_ack Of Sight Doesn't Daught Couple

By Mollie Williams Russell and Kathy Woodall are special people, not just because they are visually impaired, but because they have conquered the overwhelming problems that accompany handicapped human beings in a society created for sighted people.

Kathy Woodall became blind only hours after her premature birth from too much oxygen in the incubator. Although she's never known what it's like to see with eyes, she's managed to gain a very good education by graduating from a public high school, attending a year of college in Oklahoma and completing several trainings for the blind. She has held jobs as a medical transcriptionist, has done secretarial and clerical work, worked as a switchboard operator, worked for the State Agency for Abused Children in Little Rock, AR and worked for the IRS in the Customer Service Department. Kathy says that in past years she would work a while and save up for expenses, then go for more training wherever it was offered, realizing she would have to be over-trained in order to compete in the business world with her handicap and with computers entering the field.

Kathy enjoyed her work for the IRS because she did most of her tax counseling over the telephone. "No one knows you're blind on the phone," says Kathy with a grin. Kathy says the work was challenging because she would have to refer to the many volumes of information in Braille and yet had to be able to give customers answers as quickly as sighted people. However, she says she had very good training and memorized a lot of material and was able to do the work quite efficiently.

Kathy says she owes her independence to her mother. "She never let me accept defeat," says Kathy. Kathy's mother was so determined that Kathy overcome her difficulty that she did not allow her to attend special schools, but kept her enrolled in public schools. Her mother attended training programs designed for parents of blind children and learned how to transcribe much of Kathy's school work into Braille. Kathy learned to type by the time she was in the third grade and from that time on handed in homework and assignments just like sighted students.

When asked about her social life during her teenage years, Kathy admits that there were some difficulties. "At times, it seemed as though I was the only girl in the world without a date." Kathy recalls, "But then, someone would come along who could

look beyond my hardship and I'd have a good time.'

Kathy says that her independence helped her to be able to cope with society and that she has always believed it was up to the blind people to educate the public about their condition. She also feels that it was her generation that brought the blind out of "broom making" and gave them a place in the business world.

Kathy recalls few problems with coworkers in the jobs she has held. "After a few days on the job, I proved to them that I could do my part and didn't need any special favors. After that, things usually went okay." One of the biggest problems Kathy faces as a blind person is people's reaction to her leader dog. She says a lot of people are afraid of dogs and tend to withdraw from her in some places. 'However," says Kathy, "this is my form of mobility and I can feel independent working as a team with my

Kathy recently spent two and one half weeks in Morristown, New Jersey being trained with Lyra, a yellow Lab which was given to her by The Seeing Eye Company. Kathy's first leader dog died, so she was already familiar with using a leader

Kathy's first marriage ended in divorce, leaving her with two small boys, age one and two years old to raise alone. Kathy says she has felt the most fulfilled in life as a mother and although the struggles have been many, the joys have been far greater. Under the supervision of a friend who has a nurse, Kathy learned to bathe and care for infants before her first child was born by practicing with a doll and later with another friend's baby. She says the infant stage was easy because they had to stay where they were put. It was as toddlers that the boys gave Kathy her greatest concern. "They wore bells on their shoes long after most children," Kathy says, laughing.

Kathy and her boys moved a lot during the boys' younger days so that Kathy could get job training. She said she was always amazed that after a few days living in a new complex, someone from the welfare department would come by to tell her they had received a report from neighbors that a blind woman was living there with two small boys. "I finally learned to expect it and didn't let it bother me. They never caused me any trouble," says Kathy.

Kathy met her present husband at the Rehabilitation Center in Little Rock. AR while working there as the switchboard operator. Russell had

enrolled in the center to learn small engine repair for the blind. Russell inherited retinaitis pigmentosa, a deterioration of the retina. Russell realized he had this deterioration by the time he was a tenth grader in high school. Doctors told him he could lose complete vision at any time. With this tragic possibility hanging over him, Russell set out to get training that would allow him to support himself when his sight was gone.

Kathy recalls that as a student at the center, Russell had impressed her with his willingness to face his situation realistically and prepare for it. She says that a lot of victims in . Russell's condition refuse to face their trouble and end up bogged down in self-pity and no way to support themselves.

After completing the course on small engine repair, which, for Russell involved completely taking an engine apart, putting it back together and making it run while blindfolded, Russell became an instructor at the Rehab Center teaching the trade.

Russell and Kathy were married in March, 1983. Kathy's sons, Robert and Jerry were eight and nine years of age. Although the boys were anxious for a father figure, they were also a bit mistrustful, but within two weeks the boys were calling Russell dad, making Russell and Kathy very happy. Since that time, the relationship between them has grown very close. According to Kathy, the boys accept having visually impaired parents very well. "I have always maintained good communication with my boys. We always talk about everything. If I embarrass them, they tell me." Kathy tells of the time the school asked her to bring her leader dog and speak to the students. She said this made the boys feel very proud and special. Any problems in communication she now has with the boys, she attributes to their age and feels that the breakdown is what any parent of teenagers might face and not because she's blind.

The Woodall family moved to Rivercrest, just a few miles south of Bogata on Highway 271, in July of this year. The land there was given to them by Kathy's brother to set up a small engine repair shop. Russell hopes to get the business set up and some business coming in before he loses his vision. Robert and Jerry, now 12 and 13 years old, are anxious to help him in the shop. Kathy says she would like to find some part time work in order to supplement their income. The entire family seems to be very happy living here. The boys en-

Talco Purchases **New Emergency System**

The City of Talco has recently purchased a new answering system for its emergency number. The number is still 379-3331. This new system enables fire department personnel a 24-hour coverage on this number without trying to keep volunteers at home by the phone all the time.

The system works by letting firemen answer either through a walkie-talkie or a remot epatch in their vehicle when there is no one by a phone or everyone is on a call when another call is received.

The number, 379-3331, still reaches the City offices Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. On weekends, holidays and after hours, this number will be answered by volunteer firemen or the answering service using remote equipment.

If you use this service, please turn down all radios, televisions, scanners or anything with loud noises as this system is voice activated and loud noises make it difficult to transmit or



- 1 small onion, chopped (about 1/4 cup) cup margarine or b
- cups cooked rice



he continues to operate


