## Red River County Soccer Association Forming

The newly formed Red River County Soccer Association has nearly one hundred boys and girls signed up for the first season scheduled to begin in March, according to Robin Harris, president of the organization. The association has over twenty-five who have volunteered to coach the teams and referee the games.

Ages range from 4 to 13 with teams divided as follows: under 6 years of age; under 8; under 10; under 12; and under 14. Officials of the organization plan to have 10 members per team

and need others to sign up in order to have a more competitive season.

More members are needed in all age groups, especially the older boys and girls, Harris said. Another registration is planned for January 20 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the First Federal Savings and Loan Community Room in Clarksville for those who missed the earlier registration, but would like to play soccer.

Anyone who registers on January 20 will need to bring with them a copy to their child's birth certificate, \$10.00 to cover the registration fee, and \$6.00 for the uniform shirt.

The uniform that has been planned for the first season is blue jeans, a soccer shirt and shin guards. The shin guards are inexpensive and slip in the socks to protect the players. Soccer shoes and ball are available in local stores if anyone wants to purchase them, but they are optional.

Committees are already busy preparing for the first season. The association is glad to be able to offer this program for the youth of Red River County.

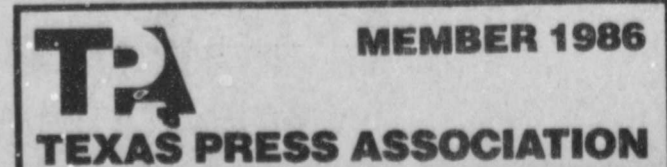

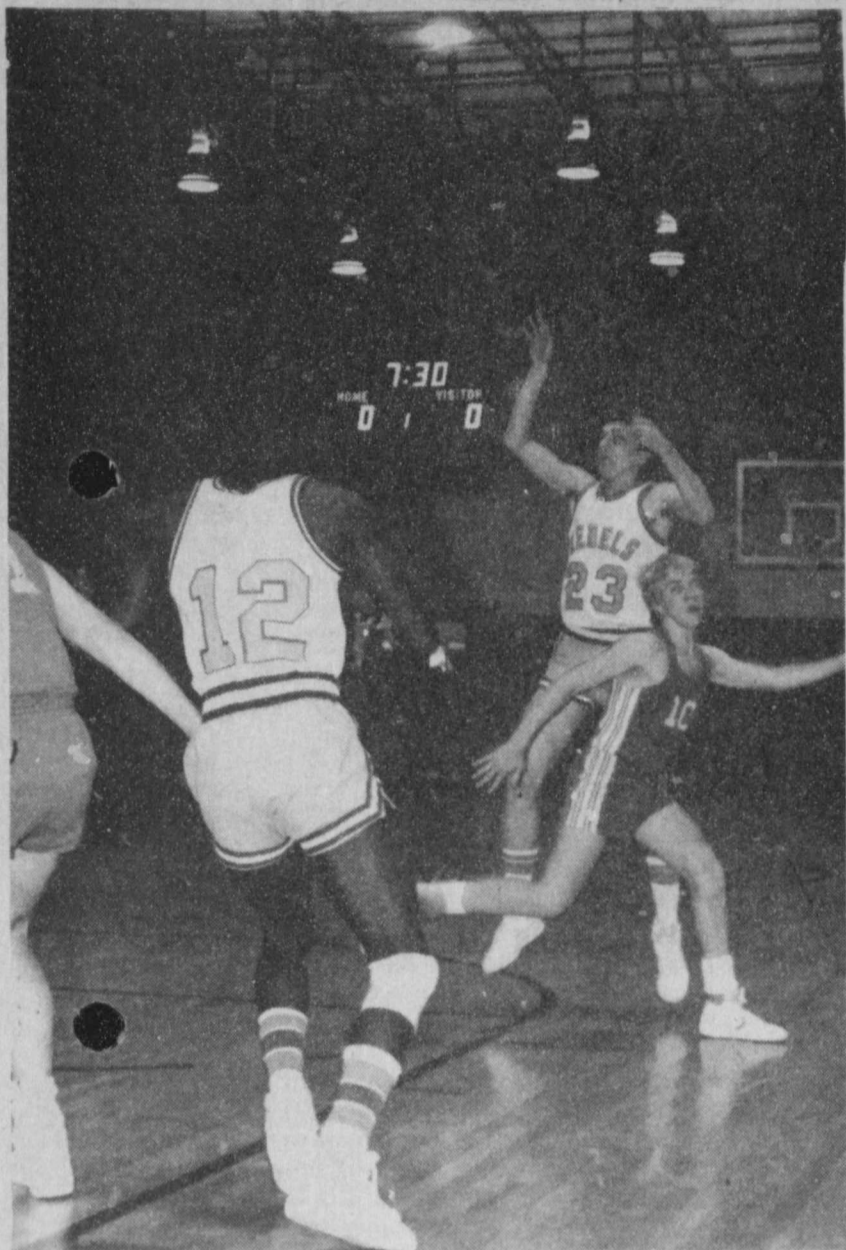

## Area Wheat Has Problems

Much of the area wheat looks sick and is suffering from a number of problems. The most pronounced symptom is yellow leaves. It is my opinion that much of the yellow leaf situation can be attributed to the saturated soil condition.

We have been experiencing a similar situation annually with some years being worse than others. We have brought all kinds of experts to the county to examine the plants and soil and have never been able to officially diagnose the cause. It has been my observation in the past that these affected plants overcome the yellowing at a later stage with no apparent reduction in yield.

Rust and septoria can be found on some wheat in the county. Plant Pathologist at Texas A&M University do not recommend chemical application at this time of the year.

Even though a chemical application is not suggested, producers should inspect their wheat for disease signs. One will find that not all varieties have rust or septoria. These differences should be noted and referred to next fall when selecting varieties at planting time.

If plants or tillers are being lost, then one should suspicion the Hessian Fly. The flaxseed form of the insect should be present at ground level of the wheat plants. To find them, pull the leaf structure away from the stalk and this should expose the brown flaxseed appearing form of the insect. No insecticide is suggested for this problem, but this could explain some of one's wheat problem.

There are a number of soil borne disease problems that could be causing some of the problems. One should particularly suspect some of these if wheat has been planted on the same ground for a number of years. Crop rotation is the number one management practice used to reduce these disease problems.

It is my problem that about three weeks of rain free weather would do more to correct the present wheat situation than any other thing.

This past week I was privileged to

participate in the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago as a representative of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents.

We are extremely proud of our association with the 4-H Club program as a mold of young men and women. As a former delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress as a 4-H member, I am convinced that much of whatever success I have attained can be directly attributed to my 4-H Club work.

The Rebelettes trailed only 11-8 at

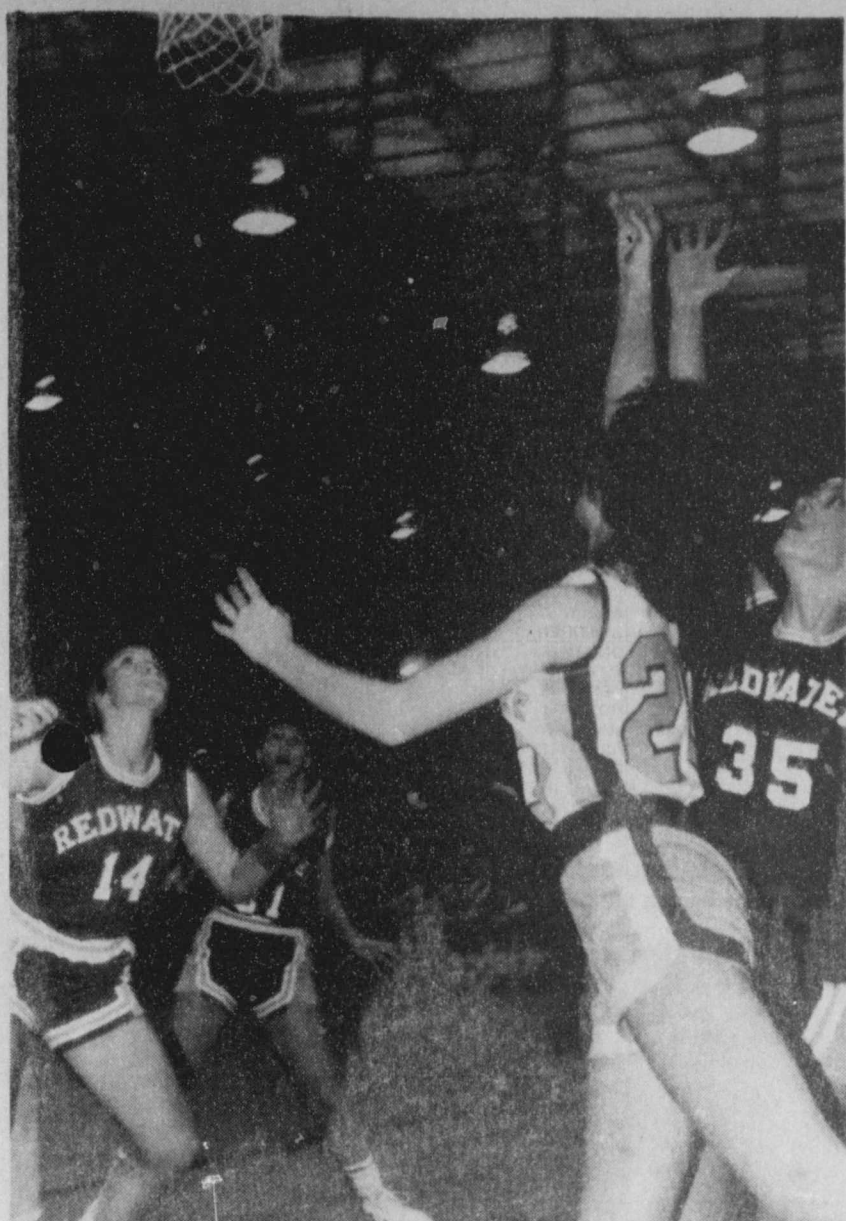

## Tax Laws, Here Are A Few Answers

By Paul D. Payne

There is a saying, "There are two certainties in this life, death and taxes." That continues to be true and we as individuals have very little control over either. We are always reminded of the latter around the first of the year when an income tax packet is left in our mailbox.

Much has been said about the new income tax law and many of the articles written for journals and newspapers have many of us thinking that all of the changes take place with the tax report that will be prepared this winter. This is not true and the following discussion will summarize those changes in the 86 report form.

Land clearing expenditures. You may not deduct expenses you pay or incur after December 31, 1985 for clearing land for farming. This is a change from previous years.

Prepaid farm expenses. If you use the cash method of accounting to report your income and expenses and certain of your prepaid farm expenses exceed fifty percent of your other deductible farm expenses, the rules for farming syndicates may apply to limit your deductions for some of the prepaid expenses. This provision applies to expenses paid or incurred after March 1, 1986.

Investment credit. More agricultural producers will be affected by this change this year than any other. The regular investment credit generally has been repealed for property placed in service after 1985. However, you may still claim credit for certain property placed in service in 1986 if on December 31, 1985 you had a binding written contract for its acquisition, construction or reconstruction. Very few producers can qualify, so we can just about safely say that there is no more invest-

ment credit. Investment credit is still available to landowners who forest or reforest property held for growing trees for sale or use in the commercial production of timber products.

Depreciation. Very little change in this area, but there will be major changes on property placed in service after December 31, 1986. However, some property put into service after July 31, 1986, may be placed on the modified accelerated cost recovery system.

These are the major changes that agricultural producers will face when completing the income tax forms this winter. For a further discussion of these and other points, one should read the "Farmer's Tax Guide" which is available from our office. These may be picked up in room 105

of the County Courthouse.

A very fine agricultural information meeting will be held in Waco on January 13, the theme for the meeting is "Tools for Profitability".

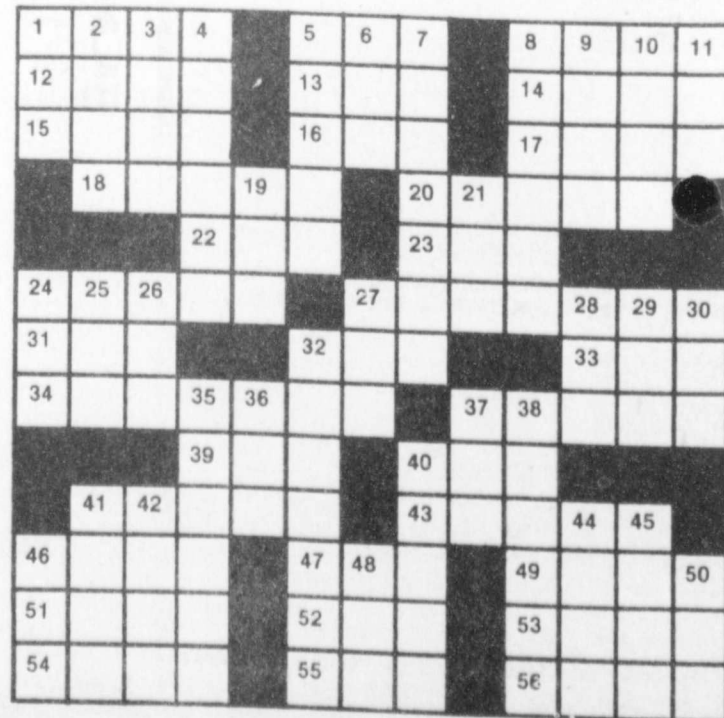
The program will be held in the Waco Convention Center beginning at 9 a.m. A list of subject topics covered in the morning session include Agricultural Foreign Trade Policy, Agricultural Financing, 87, and the New Tax Laws and Keeping Beef in the Market Place.

In the afternoon session, producers may elect to attend one of four task force in-depth programs. These include cotton, grain, beef cattle and forage and horse. The meeting should provide an excellent opportunity for individuals to update their knowledge and skills.

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### health hints

**Migraine**  
According to various estimates, from five to ten percent of the population may have migraine headaches.

According to Dennis Graham, D.O., Chairman of Neurology, Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, a migraine headache usually starts on one side of the head, and, as a rule, remains one-sided. It may, however, change sides from one attack to another. The pain of a migraine can debilitate the sufferer to the point at which he or she can no longer function. There are two major types of migraine headache.

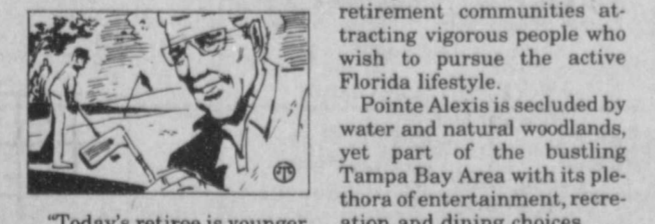
According to Dr. Graham, an osteopathic physician, "common" and "classic" migraine are differentiated by the presence or absence of symptoms prior to the onset of the headache. The most prevalent type of migraine is a common migraine. Common migraine does not have an obvious dramatic period before the headache starts. However, many people do have a vague, uneasy or irritable feeling.

Classic migraine is characterized by a ten to thirty minute warning period, which signals the oncoming headache. The victim may see flashing lights, zig zagging lines, or areas of total darkness. There may be tingling of the lips, face or hands; weakness of an arm or leg; loss of appetite, slight speech abnormality, confusion, restlessness.

Keep a detailed record of your attacks; note times, diet, odors, emotions, onset, duration, prevalence. Some headache remedies are prophylactic, and are used to prevent migraine headaches. Other medication is used to abort the attack once it has begun. Always follow your physician's instructions and take your medication as directed.
