Children lie in bed at night with visions of toys, Christmas trees, and Santa Claus flashing before them.

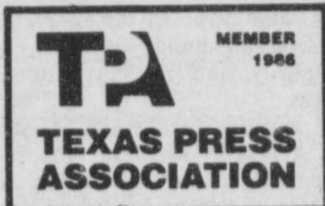

Perhaps it wouldn't hurt to notice them once in a while. To think about these people that are the backbone of the nation, and of the world.

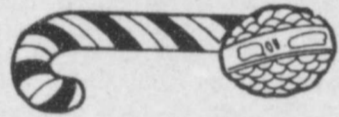
They ask for little, they give more than we realize. They deserve a round of applause.

Rivercrest Splits Victories

The Rivercrest basketball teams split victories with the 4A North Lamar Panthers last Tuesday night. The Rebelettes had to travel to Paris for their contest, only to have the Pantherettes take a 27-22 win. The Rebelettes suffered through a dismal

shooting performance as they connected on only 8 of 48 attempts from the field. Cindy Thompson and Barbi Rackliff led the Rebelette scoring with six points each. Lori Alford followed with four points while Rachael Smith, Rhonda Collins and Lucinda Craig each had two points.

The Rebel varsity stayed home Tuesday to play the Panthers. The Rebels overcame a slow start in the first quarter and only trailed 15-14 at the start of the second quarter. Rivercrest outscored North Lamar 15-10 to give the Rebels a 29-25 lead at the half.

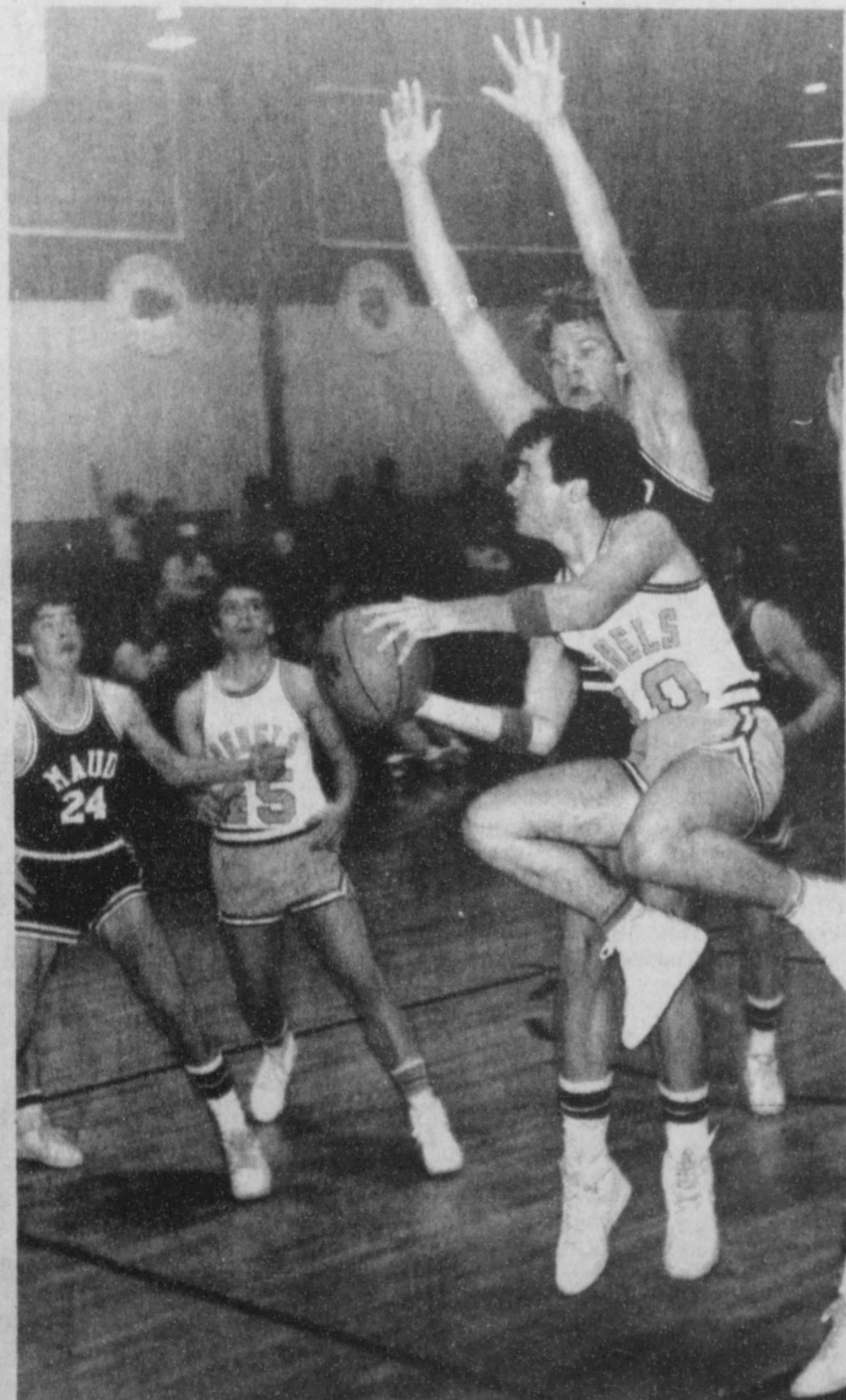
The Panthers opened the second half with a hot hand, as they outscored the Rebs 17-10 during the third quarter. But a 21 point effort by the Rebels in the fourth put Rivercrest ahead as they bounced the Panthers 60-55.

The Rebels shot a blistering 74% from the free throw line. Forward Chris Anderson hit 11 of 12 free throws as he led all scorers with 25 points. Russell Rozell followed with 12 points, Marvin Anderson had eight, Brad Anderson had six, Craig Savage had five and Brad Wood and Wade White each had two.

Friday night, Rivercrest hosted the Maud Cardinals. The Rebelettes opened the varsity action against the previously unbeaten Lady Cardinals. The Rebelettes paid little attention to their opponent's record as they blasted Maud 43-21. A hustling defense shut down the Cardinal offense and opened up the Rebelette offense allowing 8 of 9 Rebelettes in the scoring column. Rhonda Collins led the scoring with 12 points, most of them on fast break lay-ups. Barbi Rackliff had 10 points, Lori Alford had seven, Cindy Thompson had six, Rachael Smith had four, Julie Stewart had two and Kim Clark and Lucinda Craig each had one point.

The Rebels capped off the evening with a thriller over the Maud Cardinals. The Rebels had a tall order to fill, though, as they faced a 6'9" post man. But a super defensive effort by the Rebels slowed down the taller Cardinals. Maud jumped out to an early lead in the first half and led by as much as 10 points once. Rivercrest pulled within four points at the end of the half and pulled ahead in the third quarter.

But the Cardinals kept the contest close and with less than one minute on the game clock, trailed by only one point, 33-32. Critical errors by the Maud team sent the Rebels to the free throw line and put Rivercrest on top for good as Marvin Anderson sank the final basket, giving the Rebs a 38-32 victory.

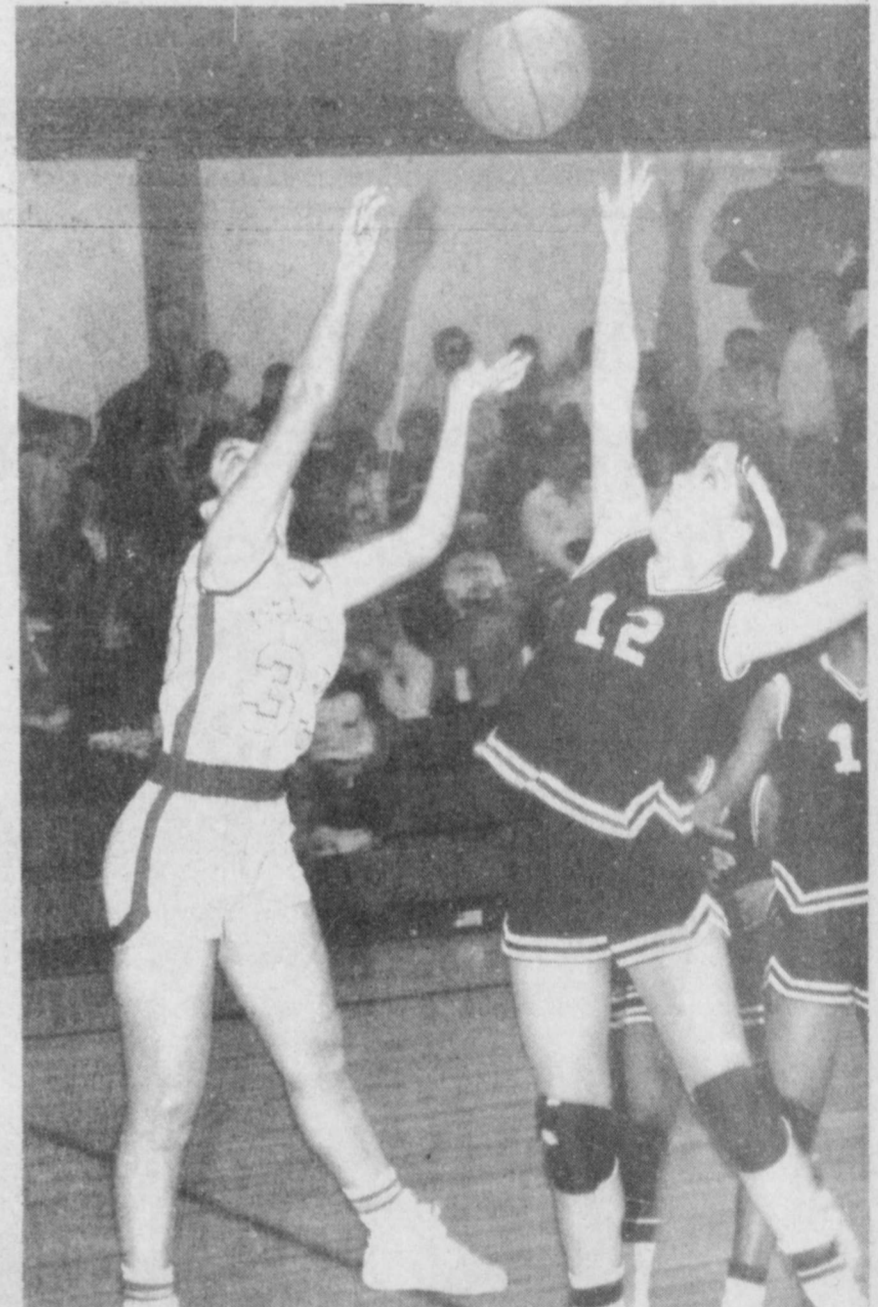

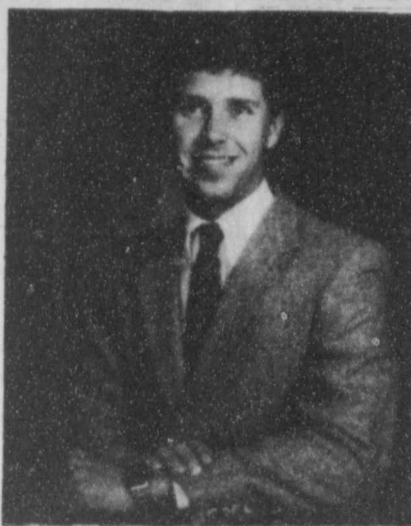

One of the deer tales I heard recently came from my husband's brother-in-law, I'll not mention his name and let you figure him out. The tale goes like this:

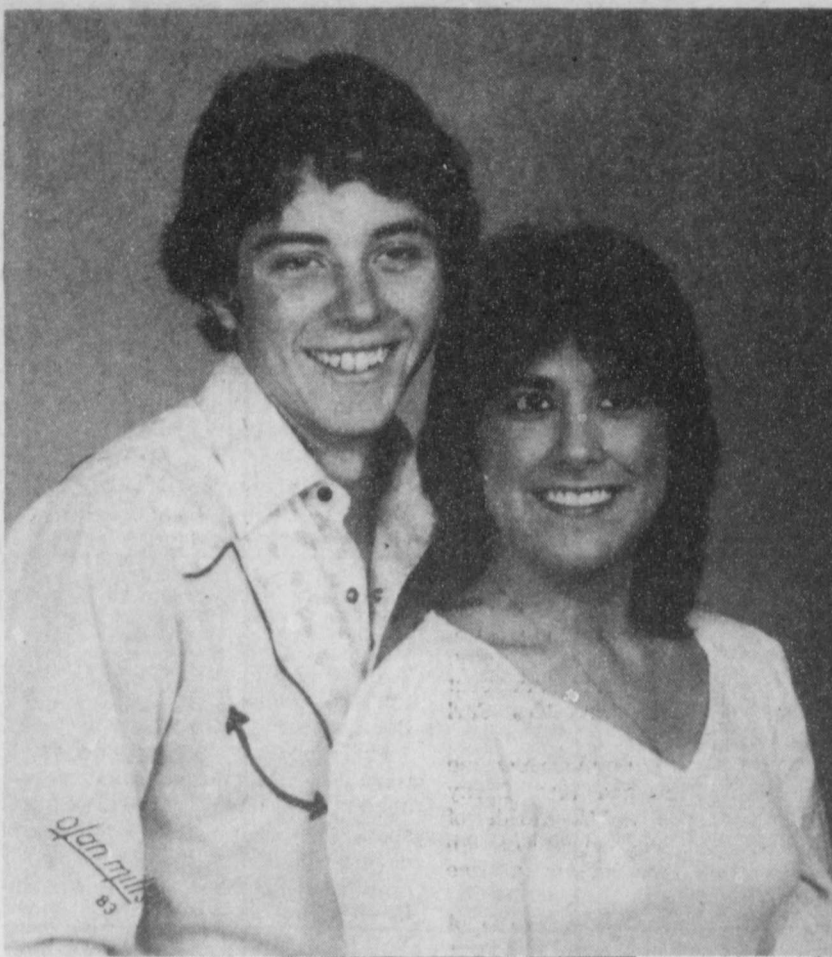

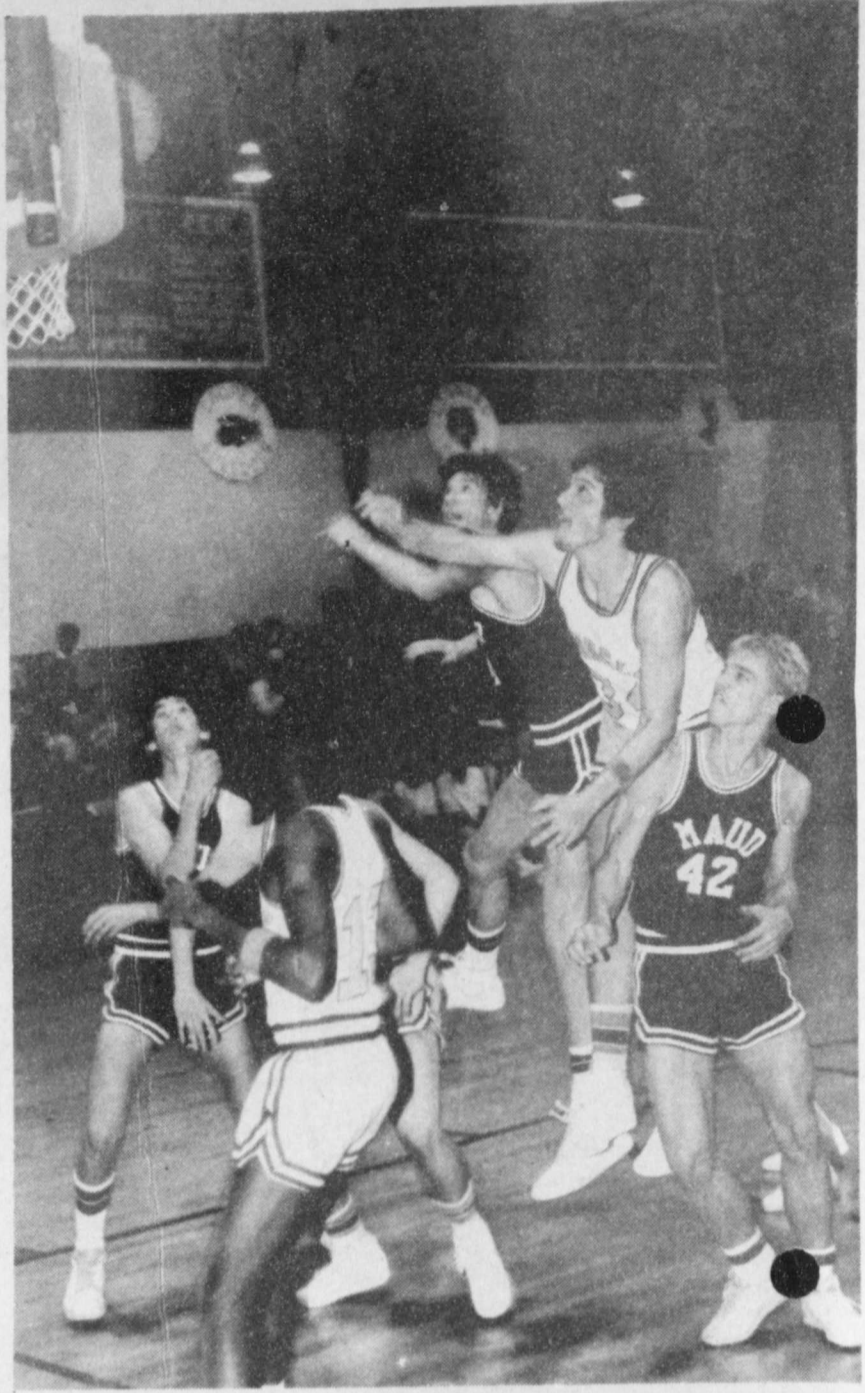

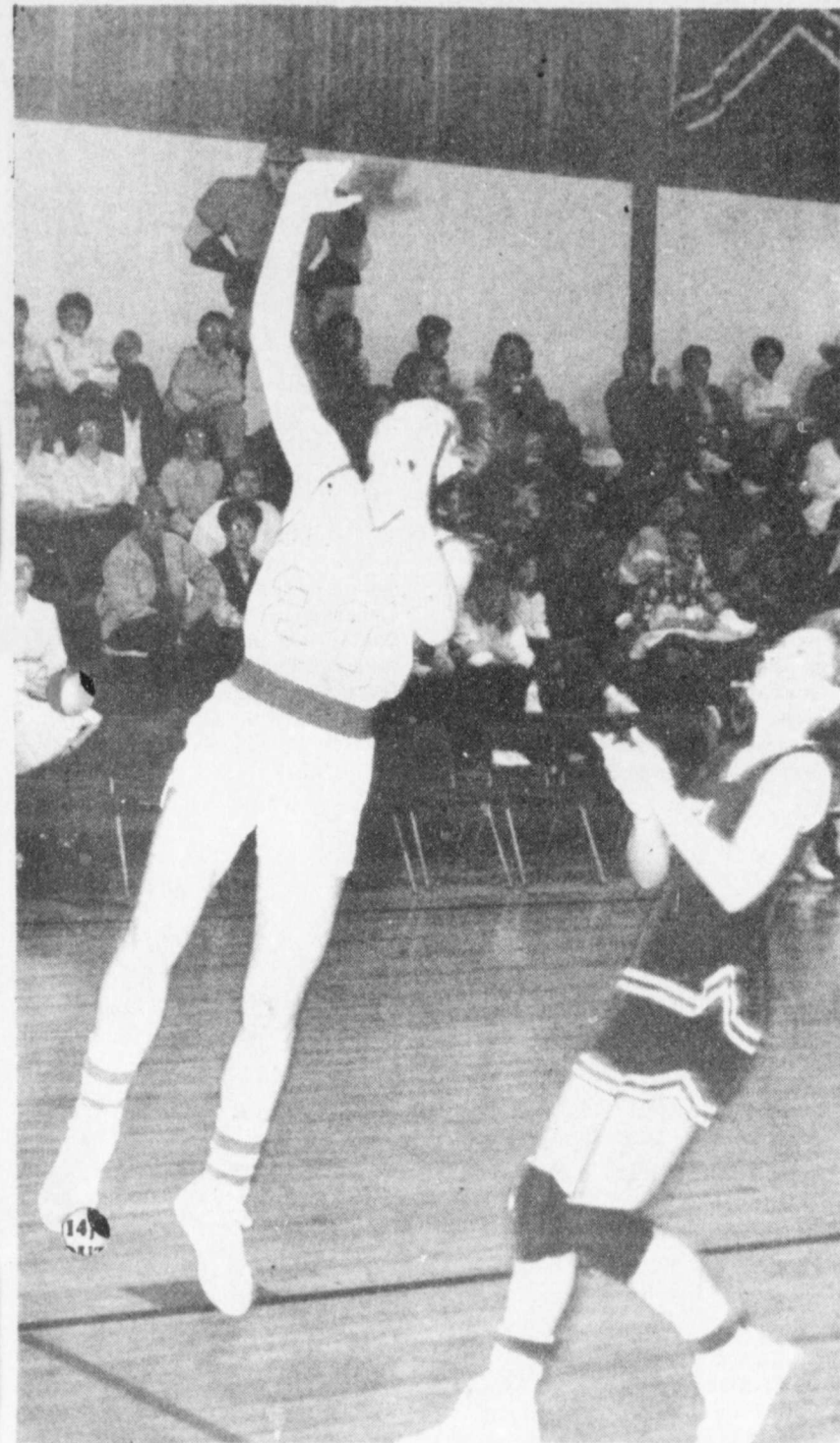

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Stray Dogs Pose Problem At School Campus

The long-time problem of stray dogs in the area has become worse at the school campuses lately. It isn't unusual to see four or five dogs at a time, inside the fenced areas at the Bogata campus, and according to Superintendent of the Talco-Bogata CISD, Harold Cowley, the problem is just as bad around the Talco campus.

As everyone knows, there is great danger in these dogs being around our children. Some of the dogs have diseases, some may become vicious and bite, and all of them have ticks and fleas.

Several mothers have to escort their children to the front door of the school each morning and from the school each evening because of the child's fear of the dogs.

Although more fencing has been added to the Bogata campus, the dogs are still able to enter through the entrance of the fences, "and", stated Mr. Cowley, "the school has no authority to handle this problem".

W.T. Harbison, Bogata City Mayor, said that the city did not have an ordinance to handle this situation. "In

order for the city to handle this problem, it would have to provide a catcher, a truck, and possibly a pound. To do this, there would have to be a tax increase, and" he added, "no one wants that." The Mayor said that the issue had been discussed several times at council meetings, but no solution had been found. He said the only thing that he knew of that could be done at present, is if someone is dog bitten, then the victim can file charges against the owner of the animal.

Talco City Secretary, Jone Clemmons, said the situation was the same in Talco. They have no ordinance and to implement the means to handle the situation would be very costly to the city.

Hopefully, a solution can be found for the handling of this grave problem before one of our children gets seriously sick or hurt, but for the present time, dog owners are urged to keep their pets away from the school campuses, and parents are urged to warn their children about the dangers of petting or teasing any of the animals.
