Throughout my life I've had a great dream...to someday have photographs or an article published in my favorite magazine. It's very, very unlikely that it will ever happen.

In the meantime, however, I look forward to that yellow and white cover each month, and realize that I haven't missed an issue in 34 years!

Local Sales Tax Figures Mostly Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$55.3 million in local sales tax to 904 cities levying the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by 5.5 percent overall compared to payments made by October last year.

Houston's check was the largest, \$8.6 million, bringing total payments

in 1987 to 108.6 million, down 6.9 percent from last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$73,668.98 for a 5.69 percent decrease over last year's payments to date.

Talco received \$2,181.84 for an 85.24 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,128.56. Total payments to date are \$29,508.95.

Blossom received \$990.16 for this

period, a 17.76 percent increase over payments to date last year. Blossom received \$1,058.32 for the same period last year.

Deport received \$533.29 for this period, a 13.98 percent increase over 1987 total payments to date over 1986. Payment of \$500.29 was received for the same period last year.

Paris received \$143,785.35 for a 1.20 percent increase over 1986 payments to date.

Bogata received \$1,619.65 for a 16.98 percent decrease over 1986 payments to date. Payment for the same period last year was \$2,757.66.

Clarksville received \$12,697.55 for a

1.09 percent decrease while Detroit received \$2,567.51 for a 13.82 percent increase over 1986 payments to date.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

Adopt-A-Highway Program "In Business"

The Adopt-A-Highway program is open for business again.

The tremendously successful volunteer cleanup program was placed in hold last month, pending departmental review. Today, the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission gave the go-ahead for new groups to join the program.

The review was requested by the commission at its June business meeting. Questions had risen earlier in the month over allowing a political action group, the Austin Gay/Lesbian Political Caucus, to adopt a section of highway. In researching the questions, it became apparent that there were several other aspects of the program that needed review. These included liability, cost-effectiveness, and the degree to which the program has met its goals.

The department's Adopt-A-Highway program allows civic groups, garden clubs and other groups to adopt two-mile sections of highway for litter cleanup. The department places signs at each end of a group's section identifying the adopter.

The program was begun in the Tyler district in early 1985, and was approved as a statewide program in March 1986. Within a year, over 2,000 new groups had joined. At the time the program was placed on hold, 2,377 groups were signed up for the program. The surprisingly heavy response to the program from the local groups required an analysis of the program's administration also.

New standards for the program were developed as a result of the review. Some of these will save the department money. For example, rather than removing the gathered trash on the weekend, the department will collect it the following Monday. That and such measures as requiring groups to get their supplies from the department during regular business hours will eliminate the need for department employees to work overtime on weekends.

Also, because the Adopt-A-Highway signs are so expensive to erect, new groups will be required to adopt for a two-year period. Under the new rules, groups will pick up the trash on their sections of highway at least four times a year. Previously, the number of times a group had to pick up varied from twice a year to once a month, depending on the region where the highway was located.

Several of the new guidelines pertain to safety. They include a ban on the consumption of alcoholic beverages, and a requirement that groups hold at least two safety meetings a year and have a first-aid kit handy during the cleanups.

A limit of 3,000 groups has also been placed on the Adopt-A-Highway program.



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Texas A&M Lists Entrance Requirements

Requirements for admission to Texas A&M University and to clarify points relating to the new core curriculum that will be required for students entering TAMU in the 1988 Fall semester have been outlined. Two years of foreign language in high school is not a requirement for admission to TAMU. Rather, the requirement of a foreign language may be met either in high school or in college. That is, students must complete a two semester sequence of a foreign language in college unless they have completed two years of a foreign language in high school. In fact, a student may meet the requirement by demonstrating proficiency in a language other than English. Similarly, computer science in high school is not a requirement for admission. Again, this is a TAMU graduation requirement rather than an entrance requirement.

A student may be admitted to Texas A&M University who completes the "regular" high school program, the advanced high school honors program. That is, the requirements for admission to TAMU remain as follows: English-4 units; Social Science-2½ units; Mathematics-3 units; Science-2 units; Electives-4½ units.

TAMU now requires either the Scholastic Aptitude Test or the American College Test as part of its admission procedures. If a student is in the top 10% of the graduating class, there is no minimum SAT or ACT score.

For students planning on a major in agriculture at TAMU, it is encouraged to advise students to enroll in high school agricultural science courses.

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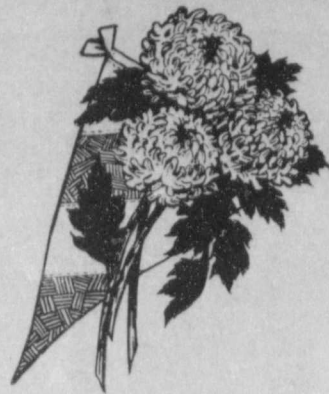

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Rebels Win District Opener

The Rivercrest Rebels opened their 1987 district season last Friday night against the Honey Grove Warriors in Johtown.

The Warriors came in with a highly touted passing game and the Rebels likewise with their running game. But neither materialized as the Warriors opted to run and the Rebs never got their running game going.

Honey Grove pounded out nearly 200 yards through the heart of the Rebel defense. The absence of two Rivercrest starters, linebacker Sammy Sparger and strong safety Donald Combs, due to injuries, weakened the Rebel defense somewhat. But the Rebel defense proved it could get the job

done when it had to. Yielding only two field goals to the Warriors after deep drives into Rebel territory.

The Rebels got off to a shaky start, fumbling the ball away three plays into their first possession of the contest. The Warriors wasted little time moving the ball into the Rebels end of the field behind the running of Darren Pratt. The Rebel defense tightened up and shut down the Warrior drive on the 16-yard line. The Honey Grove team decided to try a 26-yard field goal and took a 3-0 lead at the 7:00 minute mark of the first quarter.

Rivercrest faltered again on their second possession, gaining only three yards before having to punt the ball away.

Honey Grove took over on their own 25-yard line following a 45-yard punt by Rebel punter Bradley Woods. Three Warrior backs shared the load of carrying the ball to the Rebel 13-yard line before the Rebel defense put the champs on the Warrior offense again. And again the tribe was forced to attempt a field goal. The attempt was good as the Warriors went up 6-0 on the Rebels early in the second quarter.

Rivercrest was still unable to generate any offense in the first half and went into the locker room trailing the Warriors 6-0 at the half.

The Rebels looked like a different team in the second half. After trading turnovers the Rebs had the ball on the Warrior 33-yard line. A nine yard burst by Marcus Savage put the ball on the Honey Grove 24. One play was all quarterback Bradley Woods needed as he followed the blocking of his line around the end for a 24-yard touchdown. The absence of Donald Combs meant that Tim Easley would handle the kicking chores. His first extra point attempt sailed wide right of the goal. The score was tied at six each late in the third quarter.

The Warriors seemed determined to answer with another score of their own. Honey Grove drove the ball to the Rebel 2-yard line before Rebel lineman Todd Denny recovered a Warrior fumble in the endzone, thwarting the Warriors' hopes of going in front of the Rebels.

Both teams traded punts before Rivercrest began what would be the decisive scoring drive of the contest. A good mixture of running by Bradley Woods and Reb backs Geary Savage and Scooter Brown, steadily pushed the ball downfield.

The Rebels found themselves faced with a fourth and fifteen situation upon reaching the Warrior 23-yard line. Bradley Woods found Marvin Anderson racing down the sideline and hit him with a 22-yard pass completion giving Rivercrest a first and goal on the one yard line. Bradley Woods carried the ball over for the second Rebel touchdown of the game. The Rivercrest coaches decided to try for the two point conversion instead of a field goal. The conversion attempt failed and the Rebels led 12-6.

Honey Grove came out storming on their next possession as Warrior quarterback Homer Garner hit Michael Whitten with a 41-yard bomb on the first play of the series. A halfback option pass from Darren Pratt to wingback Doug Person gave

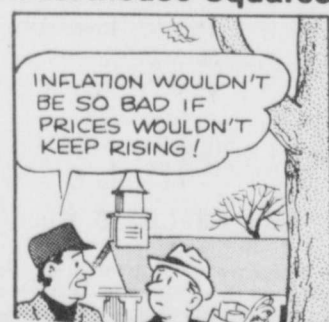

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Patients given widely prescribed benzodiazepine drugs for anxiety symptoms may be vulnerable to such withdrawal symptoms as insomnia, fatigue, restlessness, tremulousness, nausea, and anorexia. On high dose, long-term therapy, withdrawal seizures have also been reported to be a serious potential concern.

At the 14th World Congress of Biological Psychiatry meeting in Philadelphia recently, Dr. Karl Rickels, Professor of Psychiatry and Pharmacology at the University of Pennsylvania, reported that, in contrast, the new nonbenzodiazepine compound buspirone (BuSpar), currently awaiting FDA approval, has not been found to cause withdrawal symptoms even upon abrupt discontinuation.

Dr. Rickels concluded that "the incidence and severity of withdrawal are significantly more marked with benzodiazepine medication than with buspirone."

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Old Fashioned Meatloaf

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
3/4 cup Quaker Oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
1/2 cup chopped onion or green pepper
1/2 cup tomato sauce or catsup
1 egg

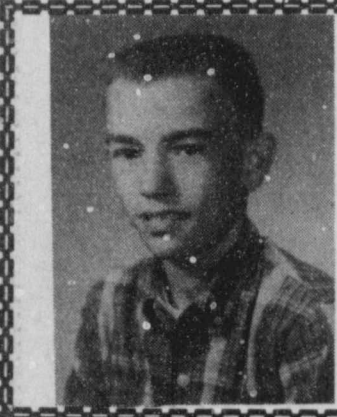

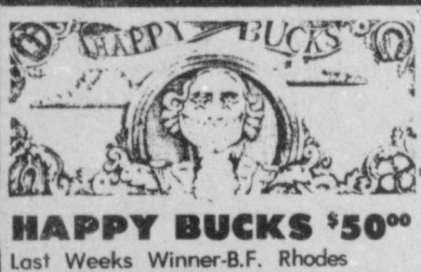

"Fortunately, these accounts can be made more complete and accurate. With colleagues, I have developed an interviewing procedure based on memory retrieval techniques that effectively improves a witness's recall.

"We are excited about this approach because studies have shown it produces the benefits of hypnosis without the need to induce hypnosis and without the accompanying risks, such as possible distortion of the memory process."
