## Tornado Destroys Grocery, Barns

The infamous "freight train" roar of a tornado woke many Deport and Cunningham residents at 1:30 a.m.

Tuesday, March 17, as the twister ripped from the southwest to the northeast, leaving a path of destruction

behind, but no injuries. Setting down at Cunningham, the twister hurled a tractor shed belong

ing to James Norwood into the home of Eugene Norwood, damaging the house and a pickup belonging to the latter Norwood.

spared completely through the front wall of the building, giving mute testimony to the awesome power of the tornado.

It apparently touched down again at the home of the Mac Webbs, destroying two large trees and damaging a garage and the house itself.

Another barn, this one belonging to Larry Whittle of Deport, was completely destroyed during the storm.

From there, it heavily damaged a hay barn belonging to Fred Swint of Deport. The huge structure, once a cotton storage warehouse, contained approximately 20,000 square bales of hay, and received serious damage.

The twister followed closely the same path as a previous tornado, which occurred on April 25, 1982, and destroyed several barns.

Across Highway 271, the twister slammed into the Quickie Superette Grocery, where the largest property loss occurred. The Quickie Superette exploded, with the back wall blowing out and the roof collapsing.

High winds and torrential rains accompanied the massive storm pattern which swept through the northeast Texas area, and these "straight" winds tore sheet metal and shingles loose, too. Power crews worked through the dark to re-establish electricity to Deport, which had a power outage of a four hour duration.

## A Town By Another Name - A Story Of Talco

I've always liked the name Talco. It is the place where I grew up, and it just sounds right. It brings back memories of friends, school, the smell of fresh oil and the far-away squeaking of a pumping oilwell jack.

There was a Goldsboro, Texas, and mail addressed to the two towns was continually getting mixed and mis-sent. Finally, the long-suffering post office department got all it wanted of re-sending mail, and notified the postmaster at Goldsboro that his office would have to change its name. He was asked to submit a list of suggested names, from which one would be approved.

The postmaster, being democratic by nature, decided to leave it up to the local residents, and went to the front porch of the store where a group of men, known as the local "Spit and Whittle Club", were gathered.

I've especially liked the name, Talco Trojans. Maybe it's because I was one, or maybe it's just the sound of the two names together that bring back the memories of the Ole Red and Blue. In any case, I just like the sound, "Talco Trojans".

The postmaster, being democratic by nature, decided to leave it up to the local residents, and went to the front porch of the store where a group of men, known as the local "Spit and Whittle Club", were gathered. Several names were suggested, including the name, Francis, honoring Francis McClain, a local resident. But it so happened that there was another post office in Texas named Francis, and that was ruled out.

One day last week I was driving down Highway 290, on Austin's southwest side, when I pulled along side of a tractor-trailer rig. It had the name "Talco-Mix Products, Inc." on it. It was from Marshall, Minn. and it's products are some kind of feed additives, according to the signs on the trailer.

Finally, one of the men, noticing the trade mark on a goods box in the store said, "Why not call it Talco?" It was possibly Dallas Fry who suggested the name, old-timers say. The name, it is believed, was an abbreviation and stood for Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana Co. In any case, Talco was included in the list, and Talco it was when the

Seeing this merchants name and advertisements on the side of that truck and trailer put me to thinking about how Talco got its name.

Shinola, Texas. This brings to mind a place of spit-n-polish, a shiny place of mirrored images...Nope, our town was clean, but not that clean.

Goldsboro was the name of a community located about one and one-half miles east of the present site of Talco. They moved the old Goldsboro store to where Talco is today and along with it came the name.

Shake N Bake, Texas. Here one thinks of a seaside village with fun places and sun bathed beaches...won't work...we only had Whiteoak and Sulphur River bottoms.

Fruit of the Loom, Texas. Can you imagine, but for a quirk of fate, I might have played football for the "Fruit of the Loom Fruit Loops".....NEVER!!

Thank you, Mr. Fry for choosing the name TALCO and I'm glad that I was a Talco Trojan.

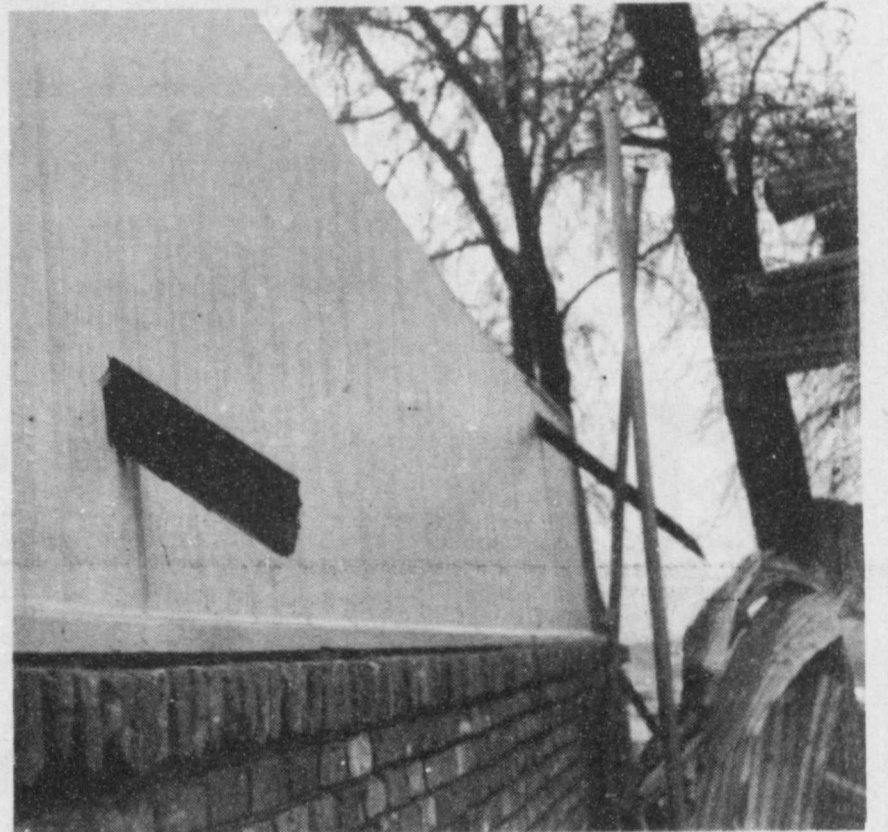



### Talco-Bogata Schools To Initiate Testing

The spring testing program, under the direction of Bonnie Huddleston, guidance counselor, will be underway in the next few weeks.

Talco, Bogata and Rivercrest grades 2,4,6,8 and 10 will give the California Achievement Test (CAT) during the first two weeks in April. On each campus, the classroom teachers administer the achievement tests and will be able to use the information gained from test results in many ways. Test scores will be returned to the schools in approximately four weeks. Parents and students alike may see these test results by appointment, as the information is processed and placed in each student's permanent record.

Along with the regular testing program, the state mandated Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) has been, or will be, administered to grades 1,3,5,7,9 and 11. The eleventh graders were given the TEAMS exit level test on October 4 and 5, 1986. This exit level test, which is required for graduation, will be administered again in May for any eleventh grader not showing mastery and again during the senior year, if necessary. Grades 3,5,7 and 9 were given the TEAMS test in February, and first graders will be tested in April. TEAMS test results will also be available to parents, teachers and students involved. The spring schedule of testing events is as follows:

March 31-April 1-Grade 10, Rivercrest Achievement Tests, Periods 1-3, Cafeteria (2 days).

April 7-8-9-Grades 2,4,6 and 8, Bogata Elementary Achievement Tests, (three mornings).

April 7-8-9-Grades 2,4,6 and 8, Talco Elementary Achievement Tests, (three mornings).

April 6-17-TEAMS test for Grade 1 on Talco and Bogata campuses (exact dates to be posted).

May 5-6-TEAMS Exit Level Test for Juniors, Second Administration, Rivercrest, May 5-English Lang. Arts, May 6-Mathematics.

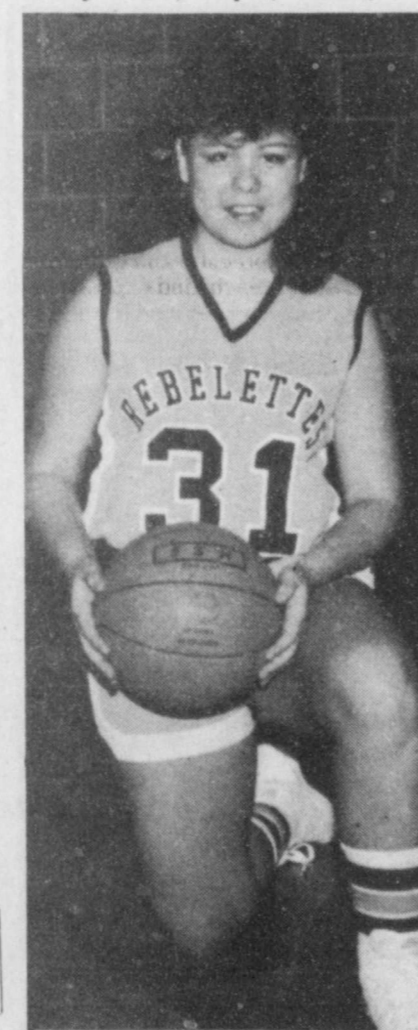
### Barbi Rackliff In All-Star Game
