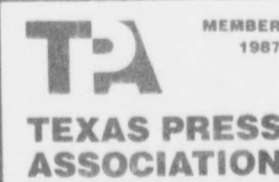

World War II Still Real In England

Editor's Note: This is the second in a travel series on England. From the response to last week's column, you folks must be enjoying it, so here we go for another column.

On Saturday, we woke to rain and gray skies, a change from our Texas temperatures that delighted us.

The morning was spent doing laundry. This means washing in the kitchen sink, then fitting clothes into a spin dryer which extracts the excess water most efficiently. Then, the clothes had to be hung inside to dry. Laundromats are available, but unhandy to get to on the bus since a lot of people don't have cars.

The afternoon was devoted to the Royal Air Force Museum at Hendon Airfield and the British Air Museum. Here, Thomas simply went a little crazy. So many planes, so beautifully displayed. A short film on the Battle of Britain, complete with air raid sirens, brought tears to Mic's eyes as she was taken back to the dreadful days when bombings came every day, night after night.

Both Mic and Lee were in the women's services during the second World War. They drew a crowd wherever people overheard them telling us just what it was like.

The realization of just how much England lost during that war soaked in on us during the week with them as never before. As Americans, we suffered some shortages...and lost a lot of soldiers.

But we never knew what it was like to huddle night after night in the underground stations while bombs laid waste to our cities overhead. We never knew real hunger, nor what it was like to not even be able to purchase a needle for years on end!

As we proceeded through the museum, hearing recordings of Winston Churchill's inspiring speeches, looking at uniforms and displays showing what life was like, Mic became quieter and quieter, finally beginning to tell us about the dreadful nights that she lay awake, waiting for the British and American bombers to return from their own bombing raids...and how the numbers returning were so horribly short of the numbers that had gone out.

It was a sombering, eloquent experience to have the times brought so alive to us.

After practically having to drag Thomas from the planes, we went to a Finchely china shop for some gift guying, then to Lee's apartment for a buffet dinner. Mic's daughter, Sue, and husband, Neil, were there, along with Pam, Lee, Mic and Thomas and myself.

Sunday was spent in London...the one square mile that makes up the actual city of London. For me, going to Fleet Street, the hub of the newspaper industry in Britain, was a special treat.

Even the pubs on that street have newspaper related names, and the whole street is geared towards newspaper production and life.

At St. Bride's Church, we were treated to the most beautiful choir we had ever heard. The famous choir and organ blended together to send hymns echoing throughout. Underneath the church, we went through the exhibits showing the various artifacts found when the church was bombed during the war. Roman walls and ruins were found when the bomb rubble was cleared, then artifacts from later ages.

St. Bride's Church is located on what is considered to be the oldest site for Christian worship in England...dating from 60 A.D.! It was a moving experience to see the remains left behind by such early Christians while modern day music drifted down the stone steps into the crypt.

Also included on our day with Lee and Pam in downtown central London was a visit to Dr. Johnson's house, and a trip to the Old Curiosity Shop, made famous by Charles Dickens.

Then we headed for the tower of London. A tour courier friend had provided the entry tickets to the tower in advance, and promptly at 2, when the gates opened, we rushed through, leaving lines of people behind. We were able to have a leisurely view of the crown jewels while everyone else was waiting in line for their tickets!

Those jewels are absolutely awesome. The workmanship and beauty is exquisite, while the size and number of the jewels simply boggles the imagination!

Afterwards we toured parts of the tower, including a visit to the tower ravens. Legend says that if the ravens

ever leave the tower it will crumble...and taking no chances, they clip a few wing feathers to make sure it doesn't happen!

The bloody history of beheadings, murders and executions bring one the struggles that took place for control of the empire over the centuries.

As usual, we were awed by the age

of things. For a nation with only a little over two hundred years of history, seeing buildings six, seven or eight hundred years old is really something.

Where we slap a historical marker on anything over 100 years of age, they simply figure it's nearly new housing and just getting broken in

good!

After the tower, we drove along the embankment...the road that runs along the River Thames. Cleopatra's needle, a huge stone obelisk given to the nation during the 1800's, rears up alongside the water, guarded by two sphinxes...one with shrapnel holes torn from an exploding bomb in World

War II.

A monument designed by the famous Christopher Wren commemorates the Great Fire of London, which devastated the city in 1666...but also broke the plague that had been killing people for the previous year.

We walked through the area peopled by barristers, solicitors and judges, impressed with the gracious dwellings the legal profession inhabits.

In a crowded city, parks are the saving grace. St. James and Regents Parks provide gorgeous expanses of green grass, stately trees and ponds for people to enjoy.

A special surprise was revealed near Regents Park, as Lee leaped out of the car and dragged us down a narrow hallway. There on the wall was a simple plaque marked "Texas Legation". It marked the room where the Texas Delegation from the Republic stayed during the time the state was it's own republic and sent ambassadors and delegates to what was then the most powerful empire in the world...Great Britain. It's a fair bet that few tourists from Texas ever even know of it's existence.

A meal on Indian food completed a busy day. Indian food, from India, not "our" kind of Indians, of course.

Hot and spicy, it capped a day well spent roaming through what may be the world's most famous city.
