Reservoir Passes By Narrow Margin

The stage was set for Red River County to have an 1,800 acre lake, as county residents approved the creation of Dimple Reservoir by the narrow margin of 211 votes.

The bond proposal passed 2,478 to 2,267 Saturday, with one of the highest voter turn-outs in recent election history.

The ballot held three parts, the first was confirmation of the newly formed

water district, the second was the bond proposal of 7.2 million dollars and the third provided for a maintenance tax of up to three cents per \$100 value.

Southern Red River County, including Bogata, did not vote with the majority, however, casting ballots against the reservoir instead of for it.

In Bogata, the vote was: 85 for, 404 against on the creation of the water

district; 83-399 on the bond issue; 83-395 on the maintenance issue.

At McCoy, the vote was 63 for, 27 against the first issue; 62-28 on the second; 62-28 on the third portion of the ballot.

Fulbright voted 19 for, 62 against; 17-62 and 18-62.

Johnstown was the most heavily against the reservoir, voting 7-94; 4-97 and 7-93.

Cuthand voted 22 for, 31 against; 22-31 and 22-30.

Detroit voted 80 for, 212 against; 77 for, 211 against, and 75 for and 215 against.

Rosalie's results were 18-90; 18-90; and 18-90 on the three issues on the ballot.

In spite of the high figures against the proposed reservoir in the Bogata area, the majority prevailed and the

issues were passed.

The reservoir has been a very controversial subject for some time, and both sides had worked hard to get the vote out and see that their "side" won.

It is to be hoped that now that the democratic process is finished, people can leave behind any hard feelings that resulted from the election campaign and continue to work together on other issues to make the county a better place to work and live.

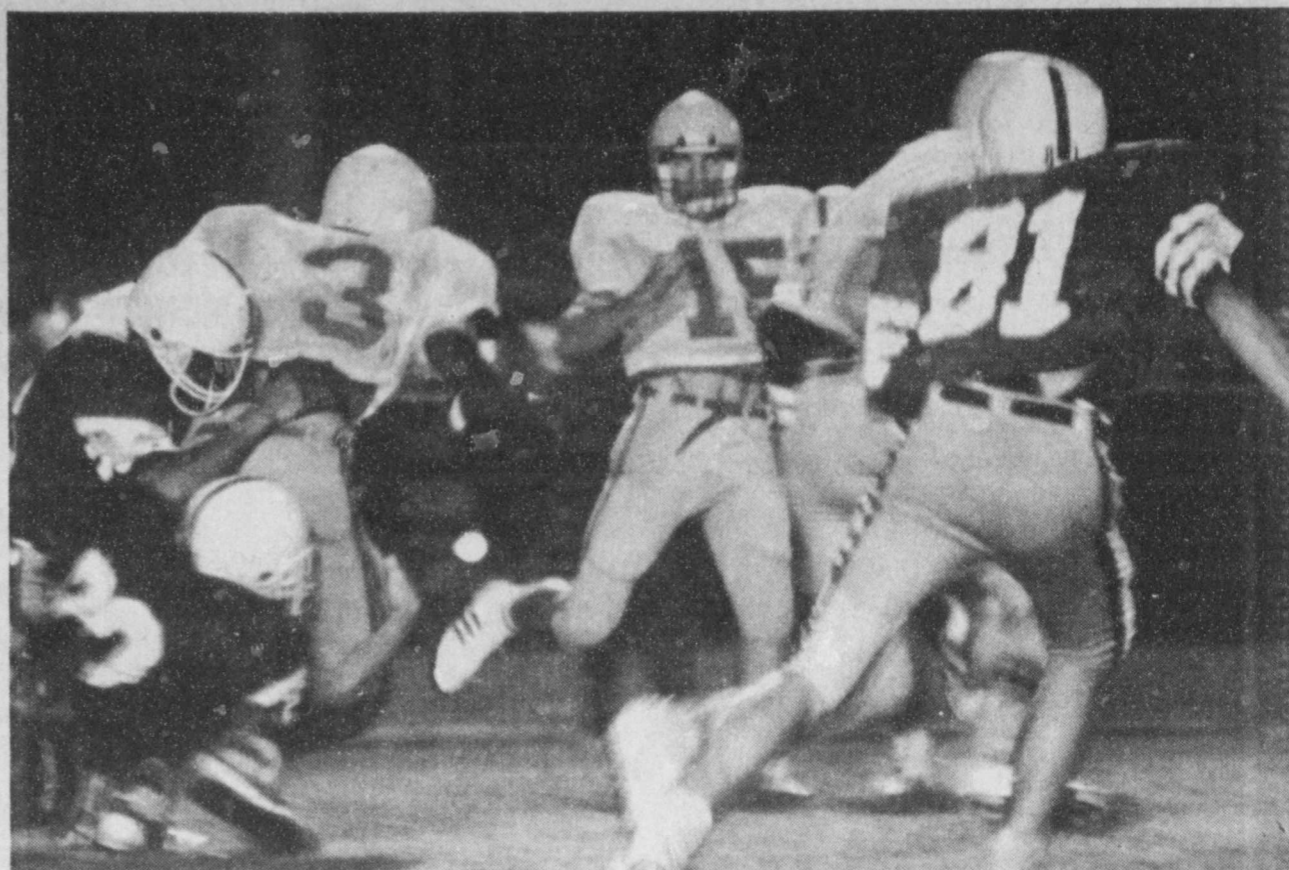

Rebels Fall To Tigers

The Rivercrest Rebels journeyed to Mt. Vernon last Friday night for a non-district clash with the class AAA Tigers. A wet field and a large Tiger team made the going tough for the

Rebels with the final result being a 20-7 Mt. Vernon victory.

Following the opening kick-off, the Rebels got off to a shaky start. The ball was jarred loose from Reb quarterback Bradley Woods, giving

Mt. Vernon possession on the Rivercrest 40-yard line.

The Tigers wasted little time capitalizing on the Reb error, relying on the arm of quarterback Jason Hopkins to bail them out of trouble on two crucial third down plays. The second being a scoring strike to wingback Brady Garcia from 54 yards out. The point after attempt was no good as the Tigers went on top of the Rebs 6-0 midway through the first period.

Rivercrest was unable to move on the Tiger defense on their next possession and was forced to punt.

Mt. Vernon took over on their own 32-yard line and with the aid of two Reb penalties, began working towards the endzone again. Despite a good defensive effort by lineman Todd Denny and John Purviance, the Tigers struck pay dirt from the three yard line. The two point conversion was good, giving the Tigers a 14-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Midway through the second quarter, the Rebels found themselves in excellent field position, following a 9-yard Tiger punt on the Mt. Vernon 38-yard line. One play was all the Rebs needed as Lafayette Brown took a handoff from Bradley Woods and outran the Mt. Vernon defense 38 yards for the Rebs lone TD of the contest. Donald Combs booted the extra point throughout the uprights, pulling the Rebels within 7 points of the Tigers. The first half ended with the Rebs trailing the Tigers 14-7.

The Tigers opened the second half with the ball on their own 39, but the Rebel defense shut down the Mt. Vernon offense, forcing a punt. The Rebels could do no better, though, as they also were unable to move the ball. Near the end of the third quarter the Tigers took over on the Rebel 41-yard line. The Tigers used only five plays to score their third touchdown of the evening, taking a 20-7 lead.

Rivercrest showed little spark in the fourth quarter, unable to advance the ball past midfield. But the Tigers appeared to want more as they banged the ball down to the Rebel 15-yard line. Tiger quarterback Jason Hopkins aimed a pass for the endzone but had it picked off by Rebel cornerback Jeremy Abshire. He returned the ball to the Reb seven yard line. Still unable to move the ball, the Rebels were forced to punt again.

The Rebel defense quickly stopped the Mt. Vernon drive giving the ball back to Rivercrest on the Reb 20, but were unable to move and went down 20-7 at the hands of the Tigers.

The Rebel offense managed 110 yards offense for the evening and were penalized eight times for 55 yards.

This week the Rebels host the Carlisle Indians at Rebel Stadium at 8 p.m.

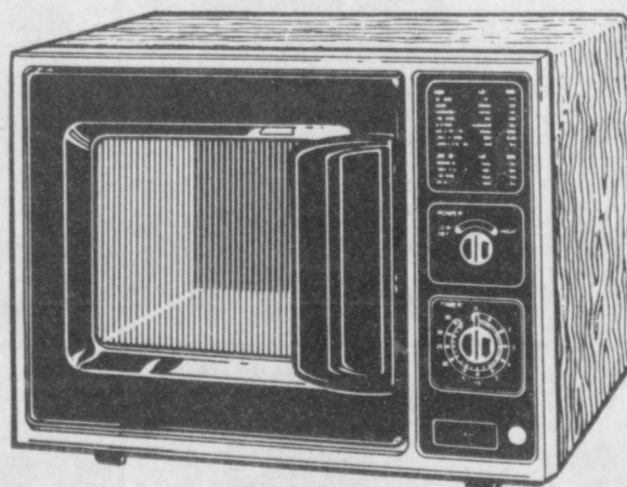

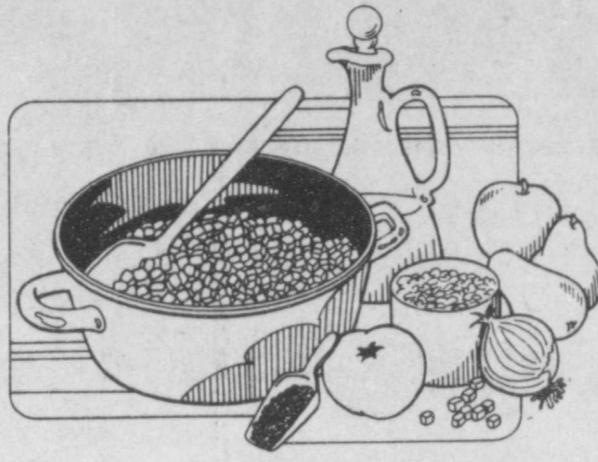
