Christmas gift that lasts throughout the whole year.

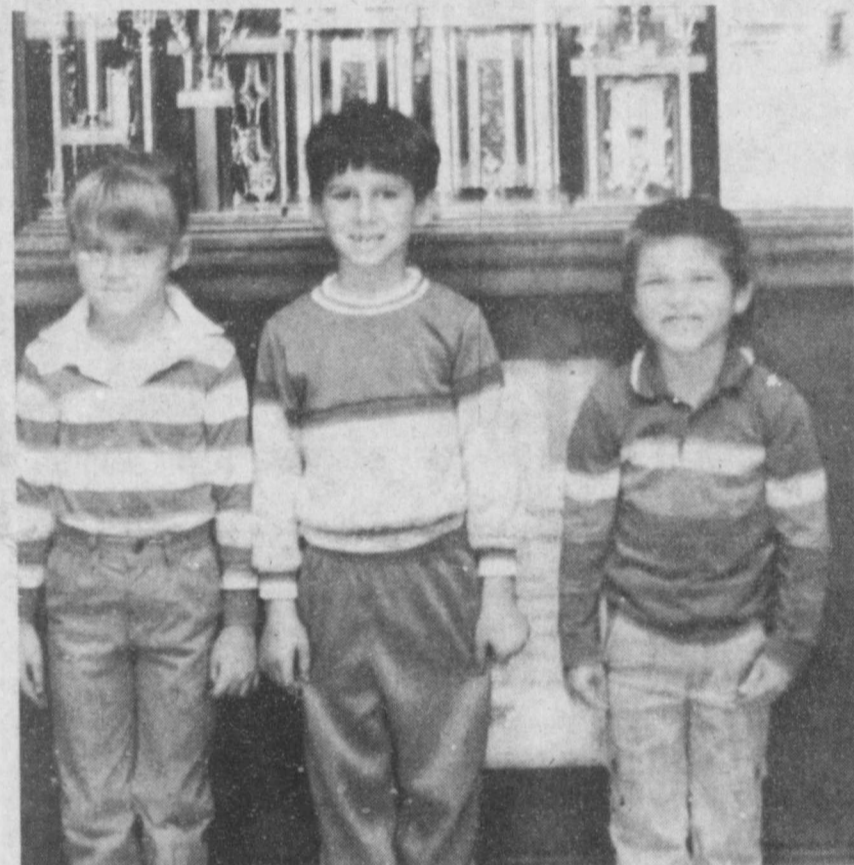
Local news, photos, public information, a television schedule and feature articles are available in the publication.

The Texas Department of Health, Public Region 7/10 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

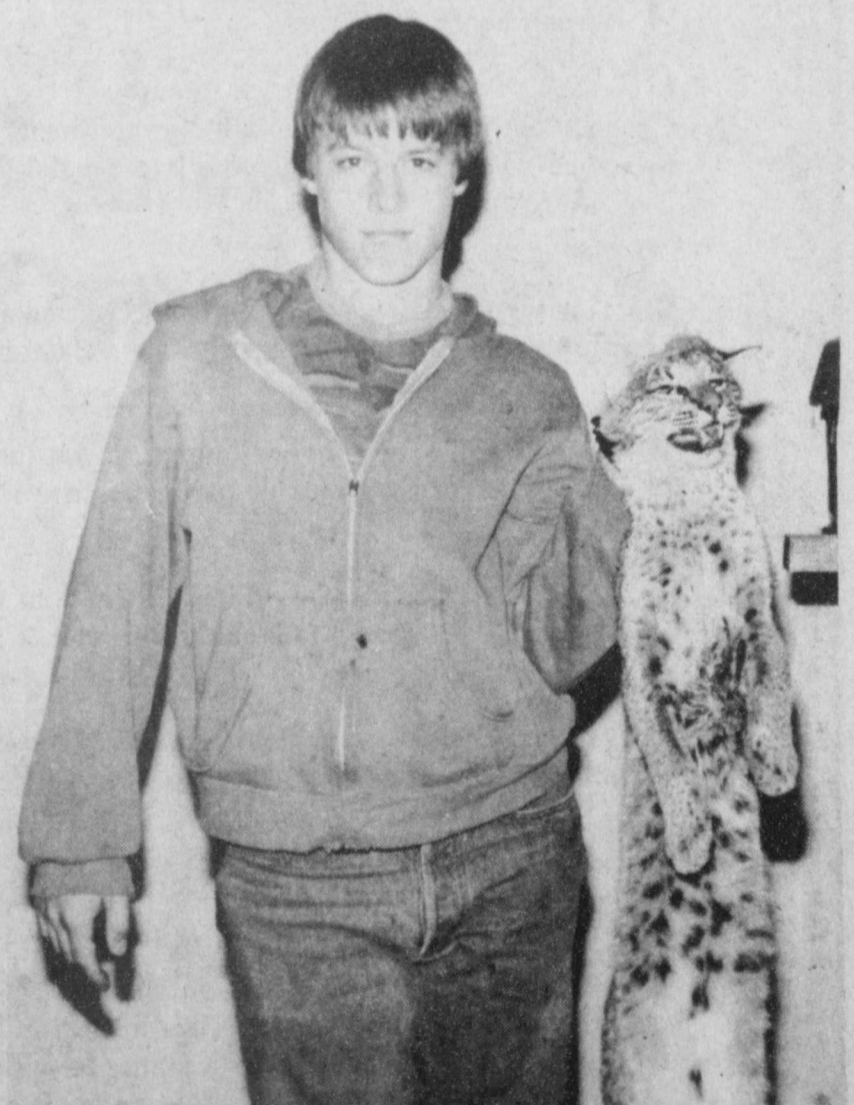
The clinic will be at 210 S. Johnson St. in Mt. Pleasant on December 2 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

# DON'T Let An Electrical Accident RUIN Your HOLIDAY SEASON!

An electrical accident can ruin the joy of the holiday season. Here is a handy checklist to follow when decorating your home so that you can avoid such accidents.

1. Never place electrical lights on a dry, brittle natural Christmas tree.
2. Do not use 120 voltage lighting on a metal or aluminum tree. Off-the-tree spotlighting is preferred for this type of decoration.
3. Use only holiday lights that have the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) listing mark for safety standards.
4. Before plugging in holiday lights, check for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections.
5. Don't overload circuits. If your lights dim when turned on, you have too many lights on that circuit.
6. When hanging outside lights, use only those approved for outside use. Do not install near overhead power lines.
7. Don't leave your holiday lights on when you're away or asleep.

Never assume that your holiday lighting is safe. Make it a standard practice to inspect all lighting each year. When it comes to holiday lighting, if in doubt — throw it out. It is much better to replace holiday lighting than to risk spoiling the season with an accident.

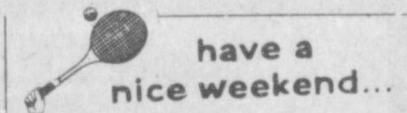

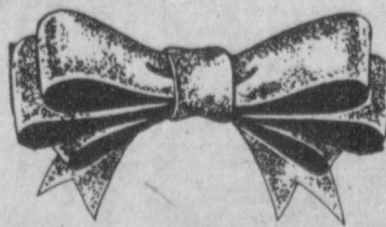

1 can (20 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple
1 cup catsup
1/3 cup brown sugar, packed
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon grated lemon peel
1 (3-lb.) fryer chicken, cut up
1 tablespoon cornstarch

Drain pineapple well, reserving juice. Combine juice with catsup, brown sugar, lemon juice and peel. Arrange chicken in a shallow casserole dish. Pour sauce over and marinate 3 hours or overnight in refrigerator. Arrange chicken on a grill or broiler 4 inches from heat. Grill 20 minutes on each side, or until done. Combine marinade, pineapple and cornstarch in a saucepan. Cook, stirring, until sauce boils and thickens. Baste chicken with sauce 2 to 3 minutes before done. Pass sauce to serve over chicken. 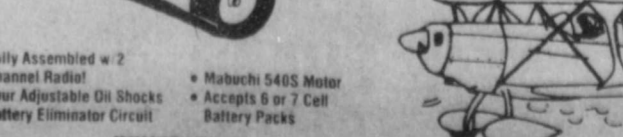

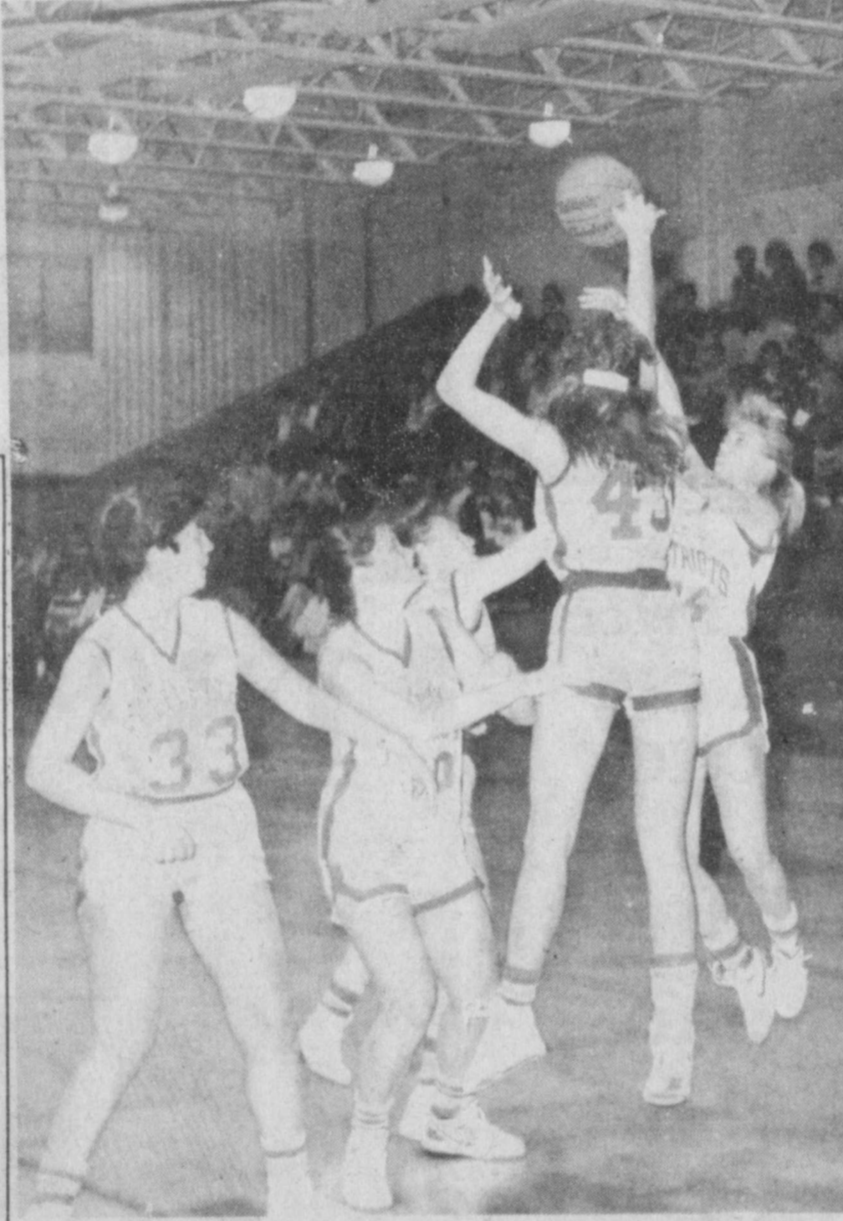
