Ballots cast in the September 19 Against Unfair Taxes." election to approve Dimple Reservoir will be officially recounted on Thursday, October 1, the Red River County Water District Board decided in an

emergency meeting September 28. The Board's action was in response to a petition for recount filed by Joe Bearden of Avery on behalf of the "Red River County Committee

The Board approved eight members named by James Vaughan, Jr., President of the Water District Board, in his capacity as Recount Supervisor. Four of the eight members of the official Recount Committee for recount of Confirmation, Bond and Maintenance Tax Election were suggested by the group that had

The committee will begin its work at the Red River County Courthouse, in chambers underneath the office of the County Clerk, at 8:30 a.m. on October 1, the Water District Board decided after consultation with the petitioning group.

"Petitions for recount are allowed

ten percent," said Vaughan. "We have received such a petition, and are proceeding under the recount procedures laid down in the Texas Election Code.

Don Cole of Avery, vice-president of the Water District Board and a proponent of the recount, said after the meeting that "the purpose of the rewhen the voting margin is less than count is to determine whether there

were any errors of addition that we would regret for twenty-five years.'

Rebels Scalp Indians

The Rivercrest Rebels grabbed their first win of the 1987 football season by knocking off the Carlisle Indians in Johntown last Friday. The Rebs used a powerful running attack and a near flawless passing game, overpowering the Indians 40-13.

Rivercrest began its scoring frenzy six minutes into the first quarter when Reb defender Jimmy Lewis intercepted an Indian pass on the Rivercrest 49-yard line. Then as in last week's game, tailback Scooter Brown made quick work of the Indians defense, racing 51 yards for the first touchdown of the contest. The PAT attempt was no good, but Rivercrest had an early 6-0 lead.

The Indians returned the ensuing kickoff to their own 45-yard line and quickly chewed off 25 yards before the Rebel defense forced the Indians hand on a fourth down and inches attempt. The Rebs threw Carlisle quarterback Steven Searcy for a one yard loss and took possession on their own 45-yard line. The hard-running efforts of fullback Geary Savage and Scooter Brown pushed the ball to the Carlisle 32-yard line. The Rebs then opted to pass on a second down but were unsuccessful. But on a third down and eight play, quarterback Bradley Woods hit split end Marvin Anderson for a 31-yard completion. Fullbck Geary Savage did the honors from there, carrying the ball over from the one yard line. An attempt at a twopoint conversion failed as the Rebels

The next Rebel score was set up by a swarming Rebel defense that backed the Indians up to their own 22-yard line before recovering a fumble on the 14-yard line. Reb quarterback Bradley Woods again went to the air, finding tight end Dennis Ewing alone in the endzone for the third TD of the evening. Donald Combs booted the Rivercrest extra point attempt through the uprights giving the Rebels a 19-0 score.

The Indians decided to pass on their next possession but found the Reb defense airtight and were forced to punt the ball back to Rivercrest.

The Rebels continued to pour it on the Indians though as backup quarterback Donald Combs scrambled free from the clutches of the Carlisle defense to complete a 34-yard pass to

sophomore split-end Jeremy Abshire, giving the Rebs a first and goal on the one yard line. Clint Tidwell carried

the ball in on the next play, the point after was good and Rivercrest took the 26-0 lead into the locker room at

The Indians were on the war path in the third quarter, pushing the ball to the Reb 4-yard line before a brilliant goal line stand had the Indians out of the endzone and gave the Rebels possession at their own four. But disaster struck the Rebs two plays later as they fumbled the ball back to Carlisle on the Rebel 17. The Indians wasted little time taking advantage of the Reb miscue when quarterback Steven Searcy hit Glen McElroy with a 15-yard scoring strike, making the score 26-6.

Once again the Reb offense stalled and was forced to put the ball back to Carlisle. The Indians had excellent field position at the Reb 31-yard line. Running back Kenneth Gill needed only one play as he scored from 31 yards out. The Indians made good on the PAT kick and only trailed 26-13 go-

ing into the final quarter Rivercrest was still full of life as the Rebs answered with another big play of their own as sophomore Marcus Savage weaved his way through Carlisle defenders for a 39-yard TD. Now, Rivercrest had a substantial 33-13 lead.

The Indians next possession was a futile attempt, netting them one yard before punting.

Joy Fellowship Held



If you smell gas, here's what to do.

You can't smell gas in its natural state, so Arkla adds a distinctive odor to make leaks easier to detect. Natural gas is clean, safe and efficient, but, if you smell gas in your home, there are certain things you should do.

If the odor of gas is light, the source of the leak is probably one of your gas appliances. Occasionally pilot lights will blow out, so first check each of these. While you're doing that, make sure each of the burners of your range and oven are turned completely off. In most cases, these two checks will solve the problem.
