

Christmas Cards Keep Friendship New

Two special Christmas cards were exchanged in person this year by Mary Jane Lowry of Blossom and Ann Cody of Bogata. The two families have been exchanging Christmas cards for several years, now, not just any cards, but the same two shown in the picture with the ladies. The tradition started in 1963 when Ann Cody, her husband, Bill, and daughter, Janette, mailed a card to Wilford and Mary Jane Lowry and their daughter, Janie. And Mrs. Lowry had been former students of Mr. and Mrs. Cody. The next year, the Cody's received the card back with this ver-

typed on it: "We hope that you'll be happy and not raise a fuss. About us sendin' this card that last year you sent us. It meant so very much to us, you must have liked it, too. And so, we just enclose our love and sent it back to you!"

The Cody's stored the card and the next year returned it with a duplicate of the little verse typed and enclosed. In 1966, the Lowry's again sent it to the Cody's.

In 1967, Mary Jane thought it was their year and couldn't find the card, so she mailed a new one saying, "Starting over in 1967; we still love

you, the Lowrys." The old card and the new card crossed in the mails that year, and have been doing so every year since.

Each year a new note is added to the cards. Reading these cards is like reading through the personal diaries of the Lowrys and the Codys. The notes relay messages of happiness and cheer, but also of sadness.

In 1968, the Lowrys had two little Indian girls from Goodland Orphanage in their home for the holidays, and the old card was signed, "We include our two Christmas girls, Ada and Daisy in our 1968 greeting."

By 1969, Janette Cody was away

from home and the card from the Codys read, "From the two of us, Merry Christmas, Ann and Bill". The Lowrys sent greetings from Ada again and another little Indian girl named Barbara.

Just before Christmas in 1970, Mary Jane sent a little note to the Paris News about the card exchange, and it was printed on the editorial page. The greetings from the Codys that year read, "Bless you for getting us all on the editorial page in 1970. At last we made the headlines!"

In 1971, the Lowrys had only Ada. Greetings from the Codys included only Ann and Bill and there wasn't

much space left on the two cards to write their messages.

In 1972, the Codys were suffering some rough times with Mr. Cody's heart ailment. They wrote that year, "What an inspiration you have been to us this year. Your courage and your faith have helped us through our darkest hours. May the Lord bless you and keep you, The Codys."

In 1973, Ann Cody had sadly written, "I love you both, Merry Christmas, Ann."

In 1974, the Lowrys signed the card, "Wilford, Mary Jane, Janie, Mike and Ginni". Ginni was the new granddaughter.

Mrs. Cody was happy to add her granddaughter's name, Suzette, to the card in 1975, as she was staying with Mrs. Cody that year.

A grandson, Ryan Michael was added to the signatures of the Lowrys in 1976.

Through the remaining years, the notes express wishes for happiness, plans for the Christmas holidays, and plans for the coming year. This year, 1986, will mark the 23rd year that the cards have carried the Christmas greetings and personal messages of the two families. Both ladies say that their children still enjoy reading the cards when they come home for the Christmas holidays.

Here at Christmas, when organizations are helping the less fortunate, and people try to share in their abundance, people really don't want to hear unpleasant facts.

There are those who will disregard this column for another reason...they don't think animals are important.

Animal dumping seems to be getting worse and worse. Living on rural farm to market roads, many people are aware of just how many pathetic bits of animal flotsam are abandoned.

Why would anyone dump a kitten barely old enough to be weaned on the theory that "cats can take care of themselves". Cats can, to some extent, but tiny kittens cannot fend for themselves anymore than a small child can.

Dogs have even fewer options. By nature a pack animal, they cannot hunt to survive alone.

As an example, last summer on the road to Detroit four white, curly puppies were sitting on a lonely stretch of road, watching the world go by with slightly bewildered expressions.

Since I had a carload of elderly women, I couldn't stop. On the return trip, one was already crushed in the road and the others were becoming hotter and more confused by the minute.

Friends with a pickup returned to the scene, but were unable to locate the abandoned pups, who had apparently wandered off into the woods looking for food.

These animals were not picked up by someone. No magic house appeared to offer them food and shelter. That only happens rarely. Most probably, they starved. The one that was run over was probably the luckiest of the four.

We have kittens and cats dumped on us with startling regularity. We feed them, doctor them and hopefully find homes for them. Sometimes they never make it to our door, though, being run over or caught by coyotes before they can locate a haven.

It seems cruel to kill a puppy or kitten, or take it to a shelter or pound. But a quick, painless death is so preferable to a lingering death due to exposure and starvation.

People sometimes just don't realize that a puppy or kitten can be so much trouble, or that they will grow up so large.

Others don't like the idea of having them "put to sleep".

But please, people, it's so much better than dumping.

The best solution is neutering of animals so that they don't continue to add to an already overfull population. Next to that, take them to a shelter or pound, or to the vet for a quick needle or painless death.

People who really think about it will do it...they won't dump anymore.

Of course, there are always those who simply don't care. And a few nights being freezing cold and death-brink hungry probably wouldn't change THEIR minds.

And to those of you who take proper care of their pets, and never dump them on the sides of the road...a special blessing to each and every one of you.

Joe Bob Johnson Resigning Coaching

Joe Bob Johnson, nephew of Nadine Caldwell of Talco, is resigning as head football coach at Lake Highlands High School in Richardson. Five years ago, Johnson led the school to the 5A State Championship. The decision came after the Wildcats' 2-8 season, only the fourth losing season under Johnson.

Johnson says, "This program has

been on top of the mountain, we have been in the middle. It's hard to get the program back where it should be after seeing things slip. I think it is best for the players that I resign at this time."

Johnson was coach of the Wildcats for 12 years with a 72-5-3 record. Johnson plans to continue with

Richardson ISD, and has asked for reassignment.

His father, the late Cecil Johnson, played football for the Talco Trojans. "I haven't missed a high school or college game in 40 years," says Johnson. "It's going to be strange without Friday night games."

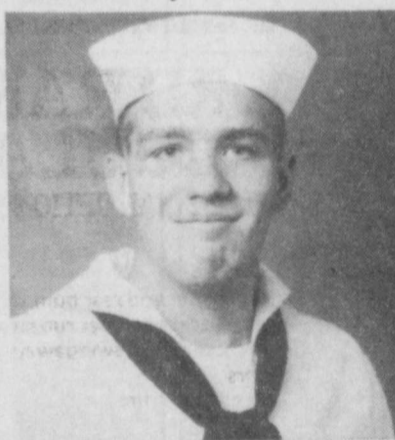
