Then it snowed...big fat fluffy flakes that didn't stick because it melted too fast.

Then it rained.

Then it hit just-almost-freezing temperatures and snowed some more..but that didn't stick except in the shade.

Now it is bright and sunny and warm again.

No wonder the poor English ladies think I've gone mad...the weather has!

Only a Texan can truly begin to accept the vagueries of weather....because from one day to the next, we never know. It may come thunder storms, hurricanes, tornadoes, mild breezes, bright sun, torrential rains, gentle showers or hellish heat and drought from day to day

In England the climate is always mild...they thought our May was intensely hot ... what would they have done in July and August?

In England there is always plenty of rain, and winters are basically mild, although damp and rainy. Texas weather must look might

Local Sales Taxes Up

Thursday, February 18, ,1988

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Friday sent checks totaling \$129.4 million in local sales taxes to 1037 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said this month's allocations increased by 3.4 percent over last year's February checks, a growth of \$4.3 million statewide.

"The growth in December's holiday sales is yet another indication that the state's recession has finally ended", Bullock said, "This increase in consumer spending is a statewide vote of confidence in our economy.'

The widened tax base, authorized by the Texas Legislature last year, also contributed to the increase in allocations, Bullock said.

February's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in December and reported to the Comptroller's Office by January 20. This month's allocation also included yearly and fourth quarter filers.

The largest allocation this month, \$22.1 million, went to Houston an increase of 10.47 percent. Dallas received the second largest check, \$14.7 million and increase of 1.4 percent. Bullock also sent checks totalling \$59.6 million to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities, an





Her husband, Frank Lewis, preceded her in death in 1973.


