But the writing is on the wall, the future clearly in the crystal ball! Brown paper is on the way out, replaced once more by plastic in a high tech world.

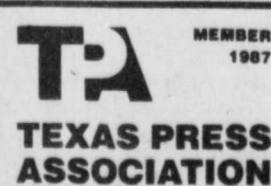

Most Local Sales Taxes Are Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$53.6 million in sales tax rebates to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 6.5 percent compared to payments made in the same period last year.

Houston's check was the largest, \$8.5 million, bringing total payments in 1987 to \$75.2 million, down 8.5 percent over 1986. Dallas received \$6.1 million for a total of \$56.3 million in

total payments for this year, a decrease of 5.8 percent.

Locally, Blossom received \$862.13 for a 24.73 percent increase over last year's payment of \$671.79. Payments to date for Blossom are \$9,769.49.

Deport received \$512.97 for its payment this period, for a 25.09 percent increase over last year. Total payments to date for 1987 are \$6,167.47, over \$4,930.48 for 1986.

Paris received \$135,656.36 for a 2.18

percent increase over 1986.

Bogata received \$2,286.27 for this period, for an 18.33 percent decrease over total payments to date for 1986. Total payments for 1987 to date are \$14,591.12, compared to \$17,866.80 for 1986.

Clarksville received \$12,014.23, marking a 2.98 percent decrease over 1986.

Deport received \$838.99 for a 9.29 percent decrease over the 1986 total payments of \$5,401.75.

Mt. Pleasant received \$71,349.89, marking an 8.24 percent decrease from 1986.

Talco received \$1,167.49 for an 18.30 percent increase. Total payments to date in 1987 are \$13,702.67, compared to \$11,582.74 for 1986.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$24.6 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities.

Houston's MTA check for \$9.8 million pushed 1987 payments to \$88.1 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$9.4 million

brought it's total to \$84.1 million this year. Austin's Capital Metro received a \$2.4 million check, for a yearly total of \$21.9 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.8 million for a total of \$16.3 million in 1987. Ft. Worth's MTA payment for \$536,434 increased the city's 1987 total to \$4.4 million.

Corpus Christi MTA received a check for \$482,972 increasing total payments this year to \$2.6 million.

According to the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills Summary Report, the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. placed in the upper percentile of the predicted national percentile rank.

In Mathematics, the predicted national percentile rank was 94. Out of 63 students who tested, the school's percentage for mastering in the total mathematics was 98.

In Reading, the predicted national percentile rank was 70. Out of 61 students testing, the school received a percentage of 87 mastering the subject and in Writing, 61 students tested. The national Language (Writing) percentile rank was 74. The school ranked 93.

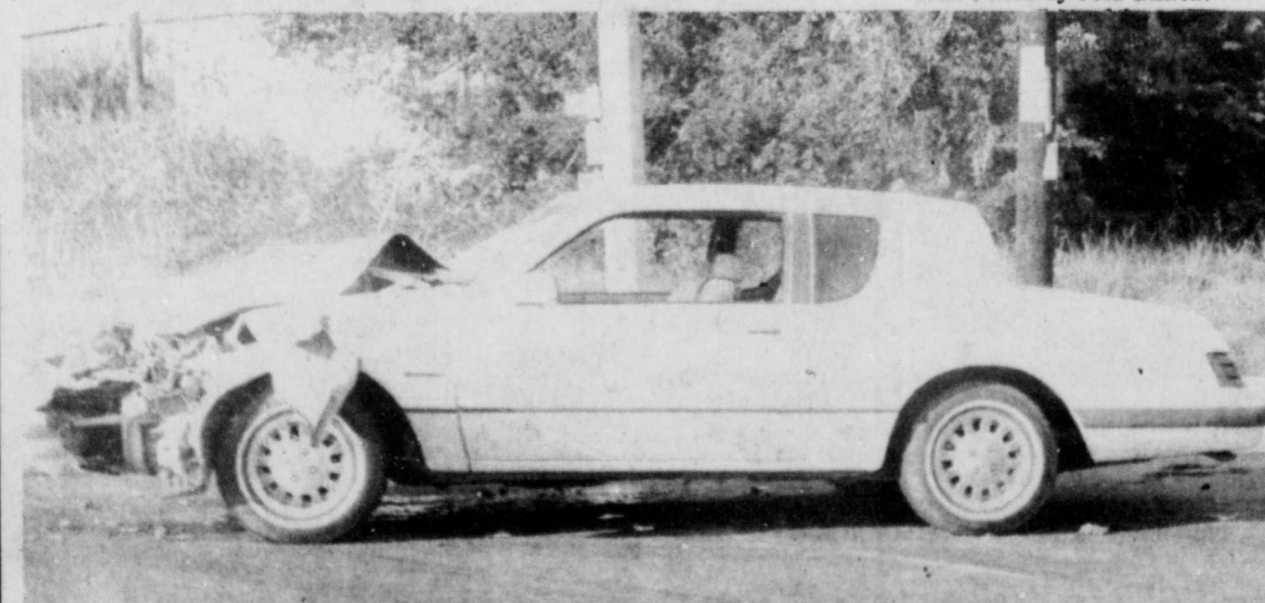

Memories Were Made At Maple Springs!

In the fall of 1935, the Great Depression hung like a dark cloud over our nation. There were no welfare checks and food stamps were unheard of. Life in the Maple community, like other places, was extremely rough during those times, however the Maple community residents made the best of it by being very resourceful. Home gardens provided vegetables. There were patches of sweet potatoes, plots of sorghum cane for sopping mill ground meal for delicious corn pone and mash for moonshine. For meat there were home raised hogs, squirrels from the woods and from the area streams, an abundance of fish. Most Maple folks had plenty to eat.

Money was scarce, of course, and most of the families chopped and hoed cotton in the spring for fifty cents to one dollar per day. In the fall, members of the families picked cotton and received fifty to seventy-five cents per one hundred pounds. The beginning of school was always delayed until October in order that children might earn money for clothes and shoes.

Prior to the school year of 1935, many students dropped out of school after finishing the fifth or sixth grades. But in the fall of 1935, the school trustees and two new teachers, Mavis Lum and Imogene Fogleman, decided to try and change this trend. Basketball for both girls and boys was begun that year in an effort to keep students in school. The sport caught on like wildfire. Interest in school and grades among the students improved. Although House Bill "No Pass, No Play" was unheard of then, the Maple community school required passing grades for those participating in the sport. Folks in the community took pride in their school and supported the basketball teams one hundred percent.

In 1937, the Maple boys team

team made a name for themselves in the Red River County Rural Basketball Conference by winning the playoffs in 1937-1938 and 1939. No conference tournament was held in 1940. The rural basketball conference was composed of Burkham, Cuthand, McCurdy, Lydia and Cath. There was no conference for the girls basketball at this time.

The Maple boys that spent countless hours trying to improve their basketball skills on a dirt court were David Knowles, John Moore, Steve Knowles, Austin McConnell, Russel Moore, Ellis Moore, Wesley Odonnell, Leslie Robertson, Charles Stewart, Nowlin Lovell, Bud Eudy, Cecil Williams, Wade Moore, Talmadge Sneed, Bernie Wooten, Sam McConnell, David Henry Askew, James Orbin Sidden and Burl Moore. Coach for the team was E.G. Lum, better known at that time as "Professor Lum", who was not only a coach and principal, but also a very influential resident of the Maple community.

Maple school students and teachers held their first reunion in 1986. The next reunion is set for the first Saturday in August, 1988.

Professor Lum is still living and resides in Boxelder and helped in preparing the information for this article. His positive influence in the Maple community and the lives of those who were taught by him is remembered by all of us.
