Well, it was pointed out to me last week that help is available, and that it costs nothing, is well qualified, and asks nothing in return. It was not a minister that mentioned this to me, but several local ministers that they were referring to.

Throughout our communities, ministers abound. And these days, ministers have to know a whole lot more than simply the gospel. There are dozens of ministers who have hours of psychoogy, counseling and training in assisting people in need.

More than degrees they have compassion, and a lot of experience in almost any field of trouble.

These ministers do not pass judgement, do not require that one be a member of their church before extending a helping hand, and won't pressure someone into attending church.

They want to help because it is a Christian thing to do.

Of course they cannot solve a problem, but they can frequently set someone on the way to helping themselves. They can be a comfort, they can be a "shoulder to cry on". If serious medical, psychological or marriage counseling seems in order, they know where it can be found.

They can even be a help in finding assistance with financial matters if that is a problem.

Ministers can be more than someone who visits the sick or preaches a funeral or sermon. They are almost all willing to help in whatever way they can, and probably are the most qualified people around to do so.

The value of a listening ear cannot be overrated. There are plenty of caring listening ears available, and many ministers top the list.

Remember them in times of trouble, or if you know someone who needs a helping hand.

Water Issue Election Is This Saturday

This Saturday, September 19, Red River County will have the opportunity to go to the polls and cast their ballots for or against the creation of a water reservoir. The official ballot has three separation items on it: The creation of Red River County Water District; The issuance of \$7,200,000 of water bonds and the levy of ad valorem taxes to pay for the bonds; and the maintenance tax not to exceed three cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property. A mark for or against should be cast on each of the three items.

The proposed reservoir, known as Dimple Reservoir, has created a furor within the county, as factions both for and against the project have attended meetings throughout the county to ask questions and voice opinions.

Voter turn-out is urged in order for the largest number of people to make their wishes known on this matter.

Polling places for the election will be: Place 1, Clarksville High School Library; Place 2, St. Paul's Methodist Church; Place 3, Red River County

Library; Place 4, Clarksville City Hall.

In Bogata, Place 5 is the old City Hall, located next to the Fire Station; Place 7 is the Fulbright Community Center; Rosalie, the Community Center; Jolntown, Rivercrest High School; Place 11, McCoy, Lone Star Methodist Church; Place 13, Detroit American Legion Building; Place 14, Bagwell Community Center; Place 15, Negley Community Center; Place 16, Kanawha; Place 17, Woodland Methodist Church; Place 18, Manchester, Community Center; Place 19, North Avery at Avery Methodist Church; Place 20, North Annona, Baptist Church; Place 21, English Community Center; Place 23, Acworth voting building; Place 24, Hopewell Community Center; Place 27, South Avery, City Hall; Place 28, South Annona, Masonic Hall; Place 29, Boxelder County Barn; Lydia Grocery Store, Place 30; East Cuthand, Place 31, Methodist Church.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Local Sales Tax Figures Varied

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Friday sent checks totaling \$56.1 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by nearly six percent overall compared to payments made by September of last year.

The city of Houston received the largest payment, \$8.6 million, bringing total payments in 1987 to \$99.9 million, down 7.7 percent from last year's total to date. Dallas' check for \$6.3 million brought the total for this year to \$74.2 million, a decrease of 6.9 percent from last year.

Locally, Blossom received \$975,088

for a 20.24 percent increase over last year's payment to date of \$927,800. Total payments to date are \$12,386,220.

Deport received \$605.94 for this period, an increase of 14.47 percent, compared to \$557.54 for the same period last year. Total payments are \$8,667.37 for 1987.

Paris received \$176,487.40 for a 2.67 percent increase over 1986.

Bogata received \$2,121.34 for its payment this period, compared to \$2,021.07 for last year, marking a 14.20 percent decrease on payments to date for 1987.

Clarksville received \$13,151.61 for a 1.85 percent decrease over 1986.

Detroit received no payment this period for a 13.51 percent decrease over last year's payments to date.

Mt. Pleasant received \$72,500.30 for a 6.64 percent decrease over 1986 payments to date. Last year they received \$68,873.66 for the same period.

Talco received \$1,646.59 for an 84.62 percent increase over the 1986 payments to date. Payment in 1986 for this same period was \$978.86 with total payments to date being \$27,327.11.

September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller by August 20.

Assembly Of God Church Has Singing

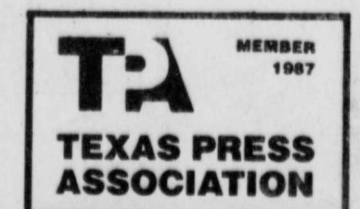
The singing at the Assembly of God Church in Talco on Sunday night was a great success. The Malone Sisters,

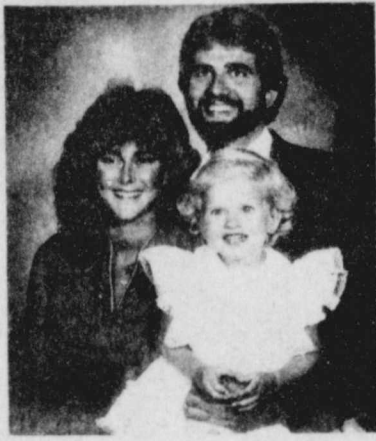

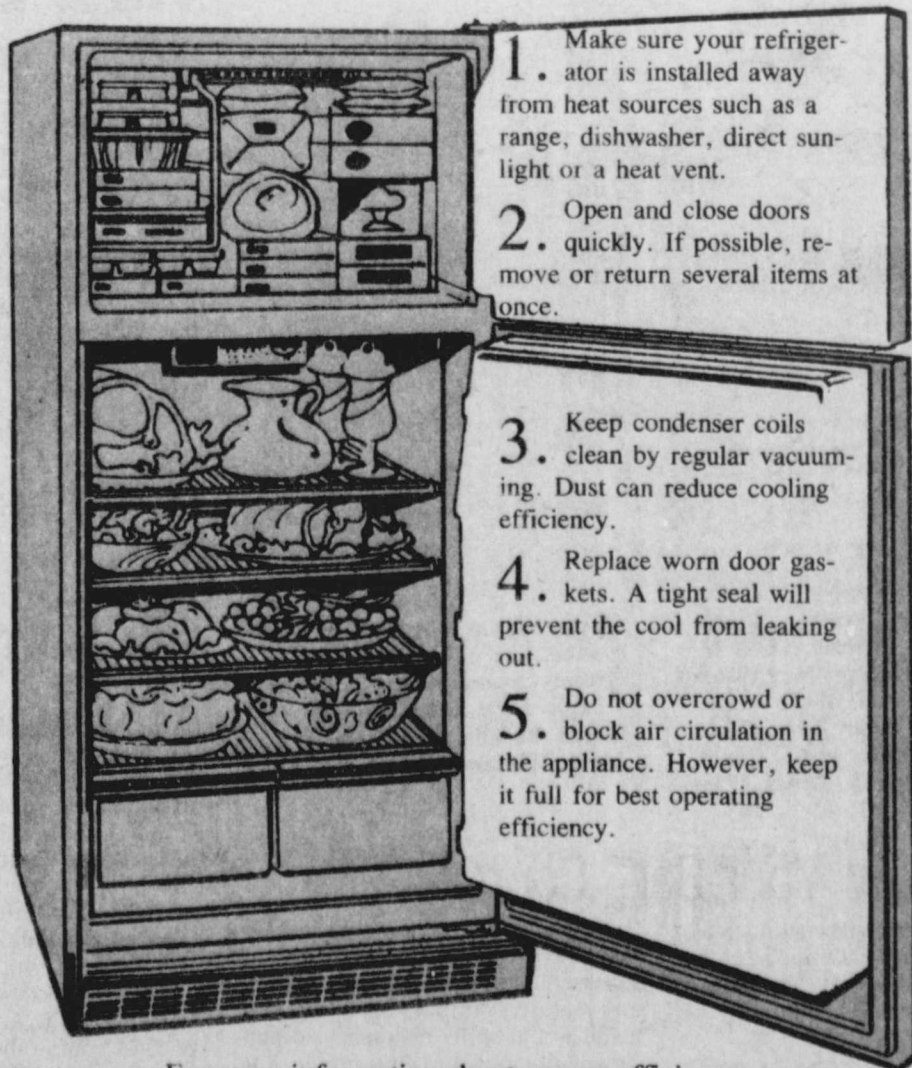

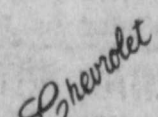

Winter Planting Time Approaches

Now that parts of the county have received a good rain, some individuals are thinking in terms of planting a winter pasture and are beginning to put a sharp pencil to the operation. According to Dr. Sim Reeves we can expect a total variable cost of establishing a small grain-ryegrass pasture to be \$113 per acre.

These costs include seed cost of \$21.20, fertilizer cost of \$76.20, machinery and equipment cost of \$13.00 and \$3.10 per acre cost for insect control. This budget was developed for a 400 pound light steer at the stocking rate of 1.7 head per acre. The length of the grazing period was 195 days and an average gain of 253 pounds per steer was figured. Other steer costs in addition to the cost of the calf comes to \$75.00 per acre of \$54.00 per head.

This cost includes implants, minerals, hay and other feed, veterinary, labor and marketing. The breakdown figure for the above operation would be \$79.59 for a steer gaining 250 pounds if the original price of the 400 pound steer was \$90.00 per hundred weight. However, the breakeven price goes up to \$82.76 for a 95 cent calf an down to \$77.05 for an 86 cent calf.

Copies of the budget are available from our office for those needing one. There are few ways one can reduce the cost of establishing the winter pasture. Individuals on blackland will not have the nine dollar lime cost and it is possible that the insecticide treatment will not be needed. However, one cannot afford to cut down on seeding rate or fertilizer applied.

These figures also included interest cost for eight months. Now if you have plenty of your own money to invest in such an operation, you will have no interest cost, but you are losing that much interest by not investing your money.

What types of seeding and fertilizer rates are we suggesting? One needs to think in terms of 100 pounds of a small grain plus 20 pounds of ryegrass. One will need somewhere in the area of 200 pounds of nitrogen, 60 pounds of phosphorus and maybe that much or more of potash depending on the soil type.

If you are only interested in reducing the feed cost of your cow-calf operation, then a ryegrass or ryegrass-clover pasture is all you need. The cost of such a pasture program will amount to \$55.00 per acre. Granted one will not get the amount of forage this fall and winter as from the small grain-ryegrass program, but an abundance of high quality forage will be provided from March through May.

Most of the ryegrass varieties will produce from 3000 to 5000 pounds of forage in the spring. This compares with forage yields of 8000 to 9000 pounds for the top rye, oat and wheat varieties. If you need forage fall,

winter and spring, then small grain pasture is the way to go. On the other hand, where a good hay supply has been harvested, farmers may only need the ryegrass pasture in the spring.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 3, 1987

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 104 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide a guarantee for the Texas grain warehouse self-insurance fund. The guarantee of the fund may not exceed \$5 million, and when the fund reaches \$5 million, the guarantee will cease.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit rural fire prevention districts in counties with populations over 400,000 to levy a tax at a rate not to exceed six cents (\$.06) per \$100 property valuation for the district, if the voters of the district approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 48 proposes a constitutional amendment to extend the school ad valorem tax exemption for elderly persons to the surviving spouse of a person receiving the exemption. If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to limit school tax increases on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years of age."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create programs and make loans and grants of money for development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment, stimulation of agricultural innovation, promotion of agricultural enterprises, and development of transportation and commerce. Bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes must be approved by the voters in the political subdivision seeking such funding sources.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development in the state."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to contract with the Texas Turnpike Authority and to contribute money to the costs of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges of the Authority. The amendment would authorize the governing body of a county with a population over 400,000, a county adjoining such county, and any city or district located in or partially in such county to make agreements with the Texas Turnpike Authority and levy ad valorem taxes to pay part or all of the principal and interest on Turnpike Authority bonds and to pay maintenance and operating expenses of the Turnpike Authority, if the voters approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing agreements between the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties, and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads, and toll bridges by guaranteeing bonds issued by the Texas Turnpike Authority."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to establish three separate development funds. A Texas product development fund could be established to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in the state. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$15 million of general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas small business incubator fund could be established to foster and stimulate the development of small businesses in the state. Small businesses operating under the program would be exempt from ad valorem taxation. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$10 million in general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas agricultural fund could be established to promote the production, processing and marketing of agricultural products produced primarily in Texas by small Texas agricultural businesses. The amendment would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$100 million outstanding at one time to carry out the agricultural fund program. The legislature could require review and approval of the issuance of bonds and the use of bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to be used for loans to local governments for acquisition, construction, repair, renovation, and equipment of public facilities or for grants to local governments for planning public facilities. The amendment would also permit the issuance of revenue bonds for the same purposes to be repaid from excess revenue from repayments of loans made under the amendment and from other revenues pledged to the retirement of revenue bonds. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance certain local public facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 56 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to be used to acquire, construct, and equip new correctional institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions or to repair existing institutions. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the projects to be financed by the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions

and mental health and mental retardation facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that a state legislator is eligible to serve in another state office even if the compensation of the office was increased during his legislative term or even if the appointment is made in whole or in part (including Senate confirmation) by the legislature. The legislator could not, however, receive the increased compensation approved during his legislative term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed and to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Subsections (d) and (e) of Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all tangible personal property except structures which are used as residential dwellings and property held or used for the production of income. This exemption would be in addition to the personal property homestead exemption already established by the constitution. If the legislature authorizes the exemption of additional personal property from taxation, under this amendment, local political subdivisions may pass resolutions providing for taxation of such property unless the property is exempt from ad valorem taxation under another law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1, Subsections (f) and (g) of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation goods, wares, merchandise, and ores other than oil, gas and petroleum products. These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a married couple to agree in writing that all or part of their community property will become the property of the surviving spouse if one spouse dies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the creation of special districts to provide emergency services. The commissioners court in a county participating in a district could, upon approval of the voters, levy an ad

valorem tax of up to ten cents (\$.10) per \$100 valuation of the property located in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases. Under current law, only criminal defendants are allowed to appeal. This proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass laws granting state prosecutors the right to appeal in limited circumstances.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg County and transfer the duties of that office to the county auditor or an elected official designated by the commissioners court. The amendment would also abolish the office of county treasurer in Fayette and Nueces counties if a majority of the voters in those counties vote in favor of the amendment. In Fayette County, the functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county auditor or the officer succeeding to the auditor's functions. In Nueces County, the powers, duties, and functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the commissioners court in a county with a population of more than 150,000 to establish more than one Justice of the Peace precinct, i.e., to provide for the election of more than one Justice of the Peace in each Justice of the Peace precinct.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to define by law those municipal functions that are governmental and those that are proprietary. This authorization would apply to laws passed by the 70th Legislature, 1987, and by future legislatures in regular or special session. A municipality is liable for damages arising out of acts committed under its proprietary functions, but not its governmental functions. Definition of such functions by the legislature would clarify the liability of a municipality in civil lawsuits filed against it.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality."

PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts. Financing of a jail district could be accomplished through the issuance of bonds and other obligations, or by levy of an ad valorem tax on property located in the district if the qualified electors of a district approve an ad valorem tax or bonds secured by a property tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the United States government, and to make appropriate grants for such undertakings."

PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for mobile offshore oil and gas well drilling equipment. The tax relief would be limited to equipment that is being stored while not in use in a county that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico or on a body of water that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative involvement in the executive branch of government by permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives in the membership of an agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch of government and performs executive functions. Under current law, the legislature is not allowed to exercise any powers in executive matters under Article II of the Texas Constitution, which provides for the "separation of powers" into three distinct departments.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives or the speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee."

PROPOSITION NO. 22 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the term of office of a gubernatorial appointee to a vacancy in a state or district office to a partial, temporary term if the appointment is made on or after November 1 of the last year of the governor's term and the governor is not reelected. Under this amendment, the legislature may provide that the tenure of such an appointee would end sooner than the term would normally expire.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if the governor is not reelected."

PROPOSITION NO. 23 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in water development bonds. Of the \$400 million authorized, \$200 million would be designated for conservation and development of water resources, \$150 million would be designated for water quality enhancement, and \$50 million would be designated for flood control. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$400 million of Texas Water Development Bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 24 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a county to use county equipment and personnel to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity if the commissioners court finds that the work will not interfere with the performance of county work and approves performance of the work. The governmental entity must be located wholly or partly in the county, and the governing body of the governmental entity must file a written work request with the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit a county to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity."

PROPOSITION NO. 25 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to authorize Randall County to levy a tax for the benefit of the Amarillo Hospital District. Any such tax could be levied only on property located outside the City of Amarillo and outside the South Randall County Hospital District. The tax could not be more than 75¢ per \$100 property valuation and would be effective only upon approval by the voters in the area to be taxed. If the tax is authorized by the Legislature and approved by voters, the Amarillo Hospital District is to serve residents of part of Randall County. If a tax is levied under this provision, Randall County must repay the State for the cost of publication of this amendment.

The proposed amendment also permits the legislature to authorize a hospital district to change its boundaries or jurisdiction if the district was created or authorized by a constitutional provision that includes a description of the boundaries or jurisdiction of the district. Any change in the boundaries or jurisdiction of such a hospital district would become effective only upon approval of the voters in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County, to authorize Randall County to provide financial assistance to the district, and to authorize certain hospital districts to change their boundaries or jurisdiction with voter approval."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 1

Senate Bill 86 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition passes, the Governor will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation throughout the State of Texas."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 2

The Texas Racing Act submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutuel wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If pari-mutuel wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on pari-mutuel wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis."

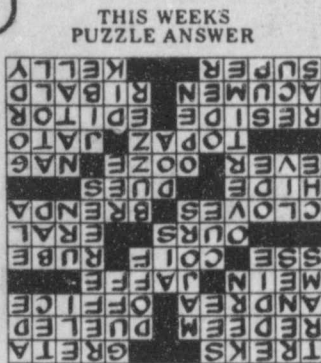

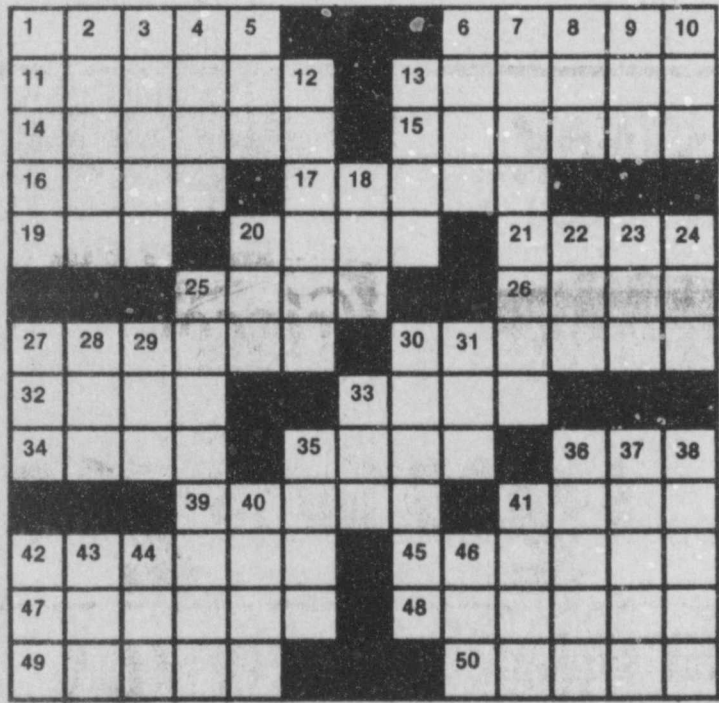

Family Chair Dates Back 90 Years

Herman Guess of Bogata, better known to folks as "Slick" is the proud inheritor of an old, straight-backed chair that will have been in the May and Guess families for 90 years on September 16. The chair is special to Mr. Guess because it was used by him and his three brothers and four sisters as they were learning to walk. Holding on to the back of the chair, the youngsters could scoot the chair across the wooden floors of their home and maintain their balance. Today, the chair has a prominent place in Mr. Guess's bedroom and is used as a sitting place each night when he pulls off his shoes.

The chair was given to Mr. Guess's mother, Emma May, as a birthday gift on her 15th birthday by her mother in 1897. Later, as the bride of Ernest Guess, she took the chair to her new home in the Blossom area where she and Mr. Guess raised eight children, four boys and four girls. Pointing to the worn legs on the chair, Mr. Guess laughingly explains "Those old wooden floors in our home were the kind you could see the chickens underneath the house between the boards." The top rail on the back of the chair bears marks which strongly indicate that it may have also been used as a teething aid for the children.

According to Mr. Guess, the bottom of the chair has been replaced several times through the years, but all the wooden parts are original. As the oldest son, Mr. Guess received the chair at the time his mother entered the nursing home. She died in 1972 and her husband preceded her in death in 1947.

At the time Mr. Guess inherited the chair, he and his wife, Agnes, lived just south of Rugby. Following a fire in 1955 which destroyed their home, the family moved to Bogata. Although

most of their furniture and personal possessions were lost in the fire, somehow they managed to save the cherished family chair.

Mr. and Mrs. Guess have raised eleven children, seven boys and four girls. When asked if his children learned to walk by the old chair, Mr.

Guess replied, "No, by the time our kids came along, we used floor coverings, and the floors were too slick."

Retiring from farming, Mr. Guess now spends a lot of his time sitting at his son's service station, telling interesting stories from days gone by. If you're ever around one of those

days, you're likely to hear about this old chair and the days spent in his parents home. From these stories, like the stories of other elders, a wealth of knowledge can be learned by a generation who knows nothing of life without modern conveniences.

The Dimple Reservoir is in controversy at this time and the following situations should be considered in determining how registered voters cast their ballot on September 19, 1987.

1. Is it a coincidence that people from Clarksville determined the economic salvation of Red River County is the Dimple Reservoir at precisely the same time that Clarksville determined a water source problem?
2. The proposed \$7,200,000.00 expenditures to develop Dimple Reservoir plus operating and maintenance cost will cost Red River County taxpayers (30.7¢ per \$100 valuation for the lake and 3¢ for maintenance and operation) a total of 33.7¢ per \$100 valuation or 52.8% increase of your current county taxes. This tax does not include the county taxpayers cost for water which they might use in the future.
3. It is indicated that the lake will create a tremendous economic im-

act on the county as far as additional development for recreation, residential growth and industrial development. This is questionable in a lot of people's mind and is a conjecture. This should not be used to influence voters because if the industrial growth does not develop, the residential growth will not develop and the tax base will not expand. 4. It is very questionable from a priority standpoint that taxes spent for the lake would be as important as taxes spent for schools in that the state has placed more of a burden on local taxpayers for the cost of operating the schools.

5. As far as new industry, Red River County lost three in the past few years which lack of water had no bearing on and there is one prospect currently on which water has no bearing.

6. It is important for all registered voters to cast their ballot in that the majority's opinion should prevail and unless you vote, this will not be the case.

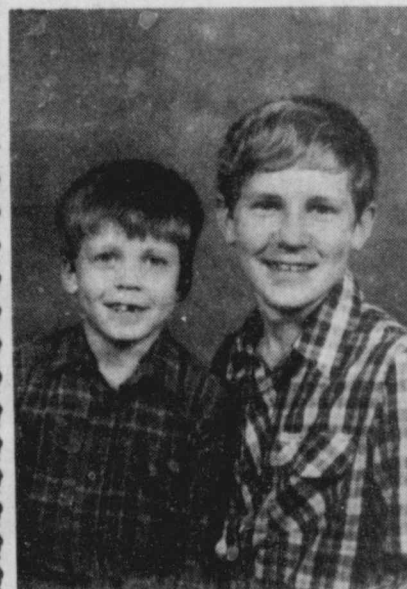

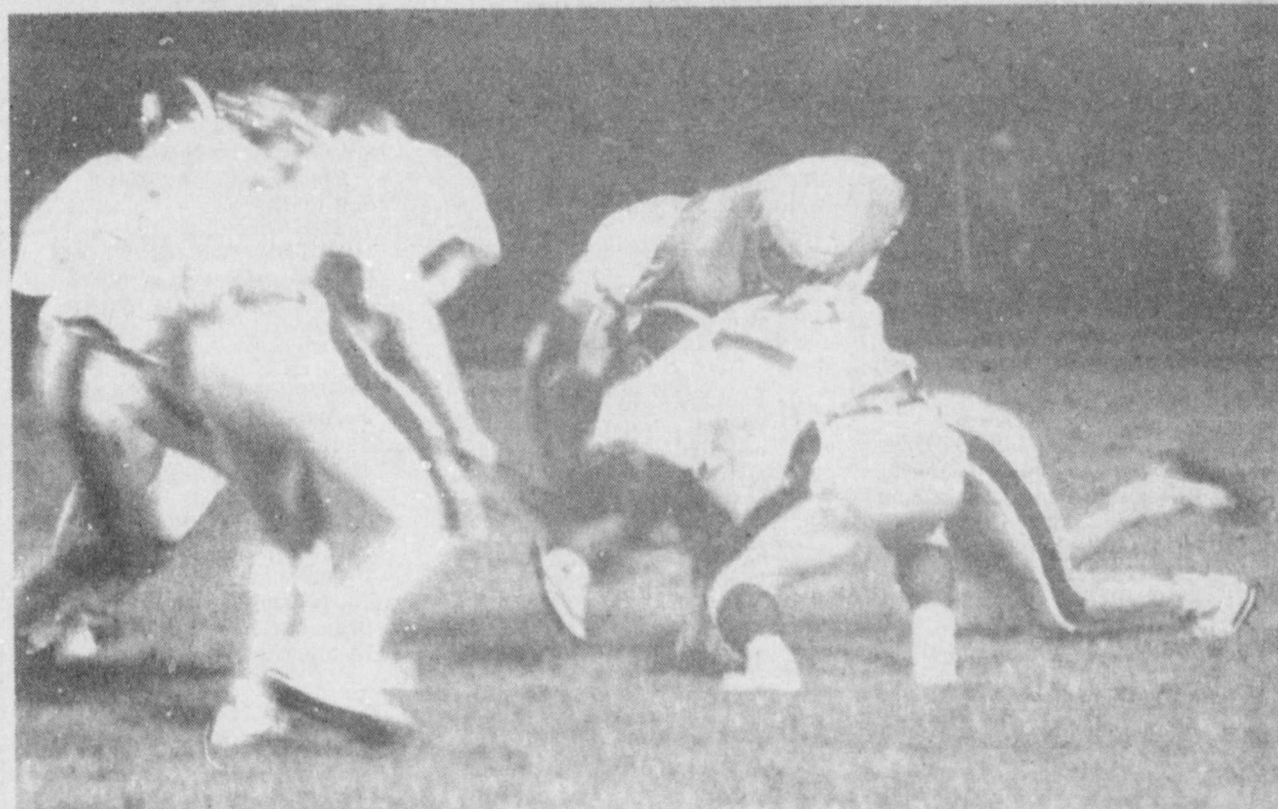

Rebels Tie Farmers In Home Game

Last Friday night, the Class AAA Farmersville Farmers invaded Rebel Stadium for the Reb's first home game of the 1987 season. Rivercrest, coming off a loss against Prairiland a week ago, was hoping to get into the win column against the Farmers. The Rebs had to settle for a 7-7 draw, but provided the home crowd with a thriller from start to finish.

The Rebels took the opening kickoff 18 yards as Reb Clint Tidwell returned the ball to the Rebel 42. The offense went to work on the Farmersville line as Lafayette Brown bolted for 18 yards on the first three plays. The Rebel offense continued to roll until a fumble on the Farmer 24-yard line appeared to shut down the Rivercrest drive, but a Farmersville penalty gave the Rebels the ball and new life on the opponent's 24-yard line. Rivercrest used seven plays to capitalize on the Farmer's miscue as Rebel fullback, Geary Savage, bullied into the endzone on the 3-yard line. Donald Combs added the extra point, giving Rivercrest a 7-0 lead at the 7 minute mark of the first quarter.

The Farmersville team was unable to move the ball on the Rebel defense on two consecutive possessions. Reb defenders Donald Combs, Marvin Anderson and Bradley Woods led the defensive charge.

Rivercrest punted the ball away following their third possession of the game. The Farmers found themselves backed up to their own 24-yard line and found the going tougher as they were backed up even further on consecutive penalties. But on a second down play, Farmer running back, Houston Farris, found a seam in the Reb defense and ripped off 52 yards before being brought down on the Rebel 33-yard line. Farmersville pushed the ball to the Reb 8-yard line and then Farmer quarterback David Brewer tossed a 7-yard scoring pass to receiver Seth Shannon. The point after attempt was good as the Farmers drew even with the Rebels 7-7 at the 6 minute mark of the second quarter. Neither team was able to threaten before the half and went into the locker room deadlocked at seven each.

Rivercrest got off to a somewhat slow start in the third quarter managing only 14 yards on their first possession before fumbling the ball away on the Farmer's 27-yard line. Farmersville began plugging away at

the Reb defense and 12 plays later were faced with a fourth down and four yard situation on the Rivercrest 23. The Farmer team opted for a field goal attempt to try to take a 10-7 lead, but the kick bounded off the right upright of the goalpost and fell back into the endzone with the score still tied at 7 each.

Farmer defense shut down the Reb offense in three plays. A Rebel field goal attempt was blocked and the score remained 7-7.

Farmersville took over on their own 19 and began consistently moving the ball upfield until Rebel defensive back Marvin Anderson picked off an errant Farmer pass on the Farmersville 43-yard line with :13 seconds left in the contest. But time ran out on the Rebel rally and the game ended 7-7.

This week the Rebels travel to Mt. Vernon to face the Class AAA Tigers. Kick-off is set for 8 p.m.

Dear Editor:

I believe that the role of Dimple Reservoir as "the magnet that will draw industry to Red River County" has been exaggerated to the point of distortion. Industry is interested in available water but they are also interested in tax rate. Low tax rate or tax exemption is commonly used as an incentive to attract industry. They, like other business people in the county, must pay tax on their inventory. How can we generate tax revenue for the county if our tax rate is high enough that we have to give tax exemptions to attract industry? Some of the business people of Red River County are already taxed to their limit. The tax increase that we are being asked to approve with our vote for Dimple Reservoir could wipe out any benefit that they might receive from industry in Red River County. The controversy over this issue will inevitably hurt our business people whether the outcome of the vote is win, lose or draw. I have been in business in the past.

Industry is interested in availability of water, not whether it is in your back yard or some distance away. Water is available to Red River County and to the City of Clarksville. This has been verified. Some effort has been made to withhold this information from the voters. The City of Dallas is now using water from multiple lakes; some a considerable distance away and not in Dallas County. Dallas does not own these lakes-they purchase water from them. Industry has not shunned Dallas.

Those who are pushing for Dimple Reservoir would like the voters to think that we will have immediate water and economical benefit from this lake. We can't receive either until the lake and facilities are completed. You may have read the recent articles in the Arkansas Gazette and the Banner News about the lake at Magnolia, Arkansas, that is now tied up in court because of the cost override which is now more than two million dollars, and could be another million, over contracted cost and the facility is not complete. Cooper, Texas also hoped for water and economical benefit from their lake but at this time, some twenty-five years later, their lake and benefits are still non-existent. The only immediate thing that I can see to be derived from Dimple Reservoir is indebtedness and tax increase.

A study done by HDR Infrastructures, Inc., in 1986, shows that the Big Pine Reservoir in northwest Red River County and northeast Lamar County is presently stalled due to the lack of commitments from major water users and waning Federal interest in water development. Red River Water District has no commitment from anyone for water from Dimple Reservoir. This is no mystery since they do not know how much the water will cost and they have no method by which they can guarantee equal distribution of the cost of this water to all residents of Red River County. It seems to me that in their haste to get voter approval they have gotten their cart in front of their horse.

I think we have other essential county services that should take priority over Dimple Reservoir. I want wise use of my tax dollars. I will vote NO on September 19th.
