Expressions May Have Unusual Origins

Why do we say that a theory won't hold water? Where did the expression "putting the cart before the horse" come from? Words, and phrases, have always been a fascinating part of our language, both oral and written.

Over the next few weeks, we'll take a look at some of the curious and obvious, origins of the expressions we use in our every day lives.

I have used Webster's Dictionary for some of the sources, and "A Hot On Ice and Other Curious Expressions" by Charles Earle Funk, Litt. D. for others. During the course of the research I've come across common expressions too numerous to ever

print, but almost without fail, they have logical, or startling, explanations.

"Spick and Span", for about two hundred years, has been used to mean very trim and smart, neat and orderly, but for the two hundred years preceding that, the phrase had no other meaning than to be totally, completely new. It started as "Span-New," an expression meaning brand new, as new as a fresh cut chip, for "span" back then, meant a chip. "Spick" was added afterwards, and it meant a splinter, as in newly shaved wood.

"Small fry", referring to young children has its basis in two places. One, the ancient Norse word fry refer-

red to the man with a large family, and later "fry" meant the numerous young of salmon!

How often is a special time referred to as a "red letter day" in someone's life? That expression goes back to the fifteenth century, when red or purple colors were used to mark special holy days in the church...later the red color was used to mark special days on the calendar...as they still are.

Sometime during the seventeenth century, the term "to hold water" was begun. It came from the habit of testing a pitcher or bowl newly made for soundness by the simple expedient of putting water into it. If the vessel was faulty, it "won't hold water". It was simple to apply to stories and tales

and theories, and is still a common expression.

"To know the ropes" has an expression so old that its origin is shrouded in the cloudy paths of time. It probably became used first in nautical communities when an experienced sailor quite literally "knew the ropes" of a sailing ship, having to use such knowledge for furling and unfurling sails, climbing in the rigging, etc.

"Barking up the wrong tree" probably needs no explanation at all, it is a thoroughly American expression, coined by coon hunters about a dog that bayed up a tree without a coon in it, while the coon was actually in another.

What about "the apple of one's eye". The beginning of that expres-

sion is actually quite different from what might be expected, and has nothing to do with fruit.

In ancient times, the pupil of the eye was called the apple, and was thought to be a round, solid body in the eyeball. Because injury to that portion of the eye blinded, the expression came to mean that which was held dearest.

If we knuckle under nowadays, we think of giving in to someone or something. In modern times we think of knuckles as the joints on our fingers, but in ancient times, the knuckle meant the knee or the elbow. To knuckle under referred to ancient Egyptians and others who were forced to kneel down on their knees and elbows in obedience to the King.

Editor's Note: Well, I've embarrassed myself once more. Yes, Charles Dickens was the author of "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." I know that now. I took a poll of about four folks when I wrote the story, they agreed with me on the Victor Hugo authorship. My husband didn't see the story until after it was published...and he knew the correct answer. Sometimes, as I've said, the gears are slipping!

Erma Bombeck wrote a column recently on the return of the girdle. She took up a subject that my best friend and I had considered on a recent trip to Dallas, only we didn't confine the conversation to girdles.

Our generation, with forty looming high on the horizon, will probably make the sloppiest bunch of older women ever to be seen.

We grew up just as girdles, full foundation garments and high heel shoes were going out.

We wore our skirts short...very, very short, much like the mini skirts today.

Then we hit the early 70's...and we all attended weddings where most of the crowd was barefooted, everyone had on long "granny" dresses, flowers woven in their hair and no one would have thought of wearing panty hose...much less a girdle!

Then, in our late twenties, we hit the back-to-nature spell of embroidered chambray shirts, flannel shirts, blue jeans and "waffle stomper" hiking boots.

Even make up went pretty much by the wayside.

I can't picture the millions of baby-boomer females spending an extra hour each morning tugging constricting elastic garments on, putting up our hair and painting faces like works of art.

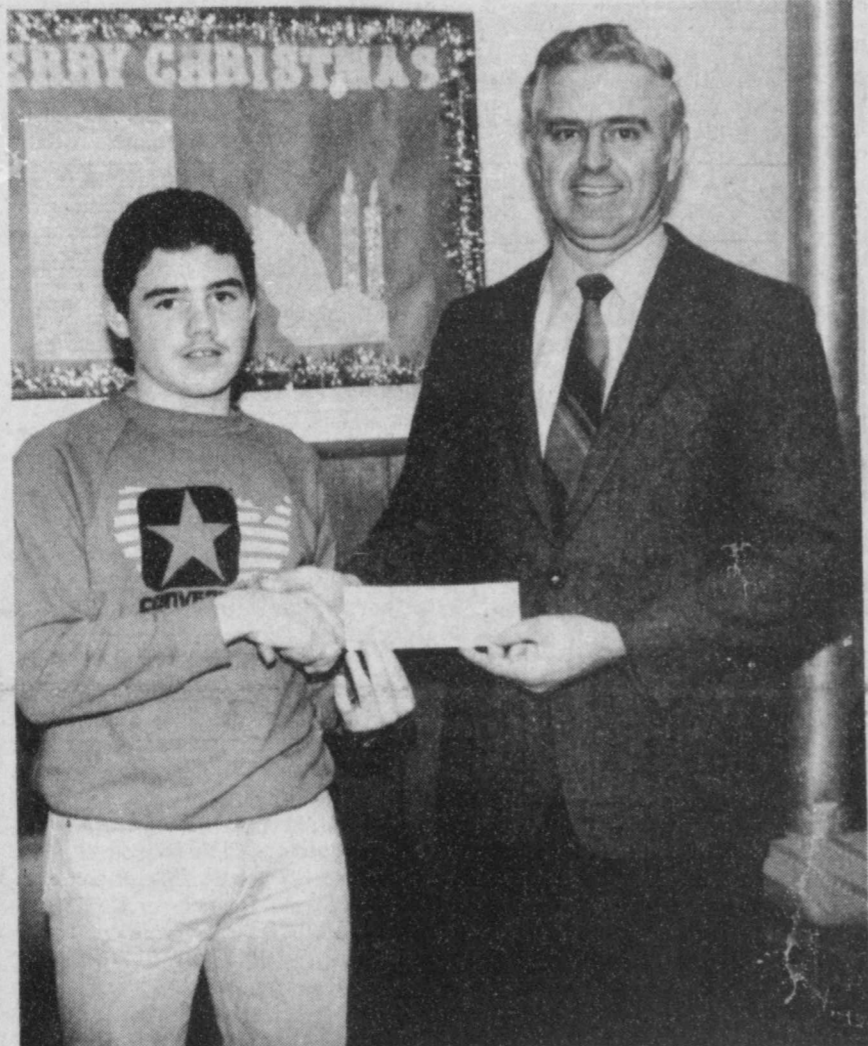
Oh, sure, being women we'll take a stab at it...but more likely, we'll give up pretty quick and be exactly what I've said, a pretty sloppy bunch of gals!

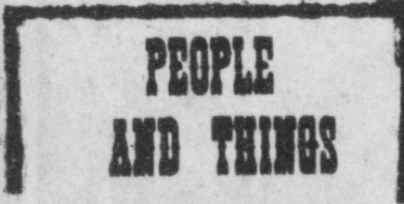

NTCC Spring Registration Set

Registration for the 1988 Spring Semester at Northeast Texas Community College continues January 11 through the 15th in the college Administration Building, according to Registrar and Director of Admissions, Phil W. Ebensberger.

Registration hours will be from 8:30 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8:30 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Friday, January 15. Classes will begin Monday, January 18.

According to Ebensberger, over 600 students participated in the early registration program conducted during the first week of December.

Copies of the new schedule are now available and include 190 day courses and 115 night courses with all of the courses scheduled to be offered on the NTCC campus.

NTCC has scheduled an 11 a.m. activity period each Wednesday, attempting to respond to the increasing number of student organizations to allow them an opportunity to schedule meetings and activities as not to conflict with classes. This will also allow the college to schedule special programs during the time period.

Final examinations will be May 9-12.

Students previously enrolled at NTCC need not complete a new application for admission; however, these students should seek academic advisement from a faculty member prior to registration. Students who have questions or concerns regarding college majors or programs of study are encouraged to seek career counseling which is available through the counseling center.

Students planning to graduate at the end of this academic year should

have an official degree plan on file in the Registrar's Office prior to the beginning of the spring semester.

The 1988 graduation program will be Thursday, May 12 at 8 p.m.

All students entering NTCC for the first time are required to complete an application for admission, a health form, an oath of residence and provide a copy of their high school or college transcripts or GED certificates.

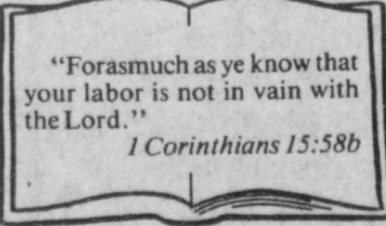

Commodities To Be Distributed Jan. 12

Commodities will be distributed Tuesday, January 12. In order to be recertified, applicants need to bring in verification of income. Income means wages earned, social security, SSI, VA benefits, interest from money in the bank, unemployment and in-

come received from rent houses or similar income sources.

This income has to be verified. Verification can be a check stub, photostatic copy of check or letter from income source. SSI recipients may use Medicaid cards as verification.

If using check stubs, applicants need to show proof of residence or Texas Drivers license. Applicants will be responsible for obtaining their own verification.

Rivercrest Hosts Holiday Tourney

Last week the Rivercrest Rebels and Rebels hosted the second annual Christmas Holiday Tournament. Both teams walked away with trophies, but the Rebel men fell short of winning the first place trophy like the Rebelettes.

The first contest pitted the Rebelettes against Sulphur Bluff. Rivercrest wasted little time establishing their dominance as they forged a 15-9 first quarter lead. Both teams slowed the pace somewhat enroute to a 24-14 Rebelette advantage. The third and fourth quarters were identical as the Reb team chipped in 12 per quarter on their way to a 48-28 victory.

The Rebel varsity also faced Sulphur Bluff in the first round of the men's bracket. The Sulphur Bluff team proved to be no match for the Rebels as the Rebs outdistanced their opponent 27-10. The second quarter saw Rivercrest pour in 20 points to take a 47-22 halftime lead.

The Reb starters played the entire third quarter and poured in 23 points to pad their lead to 70-32 going into the final quarter. The Reb bench proved as lethal as the starters as they added 29 points to an already lopsided 99-41 victory.

The second round pitted both teams against the Detroit Eagle teams. Neither teams were a match for the Rivercrest teams. The Rebelettes scored their opponent 62-26 for a win into the finals. The Rebels also took an easy victory over the Eagles, 87-39, and also getting a shot at a trophy in the finals on New Year's Eve.

The Rebelettes brought in the new year with a bang by beating the Saltillo Lady Lions for the first place trophy.

The Lions played the Reb fens tough in the first quarter trailing only 14-10 at the end of the first quarter. Early in the second quarter the Rebelettes blew open the game, outscoring the Lions 19-11 to take a 33-21 halftime advantage.

Both teams were pretty evenly matched in the third quarter as the Rebelettes and Lady Lions scored 15 and 14 points respectively for a 48-36 difference going into the final period. The Rebelettes kept pressuring the Lions offense with good defensive hustle and pitched in 16 more oints in the process as the Rebelettes took a 64-49 win and the first place trophy.

Rachel Smith and Amy Gladden were named to the All Tournament team. Point guard Kim Clark was selected as the MVP of the girls bracket.

The Rebel varsity drew Redwater for the finals. The Dragons proved to be a formidable opponent and the Reb team suffered through one of its poorest shooting efforts of this season. Rivercrest led 17-16 after the first quarter. But things started to go badly early in the second quarter as the Dragons pulled ahead of the Rebs and widened the gap to a 10 point advantage to lead the Rebels 38-28 at half time.

Rivercrest closed the gap somewhat in the third quarter, pulling within six before giving up

another Redwater basket for a 50-42 Dragon led going into the fourth quarter. The Rebels made a hard charge at the Redwater lead to pull within three points, 60-57, with :03 seconds left in the contest. But a last second shot from 3-point range by Bradley Woods fell short and Craig Savage tipped the ball in for two points and a 60-59 loss and the second place trophy.

Three Rebel players were named to the All Tournament team, Marvin Anderson, Craig Savage and David Bush. Anthony Neal from Redwater was named MVP in the boys bracket. Saturday the Rivercrest teams hosted Celeste. The Rebelettes had their work cut out for them against a tall Celeste team. Celeste took a 16-10 lead in the first quarter but saw the Rebelettes charge back within two points and a 27-25 deficit.

Rivercrest outplayed their opponent in the third quarter, taking a 35-31 lead going into the fourth quarter. But mistakes by the Rebelettes proved to be their undoing, allowing Celeste to catch the Rebs and pass them enroute to a 52-44 victory.

The nightcap pitted the Rebels against the Celeste varsity. Celeste jumped out to an early 4-2 lead but wilted before the Reb onslaught that would outscore Celeste 31-8 in the first quarter.

The massacre continued in the second quarter as the Rebs outscored Celeste 24-13 for a 55-21 halftime lead.

The Rebels slacked up somewhat in the third quarter, scoring only 13 points. But the Reb bench picked up the tempo in the final period pouring in 21 points for a 89-54 win.

This week Rivercrest travels to New Diana. Tuesday night and Leonard, Friday evening for a pair of district contests.

Red Beans and Rice

- 1 lb. red or kidney beans
- Water
- 4 smoked ham hocks
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 1 lg. clove garlic, pressed
- 4 cups small, whole Dole Fresh Mushrooms
- 1 cup chopped Bud of California Celery
- 1 cup chopped green onion
- 2 tbsp. white vinegar
- 1/2 tsp. thyme, crumbled
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper
- Hot fluffy rice

Cover beans with water. Soak overnight. Cover ham hocks with water. Cook, covered, 1 to 1 1/2 hours until tender. Remove meat from bones. Add meat back to stock along with drained beans and remaining ingredients, except rice. Simmer, covered, 2 hours. Stir 3 to 4 times. Broth should be thickened from beans. Serve over rice.

Lemon Cheesecake Mousse

- 1 Butter flavored ready crust
- 1 3 oz. package instant lemon pudding
- 1/2 pint whipped cream, whipped into stiff peaks
- 1 8 oz. package cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 tsp. lemon extract
- 1/2 cup milk
- 4 tbsp. finely grated lemon peel

Stir milk into softened cream cheese; stir in lemon pudding mix. Fold pudding and cream cheese mixture into whipped cream (temply). Add lemon extract and 2 tablespoons lemon peel. Pile high into butter crust. Garnish with remaining peel; chill well.

Coconut Chicken Breasts

- 3/4 cup Bisquick® baking mix
 - 3/4 cup flaked coconut
 - 1/2 tsp. paprika
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
 - 2 tbsp. Dijon-style mustard
 - 4 boneless chicken breast halves, skinned
 - 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted

Since taking office in 1981 I have averaged approximately 75 felony convictions per year, and the number of persons in Red River County convicted of felonies per 10,000 population is higher than the comparable figure for 4 of the 7 Texas counties which border Red River County.

In the 1950s Red River County sent to prison about 4 criminals per year, in the 1960s about 4, and in the 1970s about 6. Since I took office in 1981, the County has sent about 23 criminals per year to prison. In 1985 Red River County ranked in the top 3% and in 1986 in the top 20%, among Texas counties for the number of persons sent to prison for each 10,000 population.

In the 10-year period 1951-60 the County sentenced criminals to a total of about 147 years in prison; 1961-70 a total of about 159 years in prison; 1971-80 a total of about 437 years in prison. Since I took office in 1981, the County in the 7-year period 1981-1987, has sentenced criminals to a total of about 1,226 years. Concurrent sentences are not included.

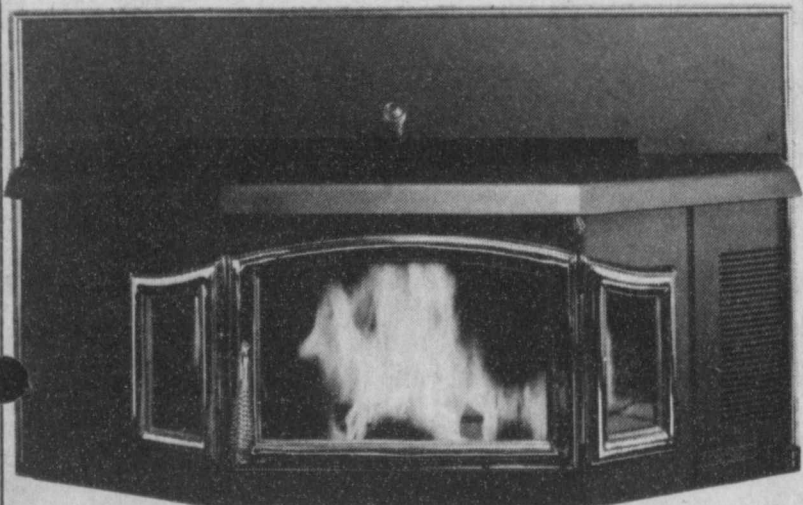
About 348 persons are presently on adult felony or misdemeanor probation in Red River County, more than 2% of the County's 16,101 population.

Convictions for class A and B misdemeanors averaged about 100 per year before I took office. They average about 167 per year now, and about 3/4 of those, or about 125 per year, are misdemeanor DWI convictions.

Fines in felonies were rare in the 30 year period before I took office but are commonplace now. In criminal cases Red River County now collects about \$220,000 per year in fines and court costs from district, county, and justice courts.

"Manufacturers' warranties vary and people differ in the way they put wear on a mattress. A good habit is to check one periodically for sags and lumps, and for any loss of support," says Arthur Grehan, executive director of the American Inner-spring Manufacturers (AIM).

"Don't give old and worn mattresses to children or adults. According to the orthopedic specialists, old hand-me-downs could encourage back problems," he adds.

When shopping for a new mattress, test the various models thoroughly. Always buy a mattress and box spring in sets. An old box spring will reduce the life of the new mattress and provide less support.

You're better off spending a little more for better quality, Grehan says. "It's worth it if the mattress can save you a backache."

In addition to the instructions your doctor has written for you, some drug stores provide "reminder labels" to help you take your medicine properly. "Take with food or milk" is one instruction used. Unless you have a cast-iron digestive system, some medicines may cause you to have an upset stomach. Taking the prescription with food or milk may decrease this effect.

By following instructions, you can get the best results from your medications. If you have any questions about how to take a prescription, ask your pharmacist.

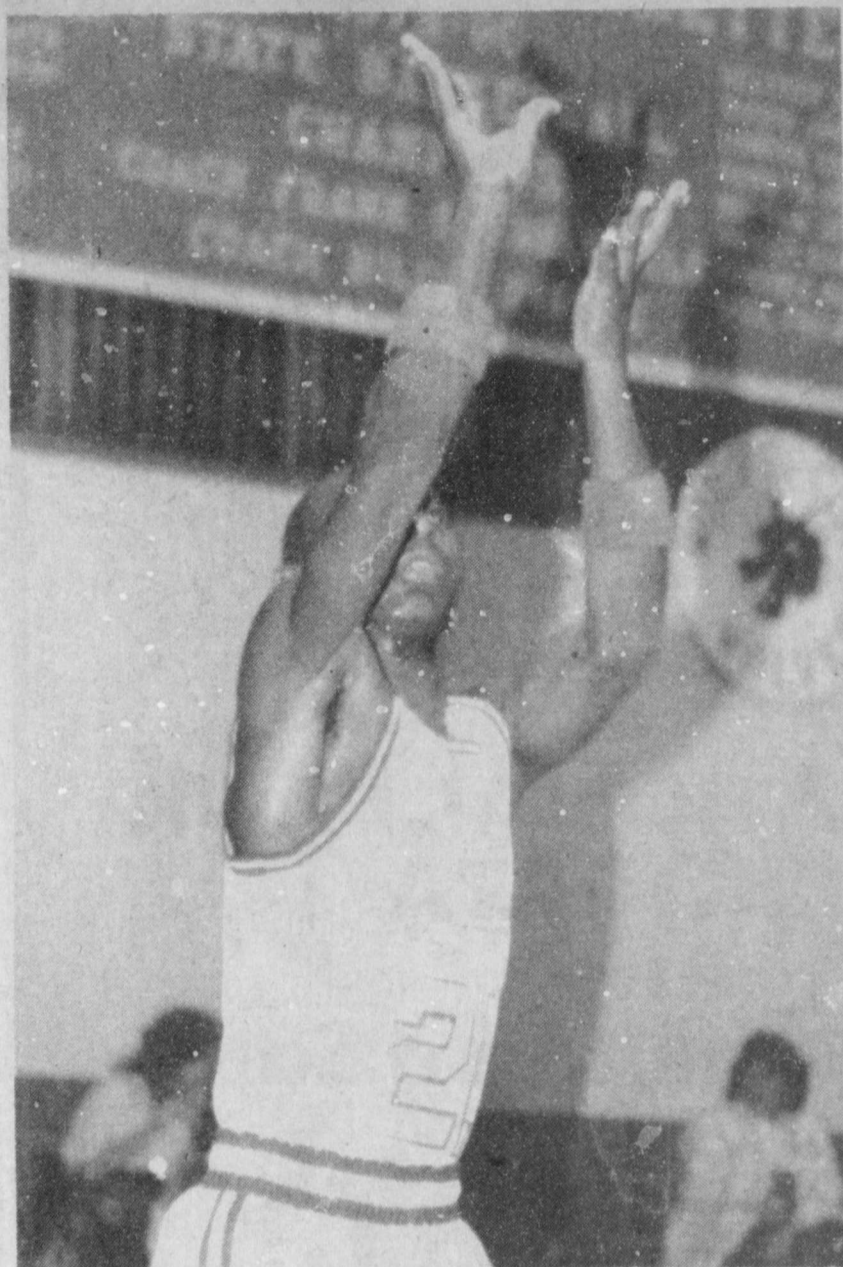

The Winter Lure of the Rio Grande Valley

Winter warmth. Perhaps more than anything else it is the warmth of the "Valley" that attracts hundreds of thousands of people to the southernmost region of Texas. After all, this is palm-tree land -- a huge river delta that lies as far south as the Florida Keys with highways lined by palm trees sprung from Egyptian seeds planted by the Royal Palm Society in the early 1900s, a winter temperature that averages 76 degrees and Mexico a river-crossing away.

But there is more to the Valley than warm, sunny days. Here are just a few of the many wonders of the Rio Grande Valley.

Los Ebanos Ferry

At the leisurely rate of 11 cars and 28 people per hour, the Los Ebanos Ferry can hardly be called the ultimate in efficiency. But it is the last hand-drawn ferry on the Rio Grande and has become a popular tourist stop. It's located about fifteen miles west of McAllen and is the only government licensed hand-pulled ferry on any boundary of the United States.

Fruit and Vegetables

The Valley is home to 56 different types of fruit and vegetable crops including juicy grapefruits, sweet oranges, and pint-sized tangerines. Most citrus can be purchased at rock-bottom prices from the numerous citrus vendors along the highways. The year round growing season allows the harvest of three crops a year for some vegetables.

Mexico

The border cities of Mexico are well known for tasty Mexican food and shopping bargains on everything from liquors to velvet paintings. The main Mexican border cities, Reynosa and Matamoros, are only thirty minutes from anywhere in the Val-

ley, and with the exchange rate at 2,500 pesos to the dollar, don't even think of changing your money to pesos, the dollar is too valuable.

South Padre Island

Here's the place to go for a winter tan. Hotels and condominiums on the beach, fishing charters, sailboat rentals, swimming, scuba diving, and sitting in the warm winter sun.

Don't forget to visit Sea Turtle, Inc, a turtle rescue company run by Ila Loetscher, better known as the "Turtle Lady." At the facility injured marine turtles, many of them endangered species, are nursed back to health. Those that cannot be returned to the open sea are given a place as permanent residents and become part of Ila's "Meet the Turtles" programs that are open to the public. Sea Turtle, Inc is located at 5805 Gulf Boulevard, 512/761-3544. Call ahead for winter hours.

On the way to "the island," be sure to stop at the Port Isabel Lighthouse State Park for a panoramic view of the area. The lighthouse was built in 1851.

The Confederate Air Force Flying Museum

One of the most unique museums in Texas, this one is dedicated to WWII aircraft, and all of them are in flying condition. Due to the demand of the aircraft at airshows around the country, one never knows what aircraft will be on display at the museum

but since it is the largest collection of vintage flying aircraft in the world, no one is ever disappointed. The only surviving A-20 Havoc, SB Dauntless, SBC2 Helldiver and F82 Twin Mustang are just some of the planes on exhibit. The Flying Museum includes three large hangers containing not only aircraft, but the largest collection of aircraft nose art. The museum, located in Harlingen, is open daily (512/415-1057).

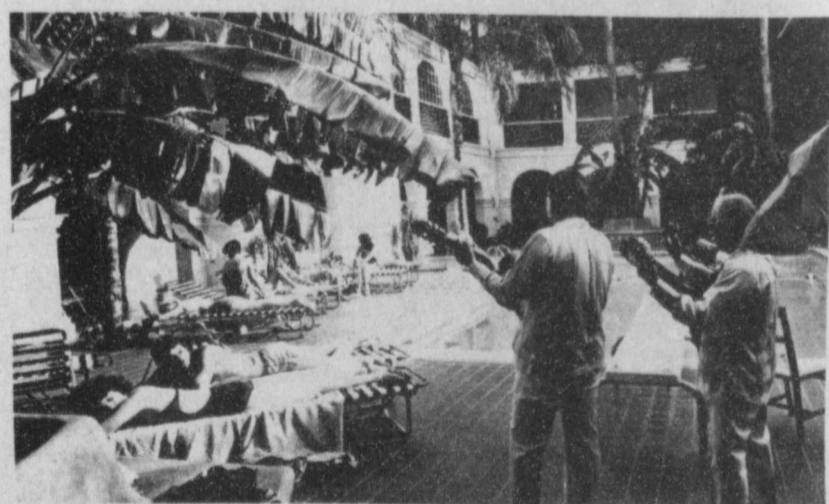
While at the museum, make a loop around the Marine Military Academy to see the model used in casting the Iwo Jima monument. The monument is 102 feet tall and weighs 130 tons.

Gladys Porter Zoo

One of the most innovative zoos in the country, Brownsville's Gladys Porter Zoo is dedicated to the preservation of endangered species. You will find no cages at this zoo as the animals live in realistic environments separated from sightseers only by waterways.

Wildlife and Bird Watching

The Valley is home to two spectacular wildlife refuges, Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge near the Gulf of Mexico and Santa Ana Wildlife Refuge near McAllen. The Santa Ana sanctuary is a favorite of ornithologists around the world, as the refuge has the distinction of holding the record for the greatest variety of birds spotted in the U.S. in an hour's viewing.

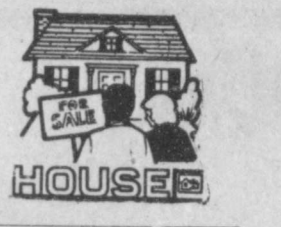

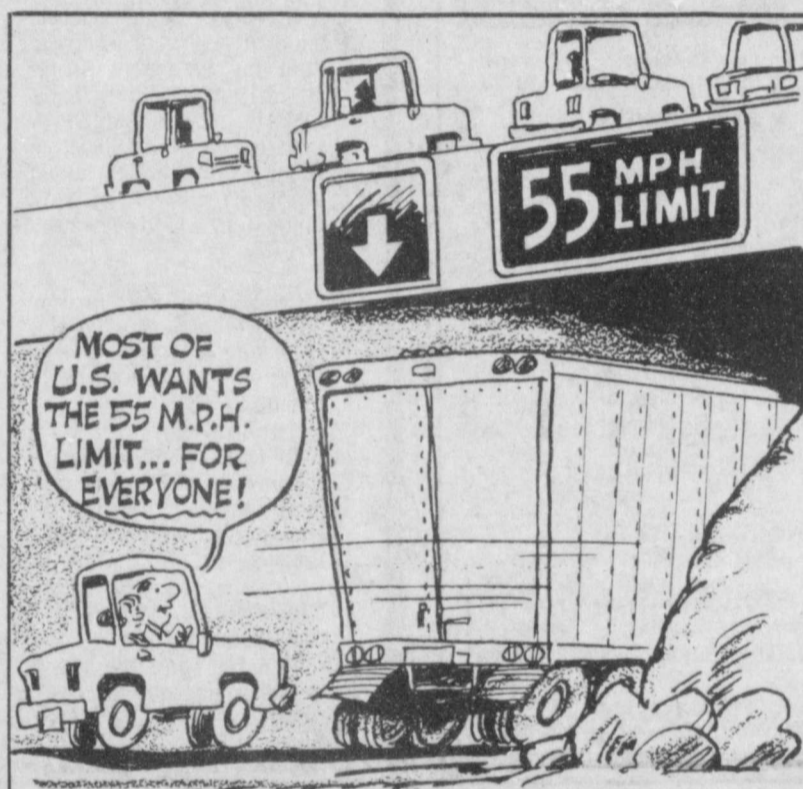
RACHEL SMITH steals the ball from a startled Detroit Lady Eagle as the Rivercrest Rebelettes took a 62-26 win over the Eagles
