Wet Winter Has Farmers Far Behind

Area farmers will find themselves going day and night when it finally dries up, after one of the wettest winters in recent history.

After a very dry fall, the rain set in early in October, and since that time, farmers have been unable to get into the fields.

Winter plowing is undone, and getting the ground ready for planting this spring will be a big job. Hard freezes and the extreme damp have had cattle producers feeding out more hay than they had anticipated, and many report that their supplies are running low sooner than expected.

The ice which paralyzed the area two weeks ago softened the soil, and mud has become a serious problem for many people feeding livestock. Most livestock is reported in good condition, however, and if the area can avoid more serious ice storms, spring grazing will begin to come up within a month or so.

Winter is far from over, however, as weathermen predict more bitter temperatures after the current warming trend.

Armchair gardeners are ordering seed and potato and English pea planting time is fast approaching.

Now is a good time for building new flower beds, if the weather allows, or fertilizing old ones. Rose growers are busy pruning, and the cold freeze may reduce insect populations enough to be a benefit during the coming spring

and summer months.

Economists predict that cotton will be in big demand again this year, and local ag specialists expect to see more

acreage planted in cotton locally.

Most people, whether involved in agriculture or not, are ready for a drying trend which will allow them some freedom of movement outside.

Whether or not the winter rains will slack up before spring rains begin is, of course, still to be seen.

He is a lifelong resident of Talco and has been employed at Talco State Bank since 1976 as a teller, working while he attended college. He is married to the former Carla Brown Sargent and they have two children, Angela Sargent, a freshman at Rivercrest High School and Josh Jones, a fourth grader at Francis Corprew In-

termediate School in Mt. Pleasant.
"I'm proud to be only the fifth president of the bank and a third generation president," said Jones.


tion operator.







TO THE VOTERS OF RED RIVER COUNTY As I seek re-election for a second term as your Tax Assessor-Collector, I would like to share with you several laws passed by the Legislature that directly affect the Tax Office.

Probably the most significant change occurred in 1979 when Texas voters voted for Tax Relief. The Senate passed Bill 621 and the House of Representatives passed HB 30, and this called for: 1) The establishment of an Appraisal Office in each county, headed by a Chief Appraiser who is hired by a Board of Directors consisting of local taxpayers, 2) A complete reappraisal of all property in the State, and, 3) The Appraisal Office is responsible for all renditions, valuations, exemptions, etc. Our office can no longer make changes to the Tax

Another new law forces the County to notify taxpayers of ALL taxes due every five years. The law mandated that statements be mailed in 1985, or the County would lose the penalty and interest on delinquent taxes. At this point it was necessary for our office to go on computer. Matching delinquent accounts with current owners was a very time consuming task that took months to accomplish, but one that certainly paid off. This was the first time EVER that statements on all delinquent taxes were mailed, and since that time our delinquent collections have totaled \$517,527.39. Delinquent

taxes being on computer enables us to increase office efficiency, and decreases physical space requirements. The collections program provides for complete accountability and audibility. Our office also collects taxes for Annona City and Langford Creek Water Control District.

The County has contracted with a law firm in Austin to collect delinquent taxes. They mail notices to all delinquent taxpayers. Then 30 to 60 days later they send a reminder to those who have not paid. Those to whom suits will be filed will receive a special "Notice of Intent to File Suit" letter telling them they have one last chance to pay before a lawsuit will be filed against them. Some taxpayers are so far behind that the attorneys approve a payment schedule by letting them pay taxes for one year at regular intervals. The delinquent attorneys receive 15% of the amount of taxes collected. We feel that in all fairness to the majority who pay their taxes, that we should make a concerted effort to collect the delinquent accounts

Another big change came about in 1983, when the Legislature passed the "Property Taxation Professional Certification Act". This requires that appraisers and Tax-Assessor-Collectors achieve certification within 5 years and be re-certified every 5 years based on continuing education. I have attended and received certificates from all the schools required by the State Property Tax Board in the Assessing-Collecting field, namely:

- 1) Texas Property Tax System
- 2) Introduction to Appraisal
- 3) Property Tax Collections 4) Property Tax Assessment
- 5) Property Tax Law
- 6) Cost Approach to Value
- 7) Market Approach to Value 8) Advanced Property Tax Collections

I have passed the Level III and Level IV State exams and have been certified as a Registered Texas Assessor-Collector by the Board of Tax Professional Examiners. With so much time and money invested in my schooling, I would like to take this opportunity to solicit the support of each voter in the Democratic Primary, March 8th. My pledge is to perform the duties of Tax Assessor-Collector to the best of my ability and I look forward to ser-






