Care Of Christmas Plants

If you have been nice, there could be a beautiful flowering plant or maybe a fruit or pecan tree under your Christmas tree. I cannot think of a more thoughtful gift, but more often than not, we are not familiar with the lant, do not care for it properly and it soon deteriorates.

Available from our office in the County Courthouse are several publications that should help one to do a better job of caring for these special plants. The next time you are in town, sto pby room 105 for a copy

Let's talk about care of these fruit and nut trees. If you were one of the lucky recipients of one of these, you may want to heel the plant in your flower bed or garden area prior to actually planting. Remember most of these plants are bare rooted and the roots will dry out if they continue to be exposed to the air. So, they need

to be placed in the soil soon. If it is not convenient to plant the plants at this time, one can place

them in a trench and cover the roots

with soil. Be sure to make the trench deep enough to prevent freezing of the roots if a hard freeze is expected.

Poinsettias outrank all other Christmas plants combined in popularity. They are well adapted to indoor temperatures so long as they are not allowed to sit in hot or cold drafts. Put them near a bright window and aim at keeping the soil evenly moist, but never soggy or overly dry. Poinsettias used to be pretty sensitive to changes from a greenhouse environment to that of a hme, with leaf and flower drop being a common problem. With newer varieties available, you can just about plan on your upoinsettias looking nice on Valentine's Day, if you care to keep them around that long.

Kalanchoes should be kept in a sunny window. This plant flowers when the days are short; consequently, they are difficult to reflower in the home if carried over for another year. Lights used in the home provide long days and the plant will not set flower

buds under such conditions. They do make excellent foliage plants once the flowers are faded. Just remove the flower stalks and use as a foliage

Christmas Cactus isn't a typical cactus. It requires as much water as any other house plant, though it should not be overwatered. This is one plant that can be kept over to bloom again next Christmas with good success. Kep it in a sunny window until danger of frost is past, then place it in a shady spot out of doors during the summer. Bring it inside next fall, place in a cool room and with reasonable luck, flowers should appear by Christmas.

Sales Taxes Up State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Friday sent checks totaling \$57.6 million in local sales tax to 852 cities

that levy the one-percent city tax.

Most Local

Bullock said this month's allocations showed an increase of \$3.3 million over last year's December allocations, an increase of 6.2 percent. However, statewide year-end totals

for the monthly city allocatin decreased to \$850.7 million from the 1986 total payment of \$886.3 million, Bullcok added.

"The increase in this month's payments is the result of two factorsstatewide economic recovery and a widening of the state's tax base," Bullock said. "Our economy is recovering, but it's going to take some time," he added.

December checks represent taxes collected in October and reported by November 20. October was the first month that the broadened tax base went into effect, according to Bullock.

The tax base was widened as a result of state legislation passed during last summer's special session.

This month's largest allocation, \$9.2 million, was to Houston, an increase of 9.4 percent. Dallas received the second-largest allocation, \$6.9

San Antonio's check totaled \$3.7 million, an 8.7 percent increase from

Locally, Bogata received \$1,098.74 for a 15.67 percent decrease over total payments to date for the same period last year. Clarksville received \$14,861.35 for a 0.51 percent increase while Detroit received no payment for

this period. Mt. Pleasant received \$74,732.88 for a 5.71 percent decrease.

Talco received \$1,354.80 for a 75.72 percent increase over total payments to date for the year.

Blossom received \$636.82 for a 14.30 percent increase over last year's payments to date.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to no payment for the same period last year while Paris received \$156,418.31 for a 0.58 percent increase from last year. Bullock sent checks totaling \$26.2 million to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities, an increase of 5.6

percent over December 1986 allocations. Dallas' DART payment of \$10.4 million was highest, while Houston's MTA received a payment of \$10.2 million

Dora Frye Cans, Fishes, Cheers For Her Football Favorites!

Dora Frye of Talco is 79 years old. That doesn't stop her from leading an active, useful life.

This year she tried something new for the first time....she entered her canned goods in the Titus County Fair. She brought home a whole handful of ribbons.

Canned pears won Best of Class, her pear preserves captured first place, and she earned two second place ribbons for sweet cucumber pickles and hot tomato relish. She is an expert at canning, and her hot, homemade rolls are a legend in the Talco area. She takes rolls to the sick.

Mrs. Frye has lived in Talco for 44 years. She and her husband, Edward, moved from Redwater so that he could work in the Talco oil field. He was manager of Talco Well Service upon his death in 1982.

She has two sons and nine grandchildren, all of which are recipients of her homemade goodies.

One son, Edward Jr., is a school teacher in Guthrie, while the other son, Bob, owns a tool packing business in Palestine.

She remembers vividly incidents from her girlhood. Born next to oldest in a family of 12 children, growing up in Arkansas meant that everyone worked. She recalls singing as she picked cotton, and milking the cows

with her sister. She was born in 1898, and her father

was a commercial fisherman during the summer and trapped and hunted in the winter. He also worked as a carpenter.

"My mama was the sweetest person," Dora smiles, "she always said if you couldn't say something nice about a person, they don't say it." Her eyes get a far away look as she

recalls big breakfasts every morning, with jelly and jam. Helping her Mama is where she learned her canning skills.

She married Edward Frye in 1928, and they were married for 541/2 years,

until his death. She counts her canning and ncooking skills among her hobbies, but also loves camping and fishing. When Edward was alive, they went fishig at

Daisy, Arkansas and Palestine. An 81/2 pound bass mounted on the wall attests to her fishing skills, and she professes that whether it is rod and reel, cane pole or trotline

fishing...she just loves to do it. Smiling, she admits to having all her own teeth, and that she has never drunk nor smoked. She is an avid sports fan and loves football.

Dora has led an active life, and still does her own yard work. She looks forward to entering more canned

goods in the fair next year. At 79, she hasn't slowed down much...and one hardly expects that

The permit also authorizes an intermittent discharge from the River Crest Reservoir to a canal; thence to the Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin, The River Crest Steam Electric Station is located adjacent to River Crest Reservoir, which is approximately 504 miles southeast via U.S. Highway 271 of the City of Bogata, Red River

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a fraft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that monitoring requirements for Total Dissolved Solids have been added to Outfall 001 and Total Residual Chlorine has been ubstituted for Free Available Chlorine. The renewed permit will also from the new Outfall 501 instead of from Outfall 301. The expiration date of the existing permit was July 5, 1987. It is proposed that the expiration data be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.
