Little league, girls softball, cub scouts, girl scouts, junior soccer leagues, they are all part of the active life in smaller towns.

Churches don't have to make up sick lists and visiting committees, it becomes everyone's business to assist when sickness or death strikes.

Wedding showers, baby showers, funeral food, whatever the call, small town folks...and those with small town roots...know how to answer it.

Want some summer entertainment that doesn't cost much, provides some fun with an easier life, and is absolutely fascinating?

Put up a hummingbird feeder! Now, don't laugh. Folks who have never had any interest in birds of any kind (like my husband) will spend a lot of time watching the aerial artists when no other variety of bird intrigues them.

The hummingbird is the smallest, fastest and most unique flyer in the bird world.

He is the only bird that can hover motionless, fly backwards, straight up or straight down. His wing beats are so fast (between 12 and 14 beats per SECOND) that they are a simple blur of movement.

The hummingbird exists only in the Americas, Canada, the U.S. and Mexico and South America...no place else in the world.

In this part of the world the only prevalent variety is the Ruby Throated Hummingbird, so called because of the flashing, brilliant red spot on his throat. The female lacks the brilliant green coloring marked with red, but is still an incredibly beautiful flyer.

Hummingbirds are easy to provide for. A bed of brilliant summer salvia or other flowers, preferably red, or a feeder will attract them within days. Fixing food for the feeder couldn't be simpler. Just mix one part of sugar to four parts of water, add a drop of red food color and make sure it's dissolved well.

After one or two hummingbirds appear at the feeder, it's only a matter of time before several more arrive, then the flight begins!

Hummingbirds are an aggressive lot, in spite of their diminutive size. They squeak high pitched chitters of anger, dive one another and generally engage in aerial battle with encroaching guests, including other hummers, bees or wasps.

They know no fear at all, and will dive bomb a cat on occasion. They soon lose their caution around humans, continuing to feed while humans are very close.

Hummingbird nests are about the size of an English walnut, made of matted together lichens and moss, cemented with spider webs.

They have one or two babies, and the size of a newly hatched hummingbird can only be imagined...it seems impossible anything so small could exist!

Children can spend minutes and hours watching the fascinating little creatures at work feeding, fighting or, on rare occasions, sitting still. So can adults.

A feeder costs as little as three dollars, and a fourth a cup of sugar surely isn't much to spend each week to keep the feeder full.

So don't laugh, if you don't have a hummingbird feeder...get one...you'll be surprised just how entertaining it is!!

## Cheerleading, Baseball, Subject Of School Board Meeting

Several parents of students attending school in the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. attended the School Board meeting held Tuesday night, July 7 at Rivercrest.

The two main issues discussed by the parents and board members were

the cheerleader Constitution and implementing baseball into the school system.

Spokeswoman on the cheerleader Constitution was Mary Lou Hall of Talco, who stated that in her opinion the constitution was unfair to the girls in it's ruling that those trying out for

cheerleader must maintain a grade average of 70 in all subjects for one year prior to try-out time. She further pointed out that the U.I.L. rules only required the girls to maintain a grade average of 70 in all subjects for six weeks prior to try-outs. "The Con-

stitution's grade rule is penalizing the girls for failure of the past year, plus the current year, and I think that's a little too much," stated Mrs. Hall.

After much discussion by the Board and other interested parties, the Board voted 5-2 in favor of deleting the grade average ruling stated in the Constitution and implementing the U.I.L. standards and the No Pass - No Play Rule.

Board members voting in favor of the change were Tommy Corbell, Eddie Brown, Jerry Russell and Gene Smith. Those voting against the change were Billy Daniels and Buford Hervey.

Jerry Beers served as spokesman for parents interested in offering baseball in the high school. Mr. Beers showed a list of names signed by area parents who would like to see baseball in the school system. He also stated that he had talked to approximately 30 eligible boys who said they would be interested in playing the sport if offered.

After much discussion and input from Coach Giddens, Supt. Cowley, Board members and other parents, the decision was made by the Board to start proceedings to see if interest in the sport would be enough to merit the cost and effort for the school year of 1988.

In other business, the Board ap-

proved the minutes of the last meeting, approved payment of the bills, approved the budget changes and voted to adopt the tax report, adjustments and changes.

The cafeteria report was given by Supt. Cowley and the Board voted to keep lunch prices the same as last year.

Mr. Cowley gave the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills Report.

High School Principal James Smith gave a report on the handbook changes. The Board voted to change the Board policy on home room teachers serving on the committee for absentees and then voted to adopt the High School Handbook as amended.

Talco Elementary and Junior High Principal Billy Vickers and Bogata Campus Principal Frank Stubblefield recommended handbook changes for their campuses. One of those changes, which the Board approved, was that non-bus students, grades K-3 must leave the school campus at 3:05 effective for the school year 1987-88.

The Board accepted the resignation of Rivercrest Spanish teacher, Mary Ann Franklin, and hired as Rivercrest Spanish and English teacher, Pamela Hayes.

Board members were informed that July 28 is the date set for School Board member training.

## Talco Citizens Asked To Help Protect Post Office

Texas and Oklahoma continue to be the target of post office burglars, according to Postal Inspector in Charge, D.C. Strader, Ft. Worth. Strader, whose area of responsibility includes the northern half of Texas and all of Oklahoma, said that over 50 burglaries will occur within the boundaries of the Ft. Worth division this year if the current trend continues.

Most of the burglaries have occurred at post offices that are located in rural communities that have limited or no local law enforcement available for routine patrols at night.

Local postmaster, Grace Hearron, emphasized the need for citizen involvement. "Even though postal funds are secured in a safe, burglars who are unsuccessful in attempting to break into a safe will sometime steal mail left in customers' post office boxes. Even when they don't steal mail, they sometimes just cause malicious vandalism. In either event, it does cost the Postal Service money to repair the damage incurred and for the Postal Inspectors to conduct an investigation. Our local tax money is also spent by our local law enforcement officers who incur expenses, because they are usually the first agency to respond, and they also provide valuable assistance in the investigations to the Postal Inspectors."

burglaries and vandalism by reporting suspicious activity at or around the postal facilities which occurs after business hours. This activity would include automobiles or trucks with license plates from outside the local area, unfamiliar people asking suspicious questions about the post office or amount of law enforcement patrol at night, or loitering in the post office lobby or around the post office by groups of young people at night and on weekends when the post office is closed. This information should be reported to the local law enforcement agencies and to the postmaster or station manager.

Post office burglary is a Federal crime which carries a penalty of up to a \$1,000 fine or up to five years in prison, or both. The Postal Service offers a standing reward of up to \$5,000 for information and services leading to the arrest and conviction of any person responsible for the burglary of a post office. Any information about a burglary or any crime committed against the Postal Service or its employees, should be reported to the local postmaster or the Postal Inspector in Charge in Ft. Worth.

The 24-hour number for the Postal Inspector in Charge at Ft. Worth is 817/885-1111. Postal Inspectors are also located in Dallas and Lubbock in Texas and at Oklahoma City and Tulsa in Oklahoma.

"It's our community, your post office, and your mail," said Mrs. Hearron, "and we need the help of all

crimes against the Postal Service in our area."

## Immunization Clinic Set

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7/10 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at 210 S. Johnson St., Mt. Pleasant on July

15 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasized that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio,

Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis and Tetanus-diphtheria. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria vaccine is available to adults.

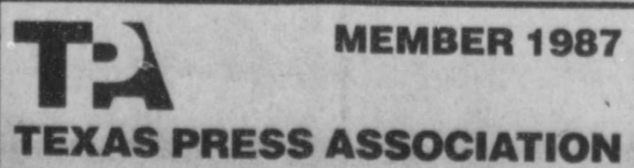
## Earn And Learn Program At NTCC

### N.E. Texas Flyer Notes 3rd Year Of Service

Paris' Northeast Texas Flyer, a shuttle service to Dallas-Fort Worth Airport and Love Field, is celebrating its third birthday with 700,000

accident-free miles, according to owner-manager Mike Pendleton.

The shuttle, which began service October 1, 1984, has continued to

grow, Pendleton explained, and plans are being made for expanded services in the future.

And, Pendleton said, the company is proud of its driving and schedule records. "In three years, we have had one cancelled run due to ice." And, he said, the shuttle has never gotten a rider to the airport too late to catch his flight. "I'll tell them if they're cutting it too close...we tell them up front." The trip, under average driving conditions, takes about two hours and 30 minutes from Paris to D-FW's terminals.

The Flyer, which carries passengers and their baggage only, makes stops in Commerce and in Greenville. The Flyer leaves Paris at 6 a.m. and at 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and on weekends, departures are at 7 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

The bus leaves D-FW at 10 a.m. and at 6 p.m. for return trips to Paris and on weekends the bus leaves D-FW at noon and at 6 p.m.

Pick up and drop off points are at the Holiday Inn, or at any other Paris motel or residence by prior arrangement.

Rates, Pendleton said, are \$28 one way and \$48 round trip, while senior citizens over 60 may ride for \$25 and \$42. Children ages four to 13 ride for one-half fare when accompanied by an adult, and those under four ride free.

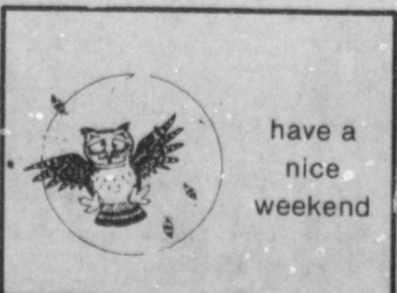
Although the bus serves Love Field, service there is by reservation only, with no regularly-scheduled buses to that location.

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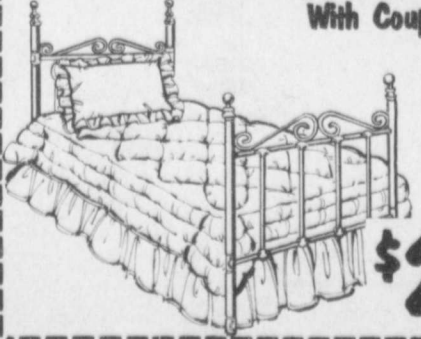

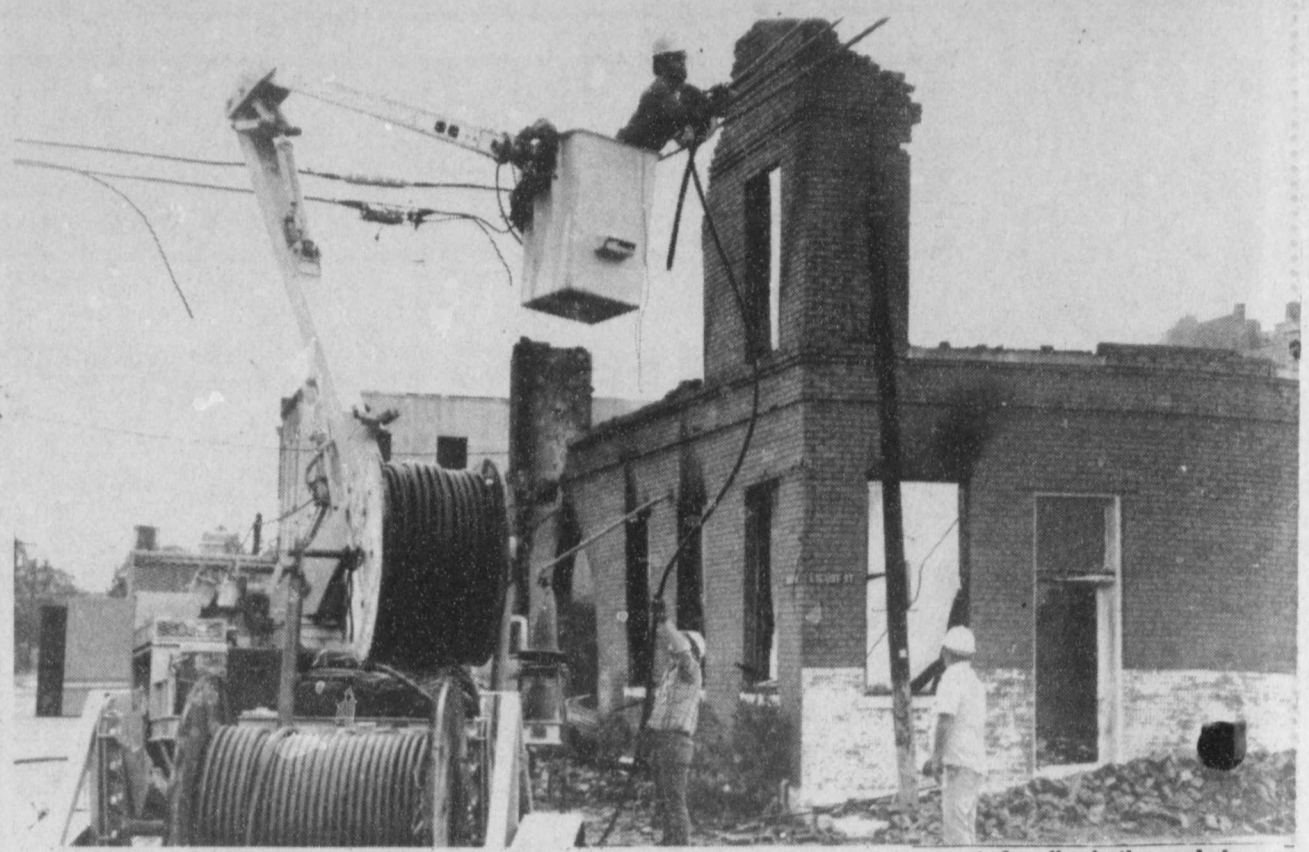
