I noticed the other morning that the mimosa trees are blooming. Lots of people don't really like mimosa trees because they are "messy".

That's a fact no one can argue with, especially if the graceful, oriental looking trees grow over a porch or driveway.

Up north the mimosa is an expensive, difficult to grow specimen, because it is so moisture filled and pithy that it will freeze to death during the bitter northern winters.

Prized as they are up there, they are as prized by me, because I think they are very beautiful, and they also invariably take me back in time.

My grandmother's driveway was lined with them. There is absolutely no telling the number of hours I spent, with friends or by myself, sitting in the shade of mimosa trees, or claiming to be among their conveniently horizontal limbs, playing or reading.

The pink "powder puff" blooms were grouped into playhouse brooms, used as powder puffs on dolls or ourselves, added to mud-pie stews and cakes, or woven into childish hairdos to add what we were sure was a touch of glamor.

I associate them with late evenings, when their perfume was strongest, and when my grandfather drove up the driveway, crushing the blossoms and releasing even more fragrance into the air.

I would always hide among the limbs of the trees, trying to scare or surprise him, but instead coming down with the giggles instead. Calls to come in or to go home would echo up and down the street.

Some evenings my parents and grandparents would sit out on the front porch on Monroe Street, their conversation would drift through my head, mostly uncomprehended, as I played with the mimosa leaves and blossoms.

Later, the "beans" would serve much the same purpose as the blossoms, providing more hours of fun.

To illustrate just how strong sensory suggestions can be, I have now collected a double set of memories.

When, in 1985, I went to Egypt, I walked into the walled compound at Memphis to be greeted by the overwhelmingly homey odor of mimosa blossoms! The trees looked the same, but the blossoms there are green and pale yellow instead of white and pink. Seeing my smiles as I looked upward into the trees, an Egyptian workman leaped into the trees, gathered a handful of the flowers and pressed them into my hand.

Over five thousand miles away from home, I felt "at home" instantly, and carried them around all day long.

Now, whenever the scent of mimosa drifts my way, I am not only carried backward into childhood, but also far away into a distant land!

Our house has no mimosa trees yet, but two are planted, and I look forward to the day when I can sit on my own porch and see the pink cloud of blossoms and smell the pleasant, memory provoking odor of mimosa.

Birds And Animals Play Part In Figueroas Lives

A fascination with the animal world led Mark Figueroa and his family into taxidermy...but a love of animals led them into hosting a home for a wide variety of creatures that are very much alive.

Saturday morning, the family released a dove to the wild after nurturing it for two months. The two boys, Chad, age 12, and Brad, age 10, found the bird with one wing shot away and brought it home. The feathers grew back ever so slowly, and finally the small bird was able to take to the wing once more.

The whole group were beaming happily as they recounted the success.

In the back yard of their Deport residence, there are a number of interesting creatures. A flock of fledgling ducks nibble and quack outside the back door, or play in a plastic child's swimming pool.

Two incredibly ugly young birds scamper through the grass...baby turkeys!

In a pen are a number of Barbados ewes and a magnificently horned ram, shedding away into their slick summer selves.

In spotlessly clean pens are ring-necked pheasants in their colorful brilliance and a ring-necked dove that asks to be put outside every morning...and demands if no one sets him out immediately!

Mark and Kathy share the chores of taking care of all these birds and animals with Kathy's father, Lowell Francis, who lives next door to them.

Lowell has spent a lot of time feeding and talking to four fox squirrels as they run about in the big shade trees overhead. The fat and sassy squirrels are now so tame they will come right up to him, and frisk around his feet as he feeds the sheep.

The boys pitch in to help, too, and take full responsibility for their special pets, the turtles and neon guppies they keep in their rooms.

The domestic ring-necked dove,

George, lives in a roomy bird cage. Every night they set him inside, and in the mornings he begins fluttering

about and cooing, wanting to be set out on the front porch. If no one comes to meet his request, he begins slinging his food out of the cup onto the floor, and will continue to do so until he is set out!

Dominecker hens, roosters and baby chicks stalk the grass for insects.

Mark is an employee of Lone Star Gas Company, but early mornings and late evenings will find him out in the "shed" working on some taxidermy job.

What began as a hobby has turned into a pretty big job. Mark and Kathy joke about how bad his first efforts were. "We had some doves that were so stiff they looked like they were at attention", Kathy laughs. "We threatened to make little soldier suits for them."

Mark has taught himself the skill of taxidermy. He loves to watch animals and then try to make them look lifelike when he mounts them.

Deer heads, raccoons, fish, birds, they all reflect his knowledge of the creature in its natural habitat, and its movements and grace.

Besides the busy schedule of work, Kathy babysits for people, taking care of the yard and animals, and Mark's taxidermy, the couple are very involved in the Little League.

Mark coaches the Deport Pirates team and has served on the Deport Ball Association board, as has Kathy.

They would like, they say, to have their whole back acreage devoted to various animals and birds.

However, many birds, reptiles or animals they have...one thing is sure, they will be tame, well fed and clean.

The Figueroas find their lives enriched by the creatures on their place...and the creatures, if they could, would probably feel the same way.

Students from Bogata making the president's honor list are Doris Fay

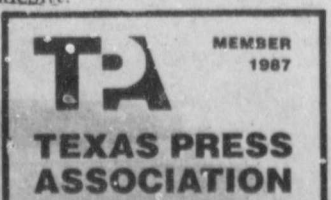
Hanna Alsop, Kathy Darlene White, and Deborah H. Winkler. Making the vice president's list from Bogata is Melanie Bishop Cantrell.

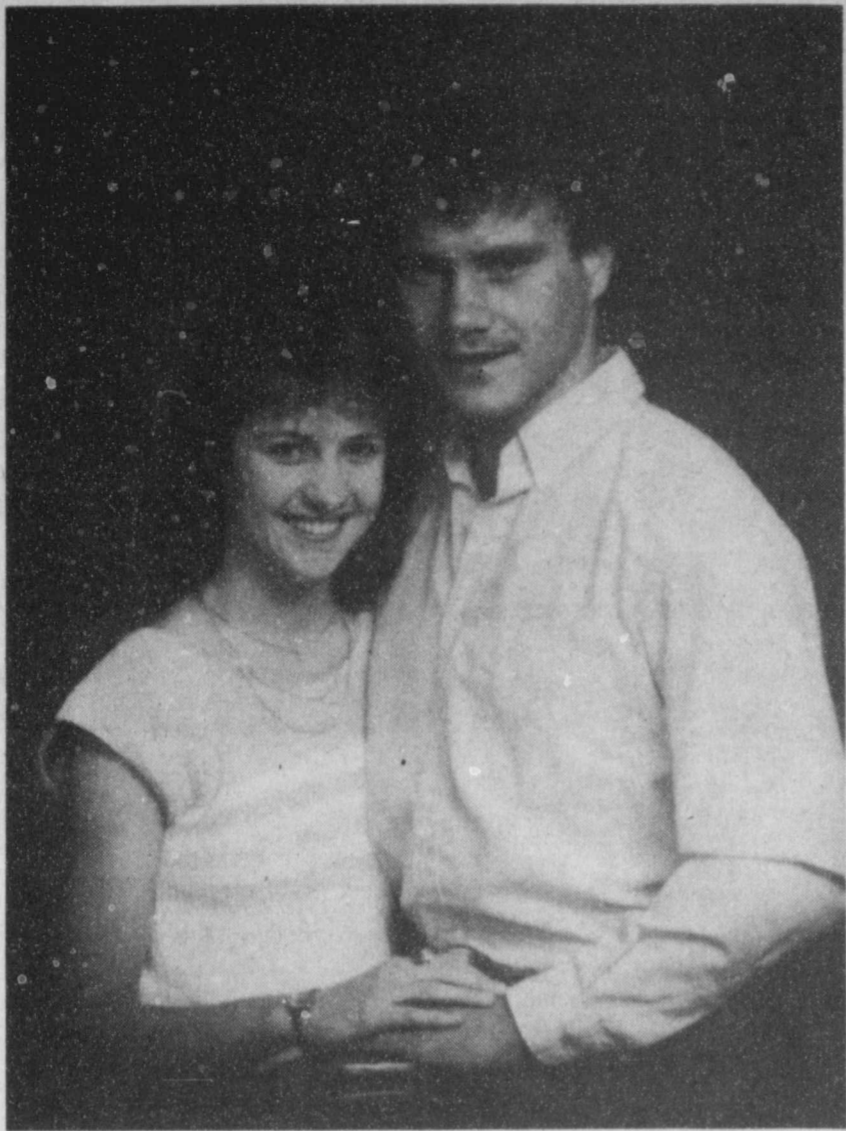

Conditions Good For Weed Control

Since many areas received rainfall, weeds are actively growing in hay meadows and pastures. Most of these weeds are in the growth stage that is ideal for spraying with a herbicide, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist.

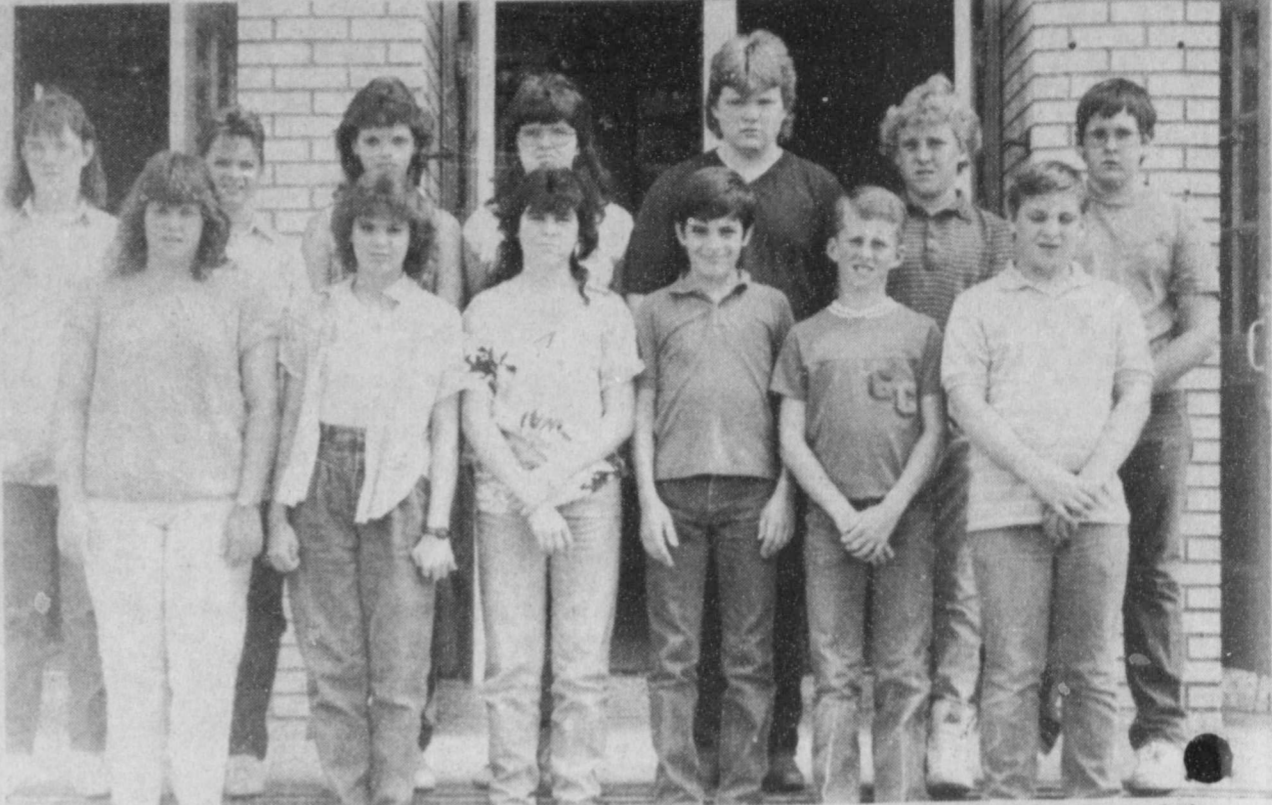
For best results, weeds should be sprayed while they are small and actively growing. For every pound of weeds grown on a given area, at least a pound of grass is lost. Weeds generally have a deeper root system than grasses and therefore are tough competitors for water, light and nutrients.

Several herbicides are available to

control weeds. Consult the label for any grazing restrictions, especially for dairy animals.

Be sure to accurately calibrate the sprayer when applying chemicals. The proper amount of herbicide must be applied for good weed control. Too much herbicide is a waste of money and may not give the desired results. Too little herbicide will not give the desired control.

Reeves says that controlling weeds in pastures and hay meadows results in better returns for dollars spent for fertilizer and management.

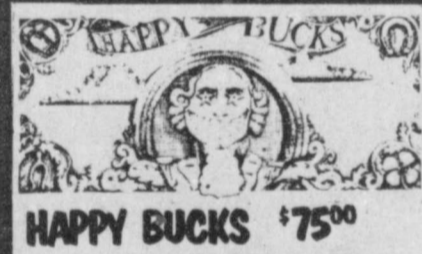
