The Wonders Of Windsor Wowed Us!

Editor's Note: I meant 'o close this column out this week, but a number of people have told me not to do that just yet...they want to hear more. Since no one has voiced an opinion to the contrary, I shall continue for this week and next.

One Wednesday there was Windsor. Oh, was there Windsor!

Windsor Castle is located outside London in rolling, misty countryside that looks like the epitome of every English movie ever seen.

It is, of course, the Duke of Windsor's "place". The Duke of Windsor, for those who may not do any royalty watching, is Queen Elizabeth II's husband.

The castle is absolutely fabulous. It is a huge complex, a mile on each side of its four outer walls.

Within there are all kinds of "grace and favor" apartments, abodes for those who have devoted their lives in one way or another to serving the country, and beautiful lavish state rooms used upon ceremonial occasions.

St. George's Chapel is an experience within itself as one walks into ancient, outstanding stained glass, intricately carved ceilings, and monuments and plaques in memory of those famous and not so famous who served the British Empire and the people before their death.

The crests of the barons hang from the ceiling, emblazoned like a roll of honor from long ago.

A box with a note pad and pencil beside it states that "prayers are made for specific people and needs, please note down the persons name and need and we will offer a prayer."

Absolutely stunning choir pews were carved hundreds of years ago. Every now and again I was struck by the multitude of lives that went into the creation of all this beauty.

One can picture the wood carvers and gilders going about their business within some huge structure before it's completion, hundreds upon hundreds of them painstakingly chipping out works of art.

In Windsor Castle itself, we entered a room which almost literally took me to my knees in shock.

Overhead was the most fabulous ceiling I had ever seen. Done all in gold, it was intricate, yet so perfectly proportioned that the immense size

of the room seemed perfectly natural.

Huge chandeliers of Waterford crystal grace the length of the room. Light sparkled and bounced off the gold and crystal, and one could only gaze and gaze until the neck gave out!

Closets were big rooms with priceless paintings within, bedrooms held beds fifteen feet high and decked with golden embroidery and velvets, carved woods and ostrich plumes.

We spent hours going from room to room. We saw the mahogany dining table where President and Mrs.

Reagan dined with the heads of state.

The table was closed to its smaller proportion walls while we were there...it would only seat 75 people. When all the leaves are in it, it will seat 150!

Also at Windsor, Madame Trussard's waxworks had an exhibition called "Royalty and Empire". These hundreds of wax figures were absolutely astonishing. One expected them to move and breath.

Devoted to the reign of Queen Victoria, they followed her through the course of her lifetime, from young

woman to her death.

Inside the theatre, the most amazing figures of all spoke, moved and commented upon the age. Charles

Dickens and Florence Nightingale spoke their piece, and Victoria and Albert told their dreams at the beginning of her rule.

Even her little dog, lying at her feet, perked his ears at her voice, wagged his tale and yawned!

After the awesome experience of Windsor, it was pleasant to drive out into the countryside to Runnymede.

Here, breeze touched meadows rolled while peaceful cattle grazed upon the hillside.

Runnymede is famous for being the site the Magna Carta was signed on. This world famous document was the beginning of "Justice Under The Law" and the beginning of legal process as we know it.

It wasn't hard, as we wandered across the empty meadow, to imagine the jingle of harness and bits, the flast of bright cloaks and armour as mounted knights and barons, kings and dignitaries met on this hallowed ground for various ceremonies, including the signing of the Magna Carta, back in the ten hundreds.

We walked on down a fence line, then up a winding path through handsome trees. There, inscribed on plain granite, was a monument to John F. Kennedy, set in the center of an acre of land that Great Britain gave to America in memory of the assassinated president.

The rain began again after we had our walk, and we drove home (how easy it was to think of our friend's place as home), through gathering dusk.

A fire, (yes, in July) took away the chill and we sat in Mic's living room sipping iced tea... (we had the craving, old habits are hard to break).

We began to talk about some of the expressions we heard among the British.


"Full of beans and bus tickets" is their expression for feeling happy and ready to go.



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
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Smith-Vaughan Exchange Wedding Vows

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

Talco-Bogata Schools Reduced Price Lunches

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55 cents and high school students may buy breakfast for 65 cents. Extra milk may be purchased for 25 cents.

Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the application which may be picked up at the school, sign it and return it to the school.

Food Stamp/AFDC Households: If you currently receive Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

All other households: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated persons who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (before deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

Foster child: Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Harold Cowley, Box 130, Bogata, TX

75417 or call 632-5205.
Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.
Reapplication: You may apply for benefits any time during the school

year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

All parties are asked to make application at the school their child or children will be attending.

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




