
He couldn't move, he was laughing so hard. He couldn't breath, he was haw-hawing so fast! If looks could kill, he assures me

## School Board City Council Elections Set

Voters will go to the polls Saturday, April 4 to cast their ballots in the elections for City Council and Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees. Voters will also have the opportunity to vote for or against a 1/2% County Sales and Use Tax to be used to reduce the county property tax rate. Talco voters will also vote on Board members for the Titus County Memorial Hospital.

In the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees election, the terms of Dr. E.E. Brooks, Jim Carroll and Billy Daniels are expiring. One trustee is to be elected from the Bogata area for a three-year term and one trustee is to be elected for a one-year term and may be from the Bogata or Talco area, according to the number of votes received. Those filing from Bogata are A.D. Stephenson, incum-

bent Billy Daniels, Buford Hervey, graduate of Rivercrest High School Jerry Craig and Jimmy Smith. From Talco, candidates are Johnny Hood, Eddy Brown, Jerry Stansell and Scott

A.D. Stephenson, one of the Bogata candidates, is a graduate of Bogata High School and is retired from the Army Air Corp. He returned to Bogata in 1966. He is married to Miriam Grayson Stephenson and has a son, Mark Stephenson, a 1977



Talco voters will cast their votes for the School Board election at the Talco Elementary building and Talco City Hall will be the voting place for the tax proposal, City Council, and Hospital Board for Titus County Memorial Hospital.

In the Bogata City Council election, three candidates have filed for the expiring terms of Travis Hale, Billie Hervey and A.G. Puckett.

Incumbent Billie Hervey is seeking another term in the election for the Bogata City Council. Billie has lived in Bogata all her life except for a short time she spent working as a construction accountant. She graduated from Bogata High School and attended Paris Junior College, NMA and MA in New Mexico. #### Freeze Damage Being Evaluated

Just how much damage from the freeze was there in the county? This is the question on everyone's mind this week, but we will have to wait a few more days to know the full extend.

It is reasonable to assume that there was damage to the peach crop. Bo Swindle of the Pinhook Orchards reports that there was three hours of 27 degree weather at his place Monday night. However, the snow began falling at that time and may have provided some protection from the cold. We generally think that fruit once they have reached the present size, can stand 28 degree weather.

The concern of most growers on Monday, was the predicted cold temperatures on Monday night. I think we can safely say that the fruit crop has been damaged, but will just have to wait a few days to determine the extent of the damage.

One can determine freeze damage to the fruit by waiting for about three days and cutting some of the fruit with a sharp knife. If the middle is brown or dark, it is ruined.

The freeze damage to area wheat could be a major problem. We are in a marginal situation according to Dr. Travis Miller, Agronomist for Texs A&M. Wheat that is about ready to head can be frozen and result in sterile heads. If the temperature drops below the 28 to 30 degree range, the damage could be quite severe.

To determine freeze damage in wheat, one should wait about three days and examine the fruit. One should look for frozen tissue. It will be brown and water soaked.





#### Vocational Ag Response To Challenge

Vocational agriculture responded to the challenge by the State Board of Education to "fix" their program, by developing and introducing a new, modernized, agricultural sciences and technologies curriculum to the

In order to embrace the new world of agriculture and to prepare students for the new knowledge and opportunities available in agriculture, the 70-year old vocational agriculture program in Texas is having to change and update, said Jay Eudy, Director of Agricultural Education, Texas **Education Agency** 

Technologies and applications in agriculture are changing rapidly, therefore, the education in high schools should also modernize, said

In order to compete with the rapid changes in the agricultural industry, vocational agriculture is in the process of totally revamping its entire

If accepted by the Stte Board of Education, production agriculture will no longer be listed in high school curriculum guides. Instead, the new agricultural sciences and technologies curriculum will take its

Development of this new curriculum began in January with a week-long advisory committee meeting, at the Instructional Materials Service Center in College Station, and will continue in the development phase for the next few months.

'Changes had to be made," said Eudy, "and to initiate those changes, we brought together the Who's Who of agricultural education as an advisory committee.'

During the week-long meeting with 53 of the leaders in the agricultural industry, a discussion draft of the new proposed curriculum was completed. Public hearings are currently being held on the discussion draft to explain and discuss the proposed curriculum and to receive feedback from those directly involved in the program.

Remaining dates of public hearing are February 17 in San Antonio, February 18 in Lubbock and February 24 in Ft. Worth. A state public hearing will be held April 23 and 24 in Austin.

If the proposed curriculum receives approval at these public hearings, and also from the Texas Education

Agency and the State Board of Educa- technology and floral design would be tion, then it could go into effect as a pilot program as early as September

"This new proposed program will be characterized by its flexibility to adapt to the needs of the individual student," said Eudy.

Instead of a full credit program, this new curriculum will be based on a semester credit, said Eudy.

"We're basing this new program on the assumption that the courses will be selected in accordance with the students' individual career goals,"

Replacing the traditional courses of production agriculture will be instruction encompassing the areas in agricultural science, agricultural production, agricultural mechanics, agricultural services and supplies, horticulture, agricultural business and management, agricultural products and processing and renewable natural resources.

"Individual school districts will be able to select the major courses of instruction which they feel will be most appropriat, e based on the community and most beneficial to the needs of the individual students," said Eudy.

"By restructuring and modernizing, we are designing a program to attrack a group of students who aspire a career in agriculture or who aspire to simply learn about agriculture for avocational reasons," said Eudy.

Twenty-five semester-length courses, under the nine major areas of instruction, have been designed as elective offerings to the student. The first two courses are designed to introduce students to the world of agriculture and the basic applications in agricultural sciences

technologies. The remaining courses are specialty courses, designed to give the student a greater understanding and concept of a more narrow subject matter in a particular agricultural field, said Eudy.

For example, an urban high school might offer instruction in horticulture. A student desiring a career in the horticulture industry could choose the following courses over a four year period.

In the freshman year, introduction to world agricultural sciences and technologies and applied agricultural sciences and technologies would be taken as electives. During the sophomore year, plant production

#### junior year, a student could complete courses in nursery production and landscape design, construction and maintenance. Finally, during the senior year, classes in horticulture and business management and marketing and entrepreneurship in agriculture could be taken as

"This restructuring and modernizing of the program is a giant step in a positive direction," said Eudy. "Optimism is high and there is excitement about the future. The feeling is that the agricultural education program in the public schools in Texas will continue and will improve and will surpass the excellence of the past decades," said Eudy.

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

#### The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department - A Community Asset Since 1936

The Bogata Fire Department was organized in 1937 with Claude Thompson as Fire Chief. Some of the others who pledged their supprt in combatting fires in the area as members of that first organization were John Speir, Ois Swaim, Tobe King, M.A. Ferguson, Richard Dozier, Delbert

Puckett, Charlie Summers and A.G. Puckett.

According to charter member A.G. Puckett, the first fire truck was an International purchased from E.G. Hutchings Hardware in Bogata, and was quite a fancy rig for its day. Chief Thompson was the water superinten-

building just back of the present Fire Station was used as the station for the first fire department.

Mr. Puckett recalls an extremely cold night when the home of Charlie Summers caught fire and Summers ran to the station without a shirt on

dent for the City of Bogata, and he also took the fire calls. The old remembers the Bogata Fire Department being called to the Talco Refinery fire somewhere around 1938. 'We were assigned to keep the fire from coming down the creek", recalled Puckett.

On July 30, 1937, a letter from the Director of Firemen's Training School at College Station was sent to the Bogat Mayor and Fire Chief congratulating the city on its progressive administration in realizing the imortance of a trained and efficient fire department in protecting the lives and property of its citizens. The letter stated that Bogata had been ably represented at the five day training course by representatives Billy Proctor and Athan Woods. Another letter dated July 30, 1938 lists Billie Proctor and A.C. Thompson as representtives and those training in July of 1939 were Randle Hunt, W.H. Montgomery and A.C. Thompson. Montgomery and Thompson again received the training in 1940 and 1941. Others in 1941 were C.W. Littles and W.H. Thompson. In 1946, James Montgomery and C.E. Summers represented Bogata at the training and in 1947, Doyle Glover and Roy Littles attended the

Mr. Kelly became the Fire Chief shortly after World War II. Sometime later, the Fire Department disbursed

and was reorganized at a later date with Malcolm Hignight as Fire Chief and Joe Ford became the Assistant Fire Chief. This was somewhere around 1952 and no one remembers another Fire Chief until Roy Lee Hutson became chief in 1964.,

Joe Ford recalls that while Hignight was chief, the hosue of Tobe King caught fire in the middle of a very cold, freezing night. The firemen rushed to the scene to provide their services, only to realize the water hoses were all frozen. "Needless to say, " says Ford, "all we saved was the lot.

A drill report submitted by Chief Hignight in 1955 states that during the months of August and September, city officials had asked the department not to use any water for drill purposes due to water shortage. Several reports of fires at the cotton gin were reported through the years.

Roy Lee Hutson served on the Fire Department for 28 years and served as Chief for 15 of those years. New equipment and trucks were added to the department during his service.

"We had several big ones during my time as Chief," recalls Hutson. 'One of the biggest was the night Pete Johnson's Grocery Store burned. We worked all night and that's the night the local barber got the end of his finger cut off fighting the fire.'

Mr. Hutson retired from the Fire Depatment to take the job of ambulance driver in 1977. Bernie Hud-

dleston then became the Fire Chief and is presently serving in that position. The Fire Department boasts 21 men, three trucks, a big pumper, a little pumper, and a grass truck. Meetings are still held once a month and the firemen receive regular training. Chief Huddleston states the biggest of fires fought during his service as Chief so far was the First Baptist Church which burned in 1986.

Whether the fire is big or small, near or far, the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department has proven to be quite different in its efforts to protect people and property in this vicinity.
