to \$132.9 million, down 5 percent from last year.

Bogata received \$3,243.62 for its payment this period, compared to \$3,149.75 for last year, for a 32.06 percent increase over total payments to date.

Clarksville received \$23,294.82 for

its payment, for a 2.95 percent increase over last year.

Detroit received \$1,062.35, marking a 5.55 percent increase over total payments to date in 1985.

Mt. Pleasant received \$123,149.60 for a 1.24 percent increase over the 1985 payments to date of \$972,632.35.

Talco received \$2,002.42 for this

period payment, a 19.81 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$3,202.18.

Blossom received \$1,597.85 for this period, for a 2.33 percent increase over last year. Total payments to date for Blossom are \$12,957.08, as compared to \$12,662.66 in 1985.

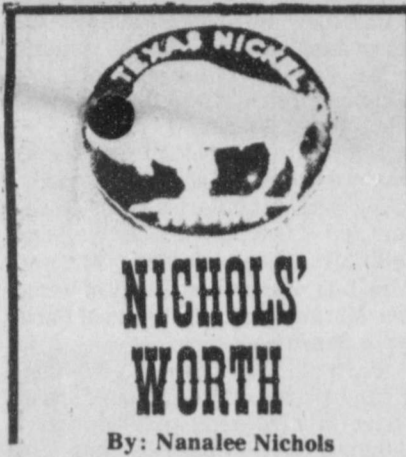
Deport received \$1,533.17 for its

payment for this period, compared to \$1,635.25 for the payment in 1985, marking a .99 percent decrease. Total payments to date for Deport are \$9,605.42, compared to \$9,701.85 for last year.

Paris received \$256,740.27 for this period for a 3.30 percent increase over

1985's total payments to date.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and reported to the Comptroller by October 20.

It was, to put it mildly, foggy Tuesday morning. Fog isn't so bad, except for those who must drive in it. It does add a "cloak of mystery" to old, familiar landscapes.

Of course, upon arrival, the fog was so incredibly thick we couldn't see the sea...only the fog. We found the sea, by feeling our way down the beach until a wave wet our feet...but we could never say we really saw it. I took a picture of that fog, with brightly painted boats under a single spotlight. Everyone told me I was crazy. It won first place in competition that year.

In the Smokey Mountains one time I was driving through a fog that seemed thick enough to cut with a knife. The road was twisting and mountainous, and I was so proud of how well I was doing until I realized I had pulled into a parking lot instead of the road!

Several years ago, we tried to take Britt and Amanda Barnard (before they shared the same last name) up into the Arkansas mountains to see the fall foliage. Naturally, the fog was totally thickened everywhere. To this day the only thing they have seen are the steps to the lodge at Wilhemina State Park...not a mountain one could they glimpse!

One of the best incidents occurred only two weeks ago, when the last football game of the season (high school that is) was played in a fog so thick that it was difficult to see jersey numbers...and impossible to see the stands on the other side of the field.

All in all, fog seems to come around pretty regularly. It has, certainly, led us into some strange places, and livened up things with a good laugh. It isn't, to my mind, so very bad!

Fire Destroys First Baptist Church In Bogata

A large crowd gathered in Bogata Sunday, November 16, to watch as a blazing fire ripped through and destroyed the First Baptist Church building. As firemen from Deport, Talco and Bogata worked frantically to combat the fire, many who had gathered, exchanged embraces of comfort and looked on through tear-filled eyes.

The church auditorium was con-

structed in 1956 and the new educational facilities were completed in the 1970's. A new parking lot was being planned for the church, due to the recent purchase of Cawley's Laundry situated behind the church building.

Smoke coming from the attic in front of the building was detected and reported around 12:15, just minutes after dismissal of the Sunday morning services. Apparently, the fire had

started during the service, although there were no indications of the fire at that time.

A number of the members later reported that they had felt uncomfortably warm while sitting in the choir loft during the morning services. Bogata Fire Chief, Berney Huddleston stated, "It was really scary, because something could have happened right in the middle of Sunday

School and church. I'm just thankful it didn't and I'm awfully grateful for all the help from Talco and Deport."

A possible cause of the fire suggested by Rev. Bob Posey, pastor of the church, was an electrical short. "However," he added, "that's just a guess." Pastor Posey also speculated that the fire might have happened as a result of some lightning damage which had occurred three or four months ago.

According to Pastor Posey, the insurance company is now working on the adjustment procedures. A building committee is to be elected Sunday, November 30, but no work will actually be done until the settlement is made. "We will definitely rebuild," stated Rev. Posey, "but all the details of the rebuilding will be worked out at a later date."

Services of the church are presently being held in the gymnasium of the First Assembly of God Church in Bogata.

Old Store Holds Memories

The dilapidated building which once housed the Maple Community Store, owned by Jess Knowles, is still standing and reminds those who pass by of a time when Maple and Cuthand were thriving communities. Mr. Knowles built the store in 1953 and kept it in operation until 1978. Although most of the people in the communities had all left and business was slow the last years of the store's operation, Mr. Knowles kept the store open as long as he was able to run it.

While in high school, between the years 1962 and 1965, I would sometimes visit overnight in the home of Patsy Sue Knowles, granddaughter of Mr. Jess Knowles. I'd ride the school bus with them to their home after school. It seemed to me that we drove for hundreds of miles on that bus. Although I loved going there, it always seemed as if the bus let us off at the very ends of the earth. You could see for miles and miles, no houses, no stores, no Tip Top, just acres and acres of barren land. I had always been a "city kid" and was accustomed to running to the store, over to a friend's house, or to "get a coke" at whatever place all the teenagers happened to be gathered at the time. It dawned on me, after only a few minutes in Maple, that this was quite a different life style. It was with a great sigh of relief that I first visited the Maple Store. I was so happy to know that Coca-Cola was available "way out there".

The small store was fascinating with its well-stocked shelves, old coke box with ice cold drinks, and the best peanut patties for miles around. During the earlier years, Mr. Knowles had sold a lot of lunch meat and sandwich fixings to sawmill workers in the area. I remember noticing the single gas pump in front of the store and thinking how wonderful it was, just in case someone ran out of gas this far away from Bogata.

Driving by the old store recently, I noticed a number of new homes that have been built in the area. I even commented to my sister-in-law, who was riding with me, that I wouldn't mind having a home there now. It's funny how time changes your way of thinking. What seemed like a terrible place to have to live as a teenager, now seems like a desirable, peaceful haven. Who knows, maybe in time

this community and others like it, hustle and bustle of the cities in their may thrive again, as people leave the search for a slower pace of life.

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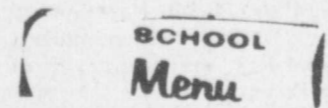

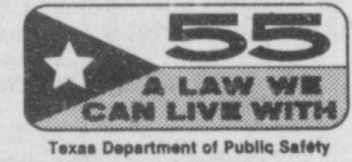
The United Methodist Women met in the Fellowship Hall Monday, November 17 for a program on World Thank Offering with Mrs. Manuel Ruthard as leader.
